TWAIN AND CABLE.

You are not disappointed in Mark Twain's looks, nor in his style, nor in his voice. But he doesn't know how to wear black pants. Cable knows how to wear them, but he is

disappointing in all the other points. And yet as a sketcher of character Cable is ahead f Twain. His people (in his books) are always real and often amusing; rone of Twain's ways real and often amusing; rose of Twain's ever existed -they are pure burlesques. But Twain can be counted on to make you laugh, and that is what people want- to laugh is part of their digestion. And if you analyze the causes of laughter you will find that a very hearty laugh is often caused by a very very hearty laugh is often caused by a very coarse -a, very common kind of humor; and that humor of a much fine, degree is , ble at its best to produce only an equal amount of risibility. Now Twain's humor judged by the recognised standard is coarse and border-ing on the doubtful; but it never fails to produce side-splitting laughter, and judged by

this measure it fills the bill. Last night Mark Twain told four or five of his stories inimitably. His drawling voice, his naturaners, his twinkling eye, the deal his batura nees, his twinking eye, the death stop in the narrati n up to which point every-one is quiet and then the mere addition of two or three words that set the house roaring, his powers of imitation are all employed to

produce the effect. Mr. Cable's forte 's not the plat'orm-except as a relish or set-off to Twain. He reads extracts from his novels in a serious, earnest kind of way, and that is all. But he is much nore enjoyable in a printed page than he is
