A small fire was left in the furnace, and Mr. Bingham is sure that the blaze cannot be attributed to an overheated furnace. "Ulster asks for nothing except to be left alone," said Rev. A. Ketterson, right worshipful chaplain of Ontario West, Royal Black Knights, during an illustrated lecture on "The War for Liberty and Democracy," which he gave in the auditorium last night under the war sold two years overseas as a chaplain during the war, gave an interesting talk on his experiences, and on the part the British Empire played in the war, and touched lightly on the Irish question. 





RAILWAY RATES TO **BE INCREASED SOON** TO OFFSET LOSSES

Advance To Be Made On Government Operated Lines in Near Future.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—(By the Canadian Press.)—Faced with a loss of approximately \$30,000,000 during the present financial year, it is regarded here as inevitable that rates of government railway lines will have to be increased. The increases in rates authorized some time ago do not, it is claimed, meet the ever-increasing cost of materials and operation. Before the United States Government hands back United States lines to their owners, it is calculated that there must be a large increase in their rates—an increase is calculated that there must be a large increase in their rates—an increase estimated by some railwaymen as high as 30 or 40 per cent. If such an increase is granted to United States lines it is asserted there will need to be a similar increase in Canada.

While final figures will not be available for some weeks, it is estimated that the loss on the whole Canadian national railway system will be in the neighborhood of \$19,000,000. To that has to be added an estimated loss of \$9,000,000 on the Grand Trunk Pacific. On the Canadian Northern alone, the loss is estimated at roughly \$10,000,000.

PREDICTS GREAT OIL **ACTIVITY IN CANADIAN** DURING YEAR

Land Surveyor Looks For Strikes in Alberta Province.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—That the greatest oil activity in the history of the northwest will take place in 1920 was the opinion expressed by Mr. A. G. Stewart of Edmonton, who is attending the annual meeting of the Association of Dominion Land Surveyors. Already prospectors are gathering in Edmonton making ready for spring operations, he said, and the effect of the "oil boom" of six years ago, which dod so much to harm the legitimate operations and which made sensible men look rather askance at the promotion of any oil schemes, is dying out.

The operations at the Peace River Crossing are attracting great attention where oil has already been struck. These have had to be abandoned for the time, however, owing to the wells being flooded with brine water, which will take a considerable time to clear. Any man who has travelled the country north of Edmonton, and who knows anything about oil signs, he said, is not orrly convinced, but certain that oil will be struck and plenty of it.

The Decline of the Dollar

The sharp rise in prices the world over has affected injuriously the position of

every man working for a fixed salary. Missionaries are in this category. Stipends that were ample in 1900, and nearly adequate in 1912, are utterly insufficient in 1920. There has been no general increase in these stipends. There cannot be, until the Canadian people scale-up their giving to balance the decline in purchasing-power of the Canadian dollar.

International exchange has been unstable. Money for export has been subject to heavy discounts. In view also of the increased cost of materials and of labor, any new building programme abroad has been out of the question. But the need for new buildings is imperative. Some missionaries are living in clay-floored huts.

New Standards Synods, the Bapare Necessary tist Conventions,

the Congregational Union, the Methodist Conferences, and the Presbyterian General Assembly, have set new standards for the salaries of Clergymen actively engaged in Canada. But, for the Missionaries, and for the Superannuated Ministers, no increases have been possible.

One of the aims of the Forward Movement is to show the fine-spirited, generous, Christian people of Canada that the old standards of giving for Missions must be revised. It is impossible to maintain existing stations, even on a pre-War basis, without more men and much more revenue.

extension of Christian teaching have appeared. In India, literally millions of "outcastes" are pleading for Missionary preachers and doctors. In China, a new National spirit has been born. From Japan, Africa and the Islands of the Sea, comes the same story. .

The Home Responsibility

Here in Canada, the work of evangelizing Indians and Eskimos must

now be undertaken wholly by the Canadian Church. The rapid growth of our cities, the expansion of the West, the great immigration of the last twenty years, and the depopulation of rural areas, make a fourfold problem which can be solved only by radical readjustments of policy and greatly increased resources of men and money.

The Pressure on cline of the dollar the Colleges

has created difficulties in financing the Colleges and Universities established and maintained for the training of the Clergy. Last year, one College which had been able before the War barely to subsist, faced an additional charge for coal alone of \$1600. All other expenditures have risen in like proportion. Christianity has been the mother of Higher Education. A thoroughly trained Ministry is the great need of the times.

The men of faith, filled with the Holy Ghost, who proclaim the Gospel story by the frozen Coppermine, beneath the cone of Fujiyama, along the banks of the Yangtse and the Ganges are the product of our Canadian Colleges. 



Through the refusal of the Germans to hand over the war criminals as demanded by the Allies, the latter have been placed in a somewhat awkward predicament. To back down would be a humiliation, and a confession of

weakness that it is not well that the Entente nations should have to make at this time. But how are they going to compel the German Government to hand over the men wanted? General Noske, who commands the German forces, says that even should the Berlin Government consent to deliver the criminals for trial he would be unable to get them to the frontier because of public sentiment.

Why not send for Marshal Foch? That resourceful party, we believe, could solve this problem. On several occasions he has, by his firmness and direct action methods, convinced the Germans of the wisdom of submitting to the Allies' just demands. It is imperative that Germany be compelled or persuaded to surrender these men. If the Allies are forced by German stubbornness to abandon their muchadvertised intention of trying the German war criminals, from the ex-kaiser down, the moral defeat will not be lost on the rest of Europe. Instructions which the supreme council may find necessary from time to time to send to Vienna or Budapest, for instance, would surely be considered by the recipients as coming from those the Germans had successfully defied. And the Germans themselves, if they are permitted to put over what looks like a fresh case of German bluff and bluster, would certainly try further defiance by refusing to carry out some of the conditions of the peace

WRONG VALUATIONS.

Recently ex-President William Taft remarked that the public is willing to pay "Babe" Ruth, the home-run hitter of the New York American League Club, the sum of \$20,000 annually to play baseball, but does not think enough of its education to increase the salaries of its college professors. Commenting upon this statement a New York paragraphist declares that while there are any number of men who can teach, there is only one "Babe" Ruth and one Jack Dempsey.

It might be pointed out to this critic that the leading college professor of Canada or the United States is not paid anywhere near what Ruth or Dempsey earn. More than that, there are hundreds of ball players, not of the first rank, who receive more annually for their services than is given the professors or teachers. Mrs. Louis Slade, chairman of a large American women's college, takes the same view as Mr. Taft. She says:

The discrimination against the teacher has been marked. The public will pay 'Babe' Ruth \$20,000 for a half year, and Jack Dempsey \$100,000 or \$300,000 for a single fight, but they will not pay their college professors enough to

professional baseball player sells for \$130,000; a professor is obtained from one of the Western colleges for a few dollars more than he was receiving there-for \$3,000 or \$4.000 a year, at a guess. In building army camps, steam shovelers were paid \$96 a week, while the college teacher, who is to prepare young men and women for pursuits of peace s to accept a quarter of that sum.

T was widely quoted last autumn as having said that I wished professors would form a union and strike to bring their needs before

This remark was not intended to be wholly serious, but had I measured my words more carefully, I would have said that it would be better for the college professors to unite to demand higher wages, and even perhaps to a body rather than that they should strike individually by leaving the profession."

The seriousness of the situation lies in the fact that many leading educators on this continent are giving up their profession to follow the attraction of higher salaries. Unless the teachers of all grades are better paid there will he a general desertion to more remunerative callings. Then, too late we will realize that it takes years to secure an efficient army of teachers.

BRITAIN NOT SEEKING A LOAN.

A number of American newspapers, especially those of William Randolph Hearst, are loudly screaming that Great Britain is attempting to "work" the American people for every cent | when he smashed the Germans at the Marne. they can get. Nothing is further from the truth than this statement. An explicit official denial of the charge that England plans more borrowings from money markets of the United states has been issued by the British Governent. It is explained that the British Governnent has no intention of adding to its already heavy indebtedness by securing more money from foreign lenders. The British Government recognizes that such a policy would retard the stabilizing of financial conditions in Europe.

On the question as to whether more loans shall be made the smaller continental nations. however, Great Britain takes another view. The British believe these bankrupt peoples can be placed on their feet if they receive financial assistance from the nations able to supply it That is the reason the United States has been invited to attend the international financial conference at London, and which many Americans have unfortunately interpreted as meaning that the British are after cash for their own pockets. Carter Glass, whose position as controller of the treasury makes him a sort of minister of finance of the Washington administration, throws cold water on the conference.

money loaned any European country. Glass should understand that Great Britain is not thinking of herself in this case. The British people are not insolvent nor will they be come so. John Bull will in time pay back every cent. But the suffering smaller nations of Europe are in a dreadful state of economic distress that can only be relieved by large and speedy financial aid.

America may refuse to unite with the other powers in this matter. In that case she may presently find herself shut out from old world markets, for it is certain that such nations as contribute from their treasuries toward the economic rehabilitation of Europe will insist upon a return via trade and commerce.

THE NEEDS OF CHINA.

A foreign mission activity that will hold a foremost interest for the Forward Movement is concerned with the evangelization of China. Charles W. Service, a missionary in the Chengtu field points out that what China needs is character, and that this can be had only through Christianity. "Give the Chinese a chance," says Mr. Service to the churches of

The Chinese race is intelligent but not educated. There is over 90 per cent of illiteracy in China. What chance is there for rearing a strong democracy on such a foundation? As long as there remain the countless millions in the heart of Asia who are wholly out of touch with the life and progress of mankind, the future of the world is not safe. These multimillions in China must and will be educated, among whom not the least important are her women and girls, who need equal opportunities with men for education and service.

To meet the deepening need for nationhood China, like other nations, will turn to its schools as the rational place for developing a larger national consciousness and patriotism. there is great danger in China, as elsewhere, of commercializing knowledge. An exaggerated and perverted interpretation of the dictum "knowledge is power" would be a baneful influence in China. We have seen its results in the prostitution of science during the recent war. From the point of view of commerce, foreign relations, world economics, racial development, world peace and the Kingdom of God, the Christian education of China is the most important question confronting Europe and America. The work of missionaries in China is not so much to bring new doctrines, as a new life, in order to leaven her social and national life. Christianity comes not to destroy education but to fulfill its hopes and ideals.

The educational situation in China is a loud call for intelligent leadership. The building up of a system of popular education which will be effective in a land of 400,000,000 living under economic stress is not an easy task. China is not equal to it. She must have stimulus, guidance and models from outside. In this respect the Ohristian Church is 2 friend and powerful ally. Mission schools are now enjoying the fullest confidence of the Chinese Government and people. These schools are doing work on which the safety of the rest of the world depends.

The most disastrous failure in the internal life of China is a moral failure. CHINA NEEDS CHARACTER. Almost universal corruption must be done away with before there can be a strong national life. To secure this there must be new standards of honesty. Again, native religions are idolatrous and degrading. The daily life of the people is such as to make much progress impossible. They live in an atmosphere of ghosts, demons and evil forces, and therefore one of terror, despair and defeat. The environment of childhood is deplorable, and the degradation of womanhood is unspeakable. Home life is absent or sadly lacking in essential elements. China is in bondage to many customs which prevent her rising, such as ancestral worship. Chinese religions are powerless to save from such conditions. The inevitable development of China economically, socially, intellectually, politically

will augment the need for an additional saving What but Christianity can set up new standards of morality and spiritual experience, proclaim deliverance from a spiritual captivity which breaks the spirit of the people, and furnish the dynamic of true progress? Indigenous restraints and moral controls have served China well for centuries under conditions of isolation. But in the new age of progress a new set of adequate and vital controls must be discovered and set up, or demoralization of society and race degeneration will inevitably result. Social progress is, in the last analysis, moral progress, which, in turn, depends on religious ideals, standard and dynamic. DAY NURSERY WILL HELP TRUANT OFFICER.

That a day nursery is needed very badly in the city is demonstrated by a late report of the public school attendance officer. In this report, he states that in some sections the attendance has been very poor, and that when the cases are investigated, the reason frequently is that the children of school age have to remain at home to care for the smaller ones while the mother goes out

to attend school regularly it would be doing a big thing for the city. But it will be doing much more than that. And one thing is the proper nourishment of these same school children, whose mothers are out at work during the day.

The scheme is that the school children, when they bring their small brothers or sisters to the nursery, will be given a nourishing breakfast before they set off for school. They will again return to the nursery for dinner and for supper. So that, not only will the very small children be cared for and nourished, but the older ones as well.

An efficient cook, working with large quantities of food along scientific lines and lines of economy will be able to give these children much better nourishment at very much less expense than if the food were improperly prepared in small quantities in their own homes.

Mrs. A. T. Edwards of the board of education is very much interested in the day nursery scheme, and immediately saw how it would help out the truant officer when the cause of non-attendance in many cases was revealed in his

In contrast, the prices in London, Canada, are about as follows: Bread 13 cents a loaf, milk about 14 cents a quart, sugar 161/2 cents a pound, and prime bee from 40 to 45 cents a pound.



At a meeting of the Western University Athletic Association held this week plans were discussed for the first annual interscholastic athletic meet to be held at Queen's Park on May 24. Secretary G. Mel Brock was instructed to issue the following statement:

"The city of London, having as one of its aims that of becoming the educational centre for Western Ontario, and Western University being the seat of advanced learning in the city, it was feit that in order to fulfill the self-imposed obligations something definites should be done for the collegiate institutes and high schools in this area. Consequently the Athletic Association has mapped out plans for a monster athletic meeting to be held annually in this city, in which the boys of the different preparatory schools may assemble and battle for supremacy in that best form of mind and body training, namely, competitive track and field athletics.

"In this manner not only will it be proven which schools have the best athletes, but at such a meeting new friends and associations will be formed, the ideas of the students, from such a former schools and colleges, and will be a held for one year by the winning schools, in addition to having the name schools, in addition to having the name schools, in addition to having the name of the school engraved on a silver plate.

"To give the smaller schools the same advantage as the larger, only a limited number of entries will be allowed for each event. This will encourage early training among the different prospective competitors, as almost every schools will have to hold a local preliminary meet in order to pick out its best athletes before sending in entries. Records will be kept of all performances for future reference.

"After some discussion it was decided to extend the area of competition beyond the nine counties at present represented on the senate of the university, and any collegiate institute or high ferent propagations.

"In this manner not only will it be proved with the largest athletic meet of its kind event."





LABOR ENTERS POLITICAL FIELD ON WIDE SCALE

American Federation Plans Active Part in Congressional Fight.

UNFRIENDLY CANDIDATES

Workers Will Oppose Those Hostile to Interests of Labor.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 .- The American Federation of Labor is getting into politics on a wholesale scale, and will take an active part in the 1920 presidential and congressional election in

the United States.

The first comprehensive political campaign undertaken by United States labor to control Congress and elect friendly national and state officials is now benational and state officials is now being prepared here. The fight will be independent of present political parties. Details of the scheme have been worked out by a committee made up of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor and department presidents of that organization in session in Washington for several days. Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, promises a statement tomorrow. The plan was actually originated at the general labor conference held here December 13.

December 13.

Believed Unfriendly.

Representatives in Congress, who are believed to be unfriendly to organized labor will be vigorously opposed for reelection, and new candidates hostile to the interests of labor will also be op-posed. The federation will call to its aid all craftsmen affiliated with the central body, and every congressional district will be canvassed. An army of organizers and workers will be placed in the field.

The federation claims a membership of more than four million. The campaign will embrace state, as well as federal affairs. Efforts will be made in the various states to secure the election of governors, judges and legislatures friendly to organized habor.

Discussed Movement.

According to labor leaders who discussed the movement today, there is to be no effort to establish a "third party," There will be no attempt to reach an agreement with national farm organizations. However, the federation hopes for the co-operation of friendly state and local farm bodies, especially in such states as North Dakota, where the non-partisan league is strong.

While heads of the big four railroad brotherhoods, now in Washington for wage conferences with the directorgeneral of railroads, refused to say today whether they were aiding in the campaign, the newspaper Labor, official organ of the railway men, will publish an editorial tomorrow supporting the political move.

Two Hundred Workers.

The editorial declares that there should be at least two hundred workers in Congress, instead of the "lawyers, the bankers, the trust barons, and the mine operators," now holding seats.

"Labor and the farmer have the votes," the editorial says. "They only need to mobilize these votes for results. They should begin to organize now. It will be too late after the primaries close. And there never was greater reason for such a union and for such an action than now."





AMATEUR BOXING CHAMPIONS WON

Jack Dempsey Is Regarded in Europe As Heavyweight Champion.

Paris, Feb. 7.—Amateur boxing was discussed by the international boxing congress at its session yesterday. Representation in the international federafesentation in the international leaders tion of amateur boxing was taken up, it was decided that Great Britain, France and the United States will have three votes each, and Belgium, Australia, Italy, Switzerland, Denmark, Holland, Norway, Sweden, Argentina and Brazil will each have one vote.







In speaking of roads, Mr. Biggs declared that Ontario would get its full appropriation from the Dominion Government of \$400,000,600. The scheme that the Government had in mind would take in 1,600 miles of provincial road to serve the people. This did not mean 1,600 miles of concrete highway just now. The roads that would be designated as provincial were those that linked up the large urban centres. The counties would build accordingly and attend to roads that would act as feeders to these highways, which would carry 75 per cent of the big traffic.

In travelling over the country, Mr. Biggs had seen many county roads which had been built and then forgotten. These roads must be maintained by the counties, or their grants would be cut off. They would have to do better than they had been doing as long as he remained at the head of the public works department. The county road superintendents would be told this when they met him in Toronto on the livest in Roads.

Villages had been paying taxes, and were getting little to show for it. County councils always gave them the cold shoulder. They had a right to come in under the county road system. The suburban roads were most important. He hoped that the difficulties existing between the County of Middlesex and the city of London could be adjusted. He would do what he could to arrange matters, and hoped that it would be only a short time before a working suburban area commission was on the job.

"The Government at Queen's Park has an ear to the ground and is listenting to the murmurs, in the hope that conditions in the rural and urban centres can be raised to the highest standards. Whether we are there for a long or short time, we will leave with a clear conscience and a realization of a duty well done to the province," said Mr. Biggs, amid applause. Mayor Little of London declared that the misunderstanding which had arisen between city and county would be settled in a very short time.

Joshua Johns, Exeter; G. A. Stanley, Lucan; A. M. Hall, Malahide; Miss Mary Grant, clerk of London Township, and James Peters, reeve of Caradoc, all asked Mr. Biggs questions relative to their own districts and received replies.

They had enjoyed themselves immensely, and he was sure that the gathering had done much to foster a better spirit between urban and rural dwellers. His motion was seconded by Alfred Wilkes of Inwood. Heavy cheers and hand-clappings were given for the united boards of trade. John Bridge, who acted as chairman of the meeting, responded by highly. of the meeting, responded briefly, Mayor Brisco of Chatham invited Mayor Brisco of Chatham invited everyone present to attend the next annual meeting, which will be held in Chatham. The speaker hoped it would be held in the fall of the year.

Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown was the main speaker at the luncheon. He declared that the scarcity of farm labor was caused by over-development industrially. There were several local causes; men on the farm were not employed all the year round, while lack of proper housing conditions was another big factor.

The remedies were the restoration of balance between agriculture and in-

balance between agriculture and in-dustry, vocational training in the rural schools, special high school courses dustry, vocational training in the rural schools, special high school courses and demonstration farms in every county where immigrants could be taught the rudiments of agriculture. The farmer, as a rule, did not have the patience to teach a green hired man even to harness a horse. However, he would like to see some businessmen go out to the farm and apply their business principles. (Laughter and cheers.)
