The church debt had decreased by \$1,500, of which \$690 had been left as a bequest by the late Dean Innes, and this was an evidence that the principle of self-denial was on the The speaker strongly advocated that the envelope system be widely used in supplementing the church revenue. The Missionary Soclety's allotment of \$1,129 had been met fully, but other funds, namely those of the widows and orphans and of the diocesan missions had been below the average.

Last year's wardens, Messrs. James Mattinson and C. B. Hunt, were reappointed by the congregation and the rector respectively, and the former was acded to the mission board.

The annual report of the wardens showed that the pew rents and ordinary collections had increased during the year. for butcher cattle was the feature of the trade at the Union stock yards this morning, and the supply again proved to be too small for market requirements. The thinguiry was particularly urgent for the best grade of beeves, and anything of best grade of beeves, and anything of prime quality fetched exceedingly high prices. A little quieter tone characterized the market for shipping cattle, but prices were well maintained on the level established last week.

Expert Cattle—Offerings were moderate.

Export Cattle-Offerings were moderate Export Cattle—Offerings were moderate, and while the demand was not quite so brisk as last week, an early clearance of surplies was effected. Sales were reported up to 6c, but this figure was obtained for only a couple of lots of extrachoice steers. The bulk of the offerings sold at \$565 to \$590 per cwt for the best, and \$540 to \$560 for the medium classes. Butchers' Cattle—The demand was very active particularly for prime beavy active, particularly for prime, heavy, well-finished steers, of which there seems to be a scarcity. The best butchers sold at 5½ to 5½c; fair to good at \$5 to \$5 35 per cwt; common, \$460 to \$4.85; cows, \$3.75 to \$4.56; bulls, \$3.50 to \$4.65. Thousand Liberals Joined In Reception to Mr. Hyman


Rank and File of the Party Gather at the Club Rooms to Shake Hands With the Acting Minister of Public Works, the Hon. Charles S. Hyman.

What was probably the most successful informal reception ever tendered public man in London took place at the Liberal Club last night, when over a thousand of the old and young Liberals gathered at the rooms to shake hands with Hon. C. S. Hyman, M. P. for London, and Acting Minister of Public Works. As far as it was possible to do so, the names of the guests were registered in a book for the purpose at the door, but when once the crowds began to come in earnest many found it impossible to get near the book, and as a result hundreds of names were not registered.

The club presented an unusually inviting and animated appearance, because of the manner in which it had been decorated by the executive of the Young Liberal Club of London. Along the front and side electric lights gleamed in red globes, and over the Queen's avenue entrance the words, "Liberal Club," shone forth in red. Inside, the rooms were gaily decorated with bunting and flags, and the word "Welcome" stared the visitor in homely plentiness from every corner of every room. And from a 100m upstairs the splendid orchestra of Frank Vita discoursed sweet music, the while the sociable Liberals passed the time away pleasantly in conversation and

Hon. Mr. Hyman was thoroughly at home amongst his friends. He was early on the scene, and as the guests arrived they were introduced to him words, passed on to the rooms, where the musical programme, the luncheon and the smoking were going on.

Mr. Hyman did not require an introduction to many, however. As his


