The girl herself refused to incriminate Ward, taking all the biame upon herself. There was every prospect that Ward would be released, especially when the Caraman-Chimays interfered in order to prevent a scandal, whereupon the lady made a further charge, to the effect that, while he was living with her at Bourges, he had in May last ruined her daughter of 10.

Ward denies this charge, and says it is made by the woman out of revenge. The little girl herself, however, supports her mother's charge. The woman says that Ward offered her \$50,000 to keep silent about the affair, but Ward himself says this was the amount she asked of him after he had left her.

DISPOSAL OF SEWAGE. In view of the fact that the question of the disposal of the sewage of this city is continually cropping up, and will be a source of trouble, expense, aye, and loss of life through filth diseases, until it is settled, the discussion of the question of sewage disposal before the British Association is interesting. The chief paper on the subject was contributed by Prof. George Forbes, who dealt with the utilization of refuse in cities, especially by means of the application of electricity. He said there was no doubt of electricity. He said there was no doubt that the use of destructors for getting up steam for electric lighting purposes, would play an important part in the future, but in most towns it would be impossible to get the full advantage from the destructors, because they must be burning refuse day and night, whereas for electric lighting purposes, or the distribution of power, it was only during certain times of the day that there was a demand, so that the heat from the destructors was wasted for the from the destructors was wasted for the greater part of the day; but by a system of hydraulic storage in Edinburgh they would be able to use destructors with the greatest advantage. in the city yesterday when the ADVERTISER bulletined the fact that Paul Peel, the femous Canadian artist, had died that afternoon in Paris, France. The melancholy intelligence was conveyed across the Atlantic by a cablegram to his father, ex-Ald. John R. Peel, of this city, who was nearly distracted by the receipt of a message so unexpected and so heartrending in import. As the news spread, general regret was expressed that a life so great in accomplishment and in promise had gone out ere the famous artist had reached the age when many of the masters began to secure ecognition

And sincere were the words of condolence that were extended to the grief-stricken parent and brothers and sisters of the deceased.

Londoners had an opportunity of mee ing their talented fellow-townsman in September and October, 1890, when his mother's last illness brought him to his native city from the sunny land of his adoption. At that time his face and figure panded attention wherever he went As then sketched by us, he possessed a well-knit figure a little above the middle neight; dark, finely shaped head with a hick, black lock falling over the brow; consitive clear-cut features, softly bearded; brilliant dark eyes and gentle manner—that was Paul Peel, the artist.

As a painter, Paul Peel was born, not made, for his earliest tastes and inclinations tended strongly in the direction of his on. While yet a mere lad chosen profession. While yet a mere lad he was associated for a short time with W. L. Judson, who had no hesitation in prophesying a brilliant future for him. In 1877, finding opportunities for study in Canada circumscribed, he began his art studies at the Academy of Fine Arts, Philadelphia, where he remained three years. studies at the Academy of Fine Arts, Philadelphia, where he remained three years. In 1880 Mr. Peel went to London, England, where he studied in the British Museum, and began to paint for the Royal Academy. The English winter proving unfavorable to his health, he remained in London only three or four months, going from there direct to Paris. He has lived in Poris ever since, with the exception of the brief period taken up in visiting the home of his boyhood and in short excursions to Britanny, where some of his most charming pictures of rural and domestic life had their inspiration. He studied under Lefevre, Boulanger, and finally Gerome. He always spoke of the training he received from Lefevre and Gerome as being particularly severe; still it was Constant, a more modern painter than either, and a better colorist, who, as Mr. Peel himself asserved, "first opened my eyes." During the four years he was under Constant he made real progress.

It was a great advantage to Mr. Peel to have sat at the feet of several of the masters; it saved him from the slightest masters; it saved him from the slightest tendency to become a mere imitator of any one of them. Paul Peel was no imitator; he did not indulge himself in a repetition with variations of the work which made him famous out of sheer repugnance to being known as 'Paul Peel, the child painter.' His ambition was to reach the tinal goal of art, which is historical painting.

Paul Peel was a hard worker, but he was not a mechanical drudge. 





To-Day's Imposing Ceremony in Westminster Abbey.

Wreaths Sent by the Queen and Mrs. Gladstone.

Many Notable Personages in

London, Oct. 12.—To-day, with all honors which the church to which he belonged could pay, the remains of the greatest poet England has produced in latter days were laid in their final resting place—
beneath the walls of the historic Westminster Abbey.

Long before the hour set for the services to begin an immense crowd began to gather in the vicinity of the Abbey. Ad dense mass of people assembled in South Palace yard between the Abbey and the House of Parliament, while an equally large crowd packed the streets to the north and east of the Abbey. At 10 c'clock the doors of the Abbey. At 10 c'clock the doors of the Abbey were awung open and ticket holders were admitted. Many of those who entered the building carried wreaths, which were placed in the Jerusalem Chamber with those already deposited there. Among the tokens was a beautiful design sent by Princess Louise. Among the most noticeable floral gitts was a wreath sent by Mrs. Gladstone on behalf of her husband and herself. This was composed of sweet smelling leaves from posed of sweet smelling leaves from the Gladstone gardens at Hawarden and was made by Mrs. Gladstone's own hands. Attached to the wreath was a card, upon which was written the following couplet:

Attached to the wreath was a card, upon which was written the following couplet:

An' in the vast cathedral leave him. God accept him—Christ receive him.

The Queen sent a wreath composed of laurel leaves tied with a broad bow of white silk ribbon. A card was attached to the wreath, on which in the Queen's own handwriting were the words:

"A mark of sincere regard and admiration from Victoria R. I."

Her Majesty also sent an everlasting metallic wreath of laurel with the letters "V. R. I." is gilt, worked in a monogram, and bearing the words:

"A tribute of affectionate regard and true admiration from the sovereign."

Railway Crossings.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

Does the city council control the portion of the streets that are run over by the railways, or do they deliver up control of it altogether, as well as all responsibility for accidents that might occur? Are not the council (directly) and the railroad company (indirectly) responsible for any accident that might occur on that portion of the street occupied by the railroad company through negligence on the part of the company to have openings on the street properly covered, and negligence on the part of the council to compel the railroad company to attend to the same?

Does not the council have a right to protect the citizens by compelling railway companies to keep the portion of the track that is on the street in a safe condition for pedestrians?

[The corporation represented by the city council has control of streets crossed or run over hy the railroad course.

council has control of streets crossed or run over by the railways, subject to the legal rights and liabilities of the railway com-panies, and is responsible for accidents caused by negligence, but is not necessarily directly responsible for all accidents. The carectly responsible for all accidents. The railway company are responsible directly for accidents caused by their neglect, and the corporation is responsible for accidents caused by its neglect. It may happen that caused by its neglect. It may happen that both are responsible to the party injured. The corporation has in such cases a remedy against the railway, if the accident was caused by the acts or neglect of the officials of the railway. The fact of the accident is prima facte evidence of negligence, against the railway company for a manifest entered to the control of t the railway company for an accident caused by their neglect, but in the case of the corporation there must be evidence of knowledge of the defect or obstruction causing the accident. It is the right and duty of the city council to compel the railway companies to fulfill their legal liability. ED ITOR ADVERTISER.


