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



LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead, a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sth-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands, Agency (but not Dutles—Six months' residence upon and Sub-Agency on certain conditions, cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a louse worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

AN OLD ALLY.

When in his great speech Sir Edward Grey stated with regard to Belgium that the relations of Great Britain with that country were as strong to-day as in 1870, he emphasized a fact perhaps lost sight of that the two peoples have long been on the most friendly terms.

The little State in question, owing to its situation directly across from Portsmouth, the chief naval arsenal of Great Britain, has great strategic value for the Old Land. It is by far the most densely populated country of Europe, having a population of 650 people to the square mile. Holland, the adjoining country, comes next with 407, England third with 374. Germany has 311 in the same regard. The rural population as to that of the towns is about 4 to 1. It is on the whole a level country, and in Flanders the land becomes so low that dykes have had to be constructed. The once impassable morasses which stayed the progress of Cæsar's legions are now drained and converted into fertile fields, surrounded by dense plantations. The natural waterways are enhanced by a system of canals. The climate in the plains near the sea is cool and somewhat unhealthy, but in the higher districts hot summers alternate with cold winters. These varieties of climate lead to a great variety of products. It is rich in minerals and these, next to its abundant agriculture, are the source of much national prosperity. There is a superabundance of coal, from anthracite to the richest coal gas, and iron is also in abundance. There are very large linen manufactories.

Brussels, the capital, is built partly on the side of a hill and partly on a fertile plain. French is spoken in the upper part and in the lower portion Flemish is prevalent, while English is also very common, owing to the large number of Britishers who reside there for economical reasons.

The clear-cut remarks of the British Foreign Secretary with regard to the present situation are said to have electrified all Europe as well as the British Isles and well they might. The open breach between France and German was rapidly followed by the appearance of German troops on French territory and by an incursion of bomb hurling German aeroplanes which attacked the fortified town .of Luneville without doing anything more than damage a roadway. French airmen and outposts were also reported to have made raids

on German territory.

A more tangible occurrence was the bombardment of a French naval station at Bona, Algeria, by a German cruiser which, however, took to its heels before doing any damage and is cruising around the Mediterranean rea where considerable number os French war yes-sels are looking for such maraud-

What the British admiralty in-tended to do was not ascertain-able number of French war veslic as to the movements of British war vessels. Precautionary measures in view of possible later developments were being taken, lowever,, as became known through a suggestion issued by the admiralty department to British ships bound for continental points north of Calais.. These were advised to dipert their course to posts in the United kingdom in the interests of the

national welfare. As to the fighting between Austria and Servia, the original combatants in the war which has spread over the greater part of the European mainland, reports come to hand from Nish, Servia, that the Austrians had suffered a sharp repulse and heavy losses at the hands of the troops of the little Balkan nation.
