FRENCH. AND B RITISH TROOPS FIGHTING WITH ITALIANS.

Rame. Nov. 10th. Franco-British Troops have arrived at the Italian front. This release information was revealed today in the announcement that Premier Lloyd George and other British Officials are at the front inspecting the Allied re-inforcements.

It is now believed that the crucial battle will be fought along the Piave River.

ANOTHER R MOVE TO BLVL RUSSIA FOR ALTIES.

London. Nov. 10 - Russia may yet be saved. Hope that the new Republic will be a factor in the war on the side of the Allies was held out here today when Kerensky had made his escape from Petrograd. Kerensky is believed to be on his way to the front. The best tighters of the Russian Army are almost certain to run up with the Premier, if he will pledge that no attempts will be made to conciliate the Extremists, but that they will be dealt with in a vigorous manner

NO MORE MONEY FOR RUSSIA FROM UNCLE SAM.

WASHington D.C. While the present turmoil continues, it is unlikely that the United States ill advance any gore money to Russia. There is no disposition on the part of the U.S. to furnish any funds that might eventually find their way into Germany.

Washington D.C.No.10 - Official dispatches to the Italian Embassy show that the Italian retreat has been checked and that counter-attacks are already being launched against the Austro-Germans.

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
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NOVEMBER 13th 1917 THE SECOND DAY'S SPORTS

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
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BRITISH LOSSES THROUGH U. BOATS SMALLEST ON RECORD.
Londyn. Nov 16 - British losses through submarines last week. was the lowest of any week since opening of the U-Boat campaign, only one. largo ship being sunk.

HUNG MAKE TERRIFICE DUT VAIN ATTACK ON PASSCHEADARTE London, Nov 16 - The German's have followed a concentrated bombardment of great violence with a fierce attack on the positions recently captured by the Pritish Troops at Passchendaele.

The shalling continued for five days, but the hostile attacks that followed were completely broken down by the British artillery's intense fire and the British line remains intact.

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HEAVY FIGHTING IN PALESTINE - BRITISH LOSE DESTROYER London, Nov 11 - The Admiralty reports a British destroyer and a small monitor porcedoed while co-operating in the Palestine operations.

There has been particularly heavy fighting in this theatre and the Turkish losses have been excessive. Four hundred Turks were buried at Katrah alone following Tuesday's fighting with the British captures that day, exceed 1,500 prisoners, 20 machine guns, and 4 large guns. This brings the total number of prisoners captured by the British xix since October 30th up to over 7,400.

Rome, Nov 10 - The Austro-German Latest attempts to cross the Piave river have been frustrated, while units which previously crossed the river are held in the marchy section between Piave and Focchin, where they have been counterattacked and heavily shelled.

GERMAN AIRMEN KILL MOPE CIVILIANS AT CALAIS Paris, Nov 16 - Garman seroptanes raided the Calais region on Tuesday night, killing a number of the civilian population.

French Alexandra acreplanes hav bombed enemy depots and centonments

in the Muldouse region.

The French commiunique records successful French raids, notably in the Moronvillers sector, where enemy dugouts were destroyed and materials captured.

Belgian troops entered the German lines north of Dixmude on Tuesday night and destroyed a number of the enemy's concrete shelters.

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
