### TO PURIFY ELECTIONS.

The bill to improve the Dominion election law which has been prepared by the minister of justice is in the right direction.

If Mr. Aylesworth's proposals are adopted by Parliament it will be no longer lawful for an incorporated com. pany to contribute to a candidate's campaign funds. The nenalty for violation of this provision of the act is a fine of \$1,000 on each director, with the option of two years' imprison-

In order that the sources of campaign funds may be more easily traced, the bill provides that all contributions must be made direct to the candidate's agent and published by him.



## Importance of the Kaiser-Tweed First of Many Huge Battleships for German Navy Christened.

Wilhelmshaven, March 7 .- The first mammoth warship of the German Prince Henry of Prussia, and Prince Henry of the Netherlands, as well as

The launch of the giant battleship Nassau inaugurates a new era in the German navy. She is the first of the mammoth vessels of which the active squadrons are in future to be composed, and is in size, armament, speed and installation superior to any warship hitherto built in Germany.

The Nassu displaces 17,960 tons, and is built entirely of hardened steel. Her dimensions and the thickness of her armor are not exactly known, as everything connected with her construction has been kept entirely secret by order of the marine minister. It is known, however, that she is to be fitted with three sets of triple expansion reciprocating engines, and is to be provided with three propellers. The minimum speed she is specified to atber 866, including 27 officers. Nassau's first keel plate was laid down in the imperial navy yard at to submit such a communication to the Bremer Haven in the last quarter of 1906, so that her construction has been rapid. Her internal fittings and armament are to be completed in the first quarter of 1909. The cost of construction, including trial runs, will total \$9,190,000, of which \$5,567,500 are accounted for by the hull and internal fittings, \$3,375,000 for artillery, and



Rev. Thomas Mitchell Discusses the Subject in an Able

Sermon.

Rev. Thomas Mitchell preached a thoughtful sermon at the New St. James' Presbyterian Church last evening on "The Labor Problem," taking his text from Ruth, ii., 4: "Behold Boaz came from Bethlehem, and said unto the reapers, The Lord be with you. And they answered him, The Lord bless thee."

"What a different attitude the modern capitalist and his employes have toward each other," said Mr. Mitchell. The men of Boaz were glad to see him and he was glad to see them. In the modern industrial world matters are entirely different. There are, as it were, two sides, or two camps, each armed to the teeth and each trying to get the advantage of the other. Industry has been placed on a war footing. The situation is a new one, and has arisen during the last 70 years. This period has been particularly critical in France, where the struggle assumed three aspects-those of labor, land and liberty. In England, also, there have been changes. There was the repeal of the corn laws and the chartist movement. But Englishmen want organization and discussion, and the keynote of the nation is for evolution, not revolution, as in France.
