## FRANCE TO SEND REINFORCEMENTS TO U. SILESIA

Briand Asks German Government To Provide Safe Conduct.

BRITISH OPPOSITION

Paris Government Decides On Action Despite Lloyd George's Stand.

Paris, July 22.-Premier Briand, following a meeting of the council of min-lsters at Rambouillet yesterday, has isters at Kambouillet yesterday, has dispatched a telegram to Berlin, requesting that the German Government take all necessary steps to insure safe conduct through Germany of a new division of French troops, which it is said in official circles will be ordered to Silesia within a few hours.

This morning's newspapers give con siderable derable prominence to the council neeting, which was the second to be

held at Rambouillet since the election of President Millerand.

The ministers are reported to feel that France should not retreat an inch from the determination to send reinforcements to Upper Silesia, despite opposition to such a move by Mr. Lloyd George. George.

Instructions were sent late last night to the French ambassador in London requesting him to tell the British Govrequesting him to tell the British Government that France considers it useless for the Allies to establish a Silesian boundary without providing sufficient troops to enforce the provisions, and adding that France intends to dispatch another division without waiting for action by the other allies.

Charles E. Bernard, secretary-treasurer of the London Motor Club, who owned the fourth car seen on the streets of London, has always driven a car since the year 1994, and in all that time he has never been summoned to court for the infraction of any bylaw whatsever, or of the Onteric whatsoever, or of the Ontario

Mr. Bernard, along with F. G. Mitchell, who owned the first car, ploneered the automobile as a pleasure car in this city, although the first cars compared with those of today would hardly be called by any such name. Mr. Bernard's first possession was a one-cylindered car, whose spasmodic chug-chug is today a dead and forgotten language. 

July 23.—Contracts between the Ontario Government and the federal highways department have been entered into to the extent of \$3,800,000, and these contracts are by no means completed, it was stated this morning at the highways branch of the department of railways branch of the department of railways branch of the department of railways grant was almost exhausted. At the present rate of progress, the amount of \$5,800,000 having been allotted to Oniario on a 60-40 per cent basis, the federal application toward highway building should last for two or three years yet in Ontario.

Under the contracts between the federal and provincial governments, the Federal Government pays 40 per cent of all cost. "If the Ontario Government chose to build pavements, that would have nothing to do with us." said one official of the railways department. "The Federal grant only covers 40 per cent of the actual cost of necessary construction under approved highways plans."

lessness or bad judgment, and are, therefore, preventable. Because of the carelessness of 5,000 people in Ontario's forests in the last four seasons, 1,000 fire rangers are employed each year at a daily cost of \$3,500.00 to detect their fires and

# Save Ontario's Forests They're Yours

Forest fires are mainly the result of carelessness and indifference.

Railways start forty per cent. of Ontario's forest fires, but the number is only one-half of what it was four years ago. If the railway companies had kept the fire protective appliances on their locomotives in the safe condi-tion required by law, Ontario would have been saved 2,000 forest fires and many, many acres of valuable timber since 1917.

Neglected camp fires are the cause of one out of every nine forest fires—tourists, hunters, fishermen, prospectors, picnickers, berry pickers, etc. Ordinary precaution would have saved 550 forest fires from this cause in the last four years and \$50,000 each summer in expense.

Settlers clearing land cause forest fires by exercise of poor judgment in setting out fire to burn slash, brush and stumps, or by reason of indifference towards responsibility or else in straight defiance of the law. Permits to set out fires are required by settlers in the newer districts of Ontario, and where this rule is neglected prosecution follows. But every year large fires are caused by pure carelessness or indifference on the part of some settlers in older districts where permits are not required.

Careless loggers, river-drivers, dam-watchers, tie-makers, sawmill employees and others engaged in lumbering operations have caused 200 fires in Ontario's forests in the past four years. Fire rangers cannot prevent these fires; they can only to a small extent lessen their terrible consequences. Until lumbermen assume more responsibility and initiative to help prevent this class of fires, little improvement can be looked for.

### **Everybody Must Help**

The duty of prevention of fire rests upon Everybody who steps inside our forests. Don't throw away matches, cigarettes, cigar butts or pipe ashes until you are sure they are out.

Build your camp fires small and on bare soil. or rock near the water's edge-never against a tree, log or stump. Before leaving, put your camp fire out with water-or earth-and be sure. Forest fires start from a tiny spark and are soon beyond control. Take the same care of fire in the woods as in your own home. Millions of dollars, and human lives may be at stake.
