WAR SENTIMENT GROWING AT UNITED STATES CAPITAL

Berlin Announces Further "Strategic Retirement" on Western Front and Claims Re pulsing Four Attacks by Boys From the Dominion-Paris Reports Calm Along the

THE WAR IN THE WEST

German troops in Northern France are still falling back towards Cambrai under the British pressure. Evidently they have not reached, in this sector at least, a line on which they feel inclined to make a determined stand against the Entente armies.

Today's announcement from Berlin of a German retirement on a four-and-a-half-mile front, between Ruyalcourt and Sorel was forecast to some extent by the British announcement last night that the village of Neuville Bourjonval, on this line had been captured. BERLIN ADMITS IT.

Berlin reports that the Germans gave way on the front indiated after an engagement with stronger British forces.

The French apparently have suspended temporarily their dashing attacks along the southern end of the line. Paris reports a quiet night along virtually the whole front. Yesterday, however, according to Berlin, Gen. Nivelle's troops attacked near Neuville and Margival, but were repulsed. CALM ON FRENCH FRONT.

ANOTHER PLUCKY BRITISHER. London, March 30.—The fight which the German raider Moewe had with the British steamer Otaki was not the only one of the cruise. A Reuter dispatel from Copenhagen says the captain of the Norwegian bark Staut, which was had been fitted out as a raider by the Moewe, states that while on the way home the Moewe had a stubborn fight with the armed British steamer Governor. During the engagement the second officer of the Governor was killed and both arms of a gunner named Huddoth were shot off. The Governor, as reported previously eventually was sunk. After the prisoners on the St. Theodore had been transferred to the Moewe off Rio Janeiro the vessel was sunk.

Rioters Take Violent Measures to Bring Down the

Chicago, Ill., March 30.—Hundreds of policemen were detailed today to protect the meat markets and groceries in the west side Ghetto, which were attacked vectorial by angel angel. the meat markets and groceries in the west side Ghetto, which were attacked yesterday by angry crowds, composed mostly of women, who protested against the high prices fo food.

Armed with stones and kerosene, which they poured over meat, the women attacked the Kosher butchers, who they said were chiefly responsible for the high prices. Windows were shattered, and hundreds of pounds of foodstuffs destroyed. Women who entered the shops to make purchases, were seized, their clothing torn and their parcels taken from them and thrown into the street. The rioting began early yesterday, and was kept up until the markets closed late at night. It is said that a boycott of all Kosher butchers in the city has been planned for today, and to prevent rioting such as took place last night, when more than fifty persons were arrested, police officials early today sent mounted and motorcycle squads to the congested districts of the west side, where crowds are likely to congregate.

The story of the raid is told by the British official eye-witness.

All through the night, the armored cars were stationary. Such a wholesome dread had the Senussi of the armored cars that 800 of them made no attempt to rush the little band. Meanwhile the unarmored cars had gone back for supplies of food and ammunition. Before day break the Senussi retired, and when dawn broke figures silhouetted against the sky showed the enemy and their camels trekking westward. a long way out of range and impossible to reach, owing to the precipitous hillsides. BRISK FIGHT FOR CASTLE

Clever French Tactics Too Much For German Defenders.

With the French Armies on the French Front, Thursday, March 29, 10 p.m., via Paris—(From a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press).—The progress of the French advance in the vicinity of Coucy-le-Chateau, now firmly in French hands, continued methodically today. Both cavalry and infantry are keeping in the closest touch with the Germans and forcing them to hasten the speed of their retreat. From the strength and thorough preparation of the German defensive works it was evident that a longer stand was intended.

League Formed to Advance the Socialism of All Industry.

London, March 29.—The British National Workers' League is holding a convention which is discussing an after-the-war social evolution. A wide-spread organization already has been formed through the kingdom looking toward the socialism of industry. Early in the war, Socialist elements impregnated with pacifist sentiments demanding peace at any price caused a split. The league represented the element determined to win the war first and then to insist upon reorganization along advanced lines. John Hodge, minister for labor, has been chosen president of the league, which proposes first to win the war, and then to insist upon minimum wages and arbitration by joint boards representing employers and employees. The convention has declared that the war is a necessity of the state.

All classes are united for social reconstruction after the war. Public ownership and development of national and imperial resources after the war under the direction of boards representing both management and workers, restriction of imports produced by labor more poorly paid than in England, and an eight-hour day are among the plans. Women urge motherhood endowments and demand that the state immediately take the railroads and manage them for the benefit of the community and not for profit.

HOLLWEG'S SPEECH HAS NOT AFFECTED SITUATION IN U.S.

Complete Backdown of Sub Campaign Necessary.

ALWAYS SHIFTING BLAME

War or "State of War" Is the Popular Thing in the Republic

WASHINGTON, March 28.—While it is assumed from the defensive measures already taken by the military arm of the Government that President Wilson, in addressing Congress next week, will ask for war against Germany, or a declaration that a state of war exists, it is known that he will speak along broad lines, dealing lightly with incidents leading up to the present crisis.

The general situation has not been changed by the speech of the German chancellor, von Bethmann-Hollweg today, according to the view tonight of officials who read press reports of the portion of the address dealing with the United States and submarine warfare. Germany, it was said, has consistently attempted to lay the blame for her acts on other nations. On previous occasions President Wilson has taken the position that Germany is in no way justified in carrying on submarine ruthlessness because of the British blockade.





The passengers and crews of both vessels abandoned the Alnwick Castle in five boats. One of these boats landed on the Spanish coast. It originally contained 29 persons, including a siewardess and a child, but five of them died. The survivers in this boat were all suffering from frost bite. Three other boats were picked up during the week, one containing 27, and another 29 and the third 20 survivors. In these boats there were five persons dead. The fifth boat which put out from the steamer has not yet been accounted for

Squash and pumpkins are tropical vegetables, and need warm weather in which to grow. For this reason they are not planted outdoors until June. A warm location should be chosen, the soil being a rich, sandy loam which has been fer-tilized with well-rotted manure. The seeds are planted in hills from 8 to 10 feet apart each way, or in every third

From 6 to 10 seeds are put in each hill, but the young plants are later thinned out, leaving but two or three plants to a hill. For extra large vegetables a small amount of manure may be put in each hill, thus forming a sort of hot bed for the tiny plants. If all the flowers picked off the vine but one or two, very large pumpkins will be the result.

The vines should be well watered, the water being poured on the hill from which the plant starts. Cultivation should be kept up constantly, the plants being well hoed, and the joints of the vines covered with earth to encourage new roots forming there. Pumpkins and squash do best where there are bees nearby to aid in pollenizing the plants. In harvesting a part of the stalk is left on. They are stored in a cool, dry cellar.

To obtain extra early squash or pumpkin, the seed should be started indoors in pots about the end of April, being set outdoors in June.





America Declares War, Germany Will Overcome Hostility.

London, March 30-Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent says Dr. von Bethman-Hollweg, in his address, referred to the events on the battle fronts, and especially the western front, where he said things had been accomplished for which more thanks were due the brave troops, Field Marshal von Hindenburg and Gen. von Ludendorff. His remarks were greeted with applause. The chancellor is also quoted as saying:

"The submarine warfare in March has been as successful as in February." a statement that was also greeted with applause. a statement that was also greeted with applause.
Referring to domestic affairs, the chancellor said that the day's speeches had not convinced him that a reform of the Prussian franchise could be begun now. It would be a very serious matter to decide such a question while millions of men were in the trenches.
The chancellor concluded by expressing confidence that the unity of the German people, who were without differences, would make them invincible.

BERLIN, March 29, via Sayville.—

"Germany never had the slightest intention of attacking the United States of America, and does not have such intention now. It never desired war against the United States of America and does not desire it today," was the declaration made by the German Imperial Chancellor Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, in a speech in the Reichstag today. The chancellor made important declarations concerning Germany's policy toward the United States and Russia. Declaring that Germany had undertaken unrestricted submarine warfare for its defence. Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg said:

"Within the next few days the directors of the American nation will be convened by President Wilson for an extraordinary session of Congress in order to decide the question of war or peace between the American and the German nations. More than once we toid the United States that we made unrestricted use of the submarine weapon expecting that England could be made to observe, the her policy of blockade, the laws of humanity and international agreements.






