Massacre Had Its Effect. Turkey's Military and Naval Prepara-

tions Vigorously Pushed. London, March 25 .- The officials at the Foreign Office deny the statements made by the Chronicle that the powers have accepted promises made by the Sultan that King George of Greece shall occupy and administer the Government of Crete, and appoint a high ommissioner for the island, together with the intimation by that paper that the king would nominate his second son, Prince George, as commissioner, and that the Cabinet would discuss the

matter at once.

The News publishes a dispatch from Athens denying the statement that the Greek Government is in favor of making the Island of Crete a princedom under Prince George of Greece. The Westminster Gazette says: There is some reason to believe that an agreement may be reached tween the powers, based upon the Sul-tan's acceptance of the proposal of Greece to nominate Prince George as High Commissioner of Crete. This report, however, conflicts with the dispatch from Constantinople announcing the calling out for active service of further large contingents of the Turkish army and with the advices from Crete, via Athens, saying that the Cretan leaders have decided to accept nothing short of union with Greece.

This Curious Corner of Every Modern City Is Well Worth a Visit by Anyone Interested in Literature.

To anyone who has ever visited one of them, the expression, second-hand book store, has a well-defined meaning. No business institution in a modern city has so much to teach, not only of er, is at present under the care of folk-lore, but of social conditions, past and present, and, above all, of that curious creature, man.

It has been said that there has been and is, too much written. A glance along the shelves of "ye olde booke shoppe" would seem to justify the remark. Nowhere will you find such a conglomerate collection of the good, bad and indifferent in literature as is there to be seen. The obligation "to make culture and the will of God prevail," is interpreted by many men as the necessity of advancing their own views. "Scribimus indocti doctique"; learned or unlearned, we all write. The man who couples this passion with the "amor scribendis," and some little influence and capital, rushes to the publishers with his manuscript, and imagines he has sent that forth which is to electrify the world. If the work catches spirit of the hour it goes at once into circulation, and passes through many editions. But if, as is more often the case, it is not popular in its views, or if it lacks any message to humanity, it occupies a place on the book-shelves of a few friends and ultimately finds its way to the second-hand book store. for there it must go sooner or later in the majority of cases. For the secondhand book store keeper differs from others in this, that he does not buy simply what he wants, or what he thinks will sell, but what comes to him, and may sell.

It may seem strange that the majority of these unsought treasures are devoted to serious subjects, but it is none the less the case. A glance along the shelves of a genuine old book store (and London possesses one such) will show that from one-half to three-quarters of the books which carry the dust since last house-cleaning, are works devoted to the elucidation in a more theological belief or text of Scripture. 

(Review of the book of reminiscences recently published by Rev. Dr. Parker, of London, Eng.)

EUROPE'S COLONIES.

Of All the Powers Spain Alone Is Falling Steadily Behind.

The only one of the European countries having colonial possessions which are falling in respect of number. wealth, and population, is Spain, once the chief colonial power of the European continent. While other govern-ments have been extending their influences and possessions, Spain has been falling in the rear, and the reason for this is seen clearly in Cuba and the Philippines. Wasteful, oppressive, mercenary, and inefficient government are the direct causes. In a census of the colonial possessions of governments made twenty years ago, it appeared that the total colonial possessions of Great Britain covered 7,600,000 square miles, or more than 60 times the extent of the United Kingdom, and had a population of colonies, exclusive of Algeria, covering 460,000 English square population of 2,500,000. The colonial posssions of Spain, the remnant of the heritage from Spain's navigators, covered an area of 115,000 English square miles, and a population of 8,500,000.

Germany, newly established as a unit-ed government, had no foreign colonies; neither did any of the German states. The colonies of the Netherlands covered 666,000 square miles, and had a population of 24,000,000. Belgium, had no colonies. Denmark's colonies were chiefly islands, the total population being about 50,000. Norway and Sweden had one small island, and Portugal had colonies covering 713,000 English miles, with a population of 4.000.000. 

FARM EXPERIMENTS.

By the Ontario Agricultural College 1,000 Varieties of Farm Crops.

Upwards of 1,000 varieties of farm rops have been tested in the experimental department of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, within the past eleven years, and 600 of them have been grown for at least five years in succession. Nearly all the Canadian sorts and several hundred new varieties imported by the experimental department from different parts of Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia and the United States have been included in these carefully-conducted experiments. some of the new varieties have done exceptionally well, and have already been distributed over Ontario, through the medium of the Experimental Union, with very gratifying results. The Siberian oats, Mandscheuri barley, Herison bearded spring wheat, and Cloud's Early Yellow Dent, nmoth Cuban, Wisconsin Earliest White Dent, and Salzer's North Dakota varieties of corn, which are now becoming so popular in Ontario, were insported by the experimental department, and after being thoroughly tested were distributed in small quanti-





Minute Ginger Cake—Set a teacup in a cake bowl and put into the cup five tablespoonfuls boiling water, one tablespoonful of butter, one of ginger, a dash of cinnamon, one-half teaspoorful of salt and a large one of soda.
Fill the cup with real New Orleans nolasses (any other will cause a failire) and stir until the mixture foams over into the bowl. Make thicker with flour than any other kind of cake. Pour into a small cake pan, bake in a noderate oven and serve while hot. Broiled Whitefish and Hard-Boiled Eggs-Every kitchen should have a wire boiler to fit over an iron drip-

ping-pan. On this place whitefish, well seasoned with salt and red pepper, and few slices of breakfast bacon on top. Put in an evenly heated oven and broil without turning. Garnish with four hard-boiled eggs, pressed through the potato-masher. Butter the fish well after it is arranged on the platter. Serve with parsley and lemon,

Orange Salad-Peel and cut four oranges into dice, place on lettuce leaves or in the halves of the orange skin and pour over a small cupful of rich salad dressing. Serve with toasted crackers.

Jenny Linde-Make a thin batter of three eggs, two full tablespoonfuls of melted butter, pinch of salt, two tea-spoonfuls of baking powder, pint of case of Joseph Dumas, the alleged would-be murderer of the widow, on hot griddle in cakes the size of a small plate.
