## ALL READY FOR BATTLE POSSESSION OF INDIA SCHOOL PICNIC

Oyama Was Just "Cleaning Up" in Recent Movements.

Armies Anxious to Fight Before Armistics-Russian Advanced Lines Still Continue to Retire.

Still Continue to Retire.

Gunshu Pass, June 23.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The operations of the Ispanese during the last five days, which at first were thought to be portentious, apparently ended after the last fight. The Japanese appear to be merely cleaning their immediate front. There is now no reason for any further delay in beginning the great battle, as the opposing armies are essentially equal. The Russian troops are under the impression that an advance is about to begin.

Correspondents are not allowed to refer to the sentingnts of the army concerning the peace proposals. The heads of the various armies have adopted a bellicose attitude, especially since the opening of peace negotiations were reported here.

Russians Retreating.

St. Petersburg, June 25.—News from the battlefield is exceedingly meagre. A press telegram of Tuesday's date speaks of a "rearguard action," and there are rumors that the Russian army is retreating; but the latest despatches received from Lieut.Gen. Linevitch bearing the same date declared briefly that the Japanese advanced has paused.

It is probable that the Russian ad-vanced lines are crossing the railroad, and will continue their retirement more or less hurriedly in order to avoid being or less nurriedly in order to avoid pend financed and pocketed until the peni-tions at Sipinghai are reached. President National Defence.

St. Petersburg, June 23.—Emperor Nicholas has definitely appointed Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasvitch to be president of the Council of Naudonal Defence.

The Novos Vremya yesterday announces definitely that the powers of the new popular assembly, which will be composed of 500 members, ejected for five years, must pass both Houses and receive the Emperor's approval. Representatives of the press will be admitted to the assembly, but reports must be censored before publication.

22 DIE IN LODZ RIOTS. oons and Cossacks Fired Inte Mob of 50,000 Workmon.

Lods, Russian Poland, June 23.— Twenty-two persons were killed as the result of Wednesday's firing by Dra-goons and Cossacks on a procession of 50,000 workmen which had been organso,000 workmen which had been organized as a demonstration against the Government. Ten of about one hundred wounded are dying. Two women were crushed to death in the rush of the panic-stricken crowds, after the firing began.

Yesterday morning some workmen, in revenge, shot and killed a Cossack and two policemen.

Investigation by the police of Nova Scotia and Boston reveals strange facts in connection with Elimer Young. No less than three women have believed themselves his wife, one of whom is Mary Hope Young, the woman arrested in connection with the murder.

BUILT HALF OF VICTORIA BRIDGE

Andrew Onderdonk, Prominent Engineer Dead From Overwork.

New York, June 23.—Andrew Onderdonk, well known throughout the country as an engineer and contractor, is clead, at his home in Oscawana, this State, from overwork and general breakdown. He was 55 years old. He had engaged in many great engineering and building enterprises, including the San Francisco harbor improvements, involving many millions, built 400 miles of the Canadian Pacific Railtoad in Brittsh Columbia, amounting to \$16,000,000; built half of the Great victoria Bridge at Montreal, Canada, and four sections of the Soulanges Caand four sections of the Soulanges Ca nal; part of the Trent Valley Cana for the Canadian Government; nine for the Canadian Government; nine miles of tunnel in the Chicago drainage system, and was engaged in dredging the Ambrose channel in New York's lower bay and in digging the tunnel under the East River to Brooklyn, con-

### necting with the new subway at the battery. QUEBEC TIMBER SALE.

Above Those of Last Year.

Quebec, June 23.—The annual suction sale of timber tracts in connection with the Provincial Department of Lands, Mines and Fisheries took place and was a complete success. The sale was presided over by Minister of Crown Lands, Hon. Mr. Sturgeon.

The upset price of the limits put up were from 28 to 40 per cent higher than last year, which caused the bidders to be careful and slew, but, notwithstanding the sales were favorable to the Government and 987 miles sold for \$171,000 or an average of \$190 per

withstanding the sales were favorable to the Government and \$97 miles sold for \$171,000 or an average of \$180 per mile. One thousand four hundred and fifty-four miles of timber limits were sold at an average price of \$165 per square mile. John Breakey, secured most of the limits on the Upper Ottawa and Centre Gaspe districts which comprised the major part of the sale. The total amount realized was \$396.645.53.

Quebec Gives Good Torms.

Quebec, June 23.—The Harbor Commissioners yesterday agreed to remove all harbor and other dues charged on vessels and on through freight brought to or shipped from Quebec by the new Quebec Transport Co. to give the exclusive use, free of charge, of the former Leyland berth and shed, upon conditions that the company maintains a regular service with Quebec as its terminal port on this side of the Atlantis during the sesson of navigation.

ANOTHER AUSTERLITZ

Says the Toronto News:
The opposing forces in Manchuria
are again in battle array. The
grand army which Kouropatkin baredy saved from annihilation at Muk-den having been rallied, its demoralized units reorganized by Linevitch, and reinforced from Russia, is once more on the eve of a battle, in all likelihood a defeat. The lessons of history will gather incline one to the belief that the force of Oyama, fired with enthusiasm and rendered inwincible by the prestige of a dozen successful general engagements will easily vanquish the legions of Russia, which must long ago have lost hope of conquest, and be suffering from the lack of spirit inevitable thereto. Between Mukden and Harbin, on the Chinese Eastern Railway, will probably be fought the Austerlitz of the Russo-Japanese War, and as the Western Napoleon a century ago this year overthrew Alexander of Russia and his ally, terminating a great campaign, so Oyama, the Napoleon of the East, is likely to win a signal triumph over the forces of Alexander's successor. The situation resembles cartographically and strategically that which preceded the march of Lord Boberts upon Pretoria. The town of Harbin, the Russian base, in the present campaign, is similar to Pretoria-while Vladivostok, to the east stands for the Portuguese border. Having seized Pretoria, Roberts turned eastward along the line of railway running across the Transvaal towards the sea, driving the Boer remnant before him, effecting on the way a junction with Buller, who had marched northward from Natai.

driven the Russian army opposing him northwards, will press toward Harbin, and afterwards turn eastward toward Vladivoctok, which will later be invested, effecting en route a junction with that portion of his force which may have occupied Kirin, from which a road runs to the Chinese Eastern Railway, connect-ing Harbinand Vladivostok. With the fall of Harbin, the junction of three great railway lines, Vladivostok will be out off by land in the same way as Port Arthur was isolated earlier in the war, and the fall of this second Eastern stronghold of the Russians will be assured. It is extremely probable that Qyama is now manoeuvring to keep the Russians to the westward, so that upon defeat no considerable body of them can retire upon the seacoast to swell the strength of the Vladivostok garrison. For this reason the right of the Japanese army is doubtless extending far to the north of the left flank, so that any Russians moving eastward will be cut off, while the avenue of escape, if any, is left to the westward. It is also likely that preceding or concurrent with the capture of Harbin, the line to Vladivostok will be out, as part of the plan to isolate the latter place.

The Chief told her he could do nothing for her, but she evidently believes the Chief is trifling with her and she intends to stick. She met Mr. Holmes on King street, and went up to him weeping and wailing and asking him to get her money for her. She has also been worrying Judge Houston, but he very deftly turned her attention towards Henry Darr. She found Henry a very patient listener, but so far he has been rather slow in taking her case up as she would wish.

She has sharp eyes and can spot a policeman a block away, but the whole force is wise and so there is considerable ducking going on when she arrives in sight.

## THE AUDITOR-GENERAL.

ibes the Right Kind of a Man to Hold the Office When He Steps Down and Out,

Ottawa, June 22—The Auditor-General, J. Lorne Macdougall, before the public accounts committee yesterday, advocated the desirability of a smaller committee to review his report and to investigate any instance wherein his remarks had been sverruled.

"If you are to get the right kind of a man" said Mr. Macdougall, "to be Auditor-General, he will be anxious to know that he is in a position to defend the financial interests of the people against all the attacks which may be unade on them. He will see that, if others should have some room to innocently accept pickings from the Government which may appoint him or one of a different political stripe, he cannot do so.

Degradation in Emolument

Degradation in Emelument.

"He will see that the Auditor-General gets a smaller salary than those efficials who were in the same scalp as himself until quite recently. He will probably examine the circumstances under which the degradation of the Auditor-General on a point of emolument was brought about. The degradation in this respect was determined upon because the present holder of the position was detected in bringing about the largest legitimate saving ever made in the public funds of Canada without his being able to point out that any other person ought to bear part of the punishment for so great a crime. These matters might be considered and settled by the sub-committee before the new man takes office."

Toe Heavy Expenses.

Referring to letters of credit, Mr.

Referring to letters of credit. Mr. Macdougall said that the present overdraft of one millen will be attended with much trouble in adjustment. Dealing with Mr. Foster's reference that there was difficulty in getting himself and Mr. Courtney to agree, Mr. Macdougall said that the interruption of the agreeable intercourse with Mr. Courtney arose from his streng objection to the Deputy Minister of Finance getting \$19 a day expenses while crossing the Atlantic.

Mr. Macdougall said that he refused to take such payments for himself, al-

to take such payments for himself, al-though he could have saved \$500 by his so doing.

Leave It to Parliament Mr. Fielding pointed out that this Mr. Fielding pointed out that this was an established practice under both Governments, and Mr. Macdougall replied that he thought he had a right in opposing such payments until Parliament had taken some action. He did not think that the Treasury Board or the law officers of the Crown ought to deter him bringing this matter he fore Parliament. Once Parliament acted, that settled the matter as far as he was concerned.

### DUNDONALD TALKS.

Says He Was Not Long In Canada Be fore He Lost All Confidence in Sir Frederick Borden.

London, June 22.-At a banquet at London, June 22.—At a banquet at the Ironmongers' Hall Tuesday evening Lord Dundonald, replying to the toast to the military forces, stated that shortly after his arrival a Canadian, nanswer to the pressing enquiries of his adjutant, one of the permanent officers of the Canadian service, told him that effective means were taken to overlook the claims of officers to promotion who were not persons grata with the political head of the Department.

Ne Confidence In Borden. Lord Dundonald added that he had not been long in Canada before he entirely lost confidence in Sir Frederick Borden, who was charged with the responsibility of administering milia alfairs. He said that while Canadian affairs were presumably administered by the council of officers with the Minister of Millite as chafman of the council, in point of fact the Min-ister controlled, the actions of the council, and that his experiences with Sir Frederick Borden as Minister of Militia was not such as to lead to the conclusion that efficiency should be the reason for promotion in the Cana-dian militia.

Militia In Disrepute.

He instanced as an evidence of the alleged disrepute in which he said the Canadian militia stood in the estimation of Canada, that thirty graduates were annually turned out of the Canadian Military College, not one of whom would accept a position in the Dominion militia service.

Indian Relies.

Indian Relics.

The rage for Indian curlos will soon be upon us. Sunday Mr. A. M. Ross was walking along the lake shore near windy Point where his eye was attracted to an unusual looking object partly buried in the sand. With a little excavating he unearthed it and found the complete skeleton of a man, who, in his lifetime, must have been over six feet in height.

Beside the skeleton, which was in perfect condition, except where the

perfect condition, except where the spine was slightly decayed from ex-posure to the air, he found an Indian tomahawk, some beads, a pair of cop-per wrist bands, and several other

posure to the air, he found an Indian tomahawk, some beads, a pair of copper wrist bands, and several other curios.

Mr. Louis Hawkesworth also reports finding bits of flint, arrow heads, and Indian curiosities on his place, since he has commenced plowing.

This country, we understand, was shabited by a branch of the Algonquins called the Nipissings, and it was for here Champlain started once on his search for a route to the Orient. Led on by the misrepresentations of Nicholas de Vignau, who claimed to have been here, he worked his way up the Ottawa nearly to Renfrow when stopped by the Indians, who described the country as full of roaring streams and entirely impassable, and brought Vignau, who was an absolute imposter, to an acknowledgment of his lies, and a confession that he had never seen this country.

Two years later — 1615 — Champlain started on an Indian war and again came up the Ottawa, passed his former terminus, and pushing on through the Mattawa crossed. Lake Nipissing and went down the French River to Georgian Bay. From there he portaged into Lake Couchiching, and paddling down Lake Simoce took a long portage across to Lake Ontario. Though very near Temiskaming Champlain was never actually here.

Just near where Mr. William Murray's place now is the Indians years ago had a moose farm. But civilization has crept ever it all. The hand of man has swept away the forest and the moose, and what the Indians told Champlain four centuries ago was an impassable country, is to-day the greater Ontario—Tam's Renging Heraid.

ENGLAND'S TREASURE.

How the Millions in Gold In Its Bank

Officials of the Bank of England are said to be worried for the safety of the hoards of wealth stored in their strong boxes. The bank station of the strong boxes. The bank station of the new underground railway in London is close to the vaults of the world's greatest institution of finance. At a recent meeting of the bank directors it was suggested that some brave but wicked person might set off a quantity of explosive in the bank station, wrecking the foundations of the state-ly building above and sending the bars of bullion and the streams of gold coin leaking out on to the station platform. ly building above and sending the bars of building and the streams of gold coin leaking out on to the station platform. The feasibility of this scheme has been conceded by the bank governor. It is figured, however, that the "tube" as the underground railway is called, is a little too deep at this point. To reach the buildin vaults of the bank the conspirators would have to drive a shaft nearly 100 feet and then they would face a mass of concrete, thick masonry and steel. At one time the Bank of England was the object of conspiracy. From a church tower close by the bank was bombarded. Afterward the authorities had the church and its threatening tower destroyed. Officials of the bank do not like the tunnelling going on in the clay beneath their foundations. The constant pumping of water has affected even the solidity of the clay, and from this cause one of the wells which is within the three acres comprised within the bank's precincts has dried up. Canadian at Soo Celebration.

Canadian at Soc Celebration.

One of the features of the semi-centennial celebration in July of the American Soc locks will be the presence of Charles Thompson Harvey, C. B., now a resident of Toronto, the engineer who constructed the original locks in 1853, who has been asked to deliver an address. Mr. Harvey built two locks, each 350 feet long, 700 fest wide and 12 feet deep, with 3 feet lift, at that time the largest locks in the world. He formally broke ground on June 4, 1853, and opened the sluice gates of the coffer dam to the waters of Lake Superior on April 19, 1855 when the work was practically completed. These locks were removed in 1853, but the schlevement stands as the world's record for water-way construction, both as to time and economy, the time being less than twenty-two and one-half months and the cost failing below a million dollars.

The Planet Mare.

Flammarion, the famous astronomer, says of the planet Mars: "The climate is very mild. There are no gales, while the atmosphere is very light, with scarcely any clouds. The inhabitants enjoy fine weather, the climate being something like that of Davos Plats, in Switzerland—dry and clear. We know the globe of Mars perfectly—in fact, far better than the early."

Lately the company invaded Westport, and the other day, when the small farmers brought their pigs and other stock to the fair for sale, they discovered that they could not sell, since a boycott had been started owing te the poor people having given their customs to the cheap butchers. The movement has inflicted considerable hardship upon the peasants, whose custom is to sell their stock and purchase supplies, including food and seed, with the money.

Horrified at the idea, the countess immediately summoned her daughter, Lady Millicent, who was barely 16 years of age, from the schoolroom in order to take the vacant place. Alone of all those present she was not "engrande tollette." No time had even been given her to brush her curly hair before she was hastened down from the schoolroom, where she was enjoying a romp with her little sisters. Yet such an attractive picture did she present that her neighbor at table, Lord Stafford (now Duke of Sutherland), straightway fell in love with her and asked her hand in marriage a few weeks later. Her wedding took place on the day of her seventeeth birthday, and she may be said to have gone straight from the schoolroom to the altar.

With one lamentable exception the

With one lamentable exception the ducal house of Sutherland has always been singularly fortunate in its marriages. In fact, it may be said to owe to the latter the dukedom, the marguisate, the five earldoms, the four viscounties, and the five baronies, as quisate, the five earldoms, the four viscounties, and the five baronies, as well as the vast territorial possessions which now stand to its credit. And all this has been acquired since the reign of King Charles I., when Sir Thomas Gower, high sherift of Yorkshire, started the ball rolling by marrying the heiress of the Levesons, who brought him Lilleshall, with its rich coal fields. His son, Sir William, inherited also from the Levesons the magnificent estate of Trentham, of which Lord Beaconsfield presents such an elaborate picture in his novel "Lothair," crowded with old masters and superb statuary brought by the second duke from Italy and Greece, the billiard table being constructed of the wood of the Royal George, the historic ship which went down at Spithead with the admiral, officers, and the entire crew on board at the end of the eighteenth century, a catastronhe immortalized in Cowper's well known verses.

the eighteenth century, a carstrophe immortalized in Cowper's well known verses.

Sir William Leveson Gower's son was created Lord Gower and married into the ducal house of Ruiland. The second Lord Gower was raised to an earl and married in succession three wives, each better portloned than the rast. The second earl in the aext generation did even better for himself. For he married the heiress of Scrope, first duke of Bridgewater, and the great Bridgewater estates in Lancashire afterwards fell to his grandson. He was made a marquis. His son married the greatest heiress of the century, the countess of Sutherland in her own right, the intimate friend and confidente of Queen Marle Anto, nette at Versailles, and lady paramount over the best part of two Scottish countes. The present duke's father kept up the family record by marrying as his first wife the heiress to the broad lands of Cromartie, who was created a countess in her own right with remainder to her second son. Three separate earlooms, those of Granville. Ellesmere to her second son. Three separate earl-dome, those of Granville, Ellesmere, and Cromurile, are now held by mem-bers of the duke's family in addition to his own. The duke's London home is certainly the most beautiful palace, not merely of the British metropolis but of most European capitals. Disraeli in one of his novels described it as "not unworthy of Vicenza at its best." Empress Eugenie was so taken with it that she wanted Napoleon III. to build for her an exact copy of it in Paris, and Queen Victoria, when she used to drive from Buckingham palace to visit her great friend, Duchess Harriet of Sutherland, grandmother of the present duke, was wont to greet her with the remark: "Well, dear, I'm coming from my house to visit you in your palace." It is a noble pile, looking on to Green park and on to Bridcage walk, and was built less than 100 years ago for the Duke of York, second son of King George III., on money borrowed from the then marquis of Stafford. The dute died before his wonderful new house could be finished, and the marquis of Stafford, who had meanwhile become the first duke of Sutheraind, took possession of the building and secured the land in which it stood on a Crown lease. He spent no end of money on its completion under the direction of Sir Charles Barry, the designer of the houses of Parliament. According to the terms of the lease the building, as it now stands, with the fixtures, though not with the other contents, will in a few years come into the possession of the ground land lord, that is to say, the Crown, without any compensation to the duke or his heirs, and there is no doubt that then the palace—for it is impossible to describe it by any other name—will be assigned to one of the members of the reigning family as a metropolitan residence. She at once sought the duchess—the famous Duchess Harriet

—in her boudoir, and stated her difficulty, Mrs. Stowe was quickly put at ease by the duchess, who, treating her more like a sister than even a friend, pinned a ribbon or two to her bonnet, fastened back here and there a stray curl, put those little deft touches to her visitor's tollet which make all the difference to the "tout ensemble," and then led the distinguished authoress to the drawing room. After the meeting was over the duchess, taking from her own arm a bracelet of massive links of gold, typical of the fetters of the slave, clasped it on the arm of the creator of "Tucle Tom," saying: "We trust it is the memorial of a chain soon to be broken." -in her boudoir, and stated her diffi-

This duchess was a wonderful woman. Her itusband had married her after an unhappy and romantic infatuation for Queen Louise of Prussia, and she herself, the duchess, after his death, and when Garibaidi visited London staid with her at Stafford house, conceived such a romantic admiration for italy's national here that she made up her mind to marry him irrespective of his other matrimonial entanglements, and, indeed, there is no knowing what might have happened had not her son, the late duke, settled matters by practically kidnapping the great Halian patriot and carrying him back to the island of Capri on board his yacht.

The duke owns not only a private railroad station but a railroad of his own, scores of miles in length, and, being a practical enginees, often drives the train himself, which caused a couple of his tenants to remark as the train fiashed by that it was only their own duke who could boast of running "his own blank train, with his own blank coal, on his own blank railroad, through his own blank county."

According to the United States census special report on mines and quarries, there was mined in the United States in the year 1902 rather over 300,000,000 tons of coal, or a little less than four tons for each inhebitant than four tons for each inhabitant. During the same year there was mined in Great Britain 254,000,000 tons, in Germany 166,000,000 tons, in all other countries of the world 163,000,000: in other words, more than a third of the entire production of the world was mined in the United States, while in 1880 ohly 20 per cent. of the world's coal product came from that country. This gain has been chiefly in bituminous coal.

The Island of Pearls.

A rise in the price of pearls two or three years ago produced great activity among the pearl fishers of the Venezuelan islands of Margarita, whose name is the Latin word for pearl and whose gems were fought over by the early Spanish explorers. About 2,000 men find constant employment in this business, thich has its thrilling moments, since the opening of a shell dredged from the pearl oyster banks may disclose a jewel of great price. The Margaritan pearls are of fine quality, usually white of yellow, with an occasional black one, and such a one is greeted with joy, for it bears a high value. About \$600,000 worth of pearls are found near Margarita every year.

A Great Dam in Danger.

That great dam in the Nile river at Assura is threatened with what may in time prove a grave danger. This much is admitted by Sir Benjamis Baker, under whose general supervision the dam was constructed. The water rushes out of the sluices with tremendous force and dashes like a mountain torrent over the rocks out side, in which it has already worn great holes, sometimes more than twenty feet deep. At present they are fifteen rards or more from the foot of the wall; but, as they will almost certainly work toward it, it is feared they may at last seriously weaken the dam's foundations. So this part is being protected by a strong bed or masonry.

## IN MAKING JAP TREATY

Canadian Government Lest Two Whole Years.

n. Mr. Fisher Long Since Knew Canada Could Get Preferment From wery Kingdom-Flimsy Excuses Put Up by Minister of Agriculture for Delay in Looking After Our

ottawa. June 25—In the House yesterday in answer to Mr. Foster's enquiry for particulars as to Canada's refusal to enter into the British-favorda nation treaty with Japan, Mr. Fisher entered into a lengthy explanation, the gist of which was that the time within which Canada could have been included expired only a few days after Sir Wittrid Laurier came into office in 1896, at which time there was the same prejudice against Japanese as against Chinese entering Canada, and it was accordingly not thought advisable to be hampered with the mest favored nation clause. Japan at that time entered into special treaties with England, France, Germany and Australia, and subsequently with nearly all the civilized nations, included the United States, getting nothing in return except recognition as a Sovereign State. The advantage of the treaty was that on certain specified articles the duty upon them was 10 per cent. as compared with 15 per cent, upon similar articles from outside countries.

Cabled to Britain.

Canditions having changed the Canadian Government had sent a despatch to the Imperial authorities asking if there would be any objection to Canada now adopting the British treaty of 1894 with Japan, providing Japan was willing to forego Canada's neglect. No answer to that cable has yet been received. Incidentally Mr. Fisher stated that among the articles to which the treaty applied and which Canada could send to Japan were: Condensed milk, hops, teather and leather goods, horses, sugar, cottons, woolens, paper, enameled kitchen ware, rubber and rubber goods, wire and wire goods, hats and caps.
