Successful Flank Movement of General Kuroki.

STOESSEL'S BAND FIGHTING ON

Assault of Besiegers From Sept. 19 to 26 Failed, the Japanese Loss Being Placed at 7,000.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 29.-5:20 p.m.-News received here from Mukden says the Japanese have assumed the offensive and have captured Da Pass. This is not actually confirmed, but the general staff thinks it is likely to be correct. The Russians, it is added, evacuated the pass without serious resist-

Da Pass, or Ta Pass, meaning Great Pass, is situated about 45 miles, southeast of Mukden, and about the same distance northeast of Liao Yang. It is about 25 miles south of the Hun River. The Japanese attacked Da Pass, which was occupied by the troops of Generals A Farmer's Barn and the Whole Mistchenko and Samsonoff, on Sept. 24, but, according to dispatches from Harbin, was twice repulsed.

Chee Foo, Sept. 28, 1:30 p.m.-Russians residing here claim to have received information that the Japanese losses in the last assault on Port Arthur, which begun Sept. 19, were 7,000. A Chinese, who left the fortress on Sept. 28, says that the Russian losses were between 500 and 600. This Chinaman says that the Japanese were unable to remain in the three supplementary forts, which they captured, and that they retired at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of Sept. 26, after enduring several days of tremendous firing from the inner forts. He adds that the Russians attempted to bury Experiment in Shipping in Refrigerthe dead on both sides at night, because the decomposing bodies seriously menaced the health of the garrison. The Russians allege that it is the deliberate policy of the Japanese to undermine the health of the Russian troops by means of the odors from the decomposing bodies, and for that reason they fire on the burial parties. One Chinese, who was a member of a burial party, says that the Japanese fired when he and other Chinese attempted to bury the dead. He adds that when the wind carries the odors toward the Japanese, the latter retire.

Chinese say that the most severe attacks were made on the supplementary forts of the Itz and Anshu Mountain forts. The Russians had undermined the ground and several hundred Japanese were brown up on Sept. 23. Russian ships, it is reported, took no part in the battle.
