WATER FROM LAKE SIMCOE.

GRAVITATION ENDORSED BY MAJORITY OF BOARD OF WORKS.

Engineer Keating's report on boring and surveys adopted—Executive will be asked for \$20,000—Trolley in Avenue-road—Bicycling at the Island—No Steam Roller.

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Little business was done, though there was much on the agenda.

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Chairman Lamb said a favorite drive through Queen's Park and up Avenue-road, to be considered in a report on the trolley in Avenue-road.

Ald. Hewitt had no patience with such sentimental objections. The Engineer should put the trolley on rich people's streets as well as poor if the public convenience required it.

Ald. Bailey moved that, whilst reports on Avenue-road, the Engineer should report on a belt line from Yonge to Bathurst-street by way of Dupont and Van Morris avenues.

This suggestion was unanimously agreed to.

Will Not Have a Steam Roller. The City Engineer's recommendation for the purchase of a steam roller at a cost of \$3,000 was referred back to the Works Committee at the last meeting of the council.

ADVANCE IN CHICAGO WHEAT. RAILROAD STOCKS OPENED WEAK, BUT CLOSED STRONG.

Local securities quiet and steady. Money market—strongly changed firm—Decrease in Visible supply of Wheat Not Up to Expectations—Provisions Firmer—Cotton Weaker at New York.

MONDAY EVENING, July 9. Notwithstanding the unsettled feeling with regard to the railway situation, Wall-street stocks closed very strong to-day.

Cornals unchanged, closing to-day at 10 1/2-16 for money and at 10 1/2 for account. Canadian Pacific firmer, closing in London to-day at 63 1/2.

The deposits of New York banks are now \$388,595,000, an increase of \$100,000,000 a year. Loans are \$485,650,000, as against \$418,650,000 a year ago.

The total tonnage of east-bound roads from Chicago last week was 111,666 tons, as against 49,288 tons the previous week.

The amount of wheat on passage to Europe is now 34,888,000 bushels, a decrease of about one million bushels. Corn on passage 5,732,000 bushels.

Harvesting of winter wheat has commenced along the Northern Railway, and it is now quite general in Welland and Lincoln, as well as in Brant Counties. A good crop is anticipated.

The returns of the Western Cattle Market for the first half of the year show an increase in the hog and sheep trade, while receipts of cattle have fallen 471,760 cows as follows for the first six months of 1924 and 1923.
