**EARLY CABLES.**

**THE CRISIS PAST.**  
LONDON, April 12.  
The Parliamentary crisis was completely surmounted to-day, when the Government, having yielded to Labor demands and undertaken to appoint a committee to investigate the preferences of ex-servicé men, the Opposition permitted the motion that the Speaker do leave the chair, to be put without further resistance. Thereupon, in accordance with constitutional usage that grievances must be heard before supplies are granted the House began a discussion on various subjects. The discussion, having proceeded for three hours with occasional interferences from the Labor benches, Sir Phillip Lloyd-Greaves moved the closure, which was carried by 165 to 155, and the motion that the Speaker leave the chair was agreed upon. The Government thus triumphed over the normal majority, and is generally considered to have suffered badly in prestige.

**IMPERIAL CRITICISM.**  
LONDON, April 12.  
Whether Government or Opposition is likely to derive much satisfaction from the commentaries on yesterday's scenes in the Commons, is not clear. The Government has been slack while the Opposition has brought upon its self the denunciation, customary when any party in the House lets violence run riot with reason. The Times, which generally supports the Government, asked it for not showing a more accommodating attitude towards the Opposition, but equally condemns the latter's violent temper. Liberal newspapers charge the Government with incapacity, and say that the policy of tranquility has proven to be a policy of drift. The Chronicle says few expect any good from the present ministry, nor look for it to last much longer, adding that a general election may be looked for. With the exception of one or two papers little is made of the red flag outbreak.

**WIL CONFESSIONS SOURCE OF TROUBLE.**  
LONDON, April 12.  
Great Britain purposes entering an energetic protest against the granting by Turkish Nationalists of certain concessions in Anatolia to United States interests. If these concessions are found to embrace the Mosul oil fields, it was declared to-day.

**METHODISTS FAVOR FEDERATION.**  
TORONTO, April 12.  
At the third day's proceedings of the Educational Board of the Methodist Church in Canada, now in session in Toronto, the Board decided to endorse the action of the Governors of Mount Allison University, Sackville, in favoring amalgamation with the proposed Federal University at Halifax on condition it could be done without prejudice to the finances of Mount Allison. If union is consummated the Methodists would move Mount Allison to Halifax, but, likely would keep the Ladies College and Academy at Sackville.

**GENERAL IRONSIDES IN HALIFAX.**  
HALIFAX, April 12.  
Over seventy days out from Portugal for Newfoundland, the term steamer Ironsides has arrived here. Heavy ice prevented her reaching her destination.

**THE LEVIATHAN LEADS.**  
NEW YORK, April 12.  
Re-measuring the United States Shipping Board liner Leviathan has revealed that the new alterations have given her such increased gross tonnage that she is now entitled to be called the largest ship in the world. The Majestic is seven feet longer but the Leviathan has two feet more beam.

**NARROW VISION.**  
LONDON, April 12.  
The thousand people attended a meeting at the Albert Hall yesterday protesting against the proposed visit of King George to the Vatican, and a telegram to the King expressing loyal greetings and humbly praying that he might forego his projected visit to the Pope, saying that such visit would cause sorrow to millions of Protestant subjects. The meeting passed a resolution calling for withdrawal by the Government of the Envoy at the Vatican.

**LABOUR'S SANE PRONOUNCEMENT.**  
LONDON, April 12.  
Apparently it is not Labor's aim to use the recent parliamentary incident as a lever to oust the Government and obtain succession to its burdens and responsibilities, according to inference, from the comment of the Herald, Labour's only London newspaper.

**GENERAL ELECTION FOR ONTARIO.**  
TORONTO, April 13.  
Ontario will have a general election in the latter part of June, Premier Drury announced to-day.

**SMALLPOX UNDER CONTROL.**  
NORTH SYDNEY, APRIL 11.  
There is a decided improvement in the smallpox situation at Ingonish. It is believed that the epidemic is held in hand.

**HOWARD CARTER'S ILLNESS.**  
CAIRO, April 12.  
Howard Carter, co-discoverer with Lord Carnarvon of King's Tomb, has suffered an attack of illness, and is being attended by the late Earl's physician. The Countess, widow of Lord Carnarvon, has delayed sailing for England with the body of her dead



## Hearken, Electors!

Here is the record of some of the Squires-Coaker outfit. Take Squires himself. Has any public man in this country in the short space of three or four years accumulated as much money in salaries and pickings as R. A. Squires, the "patriot," who was so profuse in his promises to the electors in 1919, and who proclaimed far and wide how his heart bled for the hard life of the downtrodden fishermen and how eager he was to better their condition. He has done very well for himself without a doubt, but what has he done for the masses of people of the country either in the city or in the outports? The best he has been able to do for them is to give them work at breaking rocks or shovelling snow, or instructing the Poor Commissioners to dele them out a "whack" of meal and molasses so that they may be able to keep body and soul together. But he, himself, has been touring Europe and America, living on the fat of the land, he has a high old time at the public expense, and all the country has for it is loud talk and no improvement in the condition of the people.

Now take Mr. Coaker. Time was when Mr. Coaker used to flout in the faces of everybody that he was working for \$800 a year. Now Mr. Coaker has a mansion at Port Union, goes off on long trips every winter, lives at the best hotels, and generally acts the part of a millionaire. Until a few days ago he was Minister of Marine and Fisheries, drawing \$4,000 a year for that and a thousand dollars a year for the sessional pay, and for the past two years very seldom showing up in his Department of Fisheries or paying any attention to the job for which he was drawing this money. When he needed to come and go to Port Union he had a special train at the public expense, and in spite of all his talk about his interest in the poor man the fact remains that he took care of himself very well while his party was in.

Then take Dr. Campbell, Squires' colleague and partner in the West End. What has Campbell ever done for the people of this country? What interest did he ever exhibit in them until he started to run for St. John's West with Squires three and a half years ago? What interest would he have in them now except to retain the pelf and pickings which he has been able to secure since the Squires' party took office? Does the average working man stop to consider the thousands of dollars that Campbell must be making every year through his salary of Minister of Agriculture and Mines, his sessional pay, his jobs as a health officer and quarantine officer, Fever Hospital officer, etc. Does the average working man stop to consider the thousands of dollars of money, taken from the taxpayers of the country in the form of salaries and allowances, the Doctor has received.

Next, take Warren. The Minister of Justice has not failed to feather his nest well in the past three or four years. In addition to his salary he has had far fees out of the Labrador

Boundary case—goodness only knows how much; trips to England every summer, large allowances for expenses, and will probably get a big grab after the election for opinions on Railway contracts, etc.; and then, on the back of it all he is to be appointed High Commissioner in London at a salary, according to rumor, of \$25,000 a year.

Now take Mr. Hallyard. Mr. Hallyard was an outport schoolmaster until he got identified with Coaker. Now he is an aristocrat drawing thousands. He was one of the patriots who, before his party got in, was most vocal in denouncing his opponents for all the money they took, but as soon as he got in himself he was one of the first to vote for increasing the sessional pay to a thousand dollars, doubling the salaries of departmental offices, and generally making the most of the available opportunity. Aren't these choice specimens of liberal reform, retrenchment, and economy? Aren't these splendid examples of the patriotism that pays? Aren't their very names, not to mention their records, insults to the working people of this country who have suffered every sort of misery the past three or four years while these men have clothed themselves in purple and fine linen and fared sumptuously every day. Now these political misfits are howling because they are getting hurt. They know their side is getting the worst of this argument and that they stand to lose rather than to gain by relying on appeals to reason. Therefore, vilification and intimidation are employed in an effort to terrorize people from becoming Opposition candidates or from actively working from the Opposition party, and to keep from the people the knowledge that is certain to open their eyes to the undesirability of the Coaker-Squires Government and to the very bad record of their party which is now appealing to the country for a renewal of its mandate to control the destinies of Newfoundland.

It is particularly significant that right here in this city, where the Premier himself is a candidate, he is not prepared to take the platform in response to the challenge of Sir Michael Cashin, and tell the truth regarding the Humber Deal. Nor is he prepared to do anything to have the political case tried on its merits. Here in St. John's, where one might expect all means to favor the ruling party, where money has been spent like water in the effort to bamboozle, the electorate, there is manifested a strong inclination on the part of Government supporters to browbeat their opponents and to terrorize the electorate. As a personal friend of the Premier observed after studying the situation in the West End a few days ago, Squires is by no means so sure of his own election as his papers claim. Indeed, Squires is meeting with so many signs of waning popularity that he doesn't know just where he stands with the voters of St. John's West. He realizes now at last that the people intend to vote for **BENNETT & BETTER TIMES.**

## THE FISHERY REGULATIONS.

One of the darkest pages on the record of misrule of the Squires-Coaker Government is the management by Mr. Coaker of the Fishery Regulations. That the members of the Opposition party voted in favour of the adoption of regulations has no bearing on the manner in which they were managed. The giving of power to a man or a government to regulate a business or an industry is based upon the belief and understanding that the regulations to be adopted by him or them will be sane, reasonable and just.

Will even the strongest supporter of the Squires-Coaker party deny that the management of these regulations was unfair, unjust and damaging to the credit of the colony and the stability of her chief industry? Intoxicated by the power that was given him by his colleagues, Mr. Coaker threw to the winds all discretion and common sense and acted as one whose sole aim was to destroy fishery firms of long standing and in consequence to impoverish the fishermen and the tradesmen who depend upon the fisheries for the carrying on of their business. Valuable cargoes that could have been sold at a profit were allowed to rot and hundreds of thousands of dollars that would have been saved to the people of this colony were lost for ever.

The buyers of fish become disgusted when they know that they could not purchase fish from Newfoundland

land without bending the knee to the official czar of the colony, whose terms it was impossible for them to comply with and naturally they turned to other countries to whose markets they could go without fear of being treated as they were by Mr. Coaker. The merchants saw cargo after cargo of good fish which they had collected from their dealers or purchased from the fishermen sold at a loss and in some cases becoming valueless; when they could have sold them at a profit. The fishermen saw merchants impoverished by the losses that had been forced upon them and they saw the resultant drop in prices and the coming of the bad times that have been the outstanding feature of the present Government's lease of power.

The regulations themselves were alright, but it was the management of them that stands as a big blot among many others on the Government's record. The menace of Coakerism is again threatening the country. The Prime Minister in the event of his being returned to power would do nothing to check him because he will pay any price for nominal power. One more folly on the part of Coaker and the country is ruined forever. He has threatened it in his policy of Nationalization of fish. Beware, voters, and vote for a party that will legislate for sound and sensible government—the **BENNETT** party. It will bring you **BETTER TIMES.**

## BON MARCHE

**Moon Affects Earth.**

Observations now being carried out on the structure of the Tower of London by the staff of the National Physical Laboratory, show that the building moves upwards and downwards in unison with the tides by a fraction of an inch each day. This is a reminder that not only the sea, but the solid earth, responds to the pull of the moon. A series of elaborate measurements carried out with special apparatus have enabled the amount of this earth movement to be measured. Twice every day the earth moves upwards by two-thirds of a foot and twice downwards the same distance. Some big buildings, too, are very sensible to changes of temperature. The Eiffel Tower varies with every change of temperature, a passing cloud causing it to decrease by as much as two centimetres, and the measured difference in its altitude on one day has amounted to nearly three inches.

**Water Harder Than Iron**

At the new turbine station in Fuly, Switzerland, there are several jets of water issuing from nozzles about one and one-half inches in di-

ameter, yet the water, the pressure of which is nearly two tons to the square inch, is so rigid that if the stream is struck with a steel bar, the latter simply bounces off!

The water is brought from a lake more than 5,000 feet above the station, through great pipes drawn from tempered steel. They are two feet in diameter when they leave the lake; on their way down they become narrower, and have thicker walls in order to withstand the terrific pressure.

The jets are directed on the vanes of huge turbines. There are twelve of these monsters at the generating station, and each is capable of giving out three thousand horse-power; three thousand horse-power produced by a jet of water smaller than a child's wrist!

## Gauntlet Thrown Down for Sensible Government.

Not so very many years ago we were taught this lesson of revolt by the demagogue of the North—the thn Moses who is leading the "underdogs" out of slavery WITH OUR MONEY—the man who is sustained by the Almighty—the man whom God protects (these are his own blasphemous statements in a letter to dear friend Jim, recently.) But now, the tables are turned—his guernsey is cast off—he owns a palace in Newfoundland's new capital, Port Union—he owns a motor car, the chauffeur of which edits the Advocate in the winter—he occupies a private car on the railway—he runs the railway, as a matter of fact, and he nearly owns Newfoundland. Away with him! Take him out of our sight. The very names of Squires and Coaker will be an offence to all.

## Oriental Truth Tests.

Hindus have many queer methods of finding out whether a person is speaking the truth or not.  
If a man does anyone an injury, the injured person asks his assailant—whom he is forbidden from directly accusing—to chew a quantity of un-bolled rice, previously blessed by the priest. When the suspected person has done so he throws out the grain, and it is carefully examined.  
If any of the rice is found to be dry the man is judged guilty, the reason for this is said to be that the man's mouth has become parched through fear.  
Another method used by Hindus of forcing the truth from a person is to make him declare a certain thing is so while one of his fingers is dipped in a basin of water brought from the sacred river, the Ganges. No orthodox Hindu would dare to tell an untruth under these conditions.  
Yet a third way is to ask a man to make a statement while touching the head of his son. The belief is that should an untruth be told in these circumstances the boy will at once fall dead. Similar tests are employed with a man's parents. The Hindu is firmly convinced that if he tells a lie while looking at the sun he will irrevocably be condemned to the torments of hell.

A Rotten Excuse.

The Mail admits that Squires opposed the Wilson Deal in 1916, and the Humber Deal in 1922 (basically they were one and the same), and says "Squires champions the Humber Deal now because the Reids are not prominently connected with it."

That the Reids are now "prominently connected" with the Humber Deal no intelligent person will deny. They provide the lands and water powers. They promoted the scheme. They have even consented to subordinate themselves, apparently, to furnish Squires with this latest fake excuse for his sudden about face.

It is impudence to talk of the number of men employed by the Armstrong Companies, and their capital. Those companies are not behind the Humber scheme. Not a dollar of their money has been put into it. Not an obligation concerning it rests on them.

But there is a manner in which the Reids are at the very bottom of this Humber scheme. The proposal provides for the purchase of Reid's rights in the railway and coastal steamers, and the project cannot be developed until this is done.

The shallow pretence that Squires and Coaker are against the Reids should be abandoned; it deceives no one now. However insulating they may talk of and to the Reids, their actions have been vastly remunerative to the assailed. Millions have been poured into their treasury by this Government.

They Were With Him.

SQUIRES AND COAKER WERE COLLEAGUES OF CROSBIE.

"It is to laugh," as the French say. The poor Mail thinks this is 1919, apparently, and is fighting the election of that year over again. Wake up, brother! This is 1923! 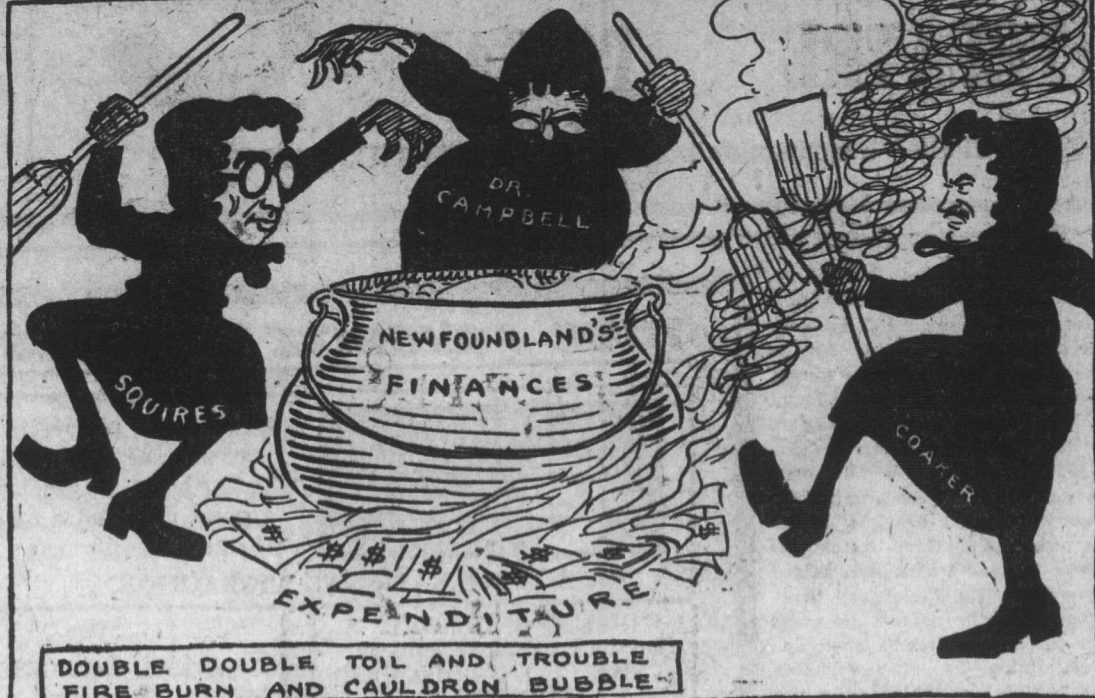

A BONUS ON FISH.

**TODAY'S MESSAGES.**

**COMMONS LONG SESSION.**

LONDON, April 13. The session of the House of Commons which began at 2.45 Thursday afternoon is still in progress at six o'clock this morning. The House resumed itself into committee, to consider the annual Army Bill and was kept throughout the night in discussion of its various items. There is no trace of the fiery atmosphere of previous days and the fatigue of the late sitting has failed to ruffle the temper of all members, who have displayed evidence in the reaction to be good.

**TROUBLE IN AMRITSAR.**

Despatches from India report trouble at Amritsar, where serious disturbances occurred in 1919. The present unrest is attributed to tension between the Hindus and Mohammedans as result of aggressive activities on the part of both parties. A score of persons were injured in a riot on Wednesday and British troops were called to support the police. Street fighting broke out again yesterday, and British cavalry with armored cars were brought in to strengthen the police. Fifty persons were injured yesterday.

**PLUNKETT ARRESTED.**

DUBLIN, April 13. The arrest of Count Plunkett by the State troops is officially confirmed, and the belated report of arrest of Countess Markievicz and Mrs. McSwiny also accurate.

**K.K.K. ACTIVITIES.**

GALGARY, Alta., April 13. Letters have been received by police and Roman Catholic authorities, threatening the burning of Catholic buildings in this city. It was learned yesterday that letters written were signed by Ku Klux Klan.

**TURKEY AND U. S. AGREEMENT.**

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 13. A local newspaper report says that the Turkish Government expects shortly to negotiate a treaty with the United States. The Turks will approach the United States representative at Lausanne Conference and the report also intimates tentative parleys already have been held with Admiral Mark Bristol, United States High Commissioner at Constantinople.

**PROMINENT OFFICIAL DEAD.**

NEW YORK, April 13. While seated at a table with friends at the Montmartre Restaurant, 301 West 56th Street, Thursday night, Alexander Dick, fifty years old, of central, suddenly fell from his chair and died. He was General Manager of the Coal Sales Department of the British Empire Steel Corporation.

**LABOUR TROUBLE IN AUSTRALIA.**

SYDNEY, N.S.W., April 13. A number of steamers are held up Newcastle owing to labor troubles the Northern country spreading to the South Coast, where two collieries are now idle and a number of coal mines in the North territory are already closed down. The trouble arose over the refusal of the Government to remove a magistrate who dismissed several miners for absenting themselves from work.

**AGRICULTURAL STRIKE STILL ON.**

LONDON, April 13. Mediators representing farmers and laborers conferred for five and a half hours yesterday in an effort to end the agricultural strike, but without success.

**TRANS-POLAR FLIGHT.**

NOME, Alaska, April 13. Capt. Anundsen expects to leave Nome today by dog team for Wainwright on the Arctic Ocean, five hundred miles north, in preparation for flight over the Pole to Norway. Plans to fly from Wainwright to that Barrow and to hop off from there for the transpolar flight.

**Horse Turned up With Owner.**

The family and friends of Mr. James Reddy, Torbay, were quite busy last night when his horse which he came to the city to buy some purchases returned home without him. A search party was organized and the police were requested to help in the search. In the meantime, Mr. Reddy was searching the city for his horse. He arrived home O.K. this forenoon.

**Eagle's Turn Out.**

The crew of the S.S. Eagle were out yesterday afternoon and left their homes by the S.S. Watchful this morning. The official specification of the Eagle's catch, tonnage, etc., has been received, and is as follows:—9,738 young fish, 35 young hoods, 351 bedlam, 121 old harks, 18 old hoods, a ton, 10,761 seals. Gross weight, tons, 19w, 1 q, 26 lbs. Net weight, 240 tons, 17 cwt, 3 qrs, 14 lbs. The net value of the cargo landed is \$20,457.81. The crew of the vessel, shared \$41.07 each.

**Aerial Dreadnought.**

NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION.

Britain's first "aerial dreadnought," a seaplane under construction at Southampton for the air ministry, is designed for actual living aboard and will be illuminated throughout with electricity. An electric captain is to be fixed for handling a 125 pound anchor, to hold the plane at rest on the water. Two watertight transverse bulkheads are provided as well as sleeping quarters for five men.

On the top of the hull will be built a superstructure divided into three compartments, one to be used by the commanding officer as a chart room, another for gunners and the third for the pilot. The total weight of the flying ship with full crew, fuel and two torpedoes each weighing 3,000 pounds, will be nearly nine and a half tons.

Torpedoes will be carried under the lower wings and discharged by means of a new type of releasing gear. Five machine guns will be carried, so arranged as to leave no "blind spot" in the craft, which will be able to climb rapidly and escape from the range of naval guns after delivering an attack.

**Seldom Go Out.**

The Moorish woman's life is never very exciting or varied, and her many domestic duties tie her to the house. It is only on very special or urgent occasions that she is permitted to go out; many never go out at all.

The lower class women are sometimes forced to attend the markets and are not so particular about cov-

ering their faces as the rules of their religion ordain. No strictly religious woman, however, will allow any man but her husband to see her face.

Some of the women are accomplished musicians and dancers, and sing to the accompaniment of their weird native instruments. This is in most cases their only form of amusement. Some of them are also experts at weaving and making tapestry.

Moorish women are seen at the best in the country districts, where one sees them going to a well for water with their earthenware pitchers gracefully poised on their heads or shoulders.

**Hearsey Evidence.**

As an example of the sort of cross-examination that was tolerated in our Law Courts in days gone by, the veteran Sir Harry Poland, England's oldest barrister, tell an amusing story of a lawyer who suddenly inquired of a hostile witness whether he remembered the date of his birth.

"Certainly," said the witness. "Every man remembers his birthday."

"A newly born infant has no memory. Now, sir, how do you know that it wasn't a day sooner or a day later—or a week, or a month, or a year—than the date you have in mind?"

"Why—er—ahem—I've been told."

"Exactly. You've been told, but you don't know. Step down. Gentlemen of the jury, this is the kind of witness who has testified against the unimpeachable character of my client."

**Back From the Dead.**

**'DROWNED' SAILOR'S LIFE SAVED.**

A Norwegian sailor named Harmensen fell into the dock at Barry, Glamorganshire, while hoisting his ship on Monday night. Boats were lowered to search for him, but a slight mist made the quest difficult, and it was not until some time after that he was found.

Harmensen's body, which was believed to be lifeless, was taken to the quay. It was examined, and, as it was considered certain that life was extinct, orders were given for it to be taken to the city mortuary.

A stretcher was sent for, but in the meantime a Barry coal-trimmer named Evan Griffiths, who was passing the place, heard what had happened and asked permission to apply a method of artificial respiration to the body of the supposed dead man.

Permission was given, but at first it seemed that the task was hopeless. Half an hour later, however, the coal trimmer had his reward in signs of returning consciousness.

Eventually full respiration was restored. Harmensen came back to life, and was taken to hospital, where it was reported last night that he was fairly comfortable.

**Gasoline From Coal.**

The conversion of soft coal into liquid oil was the subject of a lecture delivered to the Mining Society of the University at Birmingham by Dr. F. Bergius, an eminent research chemist. The process is simple. To coal under a very high pressure the gas hydrogen is added, and the result is that 90 per cent of liquid oil is obtained. By various modifications of the process it is possible to produce petrol or other kinds of mineral oil. A process which would enable a large part of the British coal reserves to be transmuted into liquid fuel would secure Britain against any risk of a liquid fuel famine and enable it to make its own oil at home. Hydrogen for such processes is generally obtained by decomposing water (a combination of hydrogen and oxygen) with electricity.

**Ship's Coins.**

A superstition among seafaring men is that a coin should be placed beneath the mainmast of a newly built ship. The coin should be of gold, though in a pinch silver will do. The coin should bear the date of the year the ship is built and before being placed beneath the mast it is carefully wrapped in cotton. Its resting place is the stepping of the mainmast.

Dealers in coins are aware of this long-continued practice, and the result is that when an old ship is broken up, especially abroad, there is always on hand a company of coin dealers desirous of obtaining the coin. It is said that in this way one collector obtained a specimen of the rare American dollar of the mintage of 1804, which has commanded a high premium for many years.

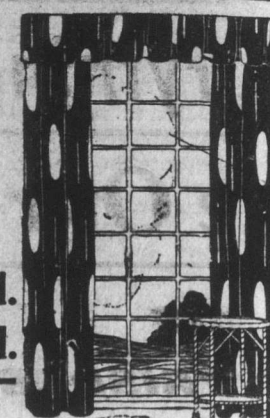

## German Air Giant.

British authorities are reported to be in possession of details of a gigantic German monoplane designed by Professor Hugo Junkers, and which it is said can cross oceans in a single non-stop flight. The enormous hollow wing of metal is to measure 300 feet from tip to tip, and in it are to be housed as many as a dozen engines, developing a total of just over 4,000 horse-power. Mechanics tending these engines will move to and fro through "tunnels" built inside the wings. With a great ship-like hull beneath its lifting-plane, this air colossus will rise from and alight upon the sea, and when loaded fully will weigh not far short of one hundred tons.

The meeting held at Petty Harbor held by Monroe, Hunt and Linegar last night destroys Squires' chance of getting a single vote there. The voters there are all fishermen and they want to carry on their industry free from Coaker interference.

The Red Cross boat took away over 100 more emigrants this week—mostly young men, the hope of the country. This is amongst many the greatest curse of the Squires-Coaker Government.

If Squires had not made up his mind to use the Humber Deal for politics to get back to power these men would not have to go away. Getting votes was his paramount idea finding work to keep the young men in the country was a secondary consideration.

No wonder that they denounced the Government as the ship moved out of the dock. Their fathers and brothers who are left behind will not forget to take revenge for them on Polling Day. Coaker once said "the more men that leave Newfoundland the better." And a man like that is given power to rule the country.

There are hundreds more waiting to see the result of this election, and it is a common thing to hear men who were prosperous and independent in 1919 say "if this Government is returned I will get out of the country."

There is not romance or mere sentiment of the imagination but cold hard fact and under the circumstance one should not be surprised. Water Street is almost dead this spring from a business standpoint and if Squires and Coaker get control again it will be "dead and buried and the grass growing on the grave."

We want to tell the South West Coast that Coaker's Nationalisation of Fish means that the fish caught there will be kept out of the Oporto market till whatever date it pleases Coaker and that will not be till his own fish is ready. The advantage of getting into the market in July and August will be taken from them, the same as it was under the old Fish Regulations. This will kill the fishermen's price as well as the merchants' price.

It is a pertinent question to ask Sir Richard Squires just now when he is talking and writing so much about the blessings of the Humber Deal why it is that the men who have been working out there all winter have no word of praise to say about it, and why it is that those who have returned say that it is a "frost" and that they "sooner be fishing on one meal a day." Yes there is another side to the Humber Deal which Squires wants to keep hidden till after the votes are all in.

Reduction of taxation and the curtailment of the orgy of extravagant expenditure is the only hope for this country. We can't live if we have to carry the burden that Squires has put on our backs the past three years. The fishermen can't make the fishery pay well enough to get a decent living under the present taxes. This Government will make no reduction. They want millions more to boodle and squander. The only remedy is to turn 'em out May the 3rd.

Turned out they certainly will be. The sentiment against them grows stronger every day. This is why the election was hastened for May the 3rd. If it was put off till the middle of May they would not get a man. The idea has taken hold of the public mind all over the country that conditions were never worse and any change must be for the better. They believe the slogan will come true.

### Household Notes.

A delicious salad combination is seeded raisins and chopped green peppers marinated with French dressing.

All the baby's milk bottles should be rinsed immediately after feeding to prevent any milk from souring in the bottle.

If carrots seem tasteless to your family, try adding a spoonful of vinegar and one of sugar to the water in which they are boiled.

For the sake of novelty, shape your croquettes like lamb chops and put a piece of raw macaroni into the end of each to look like the bone.

To save chicks put several stones in each pan or trough in which you keep water for your chicken; then when the little chicks happen to get into the pan they can get out by means of these stones and not drown.

A good sauce for meat is made as follows. Melt 2 tablespoons fat, add 3 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, pepper, 1 1/4 cups stock, 1/4 cup vinegar. Raise to boil and add 1/2 cup chopped ripe olives and 1/2 cup chopped raisins.

Oh, the weak-minded, inconsistent man, poor, childish, trusting men of Newfoundland! How greatly the map has fallen down on his job? How truly he has demonstrated his

bungling incapacity. How sorrowfully the others have realized their mistake! How terribly they have suffered the fruits of misplaced confidence. Every town, village and hamlet in Newfoundland has felt the devastating hand of W. F. Coaker since he has assumed his unbridled rule from 1919. Poverty, desolation and hunger have followed in his trail. And at last in the last stages of our existence the people of the whole island, of our cities, of our townships and our settlements have awakened to the urgent necessity of immediately overthrowing this plague-bringing man, and for establishing an organization of public improvement and national salvation. Just so surely as the leading men in our community have realized the duty that the country has expected of them, so also have our people, every true hearted man that our country can boast of, united themselves with determination and enthusiasm to consolidate a people's Government that will recall us from the racial decay that is fast wiping out our manhood. Coaker brought ruin to our fishermen by smashing our fish prices and lowering them to starvation figures, so also now will the party that is rising over the heads of the Squires-Coaker administration once more stimulate our fishing industries, reclaim our markets, and cause our selling prices to soar high again at the advantageous figures of 1919. Verily there is truth and prophecy in the saying "Fish will go up as fast as Coaker goes down."

**Household Notes.**  
Just as the skin of a roast of veal is beginning to turn brown, paint it with two teaspoonfuls of olive oil into which half a head of garlic has been grated.  
To make cheese custard, beat three eggs slightly and add three-fourths cup milk; season with one-half teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, few grains of cayenne, few drops onion juice and three tablespoons

grated cheese.  
Venetian eggs are a savory dish. To a can of tomato soup, heated to the boiling point, add a pound grated cheese, and a pinch soda. Stir until cheese is melted and add to it a cup of milk beaten into an egg. Stir rapidly, season and serve on saltines.  
To clean small rugs place right side down on dry grass or snow, beat with a flat carpet sweeper, sweep, turn over and sweep on right side. The rug will last longer if they are cleaned in this way instead of hang-

ing them on the line or shaking them by the corners.  
To prepare prunes for stewing first cover them with tepid water, allowing them to remain in water five minutes. Pour off water and wash through several waters. Cover with cold water and let stand for five minutes. Let simmer gently in same water a half an hour.

#### THE CHARGE-IT GRAPFER.

How do they do it? I refer to the people who keep getting head over heels in debt and are either being pulled out by relatives or having to go into bankruptcy or the poor debtors court.

I don't mean how can they bear to do it from the point of view of peace of mind and decency, though that is also an eternal puzzle to me. But how do they get a chance to do it?

Why are they trusted when other people, honest people, would either have to pay their bills or lose their credit?

#### A Thousand Dollar Bill.

I know a man who lived in one of the suburbs of a big city. He ran up bill after bill including doctors' bills, drugists' bills and a grocery bill of \$1,000. Finally he moved to another suburb without paying his bills and has started to do just the same thing again.

Another man of whom I know has been through the poor debtors court two or three times, and in bankruptcy once. The last time he wiped his slate clean the complaint against him included one bill for several months service on the telephone, several hundred dollars owed for taxi service, and a bill for some months stay at a hotel.

And his only assets were a personal belongings like his camera, his clothes, etc., the right to sue for breach of contract in regard to some business deal, and the right to sue the hotel which had finally ejected him for not paying his bills. Honestly!

#### Take Out the Telephone.

Now if you and I whose assets are somewhat more tangible than that should fall to pay our telephone bills the company (judging from the one occasion when I did forget my bill) would promptly call us up and tell us that our service would be cut off if we did not pay by a certain date.

Why is it so lenient to him? As for taxis and hotels, what one of us ever thinks of doing anything but paying our bills to them on the spot. It would never occur to us that these were things for which one did get trusted.

Again I heard of a man who went to New York and got a job with a banking firm at \$30 a week. The first month he bought a few things and paid his bills promptly. He has been buying things ever since and has paid for nothing. He is living at a \$10,000 rate on a \$1500 salary and nobody seems to mind.

#### You and I Pay.

Just as we laugh at political graft we are apt to laugh at graft of this nature because we do not think it is as touching us. But it does touch us in both cases. We must help pay the bills in higher prices because society always does pay in the long run for such things. The hat is passed around to use and we have to drop in just so much for every person who has been living on money that he does not earn.

If we looked at it that way I wonder if we shouldn't be a little less amused at the charge-it grafter, and a little more inclined to try to put a spoke in his wheel when we get the chance.

### Divided Food With Indians.

Splendid Spirit of Self-Sacrifice Shown by Party of White Travelers in the Far North.

The day of adventure, romance and sentiment in the wilds, is recalled by the arrival at Quebec a couple of days ago when two men and a woman, the wife of one of the men, after a 90-mile drive by dog sledge across Ungava in 50 days. When the party arrived at the first outpost on the brim of civilization the first act was to replenish food supplies which were completely exhausted, and all hands with an appetite. Then the trio pushed forward again after the first meal in almost a month, because halfway across the white wastes the party discovered ten Indian families slowly starving, with no one to go for food and no one to bring any to them.

The sledge party was provisioned to the extent for its trip of almost two months but could not leave without doing something—although pitifully little—for the starving Indians. Another careful calculation was made and each of the three consented to live on the least possible ration and take a chance on accident of loss of supplies by storm or other means. All except what the party believed would sustain life against the cold, was left with the Indians and when the travelers reached the first outpost they had been some time without food and were strenuously hungry. ### Fire Extinguisher.

Cheap fire extinguishers may be made by filling old electric lamp globes—or bottles can be used with some solution having special fire extinguishing properties. Such a solution can be made by taking 20 parts calcium chloride, 5 parts of common salt, and 75 parts of water. The globes are filled by immersing them in a large dish or pail containing the solution and breaking off the tips with a pair of pliers. They will fill quickly owing to the fact that the air has been largely exhausted from them during manufacture. When a fire occurs one or two of these globes are thrown at the burning object.

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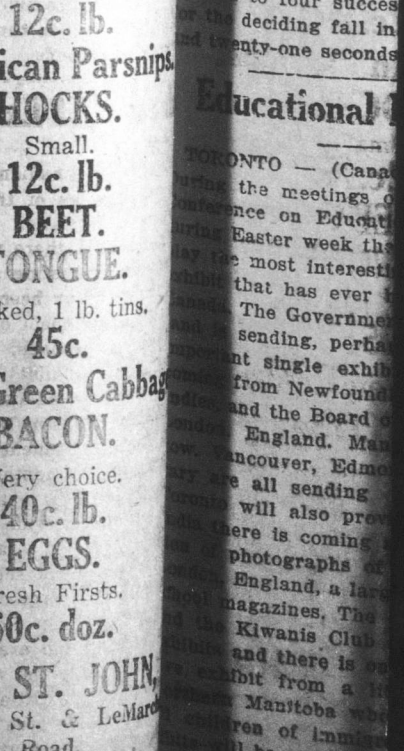

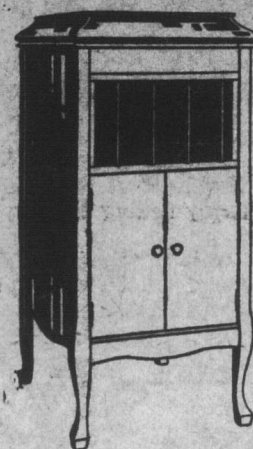

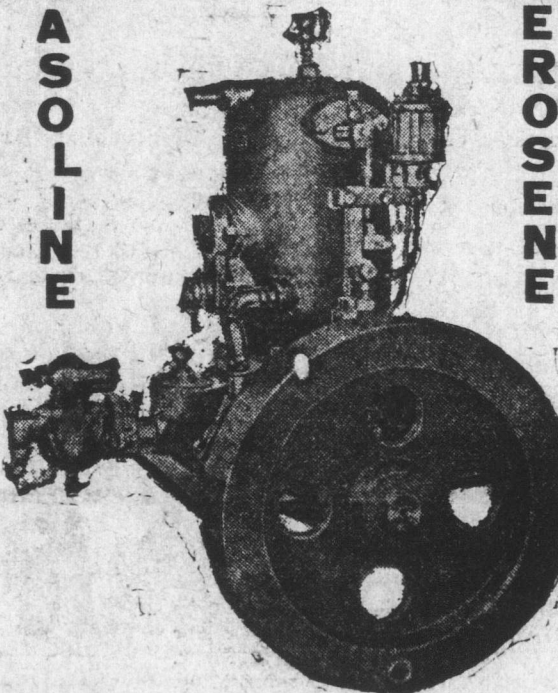
