

JEW-BAITING IN RUSSIAN POLAND

YOUNG JEWS SHOT DOWN INDISCRIMINATELY BY UNKNOWN MAN AT LODZ.

LODZ, Russian Poland, April 10.—A panic was started among the Jewish population here today by an unknown man who commenced an indiscriminate shooting at young Jews who were passing in the streets. Two of them were killed and three were wounded before the shooter disappeared.

AWFUL SUFFERING IN S. E. RUSSIA

THOUSANDS ARE DYING OF STARVATION AND \$2,250,000 IS NEEDED FOR RELIEF.

LONDON, April 10.—The report from Dr. Kennard, who went to Russia to investigate the Russian famine, writing from Samara, says that there are twenty million persons distributed throughout the southern and eastern provinces of Russia who cannot live to see another harvest, with out aid. In Samara, he adds, thousands are dying and 750,000 are starving; of the latter only 372,700 are getting relief of one meal in twenty-four hours.

As the meals provided are not very substantial, this means dying by degrees. The Commissioner closed with an appeal for two and a quarter millions.

Flues of Engine Burst.

INGERSOLL, Ont., April 10.—A. W. Smith, a Grand Trunk fireman, of Sarnia, was instantly killed and a barkman whose name could not be ascertained, slightly injured by the bursting of the flues of their engine this morning. The accident occurred at Patton Siding, about three miles west of this town. Smith either fell or jumped from the engine. His head was terribly crushed by coming into contact with the rail and he was dead when picked up.

PORT WILLIAM, Ont., April 10.—Information reached here late tonight of a terrible calamity near Chatham, east of here, which cremated two cars of No. 1 topped over an embankment. Fire broke out immediately and it is said that 11 people were burned. The report cannot be confirmed. It is said that all the bodies were badly charred and that identification is impossible.

STEAD LIKES ROOSEVELT.

Says He is Really a Great Man But Needs Thicker Hide.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—"If the Dolly had consulted me in making Stead today after his first meeting with the President, I would have advised him a thicker skin. One of the greatest needs for statesmen is to have an epidemic that is insensible to mosquito bites. That very delicacy was the weakest spot in the great English statesman, Lord Rosebery. The greater difficulties a statesman has to encounter the thicker should be his skin, for some times he has to stand humiliate. So, for Mr. Roosevelt's peace of mind, I wish that the Lord had given him a little thicker skin. But I like him. He is really a great man."

EMMA GOLDMAN.

Anarchist Leader to Deliver a Series of Addresses in Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, April 10.—Emma Goldman, known as the worker's leader of freedom, but as she terms herself a simple anarchist, arrived in the city this morning from the twin cities and will give five lectures here this week. She expects to leave again on Sunday.

"This is the first time I have been in this city," she said pleasantly, "and of course I do not know how many members our society has here. They are composed of all nationalities. We are anarchists or radicals. There is certainly a misconception of what an anarchist is. It is not a conspiracy for the assassination of Kings and such like. It is not a secret organization. All our meetings are open to the public. Anarchism as a philosophy does preach violence. It is to develop the people out of the necessity of organized governments and is progressing favorably."

Drowned in Old Man's River.

MACLEOD, April 12.—An unknown man, about 40 years of age, was drowned while fording the Old Man's River here today. He was swept into deep water by the swift current. All efforts to render assistance proved futile.

RUSH TO LARDER LAKE.

Three Thousand Men Have Invaded District in Past Few Days.



THAW'S FATE IN HANDS OF JURY

FINAL STAGE REACHED AT 7:15 O'CLOCK LAST NIGHT—VERDICT ANY MOMENT.

CHICAGO, April 10.—The Thaw case has entered on its final stage and the jury retired he had to listen to a scathing attack upon his wild life, to a narrative of hard facts which strip ped his deeds of the halo of chivalry. The judge instructed the jury to bring in one of the following verdicts: the second degree, manslaughter in the first degree, or not guilty on the ground of insanity.

Thaw was very much depressed by the judge's words. He left the court dejected and with apparently little hope of acquittal.

The district attorney's summing up evoked many comments of praise from those who heard it. It was a comprehensive, logical, and forceful review of all the evidence adduced, devoid of flowery phraseology. His arguments were consistent with the testimony.

He declared, at the outset, that romance and sentiment did not enter into the issue, because it was not a question of Stanford White's character or Evelyn Thaw's sufferings; it was a plain matter of fact homicide. "A common cowardly tendency to murder," he termed it.

The novel plea of (Dementia americana), made by Attorney Delmas at the very close of his argument, was vehemently attacked by the district judge, who repeatedly referred to it in tones of sarcasm.

Mr. Jerome dealt wittingly with Evelyn Thaw, to whom he referred as the angel child. Thaw, he termed alternately, (St. George) and (Sir Galahad).

Thaw remained in the courtroom for a short while after the jury had retired, and then the family returned to their hotel for dinner. The young wife remained and had dinner with Attorney O'Reilly, at a nearby restaurant.

At nine o'clock the jury was locked up for the night and Judge Fitzgerald left for his home leaving instructions that he was to be called as soon as a verdict was reached.

THINKS HE HAS \$15,000 DIAMOND

ROUGH STONE—BELIEVES HE POSSESSES FORTUNE.

NANAIMO, B. C., April 10.—A young man from Comox has in his possession a stone about three-eighths of an inch square and if Cumberland jewelers find anything of diamonds in their rough state, it is worth a small fortune.

The stone which resembles a piece of crystallized quartz, was found in Okanagan County by its present owner, who until a few weeks ago, was a miner in that section of the province. He knows nothing of uncut diamonds, but coming across the stone curiously he put it in his pocket, where it lay forgotten until he drew it out with some papers when in Comox. It attracted the attention of a traveling man to whom he was talking. The man examined it and forthwith offered to purchase it for \$200. This offer only a valuable bit of crystal struck the finder as being curious. He decided to carry it to Cumberland where he had a jeweler and thinking it a diamond he would cut glass. Those who profess to know something about uncut diamonds say the stone is genuine and worth fully \$15,000.

BRITAIN'S OUTLAY FOR HER WARSHIPS

£78,000,000 SPENT IN THE LAST TEN YEARS FOR NEW FIGHTING MACHINES.

LONDON, April 10.—The total cost of the ships which compose the British navy as it stands today amounts to the substantial total of £132,566,679.

Twenty-five per cent to light in the annual dockyard expense accounts, published recently. A bird's eye view of the navy is included in the accounts, its completion being given in detail. A summary of the total may be set out as follows:

Of the total sum of just over £99,000,000 which has been spent on these ships included in the contingent section, more than £78,000,000 has been spent within the past ten years, and of this amount over £54,000,000 has been spent within the past five years, so that it has become evident that the large majority of our ships are comparatively modern.

Each year has seen an addition to the power of the ships built and also to their cost. This is illustrated in an interesting way by the figures given.

For many years the average cost price of an armoured battleship has been between £700,000 and £800,000. Nowadays it is seldom that a battleship costs less than a million. Take, for instance, the twelve armoured vessels completed in the year 1905-06. The average price for the twelve was over £1,200,000. On the other hand, the seven armoured vessels completed in 1903-04, cost an average of only £899,000 each. The three completed in 1900 cost an average of only £780,000 each.

HELD UP BY C.N.R. BLOCKADE

IMMIGRANTS IN SERIOUS TROUBLE ALONG NORTHERN MINNESOTA BOUNDARY.

MINNEAPOLIS, April 10.—The Minnesota State Railway Commission has been appealed to for aid in clearing up the blockade of settlers' efforts which now exists along the Northern Minnesota boundary by reason of a refusal on the part of the Canadian Northern Railroad to accept for shipment any more goods destined for Western Canada, and owned by immigrants.

The Great Northern is in a dilemma over the order. Today cars are being furnished and loaded as usual on the assumption that they will be handled at St. Vincent and Emerson by the Canadian officials by the time they reach their destination. This will be the case providing the blockade is cleared away by the end of this week.

As a result of the order the movement of settlers has been almost completely stopped. Hundreds of immigrants are being held up, although it is up to the railroads to take care of them. They are anxious to reach their destinations in order to be ready for the spring work.

General Manager James, of the Canadian Northern, has wired the Minnesota commissioners that it may be a couple of weeks before his road will be in a position to handle the business.

The Canadian officials are doing the Canadian land men a great wrong in this manner. Many twin city land men are holding prospective settlers here pending some definite information concerning a settlement. They are housing them in second rate hotels and meeting all expenses.

NEW ORLEANS, April 10.—The case of Benj. R. Greene and John F. BLAIRMORE TOWNSITE DISPUTE

MATTER BROUGHT UP BEFORE
THE HOUSE BY MR. McDON-

opposition was supporting the view of
the member for Toronto he was do-

ing what was anything but a credit
to the house. He said that Mr. Bor-

den was waiting until he had spoken
so that there would be no chance of
denying the charges. He made it
clear that there would be no reply.

Mr. Bordeu—After I have made
charges you can reply. The attack
by Mr. Macdonell was on Mr. McKen-

zie and not on the Govern-
ment and he (Oliver) deprecated the
placing of a slander on the records of
parliament.

Mr. Bordeu—"Take it back."
Mr. Oliver did so and regretted
that under a case of that kind a mem-

ber of parliament was not permitted
to call a spade a spade.

Mr. Foster—"You had better get
out of the Dominion, as well as bet-
ter get out of the Dominion."

than you had. (Laughter and
cheers.)"

Mr. Oliver proceeded to show that
the Dominion Government granted a
patent in the case; it was taken to
the Exchequer Court and Mr. Justice
Burdidge gave judgment in favor
of the Dominion, as was stated al-

ready by Mr. Tarriff. This judgment
was on the merits of the case. Judge
Westmore in the case and he also
agreed that Montebello was the first

by the lessee and that the lessee
shall not dispose of his stock with-

out the consent of the minister.

THE WESTERN MINERS AND OPERATORS

SITUATION IN THE COAL-MINING
INDUSTRY REMAINS ABOUT
AS IT WAS.

Operators Have Taken Necessary
Steps as Laid Down in Trades Dis-
putes Act and Have Made Necess-
ary Application to Ministers.

CALGARY, April 12.—The situa-
tion in the coal mining industry re-
mains pretty much the same. The op-
erators have taken the necessary steps
as laid down in the trades disputes
act and have made the necessary ap-
plication to the Minister for the ap-
pointment of a board of investigation.
Upon receipt of the prescribed re-
quest from the Minister the operators
and separate agreement of a repre-
sentative from their side to act on
a board of three, appointed to in-
vestigate and adjudicate upon the
merits of the dispute.

Strenuous efforts are being made
by the miner's delegates to avoid re-
cognition of the operators' associa-
tion, and President Sherman is now
endeavoring to make separate agree-
ments with each particular mining
company of the old plan which would
enable the union to use one against
the other as a leverage to obtain
further concessions. The operators'

union, however, which was formed as
a result of the request of President
Sherman to a joint conference to ar-
range a uniform contract, having
come into existence thereby as a min-
ing company association, will not go
back to the old state of affairs and
arrangements separately. It is a
case of uniform agreement for all
mines now with them as the thing
was started. Work is continued un-
der the present agreement and under
the same conditions according to the
stipulation of the new disputes bill
until it is decided by board of in-
vestigation what constitutes a fair
uniform contract between two parties.

President Sherman's Statement.

PERNIE, B.C., April 12.—District
President Sherman of the U.M.W.A.,
states: "In order that the public may
understand what the demands of the
Canadian mine workers are at this
time, I wish to state that we are will-

ing for the sake of peace that the
present standard rates shall be con-
tinued with an advance of ten per
cent upon all rates; that the mini-
mum rate for outside labor shall be
\$2.50 for a ten-hour day; that wages
be paid every two weeks; that an
eight-hour bank to bank day be es-
tablished at all mines; that the
workmen shall be allowed to work
under a system of piece-work; that
we do not desire to enter into any
legal technicalities with any coal
company in this district. The agree-
ment is that wages and hours will
suit all existing customs to be main-
tained.

We do not insist upon open or
closed shop. Neither do we seek to
take any advantage over any coal
company in a legal or technical man-

ner. We are prepared to negotiate at
once with any company in this dis-
trict without waiting for an invest-

igation board.

-Mrs. F. H. MacKenzie and Miss MacKenzie will not receive on Wednesday of this week.

-The Heward Board of Trade is advocating a through passenger and mail service between Winnipeg and Regina via the Arcola line.

-The Regina Relief Society wish to acknowledge with thanks the following: \$19.35 from The Elks; \$15.00 from "A Friend," and 50 cents.

-A banquet will be tendered to the Judges of the Court en banc now sitting, on Thursday evening, April 18th, by the members of the Regina Bar.

-The Maple Creek Signal, which was closed down some six months ago, through the death of Mr. F. S. Goddouton, the editor and publisher, has again made its appearance under the management of Messrs. Cassin and Jukes.

-The uniforms for the High School cadet corps have been ordered from the Sanford Manufacturing Co. of Hamilton, the largest manufacturers of uniforms in the Dominion. They will be made of khaki duck with brass buttons and will be complete with caps and puttees. Uniforms for a company of 60 boys will be secured.

-A meeting of the Y.M.C.A. directors was held yesterday afternoon at which the new permanent secretary, Samuel Clarke, was present. It is expected that Mr. Parsons, the travelling organizing secretary, will be here this week. Mr. Clarke ex-

pressed himself as being greatly pleased with the plans of the proposed building and as extremely hopeful of the great work to be done in Regina.

of Engineer Smith, passed without opposition:

(1) That the offer of Mr. H. Antiknap to sell the west half of the north east quarter of 7-13-18, W. 2nd M., containing eighty acres for \$25 per acre, amounting to \$1,840, be accepted in order to permit an extension of the waterworks system and also in order to acquire part of the land upon which our present reservoir stands.

(2) That the City Engineer be instructed to extend the core wall on the south side of the reservoir dam two hundred feet, said wall to be built ten feet deep and varying from eight inches thick at the bottom to twelve inches thick at the top, the work to be done by day labor under the superintendence of Inspector Brimacombe at an estimated cost of \$600.

(3) That the City Engineer be instructed to prepare the necessary plans and specifications for the construction of another compensation basin, to be built on the north half of the north-east quarter of 34-17-13, W. 2 M., of one million gallons capacity at an estimated cost of \$11,000 and that the City Clerk be instructed to advertise for tenders therefor.

(4) That the City Engineer be instructed to prepare the necessary plans and specifications for the construction of an additional compensation basin to be built at the power house of five hundred thousand gallons capacity, at an estimated cost of \$7,000, and that the City Clerk be instructed to advertise for tenders therefor.

(5) That the City Clerk be instructed to advertise for the necessary iron pipe and incidental required for the construction of the waterworks system this year according to a quantity sheet to be supplied to him by the City Engineer.

Appointment of Building Inspector.

The report of the Fire, Light and Power Committee recommending the appointment of George E. Evoy as fire inspector and inspector of buildings at a salary of \$1,500 a year was subjected to considerable criticism.

As the result of questions put by Mayor Smith and Ald. Thomson, Ald. Bail, the chairman of the committee, admitted that the position had not been advertised. He had, however, he said, made it generally known and had personally made enquiries, with the result that he had come to the conclusion that Mr. Evoy was the man for the job.

His Worship thought that if the position had been advertised in the usual manner that they would have got a number of good applications.

Ald. Thomson did not think the position was worth a larger salary than that paid to the health inspector. He objected to the large salary proposed.

Ald. Gillespie said that he had been employing Mr. Evoy at \$5 a day.

Ald. Feyerherz—By the year round? Ald. Gillespie—By the day.

Continuing, Mr. Gillespie said that Mr. Evoy was a good man and well worth the money. He had offered him \$1,200 a year to work for him.

The appointment was finally agreed to with an amendment calling upon Mr. Evoy "to perform such other duties as the Fire, Light and Power Committee may designate from time to time," and making the appointment a monthly one "at the pleasure of the council."

Health Report.

The following report of the Health and Relief Committee dealing with the municipal hospital scheme, passed without discussion:

(1) That \$100,000 be raised by debentures to be expended on the building and equipping of a General Hospital in addition to the sum expected to be realized from the sale of the present hospital and site on block 128, Regina, when transferred to the city by the directors of the Regina Victoria Hospital, as well as in addition to any sum which may be granted for that purpose by the Provincial Government and that the City Solicitor be instructed to prepare an agreement of sale from the hospital directors to the city as well as a by-law in accordance with this resolution to be submitted to the burgesses to be voted upon on Thursday, 16th May, 1907.
