President Taft Hissed

When He Confessed His Convictions at Woman's Suffrage Meeting—Sounded as Though a Valve of a Steam Engine Had Broken.

Washington, April 14.—The President of the United States, the first chief executive of the nation ever to greet a convention of women suffragists, braved the danger to-night by facing an army of women who want the ballot, had the courage to confess his opinion, and was hissed. So great was the throng that sought admission to the hall that hundreds were turned away.

President Taft was welcoming to Washington the delegates to the Convention of the National American Women's Suffrage Association. He had frankly told them that he was not at all in sympathy with the suffragist movement, and was explaining why he could not subscribe fully to its principles. He said he thought one of the dangers in suffrage for women was that women, as a whole, were not interested in it, and that the power of the ballot, as far as women are concerned, would be controlled by the "less desirable class."

When these words fell from the President's lips, the walls of the convention hall echoed a chorus of feminine hisses. It was no feeble demonstration of protest. The combined hisses sounded as if a valve on a steam engine had broken.

President Taft stood unmoved on the platform during the demonstration of hostility—for the hissing continued but a moment—and then smilingly answered the unfavorable greeting with this retort: "Now, my dear ladies, you must show yourselves capable of suffrage by exercising that degree of restraint which is necessary in the conduct of government affairs by not hissing."

The women who had hissed were rebuked.

10 Tramps Killed

And Seven Injured by Wrecking of Freight Train.

Spokane, Wn., April 14.—Ten persons were killed to-day in the wrecking of a Northern Pacific freight train west of Spokane. Several of the injured and all of the dead were tramps, about twenty of whom boarded the train at Pasco. Their bodies have been recovered and seven injured are in the hospital.

It seems to me that girl is almost as guilty morally as George Coleman. Any girl who knows a man well enough to accept anything from him more personal and expensive than books, flowers or candy, ought to know him well enough to have a pretty good idea of what his financial resources are.

And no girl who knows what a man's financial resources are ought to be pleased when he gives her things or does things for her that she knows cost more than he ought to afford.

The cases in which such extrava-

gance results in dishonesty, of course I realize, are one in ten thousand but that one must be someone's, and no girl ought to risk its being hers.

And then, too, dishonesty is not the only bad result of foolishly extravagant gift giving.

In a report by a committee which had been investigating the methods of salary loan sharks, the fact is stated that many young men get into the clutches of these abominable creatures by borrowing to make some extravagant Christmas presents.

The interest on such loans is very high. Two young men have told me of paying, one double, the other treble, the original amount in interest before the loan was repaid.

Accepting extravagant entertaining is as bad as allowing extravagant gifts.

Dinner for two at a first-class restaurant, theatre tickets for two and a big bunch of violets for one mean the major part of a ten dollar bill gone and no girl ought to accept such entertaining from a man earning an average salary more than once or twice in a season.

There are so many simple inexpensive diversions that give just as much pleasure. For the winter there's snowshoeing, skating and coasting and for the summer, canoeing, and all-day tramp, punctuated by a dainty lunch for two, can be made fun winter or summer.

The man who continually accepts a girl's hospitality without ever entertaining her or doing anything for her, certainly earns the title of "freelance companion," and is certainly one kind of pest.

But the girl who actually hints for and eagerly accepts expensive presents and entertainments from a man she knows can't afford them, is a worse kind of pest and might be called "freelance destroyer."

Rowdyism Among Girls Has a Terrible Ending.

Bridgeport, Conn., April 10.—Lorraine Clark, 14 years old, a member of the freshman class of the local High School, is under treatment at a sanatorium in Brattleboro, Vt., suffering from the effects of her initiation on February 8 last in one of the school secret societies. According to the girl's story, she was made to drink on the night of the initiation a concoction, one of the ingredients of which was kerosene, and later made to eat macaroni which had been boiled in soap. After undergoing that treatment, her condition is believed to be serious.

A few days after the initiation she began to feel the ill-effects of what she had eaten, but said nothing until some time in March, when she grew worse and was taken by her father, Mr. F. C. Clark, a member of the State Legislature, to Brattleboro for treatment. Her conditions is believed to be serious.

The officials of the school refused to make a statement concerning the matter, but it is understood that the board of education will make an investigation.

Four Men Killed and Others Missing.

St. Alphonse de Gagnony, Que., April 15.—Four killed and one badly wounded, and perhaps several others yet to be dragged from the debris, constitutes the result of a terrible explosion which took place three miles from this village at a place called Bagotville Falls. The railway now being constructed to Ha Ha Bay employs many men, and an explosion of dynamite at a cutting caused the displacement of 75,000 yards of earth, which slid from its position on the side of the mountain as the effect of its discharge.

Stanislas Gagne, civil engineer, graduate of the University of Toronto, and formerly of the Niagara Electric Company, is amongst the victims, and whose loss will be severely felt here.

Four bodies have also been taken from the debris, and it is supposed that one other and perhaps more are still buried beneath the frozen earth, which slid from the side of the mountain taking five small houses in its march.

Two of the dead are named O'Brien and William Patterson, and the other two are Swedes.

Biggest Raid on Dealers In White Slaves Ever Made in New York.

New York, April 13.—With the arraignment of six men in a Brooklyn police court to-day, and the announcement that warrants were out for 20 others, the Brooklyn police declared that one of the biggest raids on dealers in "White Slaves" ever made in New York was in progress. Eight girls were in court to testify against the prisoners. One of them was only 9 years old.

The oldest was 15. They told the same story—they had been lured to a moving-picture show, where candy or other cheap presents were given them, and then they were taken to a house maintained as headquarters by the band.

Langford Won Again.

Ben Lomond, Ont., April 15.—Sava Langford, of Weymouth, N.S., again defeated Jim Barry yesterday, knocking him out in the 14th round of what was to be a 20 round bout at Los Angeles, Cal. Barry made a record for gameness.

From the 11th Langford ended at will. Barry surprised the crowd with the strength he displayed, despite the punishment he suffered, and made a rally in the fifteen.

Barry's weight was given at 196, and that of Langford at 166. Barry was by far the stronger of the two, and he was cautioned by the referee several times for rough tactics at close range. The pugilists went at one another savage at the sound of the bell. Both men were bleeding at the mouth at the close of the second round. In a clinch near the end of the third round Barry almost threw Langford through the ropes. From then until the eighth the bout was a mixture of slugging, rallies and infighting. Barry used the negro roughly in the clinches, and underwent severe punishment whenever they fought at long range.

Langford showed the utmost good nature. "Stop your tickling," he admonished during a clinch; "you can't win that way."

In the tenth the negro suddenly threw the white man against the ropes, and catching him on the rebound landed heavily flush on the jaw. Barry dropped for the count of nine. Barry's left eye, cut open early in the fight, was almost closed by that time, and his cheeks were puffed. Blood flowed in streams from his nose and mouth.

The last four rounds were marked by a succession of punching matches. It was during one of these hard rushes in the sixteenth that Langford caught his almost exhausted opponent a straight left on the chin and ended the fight.

Archbishop McCarthy Officiates at Requiem High Mass.

Antigonish, N.S., April 13.—Bishop Cameron's funeral services commenced at nine o'clock this morning with Requiem High Mass, Archbishop McCarthy, of Halifax, officiating. The Cathedral was tastefully draped in mourning, a canopy of purple overtopping the body of the deceased Prelate. The Sanctuary was filled with visiting Prelates and clergy as well as a portion of the church which was reserved for them. The large edifice was filled to overflowing, yet hundreds were unable to gain admission. On no previous occasion was there so many strangers in Antigonish, many of them distinguished in Church and State, all present to pay their respect to the late churchman.

The town was unable to give fitting accommodation to the large number, notwithstanding the townspeople had kindly thrown their homes open to the strangers. Archbishop Bruchesi, of Montreal, preached the funeral sermon, taking as his text, "Now the just man liveth by faith," Hebrew x ch., 38 v. The funeral cortege formed at the Cathedral and was an imposing sight as it wended its way to St. Ninian's Cemetery, where interment took place. The several Catholic societies in the various parishes of the diocese were represented and all combined to form a numerous body-guard.

The work of the sub-committees of the local General Committee of the Festival of Empire is about over, and the exhibits they have succeeded in getting together have either been shipped or will be sent to the Crystal Palace, London, within the next few days. Those who have had a chance of observing, know that these sub-committees have worked well and done excellent service on the several tasks which were committed to their charge. Words of commendation are especially due to the Chairman, Mr. Outerbridge, the Honorary Secretary, Mr. Gosling, and the General Secretary, Mr. Turner.

Mr. Outerbridge as Chairman has shown much skill in handling the situation generally, and Mr. Gosling has been indefatigable in supervising an extensive correspondence and co-operating with the several committees. With the resources at the disposal of the General Committee, especially with the aid of the exhibits furnished by the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Co. of Grand Falls, the Newfoundland Court should present quite a favourable appearance, even though it will have to stand the light of comparison with the courts of the more opulent Dominions of the Empire, such as Canada, Australia and South Africa. Mr. Howley, F.G.S., will have general charge of the Newfoundland Court, and he has been at work for months past preparing a fine mineralogical exhibit. In giving Mr. Howley charge the Committee has shown much wisdom, as there is no other person in or out of Newfoundland with such a knowledge of our mineral and forest resources, or who has spent a life-time in studying them at first hand. Capitalists with an eye on Newfoundland as a place for investments will find in him a veritable mine of reliable information about our Island Home. With Lord Northcliffe on the Council of the Festival of Empire, with the A. N. D. The Nationalists Support Asquith's Policy.

Budget Will Go Through House of Commons-- Bitter Encounter Between O'Brien and Lloyd George.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, April 18. After another stormy sitting arising out of a personal incident between William O'Brien and Chancellor Lloyd George attacks by the Conservatives on the Government's alleged surrender to John Redmond, leader of the Nationalists, and a warm repudiation by the ministers of any such bargaining, the House of Commons to-night adopted Premier Asquith's Gullotine motion under which the Finance Bill must be disposed of by April 27 by a vote of 345 to 252. The Chancellor warmly reproached Mr. O'Brien for publishing an account of a private interview without asking permission, and protested that Mr. O'Brien was the only man in the House of one hundred to whom he had given interviews who had been guilty of a breach of confidence. John Redmond announced the intention of his party heartily to support the Government's policy and the Budget, because financial injustice to Ireland was only remedied by securing Home Rule, and the merits or demerits of the Budget were trivial in comparison with the abolition of the Veto Power of the House of Lords. A. J. Balfour said that he would not comment upon the personal question beyond saying that ministers' interviews with their opponents ought to be treated as private. He proceeded strongly to deprecate the Government's bargain with Mr. Redmond and the manner in which the ministers had dragged in the King's name. Premier Asquith in closing the debate repeated his emphatic denial that there was ever any bargain or agreement between the Government and Mr. Redmond. An early feature of the debate was the intervention of William O'Brien who bitterly attacked David Lloyd George. Mr. O'Brien insisted upon the correctness of the statement which he made at Cork to the effect that the Chancellor had promised the Nationalists as concessions for their support of the Budget relief from the spirit, stamp and succession duties, brewery licenses, land taxes and from a general revaluation. He declared as before that he had read aloud to Mr. Lloyd George a letter which he had previously sent to the Chancellor and which contained a reiteration of the proposed concessions. As no witness was present at the reading, Mr. O'Brien said the Chancellor had thought it safe to issue his denial that such a letter had either been received or read to him. Mr. O'Brien added, the matter involves the honor and character of the Minister, and great personage as he is he thereby raises an issue of truthfulness and straight dealing which I am quite willing shall be judged by those who know him and know me. Mr. Lloyd George in replying declared that Mr. O'Brien's account of their interview was grossly inaccurate. The Chancellor admitted that upon their second interview Mr. O'Brien had read him a memorandum of what had occurred at their earlier meeting, but he said that the first he had heard of the letter described by Mr. O'Brien was from the newspapers.

Bible Society Meeting

In the Methodist College Hall.

At the College Hall last night the annual meeting of the Nfld. Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society took place under favorable auspices. Amongst those present were His Excellency the Governor, W. J. Hawker, of Carbonear; Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Canada; Rev. A. R. Bowen, Secretary Canadian Bible Society; and Rev. E. C. Ross of the Kirk. The President, Mr. Woods, vacated the chair and His Excellency presided to the close of the meeting. After singing a hymn, Rev. J. K. Curtis offered prayer, and the 19th Psalm was read by Rev. Mr. Ross. His Excellency expressed great pleasure at being present. He always had a great love for the Bible and believed that those who were circulating it were doing a grand work. He read a copy of a description of the Saviour, the original of which was written in the reign of Tiberius by the Roman Governor of Judea. Rev. J. Thackeray's report which followed showed that 4,986 Bibles had been circulated in the Colony, valued at \$676.27. He spoke of the good work being done by the Canadian workers. The Parent Society added the Bible in 13 languages to the list the past year, making in all 418. He eulogized the good work being done by the Colporteurs, and said that it was a happy coincidence that His Excellency the Governor came from Wales, whence the first great cry for the Bible emanated. The report of T. J. Daley, the Treasurer, showed that the total receipts for the year were \$1,398.35. After paying all expenses and sending away \$522.75 for books on purchase account there remained on hand a balance of \$165-

52. There are also on hand 3,061 Bibles, valued at \$669.74. The total amount disbursed during the year includes rent, insurance, printing and \$329.57, salaries to Colporteurs, the total amounting to \$1,232.56. Dr. Campbell, the speaker of the evening, on being called on by His Excellency, delivered an excellent address. He reviewed the history of the Parent Society which was organized 196 years ago with a view to putting a Bible into the hands of every man in the world printed in his own language. It was now printed in 418 languages. It was necessary to print it in 1,050 languages before the whole world could read it. A special effort is now being made by the Society to put the Bible into Tibet, Abyssinia and Nepal. The people of Halifax and St. John connected with the Society are doing a great work among the immigrants passing through there to the great North West.

After the singing of a hymn, Rev. R. J. Bowen, Missionary from Western Canada, delivered a short address. He spoke of the conditions in the Canadian North West where such potent possibilities for the future existed as far as the immigrant is concerned. The future of the Great North West depended on to what extent the influence of the Bible will make to impress itself on the minds of the new comers who are every month settling in thousands on the fertile lands of the Great Canadian North West. People of all nationalities are coming in, 80 languages in all being represented. In only 23 of these has the Bible been printed. Mr. Bowen's address was

impressive and his stories of the North West were captivating. Dr. C. Macpherson then sang a solo after which Mr. C. S. Piusnet proposed and Mr. A. Soper seconded the re-election of the existing officers and members of the Committee. Mr. F. W. Pincoc was elected Secretary, as Mr. J. Leamon, who has filled the office of Secretary for 15 years, wished to retire. Mr. Leamon has been a zealous and faithful officer during all this long period and deserves to be congratulated on the efficient manner in which he performed the responsible duties of the office. Rev. L. Curtis moved and Col. Rees seconded a vote of thanks to the Governor for presiding. A collection was taken up and a sum of \$51 received. After the singing of "From Greenland's Icy Mountains" and Benediction by Rev. Mr. Ross, the meeting closed at 10.30 o'clock.

Devonia Meets Wreck.

The barque Devonia, Capt. John Snow, arrived at Harvey & Co. yesterday with a cargo of molasses after a run of 26 days from Barbadoes. The Devonia after leaving here for Bahia had very rough weather all through and made the run down in 53 days. She had some damage and everything movable on the deck was swept away by the heavy seas which occasionally boarded her.

She left Barbadoes on March 23rd, and met fine weather until Sunday morning when she encountered a gale of N. W. wind, and had to run into Trepassy Bay to shelter. The wind moderating yesterday morning she left there and had a good run down the shore, entering the Narrows just as the wind veered from the N. E. with thick snow.

When the ship was coming in over the Banks Capt. Snow reports passing a lot of wreckage consisting of spars, pieces of bulwarks and the main and jib booms of some unfortunate vessel. The roof of a deck house was also seen floating in the water but there was nothing that would indicate the name of the ship to which the wreckage belonged. No vessel as far as this port except the Amy Louise, and she long ago has been given up as lost. The vessel also passed near a number of French bankers but did not speak them. Capt. Snow and crew are well.

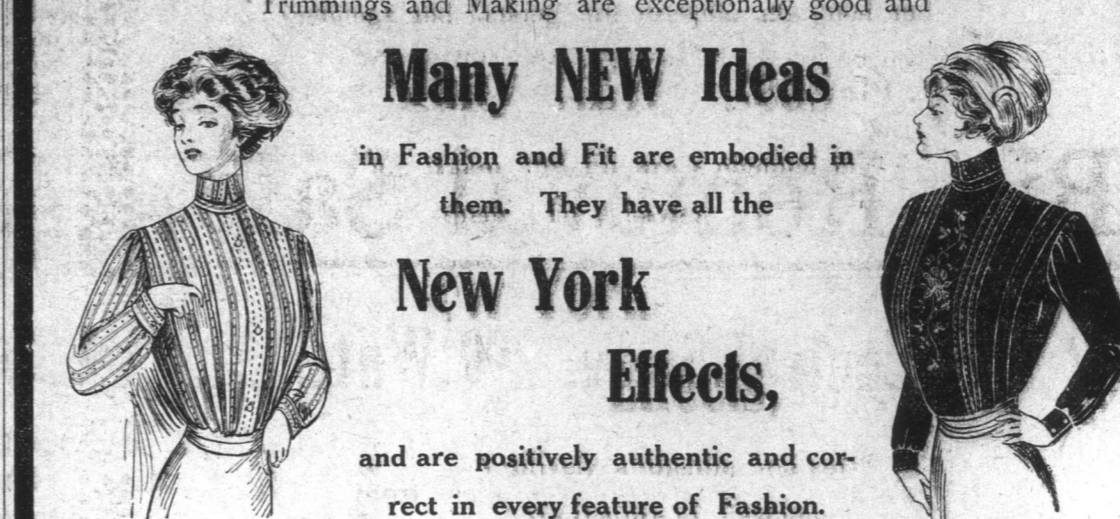
Deported From Sydney

Woman and Children Shelter at Lock-up.

By the Bruce express which arrived here at 1.30 p.m. yesterday there arrived from North Sydney a woman named Nottall and her two children, aged respectively 2 and 7 years. They presented a pitiable appearance, and being without money or friends they appealed to the police for shelter and assistance, and were last night, through the kindness of I. G. Sullivan, kept in the police station. The woman last night told the police a pathetic story. Mrs. Nottall, whose health is not of the best, said that about 12 months ago she left Bell Island and went to Sydney, where her husband secured work at the mines. Mrs. Nottall kept a couple of boarders to supplement her husband's earnings, and both these were after a while convicted by the police of entering the big store of Yeoght Bros. and stealing provisions, which they brought to Mrs. Nottall's residence. When the residence was searched by the police, articles which had been stolen from the store were found in the residence and her husband was arrested. He was tried with the two boarders and was given 4 years in Dorchester Penitentiary, the others receiving 2 and 3 years respectively. Mrs. Nottall then opened a small store, where she sold temperance beverages to support herself and children. Saturday last the police came to her dwelling and peremptorily ordered her to get back to Newfoundland, and when the Bruce was ready to sail put her on board that ship, not even affording her time to dispose of her few belongings. She arrived at Port aux Basques Sunday morning and had not even enough to buy food for herself and her children and on arrival was in a pitiable condition. If the woman's story is correct the heartlessness of the Sydney authorities is quite evident and deserving of condemnation, for this would be harsh treatment for a strong man.

Papal Nuncio and Roosevelt.

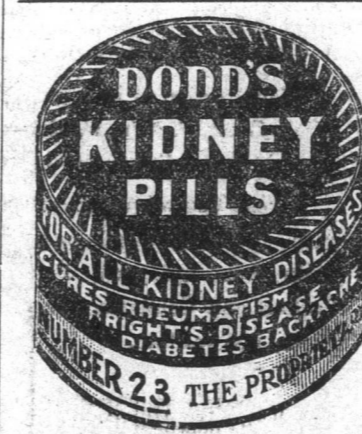

Women Candidates for French Parliament.

Undismayed by the law which inferentially bars women from office, since it denies them the right to vote, a score of women have proclaimed themselves candidates for members of the Chamber of Deputies, the election for which will be held April 24. The movement is not as militant as that in England and America, but the French women hope to attract enough attention to secure a discussion of the suffrage question in the new parliament and pave the way for attaining their right to vote in the city and subsequently at the national election.



Chinamen Identified.

When the two Chinamen arrived by the Mongolian from Canton, via Liverpool, yesterday were waiting to be identified they were held in the chart room of the ship under the surveillance of Mr. N. The Work of the Plenary Council.
The Pastoral Letter of the Fathers of the First Plenary Council of Quebec, which was held from September 19th to November 1st, 1895, deals with the Christian Spirit in the Individual, in the Family and in Society. It is a document of fifty-two pages, and is signed by 35 Prelates including Apostolic Delegate, six Archbishops, twenty-seven Bishops, one Prefect Apostolic and three Administrators of Dioceses whose Sees were vacant at the time, viz., Vancouver, B. C., Ottawa, Ont., and London, Ont.

"The great duty of him who bears the name of Christian," begins the pastoral, "is to constantly endeavor to reproduce in his own life the essential features of the life of the Saviour. To the fulfillment of this we are ex-

horted by the Apostle, that the life also of Jesus may be made manifest in our mortal flesh."

Christian life has its outward manifestation in assisting at public services of religion, in the frequent taking of the Sacraments, and in the practice of acts which lead to human conduct a complexion of integrity and honesty. These exterior appearances, however, do not constitute life; indeed, they may go hand in hand with death. "Thou hast the name of being alive, and thou art dead," says the Apostle St. John to the Angel of the Church of Sardis.

The spirit of Christ and the spirit of the world in nowise agree. Between the two there is unalterable opposition, and it is a fatal error to assume that they may be joined and mingled together in one's conduct. "No man can serve two masters," says our Divine Lord, "and all are well aware how relentlessly He upbraided the spirit of the world."

With regard to the Christian spirit in the Family it says: "The family, even as the heart of the Christian, is a sanctuary, which should be consecrated and sanctified by religion. Fathers and mothers are the custodians of that sanctuary."

The Marriage Tie.

Touching on respect for the marriage tie, it continues: "The stability of the Christian home depend entirely on the indissolubility of the marriage tie. Nothing but death can release from this bond which God Himself declares to be inviolable. 'What therefore God has joined together let no man put asunder.'"

tion the Catholic Church and your Canadian fatherland, while giving to each, in your thoughts and in your attachment, its proper place. "To love both countries," says Pope Leo XIII, "that of earth below and that of heaven above, yet in such mode that the love of our heavenly surpasses the love of our earthly home, and the human laws be never set above the divine law, is the essential duty of Christians, and the fountain head, so to say, from which all other duties spring." To that end cherish the Christian traditions bequeathed you by your forefathers, and maintain untarnished the saving principles which should illuminate public morals. Whatever be your office in civil society, fulfill it with integrity and disinterestedness, holding the common good above your own personal advantage, taking always as a guide your conscience as Catholics, and rising above all differences to promote the welfare of society and in defence of the sacred rights of religion.

"If the law gives you the right of voting use that right with wisdom and honesty. In it you are armed with an effective weapon; employ it in the cause of right. Use your liberty in voting having in view only the genuine good of the country, and obeying only the dictates of an upright and enlightened conscience. Be on your guard against allurement of bribery, and avoid the example of those who debate to mercenary ends the exercise of this sacred right. To sell one's vote is to sell one's conscience and to dishonour the fair name of citizen. Such disgraceful traffic is equally out of keeping with sound morality and with Christian sentiment.

The Christian Education of Children.
The training of children is of a truth the supreme duty, even as it is the great glory, of parents. Nature, as well as religions, places this responsibility upon them, and the welfare of society requires that they discharge it with intelligence and devotion. It is, therefore, of the highest importance that they be properly instructed with regard to this grave obligation.

Systematic Thieving.

It will be remembered that last week a young man named M. Carew of Topsail Road was before the court for stealing a pair of boots from a boarder at the S. A. Food Depot, where he said he was a mail driver, and was released from custody when he returned the boots, the owner being unwilling to press the case. The man had a respectable appearance and the police did not imagine that he was a criminal. However, their eyes were opened on Friday when Mr. Jno. Bamrick reported that a straddle valued at \$4 and a winter pad worth \$3 had been stolen from his stable on Topsail Road recently, while a set of leather tugs worth \$2 had been pilfered from Mr. Barnes; a set of carriage harness valued at \$28 was lifted from Mr. Henry Stone's place, the window having been opened by the thief; and Mr. Stephen Densmore of

Topsail Road lost a brichen straddle valued at \$3. These thefts were duly reported to the police and officers Byrne and Tobin took up the work of unravelling them. They were for a while non-plussed, but soon Byrne thought himself of the boots incident, knowing that another pair had been stolen from the Depot, and suspicion fell on Carew. He had been seen on the Topsail Road, which place the officers repeatedly visited yesterday but without avail. Later they arrested the man and last night he owned up to these various thefts. He hid the booty in different places awaiting an opportunity of selling it, and most of it was found by the officers, the silver mounted harness being taken from under an unoccupied cottage on Cornwall Avenue. In prosecuting their investigations the officers discovered that the man had his eye on such things as carriages and carts left out on Topsail Road by their owners. The officers are aware that he endeavored to sell some equipages, and believe that his idea was to secure as much money as possible for them and quit the country. During the past three years several larcenies of a glaring character have been committed and never cleared up and the police now believe they have the right party. The man was before the court to-day and was remanded for the present.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

In the police court to-day four drunks were discharged; two of them having paid the hire of the cab which took them to the station.

A fifth drunk was fined \$1 or 3 days.

Fifty Crafts Arrive.

Fully fifty crafts, all from Placentia Bay, arrived here yesterday most of them being laden with fish. They all left Friday morning, but meeting a E. N. E. gale with snow had to harbor in Ferneuse Saturday evening. As the vessels beat in the Narrows with a thick snow squall and N. E. gale last evening, the Durango, which was going out, had to slow down to avoid collision with them. In the thick weather which prevailed one schooner fell down on the schr. E. M. Brennan and carried away her bowsprit; several others had their sails torn and met other damage by colliding with each other.

Goes to Bell Island.

Mrs. Nofall and her two children who were deported from Sydney will be sent to Bell Island where the woman has friends. I. G. Sullivan will instruct Sgt. Cox to look after her on arrival there. The woman says that her mother-in-law, Mrs. White, would have helped her to make out a living at Sydney but the police would not bear of her remaining there.

PATIENT FOR HOSPITAL.—Mch. Whelan, a patient for the Hospital, came in from Colliers to-day, and was taken in the ambulance. He is suffering from a tumour.

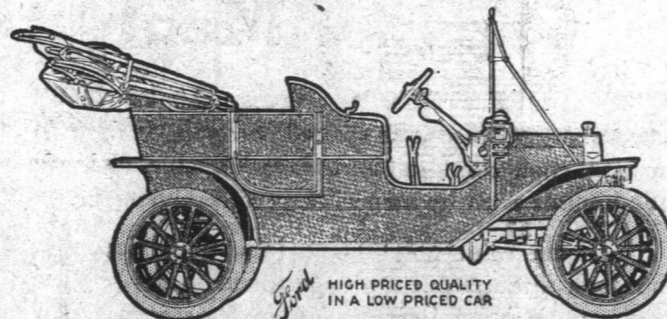
