We have of Jate beard much of the progress whioh Catholicism is making in Great Britain, and we believe the statements to which we reer are well within the trath. Without sharing the sanguine expectations which some en chusiastic persons seem to entertain as to the early conversion of the British people, we are convinced that the Church is steadily, if not rapidly, wioniog a hold over the best and mot earaest minds outside her communnon both in England and in Scotland. And this process of piritual re-conquest is not without its concrete munifestations. Bishops once more rule, Mas is once more celebruted, monks once more chant hymas in places which for three bundred years had not known true pastors or the sweet sounds of the ancient liturgy. Nay, in one or two instances the very edifices which at the
time of the so-called Reformation were diverted the uses of the new religion have been length' restored, through one means or another to the purposes for which they were originally intended. But perbaps the most notable fact in this connection is the building of the Benedictine monastery at Fort Augustus.
The name Fort Auguctus brings to the min many bitter recolleclions. Scotland, like Engand, was once Catholic. It could boast of stately hierarchy; of a laity which, at least in the northera portion, may be truly said to hav been devotedly attached to their religion; of a splendid array of sacred edifices which had been reared by the piety of many generaticns. It is needless to say that in the day of persecugrant, IIenry the Eighth, the Church in Sco land did not escape the general destruction things religious. The shepherds were slain or banishad, the fock was dispersed, the tomple of worship and the houses of learoing were razed to the gronnd or desecrated. Where at the timo of the "Reformation" Scotlan possessed two archbishops, eleven bishops, three housand priests, one thousand churches and chapels, and two hnndred abbeys and religiou houses, in 1800 there were only two mission ary bishops, forty priests, thirty thousand lay Catholics, twelve chapels, and tro small semin aries in the whole land. But it was in the Highlands that the gloomy and bloodthirsty anaticism which directed the persecution pe formed its most hideous orgies. After th battle of Culloden it raged with the fury of hell itself in that romantic but unfortunate region. A brutal soldiery set itself deliber ately to burn churches and chapels, to plunde the casties of the lairds and the houses of their retainers, to slay the priests and the peopl wholesale; and thus whole districts were at once depopulated and denuded of almost ever work there fitly presided the butcher Dute of Cumberland, and his headquarters were in Fort Augustus. Surely the genius loci would be likely to preserve such a spot for ever as the shrine of religions intolerance ! Surely
the last thing to expect would be the conversion of the place into a stronghold of the banned reed! The unezpected; however, has come to pass.
