

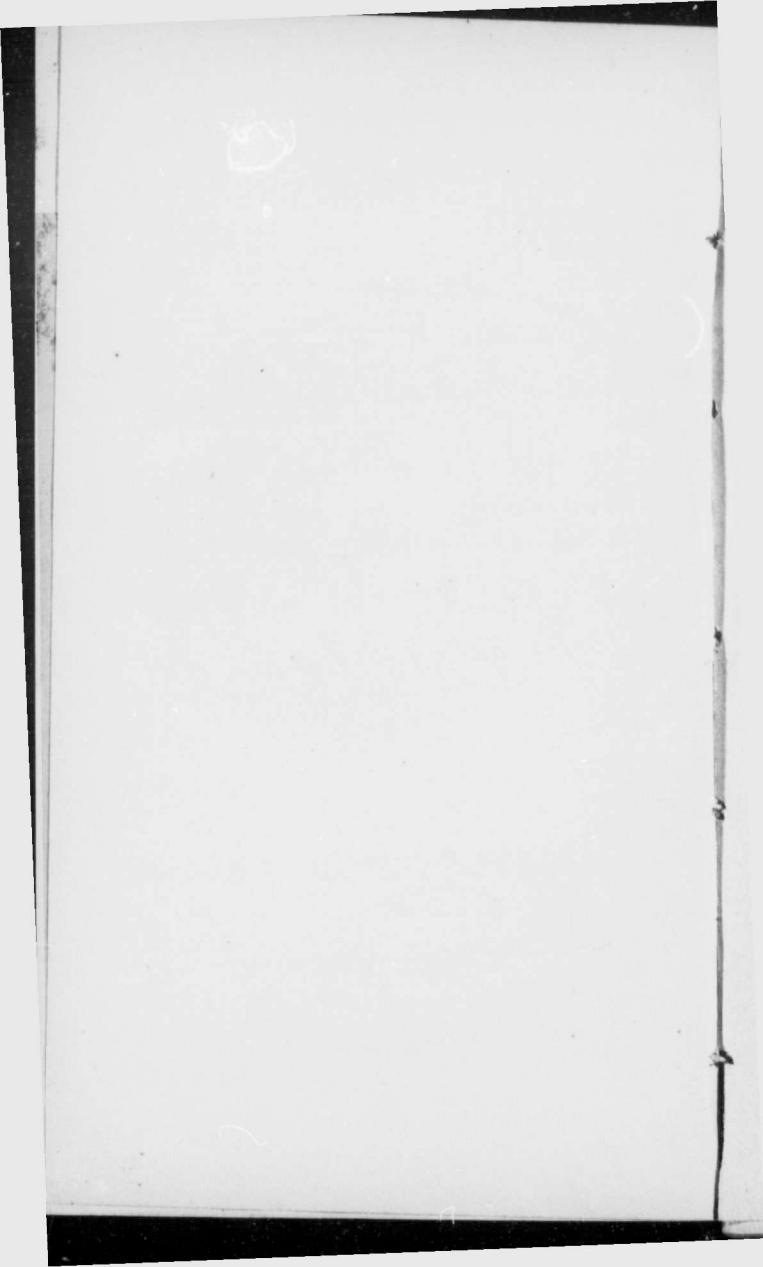



INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY,

17 TO 27 ST. MARY'S STREET.

Phone North 135.

OBJECTS.—To care for mothers and their infants during the first 12 months. Children from 14 days to 3 years of age only are admitted.

POPULATION (Oct. 1).—Sixty-two children and 27 mothers.

ADMISSION.—Destitute mothers are admitted on sanction of the Board of Management.

CHARGES.—Mothers leaving babies to board pay \$4.00 monthly. Outsiders bringing children pay \$5.00 monthly.

CRECHE (DAY NURSERY),

374 VICTORIA STREET (Opposite Normal School).

OBJECTS.—To care for young children, ranging from infancy to 10 years of age, while their mothers go out to work. The older ones are taught on the kindergarten system by a competent teacher. The younger ones are supervised at play, and taught table manners at meals.

POPULATION.—Average number cared for daily, 75.

ADMISSION.—They are admitted from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. (at the latter hour all leave).

CAPACITY.—One hundred and twenty-five children can be accommodated. Fifty mothers register here also, and most of them get daily work through the Superintendent.

CRECHE (DAY NURSERY),

521 ADELAIDE WEST (First Block East of Bathurst).

OBJECTS.—To provide food, oversight and training for the children of mothers who are obliged to go out to day work. Children of 4 months to 10 years of age received if well recommended. Children must be sent clean to gain admission.

POPULATION.—There are 40 or more inmates as a rule in winter; 50 in summer months by using an outdoor space.

CHARGES.—Ten cents per day is charged for each child, 5 cents for each additional child of the same family. For this three meals per day are given and care.

WORK FOR MOTHERS.—The Creche also operates as a Labor Bureau for the mothers by obtaining day work for them.

CRECHE (DAY NURSERY),

1575 QUEEN STREET EAST (short distance west
of Woodbine).

OBJECTS.—To provide board and education for children whose mothers are compelled to work daily. Mothers also get work supplied through the Matron. Hours, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, 7 a.m. to 2 p.m.

CAPACITY.—The Crèche has capacity for 6 infants and 34 older children.

ADMISSION.—Every child must be sent clean, and with enough clean clothes for the day.

SUPPORT.—The finance is obtained by:

ST. VINCENT'S INFANTS' HOME (ROMAN CATHOLIC),

ON SACKVILLE STREET.

OBJECTS.—The care of destitute, foundling and illegitimate infants. About 20 maternity cases are also provided for in a separate ward.

POPULATION.—There are usually about 100 cases in residence.

ADMISSION.—The recommendation of a priest or some responsible persons is necessary for admission. All who are able to pay are expected to do so according to circumstances. Inmates are required to remain and care for their infants till one year old, and to assist in the laundry connected with the House of Providence.

SUPPORT.—The institution shares in the Government and civic grants, etc., of House of Providence. Its cost for maintenance is about \$9,000 per annum.

PRINCIPAL.—General Superintendent, Mother Superior Sister Felix.

CHILDREN'S HOME (SALVATION ARMY),

41 CHARLES STREET EAST.

OBJECTS.—To care for children under necessitous circumstances—orphans, illegitimate or destitute. Sometimes children are transferred here from the S.A. Maternity Hospital. *N. 6 2 5 6*

POPULATION.—Average number of inmates, 23.

ADMISSION is through the Social Department at S.A. Headquarters, Albert Street, City.

SUPPORT is by inmates' fees, Government grant and social funds of the S.A.

OBJECTS.—The providing of care and protection for destitute and neglected Roman Catholic children. Mr. P. Hynes, the representative, is at the Toronto Police Court daily, morning and afternoon. Children are cared for at Sunnyside, St. Mary's, The Good Shepherd, or St. John's. The Society has no shelter of its own.

CITY GRANT.—A grant of \$1,500 is made by the city annually.

OBJECTS.—The object of this Home is the training and maintenance of destitute or neglected boys between the ages of 5 and 14 years who have *not* been convicted of crime.

POPULATION.—The average number of inmates is 100.

CHARGES.—\$5.00 per month is charged for the maintenance and tuition of each boy; if more than one of a family is accepted, the charge is reduced for the extra boys.

SUPPORT.—The Government grant for 1909 amounted to \$828.50; civic grant, \$1,000.00. The remainder of the expenses are obtained by inmates' fees, subscriptions collected by ladies, investments, etc.

DR. BARNARDO'S HOME FOR BOYS,

50 AND 52 PETER STREET.

OBJECTS.—Boys brought to Canada from England are placed in this Home, and thence distributed to their situations, supervised, visited and corresponded with. (Girls' receiving home is at Peterborough.) Twelve visitors are attached to this office, and complete register of all the boys kept here.

POPULATION.—The number varies in this Home; four parties per year are received, each numbering about 160 boys.

SUPPORT.—The finance is merged in the general funds of the National Waifs' Association. Canadian work is supported from the general funds, donations and gifts of old boys and girls.

OBJECTS.—This is a distributing home for boy immigrants brought from the Fegan Homes in England.

POPULATION.—Only in spring is there any number of inmates, when about 100 are accommodated. Other times of the year only a few, that may be changing situations, are in the Home.

SUPERINTENDENT.—Mr. Geo. Greenway; Assistant Superintendent, Mr. W. Hutchinson.

SUPPORT.—The financial support is from the general funds of the Homes in England. Old boys pay back \$50.00 when able, as a thank-offering, and this is used to fit out new boys.

GIRLS' HOME,

229 GERRARD STREET E.

OBJECTS.—To provide education and maintenance for needy girls between the ages of 3 and 14 years. Responsible parties must furnish reference.

CAPACITY.—Accommodation is provided for about 100 inmates. A new school building now gives excellent facilities for education.

SUPPORT.—Income of the Home is from the following sources: Five dollars per month is charged for each girl, but, in cases where

more than one child in a family is accepted, the fees are reduced for the extra children.

OBJECTS.—To provide for and educate Protestant orphan children. Qualified teachers are engaged, and the education conducted in a special building by the Public School Board.

POPULATION.—October, 1910, 140 inmates.

ADMISSION.—Those who are total orphans have the preference always. Next in order, admissions from death of a mother, or insanity of parents, or serious sickness. The police and social workers often ask admission for children whose parents have separated, but the Orphanage cannot yet open their doors to these cases.

OBJECT.—The purpose of the Guild is to promote the spiritual, moral, intellectual, social and physical welfare of young women, by providing reading rooms, libraries, parlors, gymnasium, Bible and educational classes; also securing them employment.

ADMISSION.—Young women over 15 years of age and of good moral character may become members. There are five classifications of members, viz., active, associate, life, sustaining and honorary. The associate and sustaining members must have good moral character and pay an entrance fee of \$2.00. The life member must have the same character and pay a fee of \$10.00. The active member must be a member in good standing of an evangelical church, the entrance fee being \$1.00. An honorary member is one in good standing as a member in any evangelical church, and elected by the Board of Management.

Travellers' Aid Agent at the Union Station, watches for young women and passes them on to the Home when they have no friends. Situations are also found for domestics, and young women can rest at the Home between change of situations. There are always two or three in the Home. Two hundred and ten were assisted during 1909.
