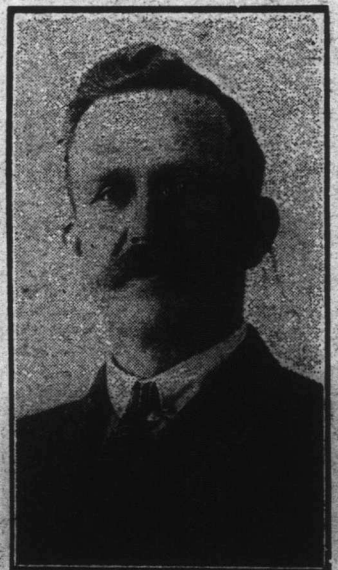

**ROOSEVELT MEETS**  
**THE ITALIAN KING**  
Victor Emmanuel Was Very Friendly, Kind and Courteous to the American Citizen

Rome, April 4.—King Victor Emmanuel received Mr. Roosevelt at the Quirinal today. The hour of his reception being known, a considerable number of persons gathered to greet him on his way from the hotel to the royal palace.

King Victor Emmanuel wore the uniform of a general of the Italian army. His words of welcome spoken in excellent English were most cordial. His majesty and Mr. Roosevelt shook hands heartily, the monarch inviting the former president to sit at his side. The door of the king's apartment was then closed, and the two remained in private conversation for about three quarters of an hour. Expressions of friendship on behalf of their respective countries were exchanged.

Following the audience Mr. Roosevelt said that the king had been so gracious and flattering both to him personally and to his country, that he felt that he should not make public anything concerning their conversation. The formalities of the reception concluded, King Victor personally conducted Mr. Roosevelt to the hall of the palace where the American inspected the hunting trophies of the king's father and grandfather. From the Quirinal Mr. Roosevelt drove to the Pantheon and placed a wreath upon the tombs of Victor Emmanuel II and King Humbert. A pleasing incident at the Pantheon was a chance meeting between Mr. Roosevelt and the Queen Dowager Margherita who detained the former president in conversation for some moments.

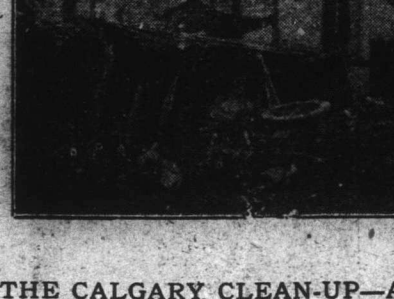

Everything Favors Best Horse Show That Canada Ever Saw.

**EXCELLENT HORSES**  
**READY FOR OPENING**  
What Will Happen at the Big Show Today.  
Calgary and the citizens of Calgary are all ready for the annual Alberta Provincial Horse show, which opens here this morning.

It is a great show in the matter of entries and the class of horse flesh on exhibition.

Entries have been made from points as far away as New York, several from the west coast, and a number of centres of Alberta will not be represented in the ring.

Ranchers and stock men from all over the country are in the city for the big event. The hotels are filled and have been for some days, and horse men and grooms on horses and their breeds fills all hotel corridors.

The scene at Victoria park yesterday afternoon of scores of riders exercising their mounts, drivers having one last spin before entering the ring and grooms dodging in and out of the box stalls, could only tell one tale, that the horse is king and will reign until the show concludes on Friday evening next.

The park every available stall is now occupied, and it has kept Manager Richardson on the jump providing stabling for outside riders.

Besides the splendid horses brought in from New York for the show by Mr. F.C. Lowe, Mr. J.P. Moodie has secured several of the finest class of Singapore Greys that have entered the province, and in this latter breed the competition will be very keen.

**ASQUITH IGNORES**  
**REDMOND'S BLUFF**  
The Annual Meeting of the Association Was Held Last Night.

London, April 4.—John Redmond is the boss of the political situation, and can hand out whatever he wishes to Mr. Asquith, but Asquith and his ministers have set their minds on carrying out "everything as advertised."

The government will not accept the suggestion made to retain the final stage of the finance bill in the commons act of the House of Commons, and Asquith has announced on veto resolutions.

As a prominent Liberal remarked today, it is a case of "Pike's Peak or Bust." The speaker gives a short breathing spell, so it will be June before the lords give judgment on the resolutions, and it is doubtful if another election will produce a materially different house, the Tories not expecting to gain more than twenty-five seats which would not give them a majority.

Liberals, however, are anticipating much success in increasing their numbers, as well as making them independent of the Irish vote.

In the opinion of some, Mr. Redmond is bluffing, and will finally shrink from the responsibility of simultaneously destroying both the budget and the government. Much importance is attached to the question of whether the strength of the government on veto resolutions.

Everything Favors Best Horse Show That Canada Ever Saw.

**WILL BE JUNE BEFORE**  
**LORDS GIVE JUDGMENT**  
Liberals Are Anticipating Success in Increasing Their Members.

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**THE NOISE BREEDERS**  
**HAVE LONG DEBATE**  
The Annual Meeting of the Association Was Held Last Night.

The question of asking the government to give the owners of pure bred and registered stallions and the horse breeders throughout the province greater protection against dealers who travel grade stallions and flourish certificates with them, occupied the attention of the Alberta Horse Breeders association at their annual meeting last night held in the Drill hall.

There was a large turnout of stockmen from all over the province, and the discussion, though heated at times, was of great benefit to those present. It placed the various questions before them in every light possible.

George Hoadley, M.P.P., president, occupied the chair, while the Hon. Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture, addressed the meeting during the course of the evening.

The president in his opening address commented on the progress of the industry of horse breeding in the province of Alberta and the rapid strides it had made. He spoke of the horse blood that had been imported into the country and the work that the association was doing as an organization of that kind.

He concluded by thanking the officers of the past year for the able management in which they had supported him in his work.

The reports and financial statement for the past year were read and adopted, all being of a satisfactory nature.

Mr. Marshall's Address.  
The president then introduced the Hon. Mr. Marshall, who stated that he was not there to deliver a speech, but rather to be on the ground and gather information for his department from the discussions that were to follow. He stated that he had increased the grant to the association by \$400 in the settlement received before the House of Commons and on the great work they were doing.

Mr. Hoadley urged that Mr. Richardson, the secretary, receive a handsome salary at their hands.

Mr. Richardson, in replying, stated that he appreciated very much their kindness in making the offer, but he had great interest in the association and would continue to do so, while they were in the department of agriculture, and would prefer to let the matter stand until the financial condition of the association improved.

A letter was read from Mr. Jacques, president of the Suffolk Breeders' society, advocating that the association be made an award to horses that could not pass a vet's examination before entering the ring to be judged.

This led to a long discussion, and was finally left to the directors to deal with, as it is a very complicated question, mainly as to what constitutes hereditary disease of horses, who should appoint the vets; also who should pay them. However, this same question led to the question of awarding certificates which they claimed were registration papers. Several resolutions were discussed, but as the same questions branched out into many by-paths of discussion, this was also passed to the directors to deal with.

Cheaper Butter in U.S.  
New York, April 4.—Dealers on the wholesale butter market here predicted today that as a result of the reduction in tariff on cream from eleven cents to five cents a gallon, there will shortly be a large quantity of cheaper butter offered to consumers in New York, Chicago and other cities within reasonable distance of the Canadian border. A chain of creameries, it is said, is to be built along the Canadian frontier which will make butter from Canadian cream and will be able to market their product at a reduction of 25 per cent. from the current price.

**GENERAL WM. BOOTH**  
**IS SERIOUSLY ILL**  
And it is Feared That The Present Illness Means a General Breakdown of The Veteran

London, April 4.—William Booth, head of the Salvation Army, is seriously ill at his home in Queen-Victoria street. He was seized with a fainting spell yesterday, necessitating cancellation of all his engagements. Those in attendance upon General Booth fear his present illness means a general breakdown. He is 81 years old and his health has been falling rapidly for the last few years.

General Booth seems to realize that the end is not far off, and expressed his pleasure to several of his co-workers who called on him today that the affairs of the army were in such shape that his passing would be without serious effect.

Train Service to Bassano Starts—Calgary to Acme Begins Today.

The train leaves Bassano at 7 a.m.; arrives here at 10.15; leaves again at 1.30 and gets there at 2.30. **WHY MR. ROOSEVELT**  
**DID NOT SEE THE POPE**  
He insists That Incident is a Purely Personal One.

**THE EUROPEAN PRESS**  
**COMMENTS ON INCIDENT**  
The Vatican Places Its Side of the Case Before World.

Rome, April 4.—The determination of Mr. Roosevelt to forego an audience with Pope Pius X, rather than subscribe to the conditions imposed by the Vatican, has created a sensation. The unfortunate and unexpected incident overshadows every other feature of the distinguished American's visit to the Holy See.

Mr. Roosevelt's refusal to see the Holy Father would be delighted to receive him, but the answer was couched with an expression of the hope that the audience would not be prevented by such a regrettable incident as made an audience for former Vice President Fairbanks impossible.

Mr. Roosevelt in turn stated that he could not accept any stipulation limiting his freedom of conduct. To the latter message the Vatican made answer that the audience could not take place except on the understanding of the first made known. On March 22, Mr. Roosevelt sent to Ambassador Lehmann the following cable message:

"Proposed presentation is of course now impossible."

Mr. Roosevelt insists that the incident be treated as purely personal, and earnestly hopes that it will not give rise to any bitterness on the part of the attitude of the Vatican, but feels that as a free American citizen he cannot consistently take any action that might be construed as involving a limitation of the freedom of his personal conduct. He had made no engagement to attend the Methodist or any other religious bodies of Rome, but at the same time thinks that he should not make promises as to what he will or will not do. It would appear today that so far as the Vatican and Mr. Roosevelt are concerned the incident is closed.

Comments of the Press.  
The news that the former president had abandoned his proposed visit to the Vatican reached the morning papers very late, but made a deep impression. However, the Messagero, an anti-Clerical organ, alone comments editorially upon the matter. This paper says:

"When the news was spread it was received with incredulity, many regarding it as a malicious fabrication on the part of the press. The incident is not first giving the itinerary of the churches which they intend to visit. Why should the Vatican require Mr. Roosevelt to ignore the churches of his own religion during his short stay in Rome. The incident will not add to the diplomatic fame of the Pope's address."

Mr. Roosevelt, as the head of the great republic, followed the principle enunciated by Premier Luzzatti, a free church under a free state. The Messagero places the responsibility for what it terms a "blunder" on the Pope's entourage, continuing:

"For it was a blunder to ask a certificate of acceptability from a man illustrious everywhere for his intelligence and the nobleness of his life. The liberty which Mr. Roosevelt is defending for all he could not renounce for himself."

After pointing out that a non-potestanus could have been given without the exchange of notes, the paper declares that the whole incident furnishes new proof of the "imperious intrusiveness of Cardinal Merry del Val, who, when confirmed it produced enormous disaster to the Vatican. **DR. SAM SMALL TALKS**  
**ABOUT PROHIBITION**  
Seventy Per Cent of Geographical Territory of the United States Dry.

The abolition of the liquor traffic is being accomplished rapidly, according to Rev. Sam Small, who was in the city yesterday. Mr. Small has just come from England, where he went to obtain information for a book he is writing on the liquor question among all English-speaking people. He is considered an authority on the question in the United States. Mr. Small spoke disparagingly of the hotel bars which are an institution peculiar to Canada.

"Seventy per cent of the geographical territory of the United States is now dry," he said. "This territory represents a population of 50,000,000 out of 90,000,000. Nine of the states are entirely dry; many others have local option. One half the licensed saloons are in six of the states."

It is foolish to say that prohibition is not successful. It is so much so that states having it stick to it. If it did not answer the purpose, why would liquor interests oppose it so steadfastly?

"The hotel bar system in Canada I consider the most vicious ever devised. It degrades the hotel and does not elevate the saloon. In some of the hotels here I have been treated like a dog because I have not patronized the bar. One half the best hotels in the United States are run without bars. When a hotel man says he cannot run a hotel without a bar, he discounts his own ability. Temperance hotels all over the country are earning from 10 to 40 per cent of the investment. I know this from careful investigation. If it were not for this bar feature there probably would not be such an overcrowding of hotels in Calgary right now. Men are timid about opening temperance resorts because the hotel man with the bar can undercut them."

Rev. Small has had a varied career. When he was a young man he was private secretary to Andrew Johnson, president of the United States, and handled some of his political campaigns for many years, until Jones' death two years ago. Prior to his conversion he says he was a great deal of a sportsman, drinking and betting on the horse races, spending 100,000 in ten years. He is a personal friend of Henry M. Flagler, the Florida hotel magnate, and multi-millionaire, who was the subject of an article in a recent issue of Everybody's magazine.

**ANOTHER DAY OVER**  
**TRANSMISSION BILL**  
The Much Debated Legislation is Again Under Discussion.

Ottawa, April 4.—The house sat from 11 a.m. to 11.30 p.m. and most of the time was taken up with the debate on the St. Lawrence Power and Transmission bill, which has caused so much discussion during the last few weeks.

The discussion took a new turn today, the government accepting the amendment of Mr. Pardon, and the amendment of Mr. Pardon, and the amendment of Mr. Pardon.

"Nothing heretofore contained shall be deemed to constitute an approval by parliament of any future development of water power by erecting a dam in or across the St. Lawrence river under contract of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of the province of Ontario, or otherwise, nor shall the company hereby incorporated be authorized to transmit power generated by and in connection with the works already constructed by the said St. Lawrence Power company."

Mr. H. R. Emmerson who so strongly opposed the bill during the all-night sitting of some weeks ago, declared that in his opinion the sting had been taken out of it, and he would support the bill.

Mr. J. G. Turfitt also explained why he was suspicious of the bill as originally introduced, and he was not sure that there was not a nigger in the fence. The discussion had aroused the people of Canada and he was quite sure that very few members knew what this bill or the other bill of 1910 meant.

Mr. R. L. Borden moved the following amendment: "The government in council shall not give its approval to the construction of any further canals, water courses, race ways, dams, wing dams, siphons, conduits or other works of the river St. Lawrence by the St. Lawrence Power company, limited, under the provision of chapter 111 of the act of 1901, or otherwise, unless and until the plans shall have been first submitted to and approved by parliament."

The amendment was accepted and the bill returned to the committee to stand over until the opposition had a chance to discuss the amendments. It was then that Sir Wilfrid paid his respects to the hydro-electric commission and moved that progress be reported on the bill.

**PARDEE AMENDMENTS**  
**SATISFY OPPONENTS**  
Borden Brings in Another Amendment—The Debate Adjourned.

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**EDMONTON PROTESTS**  
**AGAINST VANCOUVER**  
Edmonton, Alta., April 4.—Edmontonians are protesting against a resolution passed at Vancouver to protest against the request of Vancouver board of trade before the railway commission for cheaper rates on goods brought in from Vancouver over the mountains to the prairie cities. Other western cities may join with Edmonton in the protest as it is charged that these rates their whole sale business would be able to compete with western wholesalers in their own territory.

Edmonton will also protest against what the Daily News declared was the other hand the Daily News declared that the resolution was against what they claim are discriminatory rates on goods coming in from the west.

**KING'S HEALTH NOT**

London, April 4.—London newspapers ordinarily print only brief news items about the condition of the king's health. The king is at Biarritz and has not been well for a fortnight. Newspapers say he is suffering from a bad cold, but the fact is that he has had more than a cold to cause his physicians worry. 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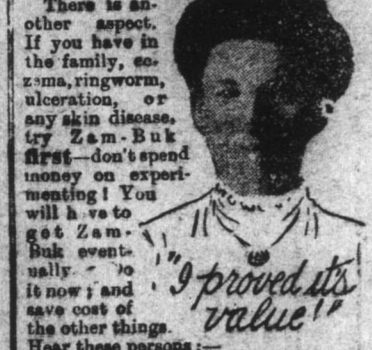

### THE LAST EVIDENCE IN INVESTIGATION

Some Evidence Given by the Officials in the Government Offices.

#### EVIDENCE FROM OFFICIAL IN WATERWAYS OFFICE

Not Very Much Information is Given by the Last Witness.

The Albertan herewith presents the latest instalment of evidence given at the Royal Commission, which adjourned last Wednesday until April 12. J. A. McKinnon, having been duly sworn was examined by Mr. Johnstone and testified as follows:

Q. You are in the employ of the Alberta & Great Waterways railway?

A. Yes.

Q. In what capacity?

A. Right of way agent.

Q. Have you any work to do in the office?

A. Nothing at all.

Q. You are in the office when you are in Edmonton, is that correct?

A. Very little.

Q. Have you custody of any of the files or documents of any kind?

A. Nothing except my own, which refer to right of way matters.

Q. That is, your own personal correspondence on behalf of the company, do you mean?

A. My own papers, referring to the purchase of right of way only.

Q. How long have you been with the company?

A. I think it was about the 1st of November.

Q. Of last year?

A. Last fall.

Q. And have you held the same position that you now hold ever since then?

A. Entirely.

Q. No other?

A. No other.

Q. Have you at any time had any correspondence of the company in your possession other than that which you have just mentioned, referring to the purchase of right of way?

A. No correspondence. The only things I have are requests for the local situation, the political situation.

Q. What do you mean by that?

A. Well, when Mr. Clarke was in the seat.

Mr. Robson: It would save a lot of time if you would make the same arrangement with Mr. Walsh as we have with the rest of the papers.

Mr. Johnstone: If you produce everything that is in your possession that will be satisfactory.

Q. Absolute? None.

Q. And have you any knowledge of any documents that ever were in existence in connection with the Alberta & Great Waterways company that are not now in existence?

A. None whatever.

Q. Then do I understand that you will produce for inspection at the of-

ices of the Great Waterways railway here at any time, upon request of Mr. Walsh or myself, any documents that you may have in your possession?

A. I will be most pleased.

Q. Who is in charge of the office here?

A. I think Mr. Goddard, when Mr. Goddard is here.

Q. And who is in his absence?

A. Mr. Seymour.

Q. Where is he now?

A. In the city.

Q. Can you get him conveniently?

A. Yes. I imagine he will be at the office this afternoon.

Q. Will you ask him by phone whether he will come up here?

A. Immediately?

Q. Yes.

A. Yes. I will do that.

Q. Tell me before you go if you have ever seen any books of the company of any kind, examined them or such any?

A. Never. Never examined a book or paper of any kind except in my own department.

Q. Cross Examination by Mr. Robson.

Q. You said that you were in the employ of the Alberta & Great Waterways railway company?

A. I made a mistake if I did.

Q. Just correct that.

A. I am employed by the Canada West Construction company.

Q. Re-examination by Mr. Robson.

Q. Have you no connection, then, with the Alberta & Great Waterways railway?

A. No connection whatever, no. It is an easy mistake to make.

Mr. Johnstone: Does the suggestion of Mr. Robson apply to the documents in the possession of this witness, referring to the Canada West Construction company?

Mr. Robson: Yes.

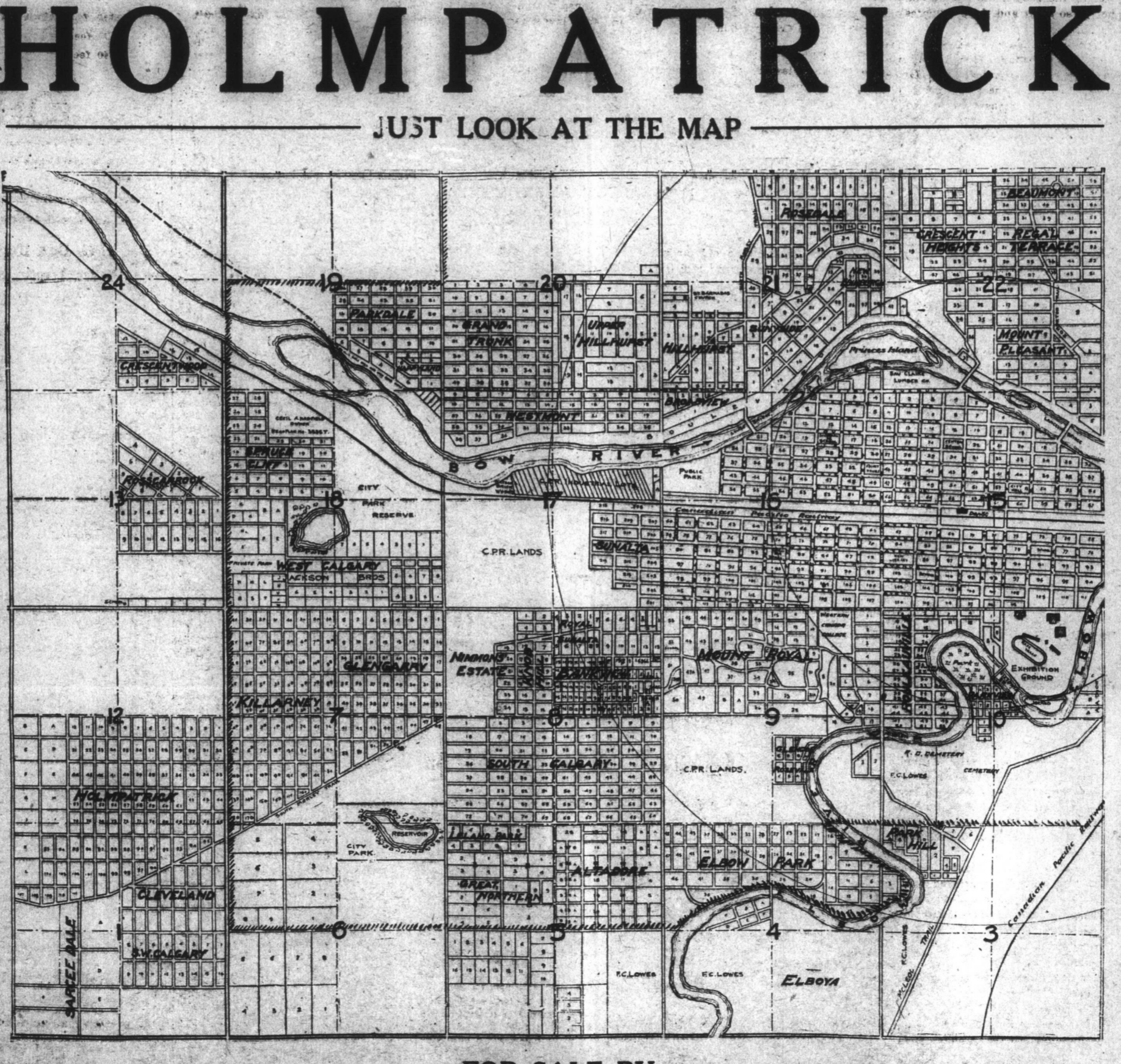

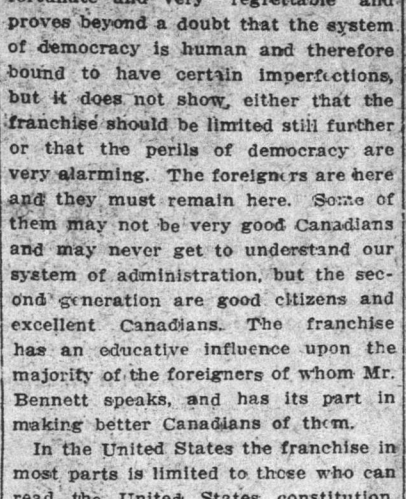



Q. You are in sole charge of that are you?  
A. Practically so.  
Q. Have you any file of documents or any documents whatever or correspondence relating to the Alberta & Great Waterways railway?  
A. Not now.  
Q. Have you ever had?  
A. Yes.  
Q. When did you have it last?  
A. I don't remember the date. They were asked to be brought down to the house and I presume they are here, as far as I know.  
Q. To whom did you give them?  
A. I gave them to Mr. Stocks, likely.  
Q. The deputy minister?  
A. Yes.  
Q. About the time the debate over the Great Waterways railway was going on in the house, is that correct?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Did that file contain all the correspondence that you had knowledge of relating to the railway?  
A. It did.  
Q. Is there any other correspondence or any other documents that you have any knowledge of or ever had any knowledge of relating to the railway company which do not appear on that file?  
A. Not that I am aware of.

A. Well, the only files in connection with railroad matters that I know of are the files that had in my possession, which I presume are all here.  
Q. Well, as far as the departmental files are concerned, with regard to the matters which you were not under your control?  
A. I cannot tell you what other files there might be.  
Q. Did you know until you saw that file that there were any railway files in the department of public works that you were not familiar with?  
A. That might possibly be.  
Q. You did not know it until you saw this file here today?  
A. Would you put that question again?  
Q. Until you came here this afternoon and looked at this file No. 30, you understood that you had charge or under your control all the files of the department with regard to railway matters?  
A. No.  
Q. Now which of them would you not have charge of?  
A. Files dealing with matters of policy, etc. The only railway files I had in connection with matters involving dealings with the railway companies direct, as to railway crossings and such as that.  
Q. I see, and general files with regard to railway policies you had nothing to do with?  
A. No.  
Q. Well now, there were specifications prepared, were there not?  
A. For whom?  
Q. By you or the department in connection with the Alberta & Great Waterways railway?  
A. I prepared specifications, yes.  
Q. Did you find any of those on those files?  
A. I haven't seen them on here, they might be. I haven't got to the end of it yet.  
Q. Just glance through the rest. It is a bulky document, is it not?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Now you are at file 30,999, are you not, with which you are familiar?  
A. No. This is Great Waterways, yes. I don't see any file numbers on many of those documents. That is the end of 50.  
Q. Now glancing through the others, there are no specifications so far?  
A. Not that I have seen.  
Q. When were these prepared?  
A. I don't remember the exact date. It was some time the latter end of October or the fore part of November of last year.  
Q. And do you know what happened to those?  
A. No, not directly. One copy I handed to Mr. Stocks or to Mr. Cushing copy. I am not sure which. The other copy I received instructions to forward to Dr. Waddell.  
Q. And did you ever borrow that copy that you sent to Dr. Waddell subsequently?  
A. I never saw it after it got out of my hands.  
Q. You asked for it?  
A. I asked for it, but was not successful in getting it.  
Q. At the time you asked for it, did you have any information as to what had happened to the office copy, the one you handed to Mr. Cushing or Mr. Stocks?

Q. Well, had you any information as to why it was not in Mr. Cushing's possession?  
A. I had not.  
Q. And did not give any explanation to Mr. Goddard of why it was not in the office?  
A. Mr. Goddard never asked.  
Q. I mean altogether apart from any inquiry. You did not give any away?  
A. No.  
Q. And now you find you prepared some reports in connection with the Alberta & Great Waterways project, did you not?  
A. Well, more in the nature of memoranda.  
Q. Did you find all those on those files?  
A. As far as my recollection goes.  
Q. Do you remember when you prepared the first of those reports or memoranda?  
A. I couldn't give the exact date; the first memorandum I prepared was, I think, about a year ago last September or October.  
Q. Do you find that on these files?  
A. I think it is.  
Q. Just turn it up, will you?  
A. But I am not positive whether it is or not, as far as I recollect, this is the document.  
Q. Is it dated?  
A. No, there is no date on it; it was simply a disconnected memorandum.  
Q. Mr. Justice Harvey, is it numbered?  
A. Yes, C-24 is on here.  
Q. Mr. Justice Beck, is this C the file you have personal charge of?  
A. These numbers have been put on the file since.
