



NEW ELECTION LAW.

We give below a brief synopsis of Sir John A. Macdonald's new election law.

In counties the franchise will be enjoyed by persons having either of the following qualifications: 1st. Owners of land valued at \$200. 2nd. Tenants having a five years' lease of property, for which they pay an annual rental of at least \$20. 3rd. Persons working farms on shares, for which they pay the owner crops or produce to the value of \$20 per annum. 4th. Persons holding from the crown a lease of land valued at \$200. 5th. All persons paying taxes on incomes of \$400, and over.

In cities—1st. Owners of real estate valued at \$400. 2nd. Tenants paying \$30 per annum. 3rd. All persons having incomes of \$400 and over.

In towns and incorporated villages—1st. Owners of real estate valued at \$300. 2nd. Tenants paying \$20 annual rental. 3rd. Persons having incomes of \$400 and over.

Three scrutineers shall be appointed by government, and shall be paid. It shall be their duty to inspect the assessment roll, and to decide who is entitled to vote. They shall hold a court in each district in which there is a polling place, and after concluding their duties, shall publish the list of voters. Their decision may be appealed from, in Ontario, to any County Judge, and in the other Provinces to Judges mentioned in the Act.

The Royal Canadian Bank.

The bills of the Royal Canadian were selling in Toronto on Monday for 85c, and in a great many cases 88c, and when in sums of over \$100, 90c, were paid freely. There were not many bills offering, and people who had notes falling due on Saturday had some difficulty in procuring a sufficiency to meet their wants.

The general impression seems to be, since the publication by the Directors of the statement of the affairs of the Bank, that the bills are worth their full face value, and a great many holders will accordingly not sell for less. The shareholders appear to have confidence in the solvency of the Bank as there have been no transfers of stock. Attempts were made in Fergus and its neighbourhood to purchase bills, but after the panic of the first day or two had subsided, these were not successful.

The Tribune says: In spite of the Gold premium and the Wall-st. gamblers, the Treasury makes steady progress. The decrease of the National Debt during the first month of Grant's Administration was \$2,915,320. During the second month it was \$6,399,070. During the third month, now nearly ended, it promises, as our despatches assure us, to be at least seven millions! Meanwhile our Internal Revenue steadily improves, the upward movement of our bonds continues, the Pacific Railroad expenses are substantially ended, and the Secretary of the Treasury is moving cautiously but wisely. We are not without our discouragements, but the skies grow brighter.

CATCHING AT STRAWS.—The Government, as might be expected, is making the failure of the Royal Canadian Bank an argument in favor of its Banking Bill. The feeling of members from Ontario, however, is still so strong against it that Rose hesitates about its introduction.

POLITICAL.—The delegates from Newfoundland are to meet the members of the Government to-day, to discuss the basis of Union.

The latest exploits of New York thieves was picking the pockets of a prisoner whom the police were dragging to the station on Saturday afternoon.

Five thousand five hundred pictures were sent in this year to the French Annual Exhibition of living painters.

The Newfoundland seal fishery has been very successful during the past season. The number of seals landed at St. John is nearly 150,000.

It is reported in Ottawa, that the Government are determined to proceed with their banking policy next week. The opposition to it from the Province of Quebec is gathering strength.

Guelph Rifle Association.

The annual meeting of the Guelph Rifle Association was held in Mr. Deady's Hotel last (Tuesday) night. The following were elected office bearers for the ensuing year:—President, Geo. Elliott, Esq.; Vice-President, J. Hazelton, Esq.; Secretary and Treasurer, E. Newton, Esq.; Managing Committee, Judge Macdonald, Messrs. A. McKenzie and A. Stovenger, Capt. Swinford, Lieut. G. A. Bruce and Lieut. J. Hooper.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring President, and to the Secy-Treasurer; and a resolution was passed voting \$25 to purchase a rifle for the latter in recognition of his services to the Association.

The Treasurer presented a full report of receipts and expenditures for the year, which showed a balance on hand in favour of the Association of \$116. The report was received and adopted.

The retiring President read a summary of practice during the past year, and complimented the Association on the improvement in the score.

The return match between the Association and the Eramosa Rifles will take place on Monday next, near Dryden's Hotel.

Dominion Parliament.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

OTTAWA, May 25.

Sir Geo. E. Cartier moved that on Friday next the House resolve itself into Committee of the Whole to consider the North-West resolutions, which he said were not yet printed, on account of yesterday being a holiday.

Sir John A. Macdonald gave notice that on Friday he would introduce a Bill respecting the office of Queen's Printer. It was proposed that the Queen's Printer should be a salaried officer with £500 a year, and have the control of all Government printing, the Gazette, the Statutes and the Government generally, and that all the printing except what was confidential should be given out to public competition for a term of five years.

Hon. Mr. Rose moved the reception of the report of the Committee of Supply. The several items agreed to on Friday last were then moved and concurred in, except the items for Dominion officers in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, \$51,000 which was reserved. The item of \$31,792.65 for salaries and contingencies of the House of Commons was also reserved at the request of Mr. McKenzie, who pointed out that it contained an over-charge of \$2,000 on the grant of \$6,000 to the Parliamentary library. When the item regarding emigration was brought up, Mr. Levesconte moved, seconded by the member from Lambton, that the item be not concurred in, but be committed to committee of the whole with instructions to strike out the item of \$1,000 for agency at Halifax. A long discussion followed after when the amendment was put and lost. Several other items were then concurred in, when the committee arose.

On Tuesday evening a gentleman was driving a span of horses attached to a double buggy down Macdonnell-st., and when opposite the stables of the Queen's Hotel the animals became restive and made a bolt as soon as they reached the corner of Wyndham-st. One of them broke the whippletree with a kick, and they were in a fair way of making off when the Mayor got them by the head and stopped them.

The Globe says that the Algona on Tuesday took up a party of seven gentlemen, under Professor Bell, of the Geological Survey, amongst whom was Mr. Peter Bell, of Guelph, who will be engaged during the summer in making an examination of the country between Lake Neepigon and the United States boundary line on the one hand, and Lake Superior and Lake of the Woods on the other. Professor Bell, being a civil engineer as well as a practical geologist, will be able to contribute much important information as to the best route for a railway or other means of communication through the country he will traverse.

TROTTLING MATCH.—A trotting match took place on the Waterloo Road, by moonlight, on Tuesday night, between Jas. Quinn's "Kitty Clyde," and John West's "Rattler" for \$5 a side. The mare won in two straight heats, the race being the best two out of three mile stretches.

The Frances Smith has left the dry dock at Detroit, and is on her way to Owen Sound, to resume her trips between that place and Collingwood.

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., Police Magistrate WEDNESDAY, 26th.—Thos. Breckon was charged by Jas. Gay, with assault and battery. According to the poet's story he was pretty badly handled on Monday night, but the defendant said that he intended kindly by the plaintiff, having only endeavored to rouse him, when he found him sleeping on the sidewalk. His Worship told James that he was rather afraid the assault was one of those hallucinations to which he is sometimes subject, and for proof he instanced Mr. Gay's belief that he is a magnificent poet, a point which was at least debatable. The case was dismissed without costs, and plaintiff admonished to stick to poetry and let whiskey alone.
