WHISKEY AND JEALOUSY

Caused a Bloody Tragedy at Bradford, Pa.—Brakeman Shot His Wife and Killed Himself.

Bradford, Pa., Nov. 23.—Yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, John J. Keating, aged 39, a passenger brakeman on the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh railroad, fatally shot his wife, aged 35, and then turning the smoking weapon against his own breast, fired a bullet through his heart. Two bullets were fired at Mrs. Keating. The first entered her left temple, and the second passed through her left breast. After the shooting of the woman, Keating seemed to suddenly realize what he was doing. "My God, my God," he shrieked, "what have I done!" Then he shot himself and fell forward against the body of his wife. Both were soon dead. In a small room near where the shooting occurred a little 9-year-old son of the dead woman by a former husband, lay sick of the scarlet fever. The sounds of the shooting and the frightful death of his mother and stepfather produced a shock to the little patient which may also end his life. The cause of the tragedy is ascribed to whiskey and insane jealousy without cause.

WILL NOT SURRENDER

So Oom Paul Says of the Boers.

WILDLY EXCITING TIME

OVER THE LANDING OF THE EX-TRANSVAAL PRESIDENT AT MARSEILLES—MIKE DAVITT THERE!

Marseilles, Nov. 23.—The Gelderland was sighted several miles out at seven o'clock in the morning, and Dr. Leyds and Messrs. Fischer and Westels, an interpreter and Dr. Van Hammel immediately proceeded to the Dutch warship in a steam launch, and soon afterward boarded her. A conference between the Boer leaders ensued. The Gelderland remained behind the island of the Chateau d'If, made famous in Dumas' "Monte Christo," until ten o'clock, when she steamed into the outer harbor, firing a salute of twenty-one guns, to which a short battery replied. Mr. Kruger cannot but be elated at the warmth of his reception by the people of Marseilles to-day. From the moment the white twelve-masted barge left the side of the Gelderland, with ex-President Kruger sitting in her stern, surrounded by the Boer representatives, the storm of cheering never ceased until he entered his hotel. Even then a vast concourse of people remained in front of the building until Mr. Kruger arrived on the balcony, where he had to remain for some time uncovered, acknowledging the acclamations of his thousands of admirers, who cheered until they were hoarse. The fighting declaration which Mr. Kruger made at the landing stage dispelled at once any impression that he might intend to accept a compromise from the British Government. His announcement was greeted with a roar of cheers, and cried "Vive Kruger!" "Vive les Boers!" "Vive la Liberté!" He repeated the sentiment from the hotel balcony, where, replying to the storm of acclamations from the solid block of thousands of people, Mr. Kruger said the reception given him would do much to soothe the wounds in his heart. The Boers, said he, would never sacrifice their freedom. They would rather be exterminated to the last man.

KRUGER'S SPEECH.
Following is the text of Mr. Kruger's speech:—"I thank the president of the Marseilles committee and the president of the central committee of the independence of the Boers for their welcome. I think all this population assembled in great concourse to greet me, for although I wear mourning for the misfortunes of my country, and although I have not come to seek festivities, still I accept with all my heart their acclamations, for I know they are dictated to you by the emotions which are inspired in you by our trials and by your sympathy for our cause, which is that of liberty, which awakened you. I am truly proud and happy at having chosen as my point of landing a port in France, and to set foot on free soil, and to be received by you as a free man. But my first duty is to thank your Government for all these tokens of interest that again only recently it was

pleased to give me. I believe England, had she been better informed, would never have consented to this war, and since the expedition of Jameson, who wished to seize the two republics without the necessity of firing a rifle shot, I have never ceased to demand a tribunal of arbitration, which up to now has always been refused. The war waged on us by the two republics reached the last limits of barbarism. During my life I have had to fight many times the savages of the tribes of Africa. But the barbarians we have to fight now are worse than the others. They even urge the Kaffirs against us. They burn the farms we worked so hard to construct, and they drive out our women and children, whose husbands and brothers they have killed or taken prisoners, leaving them unprotected and roofless, and often without bread to eat. But whatever they may do we will never surrender. We will fight to the end. Our great imperishable confidence reposes in the Eternal, in our God. We know our cause is just, and if the justice of men is wanting to us, He, the Eternal, who is master of all peoples, and to whom belongs the future, will never abandon us. I assure you that if the Transvaal and the Orange Free State must lose their independence, it will be because all the Boer people have been destroyed, with their women and children."

A TRAITOR SPEAKS.
Michael Davitt delivered a short address on behalf of the Irish people, which evoked much enthusiastic applause from those present, during which cries of "Vive Ireland" resounded. The gist of Mr. Davitt's address was interpreted to Mr. Kruger, who is pleased with his reception. Mr. Kruger only replied in the hall of the hotel to the first address delivered by M. Thouriel, president of the Marseilles committee, who presented the traveller with a symbolic bronze group entitled "the defence of home."

MORDED THE ENGLISH.
Mr. Kruger received a great ovation from his hearers. Although the former president had retired for a rest, the crowd still remained in front of the hotel and horse cars and carriages could only pass with the utmost difficulty. The crowd called upon a party throwing soaps from the balcony of the hotel to take off their hats as Mr. Kruger passed. But the seemingly plausible explanation was given that they were Englishmen and did not understand French, and foolishly threw small coins into the crowd which they had so frequently done on similar occasions in England. The Frenchmen misunderstood this and imagined the soaps were thrown insultingly at Mr. Kruger. Hence a tumult. The crowd endeavored to invade the hotel, and the police prevented this. But the hotel people were obliged to close their doors, and late this evening an unfriendly mob was cordoned by police.

A WILD NIGHT.
The highly reprehensible foolishness of a half dozen persons in throwing small coins into the crowd as Mr. Kruger passed acted like magic in conjuring up an anti-English outbreak, which it needed all the promptitude and energy of the police to prevent becoming a serious disturbance. The hotel remained for the rest of the day in a state of siege, while at one time a procession several thousand strong marched in the direction of the British consulate, shouting "Down with the English" and raising other threatening cries. The result was that

a strong body of police was compelled to disperse the demonstrators, although it was not found necessary to make more than a few temporary arrests. Throughout the evening, however, large bands of students and other youths marched up and down in front of Mr. Kruger's hotel and of the hotel which was the scene of the unfortunate incident, cheering in chorus for Mr. Kruger and the Transvaal and denouncing England. The demonstrators were more noisy than dangerous, and the police wisely left them to relieve their feelings by shouting instead of interfering with them, which might have created disorder.

THE MEAT SHONE

Sensation in North Chatham Over a Quarter of Pork

The whole of North Chatham was engaged this morning discussing the peculiar attributes of a piece of pork purchased last Saturday by James Matthews, who resides at the corner of Forest and Joseph streets. Mr. Matthews, or as he is more familiarly known, "Babe," went out to the back kitchen to cut a slice from the quarter of pork. What was his surprise to see the meat luminous and glowing as if it had been soaked with phosphorus. The meat was brightest right at the bone and Mr. Matthews cut out this piece. The news of the wonderful meat at Matthews' was soon noised about the neighborhood and over 200 people visited the house to see what Fred Ward styled a phosphorescent luminescence. One young lady vividly described her visit to the house as follows: "I heard about the strange phenomena at Matthews', so we went to see it. They took us into the kitchen, which was in darkness so that we could see the meat. This rather frightened us, but we were really scared when we looked at the meat. It lighted up with all the appearance of a man's face. It was horrible. We were sure that the Devil had got into that pork, and were exceedingly glad to leave that dark room and the mysterious meat."
The remains of Mr. Matthews' little 10-year-old crippled son had been brought home from the Children's Hospital, Toronto, the day before. The body was lying in the house and there were some among the people who complained the peculiar conduct of the meat with the death of the child.
The meat was taken over to Dr. Hall for examination, and probably he will be able to throw some light on the matter after he has examined the pork.
It is said there is a certain disease affects hogs which when a degree of decay is reached the meat throws off phosphorescent rays resembling the will-o'-the-wisps in swamps. Dr. Hall stated that he had inspected the meat and observed the phosphorescence, but was unable to definitely account for the phenomenon. It may have been caused by rubbing phosphorus on the meat or it might also have been caused by the hog having had access to phosphorus in some form, probably by medicine administered to prevent hog cholera. The Medical Health Officer stated that the amount of phosphorus present would have no detrimental effect on the meat.

SCRAP OVER SCRAP IRON.


