The Parish Councils Bill. LONDON, Jan. 9. - The House of Commons fixed Jan. 11 as the date for the report stage of the Parish Councils Bill.

Anglo-Canadian Trade. LONDON, Jan. 9 .- The British trade returns for December show that the imports from Canada amounted in value £581,736, a decrease from the previous December of £35,809. The exports to Canada for the month were £244 899, or £70,555 less than for December, 1892. The total imports from Canada for the year were £10,236,-371, a decrease as compared with 1892 of £715,424. The exports to the Dominion for the year totaled £4,754,834, a decrease of £67,450 as compared with 1892.

Dead Dervishes. Massowan, Jan. 9. - Late dispatches received here from Kassala, confirm the previous accounts of the battle recently fought between the Italian troops and the Dervishes. It is now stated that the latter left 4,000 dead upon the field, and that, in addition, the leader of the Dervishes, Hamed Ali, and all his emirs, were killed. The Dervishes are said to be much discouraged at their defeat, and serious dissensions are reported to exist among their chiefs.

Ready for a Ruction.

LONDON, Jan. 9 .- A dispatch to the Chronicle from Vienna says: "The officers in command of the artillery and engineers in upper Italy have been ordered to put the fortresses on the Italian-Swiss frontier on a war footing. The coast batteries on the Gulf of Genoa will also be put in a better condition. The military commanders at Venice and other districts have been ordered to keep arms and ordinance ready for arming the fortresses."

Wholesale arrests have been made in connection with the attempt.

Work or Bread. BERLIN. Jan. 10.-There was a riot yesterday evening outside the warming refuge, situated beneath a railway arch. A crowd of unemployed persons, after loudly demanding work or bread, smashed the doors and windows of the refuge. This crowd was reinforced by riotous mobs from the adjacent districts and eventually became so disorderly that the police were ordered to draw their swords and charge upon the mob. This was done and after a sharp struggle the rioters were dispersed. and a number of the leaders of the disturbance were arrested. It is stated that the riot had been planned for several days.

Two Toronto Boys Drowned-And a Score of People Came Near It.

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 10 .- A sad drowning accident occurred last evening on the bay at the foot of York street. A party of boys were there skating on the slip. A lad named Owens went through. A comrade named Coombs went in after him. A third tried to help with the same result. A fourth got a pole and approached more cautiously, but the boys behind crowded on the thin ice and it cracked and the fourth boy went in. Thanks to his pole he got out without great difficulty and helped one of the other boys to firm ice. The two boys who first fell in, Owens and Coombs. were beyond their aid by this time. A boat house keeper named Akroyd was on the spot in a few minutes with a boat and he and others succeeded in getting the first body, that of Owens, in about twenty minutes. Life, however, was extinct. The second body was secured ten minutes later. As it was being taken ashore a second accident occurred which might have been far worse than the first. The body was taken to the quarters of the

London's First Mayor Celebrates

Murray Anderson and What He Has

Brief Sketch of a Busy Life-His Ancestry -Early Methodis m-Incidents in

Mr. Murray Anderson was 80 years old yesterday. In 1778 or thereabouts three brothers-inlaw lived about 60 miles from the present site of New York City. The war of the rebellion had broken out and they were called upon to join Washington's army. But they were royal to the King of England and would not take up arms against him, so they were obliged to leave the country. They had heard of a place called Canada, away out west somewhere, and in that direction they turned their horses'

During the war of the rebellion in 1776, Col. Peter Anderson had charge of the King's Rangers, then stationed at New York. He was married to Miss Abigail Fortner, a niece of Sir Charles Douglas, of cents a bushel more for wheat in the neigh-Lafayette and Washington at the battle of Princetown, New Jersey. that time. The colonel's son Charles married Miss Brooks, whose advent is described above, and Mr. Murray Anderson was born on Jan. 9, 1814. His birthplace was on the battle ground of Lundy's Lane, and there is a little history connected with Mr. Anderson's given name. Gen. Murray had boarded with Mr. Anderson's parents during the stirring times of 1812 and 1814. Murray Anderson's father was by this time a colonel of artillery and had taken part in every battle during the trouble-Queens-ton, Niagara, Stoney Creek, Crysler Farm, Chippewa and Lundy's Lane. The defeat of the enemy in the last named engagement was mainly caused by the gallant work of the artillery under Col. Anderson, and thus, as it were, the whole future of Canada was at one time bound up in the hands of father of the present Murray Anderson. The war drew to a close, and when the little son was born on Jan. 9, 1814, Gen. Murray requested to be allowed to name the child, and he named him after

himself, "Murray." Murray Anderson came to London from Hamilton in 1835, stayed here a year, and then went back to Hamilton, where he was connected with the late Edward Jackson. In 1838 he married Miss Jane C. Kerr, a native of Albany, N. Y. As a result of this union three children were born, two of whom are now living-Edward and Sarah, wife of J. H. Flock, Q. C. Returning to London in 1840, Mr. Anderson went into business, making tinware and buying furs from the Indians. Mr. Anderson can well remember the time when Methodism in London was freprewhen it is remembered that the Methodist circuit, of which London was a preaching station in those days, extended to Woodstock. St. Thomas, Sarnia and Goderich. The Methodist services in London were divided between two preachers, Rev. Mr. Law and Rev. Mr. Wright. They worshiped in a union church occupied at different times by Presbyterians, Baptists and Congregationalists. This with a small Roman Catholic chapel and an English Church chapel comprised the religious element of those early days. London East was not thought of at that time and it was nothing but a wilderness and a swamp. Mr. Anderson commenced the manufacture of stoves in connection with his tin business, and to lessen competition with Rochester and Buffalo manufacturers he was mainly instrumental in having the tariff increased from 5 to 15 per cent.

In 1855 London; was incorporated as a city, and Mr. Anderson was elected its first mayor. Previous to that he had filled the reeve's chair for three terms. He was an early shareholder in the old London and Gore Railway, on the old Great Western road. When the road was being built the president of the New York Central made the company an offer. If they would extend the London and Gore Railroad to Niagara Falls and Detroit he would take \$800,000 stock. To this the stockholders agreed and the charter was renewed accordingly. Then the rebellion of 1837 and 1838 put a stop to the whole project for a time. After the war the company made a great effort to find purchasers for the stock. Mr. Harris, president of the road, who lived over the river, where the sixth ward is now, went to England to try and interest capitalists there. In the meantime Mr. Anderson, as reove of the town council, used his influence to get the city to purchase \$100,000 worth of stock, payable in a twenty-year debenture. The council carried it. Mr. Anderson, being a county councilor, (the county through il then covered the counties of Elgin

and Middlesex), moved a similar resolution in the county council and they also purchased \$100,000 worth of stock. When this news reached England it gave confidence among the speculators there, and when Mr. Harris returned home he stated that after that he could have disposed of four times the amount of stock he had for sale. In 1855 Mr. Anderson represented the stock as mayor of London. Mr. Brydges, Hamilton, was superintendent of the road and Mr. W. H. Muir, of the same place, was assistant. These gentlemen impressed Mr. Anderson with the fact that a dividend was wanted. The stock was then only worth about 80 cents on the dollar. The company offered \$100,000 in scrip for the debenture, and Mr. Anderson closed the bargain. Shortly after that a Mr. McInnes, representing an English firm, commenced to dicker for the stock. From 80 cents he came up to par. This was in Hamilton. Coming back to London Mr. Anderson called a special meeting of the council and advised them to sell. They agreed and Mr. Anderson went down to Hamilton and returned with \$100,000 in cash.

Fifty thousand dollars was badly needed at that time to build sewers. The city had paid 70 cents on the dollar for the stock, and thus through the instrumentality of Mr. Anderson they cleared \$30,000. Mr. Anderson tried to induce the warden of the county council to sell at the same rate, but he was holding for higher prices. Shortly afterwards the county sold out at 65 cents. The main object in building the Great

Western road was to lower the freight charges on teaming from Hamilton. But when the road was operated the rate was almost the same, and so Hamilton and Toronto continued one house standing and this was the last of to have an immense advantage over London as far as shipping facilities were concerned. OTTAWA, Jan. 10 .- The Governor-General has exercised the clemency of the crown in the case of the two Indians, Peter and Jack, convicted at the New Westminster, B.C., assizes and sentenced to be hanged for the murder of a white man. She was a Kloochman and the Chehalis witnesses testified that she had confessed to having done the shooting herself. Her friends, however, gave strong evidence against the accused. In consequence of the fued between the two tribes of Indians it was thought to be more conducive to a better state of feeling to exercise mercy rather than make it appear to the one that the lives of their friends were sacrificed and to the other that their ill will had been satisfied. The sentence was, therefore, commuted to life imprisonment.

VICTORIA, B.C., Jan. 9.—The public alarm at Honolulu was revived on the 16th by the British Minister asking and receiving permission from the Provisional Government to land marines from H. M. S. Champion for the protection of the British Legation and the property of British resi-

dents in case of disturbance arising. On the same evening Capt. Rooke, of the Champion, stated that he expected the Queen to be restored by the American forces, and that he should land about 50 marines, who would remain entirely

IT TROUBLES WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 .- It is believed at the State Department there is little likelihood of bloodshed at Henolulu.

It is evident, however, that the landing of British troops has added a new and troublesome feature to the situation. VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 9 .- Advices from Honolulu to Jan. 1 state that on Dec. 13 President Dole asked Minister Willis why he was in communication with the ex-Queen, with a view to her re-establishment. Willis replied by submitting a communication from the United States Government stating that as the Queen surrendered her throne under pressure of the armed forces of the United States, the President, therefore, determined not to send back to the Senate for its action the annexation treaty, and the Queen was informed of this de-

reported to have said: "It becomes my duty to advise you, sir, the executive of the Provisional Government, and your Ministers, of the President's determination of the question which your action and that of the Queen devolved upon him, and that you are expected to promptly relinquish to her constitutional authority, and now, Mr. President and gentlemen of the Provisional Government, in the name and by the authority of the United States of America, I submit to you the question: "Are you willing to abide by the decision of the President?"

THE "GLOBE" AND WOMAN'S RIGHT TO A VOICE AT THE BALLOT BOX.

We regret to see the Toronto Globe for the second time since the plebiscite vote talking covertly against the enfranchisement of women. It introduces the old platitude that many women appear to be indifferent to the franchise, and advances the recent vote to show that many women in Toronto who had votes did not vote, not even for prohibition. Some of our contemporary's points are two-edged swords.

1. Doubtless many women did not vote, for various reasons, not necessarily because of disinclination. But more men-voters than women voters failed to vote at Toronto in the recent election. Why not, because of the neglect of some Toronto men, disfranchise all other Toronto men?

2. Some women may be indifferent to the right and privilege of voting-some may even as yet be opposed to it. Is it in accordance with justice that those women who do want to vote should be deprived of the franchise because there are others who do not want to do so?

3. The Globe seems to think it makes a point because of the woman in Toronto who voted, 25 per cent. voted against prohibition. Who said that all women would vote alike? Do all men vote alike? There are two ways of putting a thing. You may wring your hands that 25 per cent. of the women of Toronto who voted did not vote for prohibition, or you may rejoice that 75 percent. of the women of Toronto who voted did vote for prohibition. We hope the Globe is not stealing a march to give the impression that 25 per cent. of the women of all Ontario who voted at all voted against prohibition. When the full returns are in it will be found that, no matter what Toronto did, of the women who voted throughout the Province, the vote was nearly unanimous for prohibition.

4. The Globe talks as if the mass of the wemen of Ontario had had an opportunity to vote in the plebiscite. The very opposite is the case. The mass of those women of vigor and brain who are the life and soul of the churches, the day schools, the Sabbath schools, temperance and missionary work, the wives and mothers especially, had no votes during the recent plebiscite, though they earnestly desired the ballot opportunity of saying "Yes" to whatsoever things in legislation are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever

5. A plebiscite in Ontario on the subject of allowing or denying equal rights to women at the ballot box would have as large an affirmative majority as had the "Yes" in the prohibition plebiscite. With insignificant variation, the same people who voted "No" on the plebiscite would vote "No" on the question of equal rights for women at the ballot box; while the same people who voted "Yes" in the prohibition plebiscite would vote "Yes" on the question of equal rights for women at the ballot box. At the same great inaugural plebiscite convention at Toronto, which foreshadowed a popular majority of 75,000 for prohibition, the following resolution

was adopted unanimously: "That this convention rejoices that at least a section of the women of Ontario are to vote in the coming plebiscite, and trusts that the time is not far distant when they will no longer suffer disability in any election because of sex."

## THE THREAT EXPEDIENT.

The threat method is always resorted to by the monopolist when he finds the trend of public opinion in favor of tax reduction. It has a powerful influence with men who know that they have again and again escaped popular condemnation by the joint influences of the money bags of the combines and the gerrymander. But the day of reckoning is approaching.

GET A MOVE ON AT OTTAWA. The United States House of Representatives has got down to the business of considering the bill for the radical reduction of taxes in the adjoining Republic. Mr. Wilson, chairman of the committee of ways and means, introduced the measure in an admirably plain and comprehensive speech, in which he showed the evils resulting from a system that discriminates in favor of the few at the expense of the many.

While the United States Congress is thus actively engaged in promoting legislation and forwarding a settlement of a question that will tend to revive business, the Dominion Government appears to be afraid to call Parliament together to consider its scheme, if it has any scheme, until such time as it hears from Washington. This hesitancy does not tend to the improvement of business, but rather keeps the country in an unsettled condition. Parliament should be already in session, instead of as yet uncalled. Work as the legislators will, when the House meets at a late date, there is always an unseemly and unsatisfactory rush to get the business completed, and to escape from the capital before the warm weather sets in. 

THE FIRST ROUND

#### Fought by the Water Commissioners for 1891-Objections to Rates-The New Buildings and Machinery.

The Board of Water Commissioners held their inaugural meeting for the year 1894 in the city hall last night, all the members, with Inspectors Platt and Plastow being present. The first business was the selection of a chairman. It was moved by Mayor Essery, seconded by Commissioner Cowan, that Commissioner Jones act as chairman for the third time.

The chairman replied, thanking the members for the honor conferred upon him. The chairman reported to the board that a committee of the Real Estate Owners' Protective Association had waited on him and requested that the board accompany them on a tour to Springbank in order to get posted on the workings of the depart-

The request did not meet with general favor, the mayor wanting to know why the association had not met the candidates on the hustings when before the people. The committee will very likely have to take their desired trip alone, the buildings at Springbank always being open for public inspection and the efficials in charge always ready to supply information.

Mr. A. E. Lloyd objected to the water rates which had been charged on "The Richmond." He said that he had made several improvements and reduced the number of taps. The meter will be tested.

In accordance with the report received from the chief engineer of the Steam Boiler Insurance Company recommending several repairs and a recleaning of the boilers, Engineer Moore stated that the repairs had been made and the instruction carried out. On behalf of the Steam Boiler Insurance Company of this city Mr. A. B. Powell applied for the insurance on the three boilers at Springbank. Referred to the chairman with power.

City Clerk Kingston forwarded a copy of the bylaw passed by the council granting water to the McClary Manufacturing Company at the rate of 5 cents per 100 cubic feet, with the option of purchasing their own meters or renting from the commissioners. Engineer Moore was instructed to

carry out the provisions of the bylaw. Fraser, owing to an excessive charge being made during the past quarter. The water pipe had broken near the hydrant and caused an extra cost of \$8 04. The commissioners followed out their previous course in such cases and remitted one-half. Engineer Findlay's semi-monthly report

The boilers will also be of the latest model, and the makers will have to give a guarantee against any loss for the first year after being in place. The pumps will have to be ready by June 1. The engineer was instructed to advertise for tenders for the

A Conference on the State of Religion.

Suggestion to Make Connection With the Superannuation Fund Scheme Obligatory - Home Mission Committees Appointed-Several Calls Dealt

In the lecture room of Knox Church. St. Thomas, the Presbytery of London met at 4 o'clock Monday, Jan. 8, for conference. After devotional exercises,

With.

Rev. Mr. Sawers, of Westminster, in-troduced the subject, "Should connection with the aged and infirm ministers' and widows' and orphans' funds be made obligatory on ordination?" and advanced vigorous arguments in favor of such com-pulsion. Messrs. Little and Sutherland followed in the same line. Mr. Macdonald also supported this view, but deprecated the prevalent idea that the money received from such funds was charity. It was simply an insurance. The discussion was carried on by Messrs. Cook, Dewar, Young and others, and Mr. Sawers closed the debate.

The expression of opinion generally was in favor of making connection with the fund obligatory.

The subject of inciting congregations to greater liberality to the schemes of the church was discussed for a short time, and the conference adjourned.

MONDAY EVENING. The conference resumed at 8 o'clock in the evening, and Dr. Robertson gave a strong address in regard so the needs of home mission work in the Northwest.

Mr. Sutherland, of Fingal, followed on the subject, "What means other than the ordinary should be adopted to increase our contributions for missions?" Messrs. Henderson, Sawers, Young and Macdonald also spoke on the subject, and were followed by others.

The conference then closed at 9:45 p.m. TUESDAY MORNING. The Presbytery met at 9 a.m. yesterday,

A Diabolical Plot.

BARCELONA, Jan. 10. - Santiago Salvador, who was arrested at Saragossa, and who confessed that he was the author of the bomb explosion in the Lyceum Theater in this city, was further examined. He declared that a man named Bacherisi and another, both of whom were leaders of the Barcelona Anarchists, attended a meeting in the bull-ring in Barcelona. Most of the Anarchists went with Orsini bombs and other explosives, intending to blow up the building, and, in the confusion that would ensue, sack the town. The conspirators disagreed, and the plot was abortive. Bacherisi and the other leaders were immediately arrested. The police have been informed that Salvador some time ago murdered a custom house officer while the latter was trying to arrest him for smuggling. Salvador, who attempted to kill himself when arrested, is recovering his health. His wife is to be examined.

Delay is Dangerous. Sr. Louis, Mo., Jan. 10.—The Merchants' Exchange has appealed to the senators and representatives of Missouri in Congress to urge speedy action in Congress on the tariff bill as the delay is very injurious to business in the States.



Important Resolve of the Waterloo Temperance Fxccutive-Action of

GALT, Jan. 9 .- The county of Waterloo emperance executive held an important meeting yesterday afternoon, when, after full discussion of what action should now be taken to make the most of the plebiscite vote, the following resolution was carried unanimously: "Resolved, that we consider any effort on local option lines at the present time would be a step backward, and that we are opposed to any action looking in that direction as calculated to rob us of the fruits of the victory just gained, and that the present duty is to work directly for total prohibition, to secure for the Local and Dominion Houses thoroughly honest prohibition members, and to press upon the Legislature of Ontario and the Dominion

Parliament such prohibition legislation as may be within their respective provinces.' TORONTO, Jan. 9.—The members of the Ministerial Association, which met in the Y. M. C. A. library yesterday morning, were jubilant over the result of the plebiscite vote. It was moved by the Rev. Mr. Burns, seconded by Dr. Gallagher, "That this Ministerial Association, recognizes the hand of God as guiding the Christian pub-lic in their wise decision at the recent plebiscite, and hopes that the result will culminate speedily in the prohibition of the liquor traffic in our Province."

Before the meeting dispersed the following officers were elected: President, Rev. Dr. J. F. German, Eglington Methodist Church; vice-president, the Rev. Charles Duff, Parkdale Congregational Church. The secretary-treasurer, Rev. J. W. Burns, was re-elected.

At the annual meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held in their hall, Dufferin avenue, last evening, the matter of extending the influence of workingmen in the political affairs of the country was extensively discussed. For the purpose it was decided to form a political organization in each ward of the city to be called "Workingmen's Legislative Club." Messrs. J. T. Marks, James Taylor and H. B. Ashplant were appointed to draft a platform of the plan upon which these organizations will be conducted. It was pointed out during the meeting that the object of these bodies would chiefly be

An influential committee was appointed to make the needed arrangements. The demonstration promises to be a popular one in every respect. The proceeds go, as usual, to the charitable funds of the society, which, owing to the distress in the city, have been heavily drawn on recently.

Temperance Stock-Taking. The regular meeting of the Women's

Christian Temperance Union was held yesterday afternoon in Somerset Hall. Mrs. Thornley, president, presided. There was a large attendance. Aside from the ordinary routine business, the occasion was mainly set apart for what was called stock-taking — namely, taking into account the progress and present position of the temperance movement. Mrs. J. W. Jones, in an able paper, dealt with the growth of the London W. C. T. U. Mr. D. A. McDermid had been assigned the advancement of the cause in the city as a whole during the past few years, and handled his subject in an interesting and tactful manner. Mr. John Cameron gave a bird's-eye view of the past, present and future of the temperance cause in Ontario, covering a period of about 50 years. Votes of thanks were accorded the three speakers. The president announced that Jan. 23 would be "Crusade Day," when it is expected a large increase in the membership will be made.

We, the Liberal party of Canada, in con-

vention assembled declare: That the customs tariff of the Dominion should be based, not as it now is, upon the protective principle, but upon the requirements of the public service.

That the existing tariff, founded upon an unsound principle and used as it has been by the Government as a corrupting agency, wherewith to keep themselves in office, has developed monopolies, trusts and combinations:

It has decreased the value of farm and other landed property;
It has oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few;

It has checked immigration; It has caused great loss of population; It has impeded commerce; It has discriminated against Great

Britain In these, and in many other ways, it has purpose of manufacturing their own illumioccasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must continue to grow in intensity so long as the present tariff system

That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of this obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote domestic and foreign trade and hasten the re turn of prosperity to our people.

That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economical and efficient government That it should be so adjusted as to make free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon the necessaries of life and should be so arranged as to promote freer trade with

the whole world, more particularly Great Britain and the United States We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light

of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy. The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly

defined. The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profess their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of

protection. We denounce the principle of protection as radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fail to afford any substantial relief from the burdens under

which the country labors. This issue we unhesitatingly accept and upon it we await with the fullest condence the verdict of the electors of Canada.
