

Their herd which numbers 75 animals is headed by Mink's Mercedes Baron, six of whose half-sisters have yielded 16 pounds 5 whose half-sisters hav yielded 16 pounds 5 ounces each of butter per week, a little over 16 pounds of milk making one pound of butter on an average. Mink, the dam of Baron, gave 96 pounds of milk in one day, 16,629½ in one year, 3 pounds 9 ounces of butter in one day on grass and 20 pounds 9 ounces in seven days.

Spring Wheat vs. Barley.

A committee of the Dominion Millers Association was appointed at the last meeting of the association to take into consideration the question of procuring for the farmers of South Ontario a kind of apring wheat that will ripen a couple of weeks carlier than the kind that has been grown. The effect of the McKinley Bill, it is hoped, may be mitigated if a kind of wheat that will ripen early enough to escape the drying sun of South Ontario can be found, to make wheat growing as productive and profitable as barley. What is wanted is a spring wheat that will ripen about two weeks earlier than the kinds now grown (to a small degree), which will be about a week later than fall wheat. The committee has so decided to go vigorously into the question and get all the information obtainable; and this may necessitate the putting of a man into the United States to look into it. Bee Statistics.

An exchange contains the following figures on bees, bee-keepers and beeswax. Some of the items appear rather large, but they may be correct. It reads thus:

Careful estimates put the number of bee-keepers in the United States at 350,000; over 10,000 of this number keep more than 500 hives each. The value of the honey produced by them in 1889 was over \$100,000,000, and the value of the bee-wax produced for the same year exceeded \$17,000,000. Many tons of wax were manufactured into ccmb foundation to be used by the bee-keepers in their own apiaries, as it is fully demonstrated that the use of foundation in the apiaries very largely increases the yield of honey. There is little doubt that in the very near future the bee-keeper will use all the wax he produces for comb foundation. One firm made 64,000 pounds of it last year, and found sale for it at home.

Fat bullocks run close on \$9 per cwt., live weight, but they leave little or no margin for the past four months' of the state of \$60 each, but some experienced stockmen asy that they are too dear. They have I been paying pretty well in past winters, however, and the policy is, 'Never venture, hever gain.''
