



CHINESE CLASS.



R. D. McLaren, (who has taken a deep interest in the Chinese who live in Toronto, and to whose energy and love for

whose energy and love for Christ is due the efforts to reach these hitherto neglected members of our community,) is leaving the city for several months' absence: but "God hath been mindful of the work," and has sent a labourer into the field to take the place soon to be vacated by Bro. McLaren. Mr. W. M. Morse, who has had experience among Chinese in British Columbia. having consented to take charge of the The teachers have been very faithful in their attendance, and their labours are fully appreciated, as will be seen from the following extract from a letter written by one of Mr. McLaren's former pupils:-

MY DEAR FRIEND

I am very glad to hear from you about the Sunday School, that the scholars is advancing and many teachers. I would like to be there to see them once more. When I was in Toronto you was the only teacher in the school. There is a difference now. We have a school here but I don't like it as well as yours. I am sorry because I depended on the school to learn the English Language. Here they only teach the Catechism and one teacher has 20 or 30 scholars. So I have no chance to read the Bible. I believe Sue Hoey & Sam Kee getting to read better than me. They so clever and take much pains to study.

I must close as it is supper time. I expect to hear from you. I am your friend and always will be.

CHIN PRAN.

We have corrected some parts of the letter in order that it may be clearly understood; but, apart from the misplacing of words, the letter both as to spelling and penmanship would compare favourably with nine out of every ten we receive at our rooms.

The Chinese are a difficult class to reach and hold, and much grace combined with patience is needed to secure their attendance at the class; but when led to Christ they are very zealous in working for others, as will be seen by the facts stated in the following extract from an exchange:—

A Chinese Young Men's Christian Association, organized at Honolulu in 1877, has now a membership of 131. It occupies the premises No. 96 Nunanu Street. The upper front room is a social hall, with pictures, tables, books, etc. The lower room is a crockery store, managed by the Association, and the profits spent in various ways in promoting evangelistic work among the Chinese. The Association has a regular monthly meeting for business, besides maintaining its own devotional meetings, Sunday noon and evening, immediately after the church services. It is to these meetings that they bring their countrymen, and try to lead them to the acceptance of Jesus Christ as the only Divine Redeemer for sinful men. This Association not only helps in the support of Sit Moon, their missionary, but aids and stimulates the feeble bands of Christian Chinese located at different points on the other islands.
