Get your ground ready (when it is dry) as soon as you can. Plow it deep and harrow it well. If yours is a small garden, dig it to a depth of twelve inches, then rake it thoroughly.

A few days before you put in your seed, spread Fertilizer over the surface and rake it in. For potatoes, put Fertilizer in the bottom of drills and mix it with the earth.

A 125 pound bag of Fertilizer will do a quarter of an acre if you are using it with stable man-ure. Double this quantity if you are not using stable manure.



James Pike was also in command of the splendid brig "William," in the employ of John Munn & Co. for several years, and made remarkably quick passages to the Mediterranean and elsewhere. But I think that it was whilst master of the barque "Fleetwing," owned by John Munn & Co., that he made a record that has seldom or ever been broken. I know that he made the passage to Pernambuco (Brazil) in 21 days, and accomplished the return trip in 24 days. The "Fleetwing" was a remarkably smart safler. and was built by Newhook of New Harbor, Trinity Bay, and upon another occasion, Capt. Pike made the run to Oporto in 9 days. This passage was beaten by Capt. William Hennessey in the brig "Belle," also owned by John Munn & Co., but Capt. Hennessey had "to let her go" because he was caught in a gale, and ran over the bar at Figueira, Portugal, when it was thought impossible that any vessel could accomplish such a feat, and for many years afterwards the miraculous escape of the Newfoundland brig "Belle" was the chief topic of con-
