Two great events have occupied public attention in France during the past week—elections to some vacant seats in the Assembly and the trial of Marshal Bazaine for treachery and unsoldierlike conduct in the Franco-German war. The coalition between the Monarchists and the Imperialists in France, the healing of the breach between the two Bourbons who aspired to the throne, and other circumstances, caused great anxiety amongst the Republicans. Ex-President Thiers, however, allied himself heartily with the Republicans, the different sections of the party co-operated heartily together, and the result was a great Republican success at the recent elections; making the chances for another French king once more remote. Bazaine's trial continues, but no definite result has yet been reached.

In Spain, the Carlist Rebellion is evidently on the decline. The loyal troops of the Spanish Republic have won two or three important victories, and their opponents are reported to be much disheartened. Nor do the prospects look any brighter for the other rebels—the Intransigentes, as they are called. Four rebel iron-clads recently fought a spirited battle with five Government vessels, but were badly beaten and had to retire to Carthagena is their last great stronghold, and a great attack is to be made upon it soon by the Government troops.


