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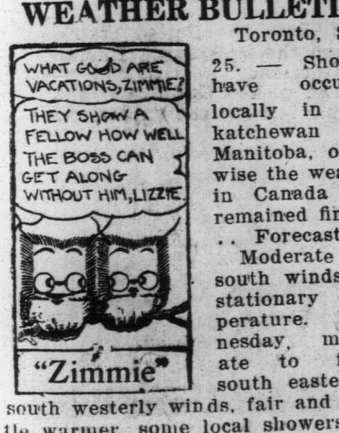

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH.

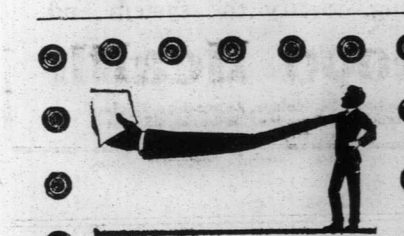

That Charles Walter be appointed Janitor of the city hall from the 25th September, 1917, at a salary of ninety dollars, this amount to include work of all kinds about the windows, and all work required to keep the building in a clean and sanitary condition. He to retain the present help now engaged in the cleaning of the Mayor's office and the clerk's office on the second floor, at the wage now paid. He to pay this amount out of his salary.

That the request of the merchants and owners on King street, between Colborne and Dalhousie streets for better light be granted.

That the request of the ratepayers on Marlboro street for extension of lighting to Stanley street, be granted.

That the request of the ratepayers on Dundas Street between High and West streets for street lighting be granted.

The only absentee of the evening was Ald. Jones. The council adjourned at 11.50.

DUFFERIN RIFLES CHAPTER

The Dufferin Rifles chapter held a meeting at the armories on Monday afternoon. After the usual opening ceremony and the routine business had been disposed of, the committee appointed at the last meeting to inspect the chapter's donation to the furnishings of the home for returned soldiers, reported that it was considered best to undertake the complete furnishing of a bedroom. The committee had already chosen the wall paper and hangings, and made enquiries at several local stores as to the cost of appropriate furniture and linen. It was voted that the committee be empowered to select all the necessary furnishings. A much valued contribution of an electric reading lamp has already been donated by Mrs. Miss Fie. The linoleum, shades and curtains will be purchased from the general furnishing staff, so as to have uniformity as regards the windows. Arrangements were then made for the shirt waist dance to be given at the armories on Thanksgiving day. The committee reported that suitable music could be secured—that the tickets were already procured and could be obtained from Mrs. G. D. Watt. The admission would be 25 cents, the supper of coffee, home-made cake and sandwiches would be extra. No meeting will be held in October.

Amendment Beaten. On the call for the year and message on Ald. Dowling's amendment, it was defeated by one vote; Ald. English, Secord, Symons, Jennings, Varty, Wiley, Harp and MacBride opposing the measure. Deafening applause greeted the vote. "Silence gentlemen," you commanded the Mayor.

"I hope I shall not have to turn you out," observed His Worship. Repeated laughter. "Well turn you out next year," declared a speaker from the crowd. Report Carried.

The report of the committee then carried by one vote, Mayor Bowly and Ald. Kelly, Bragg, Hesse, Milne, Tulloch and Dowling being in opposition. Upon the motion of Ald. Dowling, seconded by Ald. MacBride, the clerk was instructed to write to the Attorney General upon the subject of the legality of the referendum.

The delegation on leaving the council chamber, gave three hearty cheers for Ald. MacBride. The council authorized a grant of \$600.00 to the Italian Red Cross fund.

Fixed Assessments. Fixed assessments granted to a number of city hotels and factories were renewed upon the recommendation of the finance committee.

Board of Works. The Board of Works submitted the following report: 1. That Mr. C. Cook, president of the Brant Sanatorium Board having written the Board of Works (Sept. 17th 1917) as to the necessity of having the institution connected with the City Sanitary Sewer System, a Committee consisting of Aids, Jennings and MacBride be appointed to wait on the Sanatorium Board and come to an agreement as to the construction of the sewer and apportionment of cost.

It Takes Her Months To Answer A Letter.
I have a friend who was married a few years ago and went to a distant part of the country to live. Her friends here miss her and write to her. Sometimes months elapse before she answers their letters. Some-times she comes back here to visit and she is glad to see her that we forgive her. She is the kind of a person who makes people without doing things for them. People vie with each other for the chance to do things for her. She takes what they give as a matter of course and they are content. You know the sort of people for whom it is difficult to find things for whom it is difficult to find the time to keep up with their correspondence (and they are often the people who answer you the day they get your letter). 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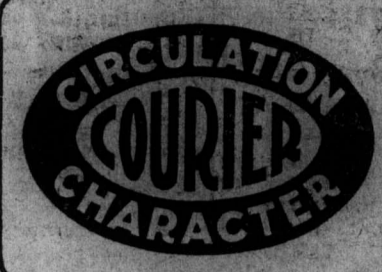
