ITALIAN TROOPS

SEIZE BOMBS IN

LUCCA FACTORY.

Paris, Sept. 11.—Three companies of Italian infantry have seized a factory at Lucca, which had been occupied by workmen, and have forced the men in the plant to surrender 60,000 bombs, according to dispatches received here. Another feport states that workers, using armored trucks, invaded a French owned factory at Turin. They are said to have distributed arms to workers there, and to have searched all the employees not joining in the movement. streets, and artillery, rifles, machine

As evening drew near the military drew artillery into position and prepared for a concerted attack. Before this was delivered, however, Civil Governor Mosconi sent an ultimatum to the Socialist leaders ordering them to withdraw from the streets. The leaders of the revolt ultimately decided to bow before the governor's threat of more drastic measures, and the rioters tore down fore the governor's threat of more dras-tic measures, and the rioters tore down their entrenchments, indicating they had abandoned the fight, and fell back from the streets. The carabineers and the royal guards, who had been sta-tioned in the vicinity of the hill in the teart of the populous section which the socialists had held, thereupon were withdrawn from their barracks through the streets, the men shouting cries of "Victory!" from their camions.

Destroyers Take Part.

The destroyer, which played a part in the action to put down the revolt, arrived in the harbor during the afternoon and anchored immediately facing the public square. The president of the congress answered in the negative, and declined to accede to the delegate's request to have the subject introduced, pointing out that the only resolution the congress could pass would be one in favor of a "down tools" policy. This matter, the president declared, was not on the agenda of the congress, and, therefore, the congress was not competent to discuss such a resolution.

Total Amount of Loans Approved is \$76,530,675

MOSTLY FOR LAND

Alberta Has Attracted Majority of Men.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.-Up to the end of August the soldier settlement board of Canada granted loans to 19,181 settlers LITHUANIANS AND actually on the land. The amount of loans approved by the board is \$76,530 -675, for the following purposes:

REPUBLICANS GOING

Difference of Opinion About More That 200 Factories Are Occupied by Workmen at a Given Signal-Order Came From the Chamber of Labor—Seizure Was M ade to Assure Metal Workers of Materials to Carry on Industry.

Milan, Sept. 11.-More than 200 chemical works here were Split Among Organizations occupied by workmen at a given signal late yesterday, and red Seems To Be Emphasized flags were hoisted above them on orders issued by the chamber of

The chemical plants were occupied simultaneously, the movement being carried out following a signal of three blasts on a large siren.' Immediately afterward, red flags and banners bearing the Bolshevik emblems of the hammer and scythe were hoisted. The workers obeyed the order received from the chamber of labor in spite of the fact that they were recently granted wage increases of from 60 to 70 cents per day.

The chamber of labor, in explaining the seizure of the chemical works, declared that the move was not in the nature of a real occupation of the plants, but was simply a measure which was necessary to guarantee metal workers the materials they need to carry on their industry.

London Bids Fair to Become One of the Most Important Motor Manufacturing Centres in the Dominion-Work to Start on Large New Factories Immediately.

Announcement was made today by Ald. John Bridge of the Chamber of Commerce of another large new industry for London, in the shape of a motor truck factory which will employ 700 men.

The location in London of this industry, in addition to that of the Ruggles Motor Truck Company, which was announced recently, means, Mr. Bridge states, the securing of a third large industry. This will be a malleable iron foundry, which will make castings not only for the motor truck factories, but for any firms in London and district requiring material of this kind. The new motor truck plant will be located in the southeastern section of city, and tenders will be called at once for the construction of three factor buildings, 100 by 200 feet, of brick and steel construction, to cost \$250,000. These are the first of a number of buildings.

The new firm plans to make all parts here, as well as to assemble the trucks. It will be under the management of Paul Moore of Wabash, Indiana. With the recent announcements of these two large motor truck plants being cured for the city, and the plants that the Ford Motor Company has for expansion, London bids fair to become one of the most important motor centres

# MODERN PUBLIC HEALTH

BY H. W. HILL, M.B., M.D., D.P.H. Institute of Public Health of Western University, London, Ontario, Canada.

A Column Devoted to Public Health in All Phases. Questions Addressed as Above Will Be Welcomed

One hardly thinks of iodine as a necessary part of every meal, but G. Ennis Smith, chemist, formerly in the Institute of Public Health of Western University, London, did some excellent research work. the results of which indicated, amongst other things, that a lack of iodine in the vegetables, fruit, etc., used in parts of this country was responsible for the enlarged thyroid glands which disfigure the necks of so many of our young girls and boys. By taking 15 cents worth of sodium iodine a year to make up for this deficiency these enlargements can be prevented from appearing entirely in the majority of cases; while if they already exist the same method will reduce or get rid of a very large percentage. No doubt the open-faced waists which young ladies affect makes the enlarged neck more obvious in the girls case than in the boys, so that many people think of it as almost entirely a girl's disease; but boys have enlarged thyroids as well as girls, although they are more common amongst girls, in the proportion

of six girls to one boy. REGULATES THE AMOUNT. One of the things done by the thyroid gland is the regulating of the amoun of food which is used by the cells in the body, somewhat as a chauffuer regulates the gasoline fed into the cylinders of his engine. When the chauffeur "steps on the accelerator" more gas enters the cylinders, and the speed of the engine is increased, unless there is something wrong with the accelerator. So, when a thyroid does not behave properly, it is as if the accelerator were out of

The thyroid is situated at the base of the neck just above and behind the op of the breast bone. When it enlarges, it generally makes a swelling at this point, which is quite evident to all observers. It would appear that this entargement in young girls and boys usually means that the thyroid is having a hard time to do its duties properly, chiefly from lack of iodine, which it needs business. In the majority of cases, if you supply the proper amount of iodine in almost any form, the strain is removed, after which everything goes well again in its line, as it should; and the thyroid returns to its normal size. CAREFUL TESTS.

Ohio, has made some very careful tests of this treatment amongst the pupils there since 1917, under a grant from the American Medical Association. The fourth annual report of this investigation shows that of 2,305 pupils in the fifth to twelfth grades, who had no enlarged thyroid to begin with, 495, or more than one-fourth, developed thyroid enlargements while under observa-These children had no iodine except as their diets supplied it. Of 2,190 other pupils, who were given the equivalent of three grains of sodium iodide a day for ten days in the spring and ten days in the fall, only five showed enlargement, or less than one four-hundredth, instead of more than one-fourth! Ob viously, the iodine in the food alone was not sufficient; extra iodine was needed. Not only was the extra iodine thus supplied successful in preventing thyroid en largements in those school children who had none to begin with, but it had excellent effects also on those children who already had enlarged thyroids, befor the iodine was given. Thus of 1,046 pupils with thyroid enlargement, not treated by iodine, 145 showed a decrease in size of the thyroid, while under observation that is about 14 per cent improved on their own account. But of 1,182 pupil with thyroid enlargement who received extra iodine, 773 showed decrease in size

of the thyroid, or about 75 per cent.

NEED MORE IODINE. The conclusion reached by these investigations, and widely indorsed by leaders in public health, is should receive extra lodine, beyond that furnished in an ordinary diet, to the extent indicated above. It may be given in many ways; the essential point is to

# Burden As Usual Likely To Fall On The Consumer

Liberal Railway Critic Says New Rates Hit People Hard.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—(By the Canadian Press.)—That the burden imposed by the increase in rallway rates authorized by the railway commission, is bound to fall very heavily upon the consumer was the view expressed by Mr. F. SARNIA, Sept. 10.—It was announced tonight that the Sarnia Chamber of Commerce may take action as a result of a rumor that one of the gas-producing companies in Dover Township recently made a contract with the Dominion Gas Company for their output, and if this contract is carried out that 700,000 cubic feet from this company will go to Hamilton and other places. At the present time Sarnia, Chatham and Windsor are getting the benefit of this production, and to cut off this quantity in the face of the winter would be a serious matter. By building a pipe line six miles long the Dominion Gas Company could take care of this piping, and they might induce other producers in the Dover field to give their production to others than the Union Gas Company and make the West suffer a shortage.

# FACTS FOR FARMERS

THE VALUE OF GRADING UP THE AVERAGE DAIRY COW.
(Experimental Farms Note.)
The breed is only one of the many features to be considered in carrying on

profitable milk production. Sometimes breed is overestimated, but more often profitable milk production. Sometimes breed is overestimated, but more often the reverse is true.

Our present dairy breeds represent the efforts of many breeders along certain definite lines, covering a period of several generations. This work is of inestimable value to the pure-bred breeder, but equally valuable to the dairyman of the present day, for, a close study of their breeding work reveals the fact that they placed a great deal of stress on the selection of the herd bull, just as do the good breeders of today. Why? Because from years of practical experience they found that the herd bull was approximately half the herd, and that in order to increase the average production in as short a period as possible at a minimum cost it was necessary to select, not only the best cows in the herd, but also select sires from high-producing dams. Now the example set by these successful breeders has done much toward raising the standard of the average dairy cow, nevertheless, it must be admitted that our present standard average dairy cow, nevertheless, it must average dairy cow, nevertness, it must be admitted that our present standard is at least 3,000 pounds per cow lower than it should be, due largely to the practice of using the scrub bull on the average dairy herd.

In order to show the value of using pure bred sizes expected from high-pre-

pure-bred sires selected from high-producing dams on the average dairy cow, a grading up experiment was started at the Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S..

In this we have two crosses from one In this we have two crosses from one foundation lot of cows, namely, an Ayrshire cross and a Holstein cross. Each are being bred along pure-bred lines, that is to say, all Ayrshire crosses are being bred to pure-bred Ayrshire bulls, selected from high-producing dams. Holsteins along similar lines. As space will not permit of detail only, a few of the outstanding facts can be given, and they are indicative of the possibilities in grading up to a much higher standard the average dairy cow by using pure-bred sires, selected from high-producing dams.

pure-bred sires, selected from high-producing dams.

Comparisors of Crosses.

When comparing the progeny of the Ayrshire crosses with their dams and the Holstein crosses with their dams, over a period of three consecutive years, the following results were recorded. One of the most outstanding features to be noted was the propency of the sires, in stamping into their progeny the breed and dairy type characteristics. This is true of not less than 75 per cent of the progeny of both the Ayrshires and Holstein crosses. In the latter the breed markings and coloring is more pronounced than in the former, but so far as dairy type is concerned little difference can be noted. In the second and third crosses these characteristics are intensified to a still greater degree, thus demonstrating consistent breeding.

In comparing the production of the progeny with that of their dams at the same age, it is found in the case of the Ayrshire crosses as 2-year-olds 50 per cent were superior to their dams, as 3-year-olds, 29 per cent, and as 4-year-olds, 29 per

3-year-olds, 29 per cent, and as 4-year-olds 33 per cent were superior to their dams. In the Holsteins as 2-year-olds 55 per cent were superior to their dams, as 3-year-olds 16.6 per cent, and as 4-year-olds 40 per cent were superior to their dams.

as 3-year-olds 10 per cent were superior to their dams.

During this period no selections were made, that is to say, all cows with progeny were retained in herd for experimental purposes. This would naturally tend to keep down the average production per cow, notwithstanding this fact the average production was increased 985 pounds per cow per lactation period for the entire herd of 24 cows; of these 14 were progeny of the original 10 foundation cows.

Now under proper dairy conditions, a rigid method of selection would have been practiced, and all dams or progeny falling below a set standard would have been eliminated had this been carried out with the above herd of 24 cows, setting a standard of 4,000 pounds for 2-year-olds and 5,000 pounds for 3-year-olds, the following results would have been realized:

Out of the 10 foundation cows 60 per cent were over the 4,000 pounds as 2-year-olds, of the seven first-cross Ayrshires 85.7 went over the 4,000 pounds, of the 6 first-cross Holsteins 66.6 per cent went over the 4,000 pounds. Out of the 15 that qualified as 2-year-olds only 9 qualified as 3-year-olds; that is, produced 5,000 pounds or more per cow per lactation period, of these 25 per cent were first-cross Ayrshires and 25 per cent were cross Ayrshires and 25 per cent of the first-cross Ayrshires and Holsteins who qualify as 3-year-olds were from dams who did not qualify as 2-year-olds; that is, they produced less than 4,000 pounds per cow per lactation period.

will lay more before they take a day off, and we have known individual hens to lay five and six dozen eggs and not miss a day, but a record in long-distance laying, without a miss, has, as far as we know, been established by the Experimental Farm, Poultry Division, at their Kentville, N. S., station, where a Barred Plymouth Rock pullet laid 104 eggs in 104 days.

This Barred Rock, whose leg band number is 63, did not start to lay very early. In fact, her first egg was laid on the 25th of January. # DOHERTY RAPS BRITISH BARRING

TORONTO, Sept. 10.-Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture for Ontario, in a speech at a luncheon of the directors of the Canadian National Exhibition today protested against Great Britain's embargo on Canadian

hogs. It had been proved that Canadian hogs were not suffering from pleuro-pneumonia as had been alleged, Mr. Doherty said.

"If they want to keep the embargo on our hogs let them do it as protection for the Irish farmer or the English farmer and not camouflage it under the allegation of diseases Canadian stock."

The control of Canadian bacon on the English market was also protested against by Hon. Mr. Doherty. The Ontario Government's campaign for the improvement of Canadian cattle would be on in earnest in about six months. the minister promised. He intimated that the Government might have to step in and help to secure better sires for Canadian horses and cattle. Speaking of Ontario's big grain crops this year, Hon, Mr. Doherty said they were greater, per man, per acre, tran in any province in Canada.

At the time of the raid half a dozen men were engaged in repairing the foundation under the house.

STUBBORN FIGHTING. LONDON. Sept. 10 .- Stubborn fighting is proceeding between Russian Soviet forces and the troops of Gen. Wrangel in the Oriekhov region of the Crimean sector, says the official statement issued in Moscow Thursday and received here today by wireless. On the other sections of the front the statement claims successes for the Soviet arms. The statement says:

"In the Grodno region fighting is occurring east of Novo Dvor and north of Kuznitza. We have repelled an enemy attack on Bieloviezh.

"In the Brest-Litovsk region fighting is proceeding in the region of the Joabinda station. In the Vladimir-Volynski region the enemy attempted to cross to the right bank of the western Bug, but his attempts are being frustrated. In the Rogatin region (to the southeast of Lemberg), as a result of our attack, the enemy was defeated and suffered considerable losses.


