He is so undeniably a fine soldier that the dress is looked upon as rather a charming little national eccentricity. Why, the short plaid skirt in this year's fashions is due, I am told, to the spell of the kilts. So Nice followed her Highlander about and admired him hugely, siding up to him on every occasion, to feel what the kilts really were like.

There was also in Nice at that time a young American girl with her mother. She was charmingly pretty, the girl—the best little dancer at the exclusive 'country club. Editorial Brevities.

Many incomes may be augmented by cultivating the back yard. A penny saved is a penny earned.

Vegetables fresh from the garden are a luxury only appreciated by those who cultivate their own back yard or the vacant lot.

If farmers paid more attention to their seed and seed bed in the spring they would have greater reason for celebrating Thanksgiving Day in the autumn.

Drive the fly from its entrenched position by cleaning up and disinfecting its breeding places—the garbage can, the privy pit and the exposed manure pile.

Japan's insistence has won from China commercial, industrial and other concessions that will make Japan the dominant power in the Flowery Kingdom. China, powerless to resist, and shut off by the war from outside assistance, had no recourse but to yield. Many fear that what Japan has now done will cause much trouble in the future.

A subscriber writes: 'I have not been sleeping well lately and concluded there must be some cause, and in meditating, found that my subscription to THE ACADIAN had not been paid for 1915.' This is good news to the editor of this paper and it is to be hoped that this subscriber will now enjoy the peace that an easy conscience allows. At the same time, it cannot but come to mind that there must be an awful lot of insomnia in some sections of this district.

A Maine judge, after disposing of forty uncontested divorce cases in two days, wearily announced that he had done enough, and that the remaining twenty or thirty cases on the docket could stand until the October term.

As Maine's liberal divorce laws are frequently taken advantage of by provincialists and other non-residents, the court record exaggerates domestic conditions, and as number of divorces granted for habitual drunkenness exaggerates the drinking evil in that prohibition State. Making liberal allowances for non-resident appeals, the divorce record in Maine is nevertheless an appalling one.

If there is anyone in Canada who is not bearing some share of the burden of a wide world war, in which the very life and fabric of our empire and dominion are at stake, he is not worthy of the name he bears or of the country of which he is a citizen. There must be few in Canada who are not doing something, but there are some who could do more. The cries of wounded and suffering men come out to us in the darkest and call upon us to help. Can we turn a deaf ear to them in their hour of victory and death? We must deny ourselves everything if necessary, in order that our country may be victorious. All of us cannot fight, all cannot bear the actual blast of war but all can do something, however little it may be, for the cause of mercy and humanity.

A law has been passed in the State of Massachusetts under which destitute parents may call upon their children to support them. Such a law should be made universal. There have been cases in Nova Scotia where parents died in the poorhouse who had children well able to care for them. Under the Massachusetts law, any person above the age of twenty one years who, being possessed of sufficient means, unreasonably neglects or refuses to provide for the support and maintenance of his parents, whether father or mother, when such parents through misfortune and without fault of their own are destitute of means of sustenance, and unable by reason of old age, infirmity or illness to support or maintain himself or herself, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500, or imprisonment for not more than one year or by both fine and imprisonment.

The Monetary Times is well satisfied with Canadian business prospects at the present time. Dealing with the subject in its latest issue, the Monetary Times says:—'Nine months of war have shown how many of the business fears of last August were groundless. Then, Canadian business and finance almost threw up hands in despair, the despair largely of predicted future events rather than of existing facts. With a great effort business kept its head but towards fall, commenced to worry again about what had things might happen after the Christmas trade had passed. The prophets of pessimism having proved wrong again, persisted and forecasted poor spring business. After nine months of war, and keeping always in mind that the country was due for a drastic economic readjustment, Canada is rapidly assuming a healthy condition.'

Battleship Goliath Torpedoed in Dardanelles.

(Special despatch to THE ACADIAN.) LONDON, MAY 13TH.—Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, announced in the House of Commons to-day that the British battleship Goliath had been sunk by torpedoes in the Dardanelles. Probably 500 men lost, including 50 officers. 160 were saved.

The Maritime Provinces.

Mrs. Ruth Zedzie Rood, the author of tourist's books on California, Russia, Spain and Portugal, is adding another to her long list of guides this spring, with 'The Tourist's Maritime Provinces.' This well arranged book covers some of the most picturesque travelling regions and at the same time the most little known of our continent. Halifax, the Land of Evangelines, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, these contain a great number of quaint, picturesque, out-of-the-way places well worth visiting in a comparatively compact space. In addition Mrs. Wood has included special chapters on the Gaspé Shore, Newfoundland and Labrador, and the Miquelon Islands. These latter islands, south of Newfoundland, are the last of the once vast possessions of France in North America. The life there is essentially French in every particular. St. Pierre Miquelon, the capital, being a bit of Brittany gone adrift. The special features of Newfoundland are its bold coast scenery and its great game barrens and salmon streams, while the section of the maritime provinces on the shore of the Bay of Chaleur and the Gulf of St. Lawrence comprise some of the most remarkable scenery on the Atlantic coast. Mrs. Wood spent five months in sight seeing and preparing for her new book, and she says that the travelling covered by her special chapters that we have mentioned entailed the most rugged journeying of the five months trip.

In recognition of her valuable contributions to the literature of travel this author, Mrs. Ruth Zedzie Rood has just been made a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society.

The Kings Co. Temperance Alliance.

At the annual meeting of the Kings County Temperance Alliance, which was held at Forresters' Hall, Berwick, May 4th, the following officers were elected:

President, E. B. Newcombe; Vice-President, Dr. H. Chipman; Secretary, F. H. Beals; Treasurer, W. E. Porter.

Executive Committee: The officers together with Messrs. C. A. Campbell, C. C. Cogswell, N. W. Eaton, B. O. Davidson, Ira L. Cox, C. I. Wolfe, S. B. Chute, S. V. Sanford, Geo. Hutchison, N. I. Bowley, F. H. Northup, Rev. J. D. Spidell and Rev. A. Saunders.

The report of the executive was enthusiastically discussed by President Newcombe, Rev. H. R. Grant, Dr. H. Chipman, Rev. A. H. Saunders, Rev. A. W. Robbins, C. I. Wolfe, S. B. Chute, John Chute, Dr. A. Chipman, James Northup, B. H. Lee, E. C. Bishop and others, and finally passed. In view of the possibility of an election in the near future, the principles of the Alliance touching its relation to the nomination of candidates, were reaffirmed, namely: (1) The purpose of the Alliance, so far as political action is concerned, is to have the civic affairs of the country carried on by good men, especially such as are favorable to the prohibition of the liquor traffic. (2) 'In making our influence felt, we have no desire to interfere with political parties only when, and in so far as, they stand in the way of the purpose of the Alliance.' (3) 'The policy of the Alliance shall be to refrain from putting candidates in the field, until forced to do so by the neglect or refusal of one or both of the regular parties to nominate men in agreement with our purpose.' In agreement with this statement it was resolved to send a communication to the Liberal and Conservative Associations asking them to nominate suitable candidates, and a committee was appointed to act with the Secretary in framing such communication. Immense quantities of Gaspereaux fish are being taken from the river, which, with square nets and groups of fishermen, has a very busy appearance. The fish are either sold fresh to dealers who send in their teams from nearby towns or packed in salt and sent to Halifax and West India markets.

A Wolfville Boy in B. C.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN:
DEAR SIR,—Thinking that perhaps my friends in Wolfville and vicinity would like to know something of this country, I will undertake to describe conditions as I see them here.

The Okanagan Valley extends north and south, from Sicamous, on the State border, with an average width of about five miles, and with numerous small valleys opening into it on either side. The valley is from 1000 to 1200 feet above the sea level, and the mountains rise on either side to a height of from 1500 to 2000 feet. A chain of lakes extends throughout the entire length of the valley. The largest of these lakes, called Okanagan Lake, is eighty miles long and about three miles wide.

The climate is splendid, the best, I should judge, in Canada. The winters are short and not severe, and there is very little snow. Winter does not usually begin until Christmas and a man told me that he had been out boating on Christmas day. I arrived here on the tenth of December and that was the first day that the ground was frozen. We had our coldest weather before Christmas, but the temperature was never down to zero.

There is a good deal of fall weather in the winter, due to the rainy season on the coast. Spring began in February and there has been nice, bright weather ever since. The sun shines nearly every day and there is very little rain. The weather has been real warm for over a month and for a few days the temperature was seventy degrees and above. The grass has been green for a long time and the first crop of alfalfa is nearly ready to be cut. The leaves are out on the trees and wild flowers are abundant. The apricot, peach, cherry, pear and plum trees have gone out of bloom and the apple trees are now in blossom. The season is about six weeks ahead of what it is in Nova Scotia.

The country is so dry that nothing can be cultivated without irrigation except in sections on the lake level and alongside the streams coming down from the mountains. Fruit raising is the chief pursuit in the valley and large quantities are exported every year. The fruit ranches are on what are called the benches, or three or four hundred feet higher than the valley proper. The orchards are for the most part young and the trees are not permitted to grow to the size that they are in the Annapolis Valley. Apples and peaches are the principal fruits exported, but apricots, plums, pears and cherries are also successfully raised. All the fruit is shipped in boxes, a barrel never being sent in this country.

The chief towns in the valley are Vernon, Kelowna, Summerland and Penticton. Penticton, where I spent three months, is at the southern end of the Okanagan Lake. It has a population of about two thousand. It is a divisional point on the Kettle Valley Railroad, which is just being completed and over which trains will begin to run the first of June. This railroad will greatly shorten the distance between the west and Vancouver. Summerland is on the western shore of Okanagan Lake, ten miles from Penticton. It is the seat of Okanagan College, sometimes called the 'Acadia of the West'. There are a great many Nova Scotians in this country, and I have met quite a number who at one time lived in Wolfville. I like this country very much and feel sure that in this sunny climate I shall speedily recover my health. **HARLAN P. DAVIDSON.**

A Tragedy.
