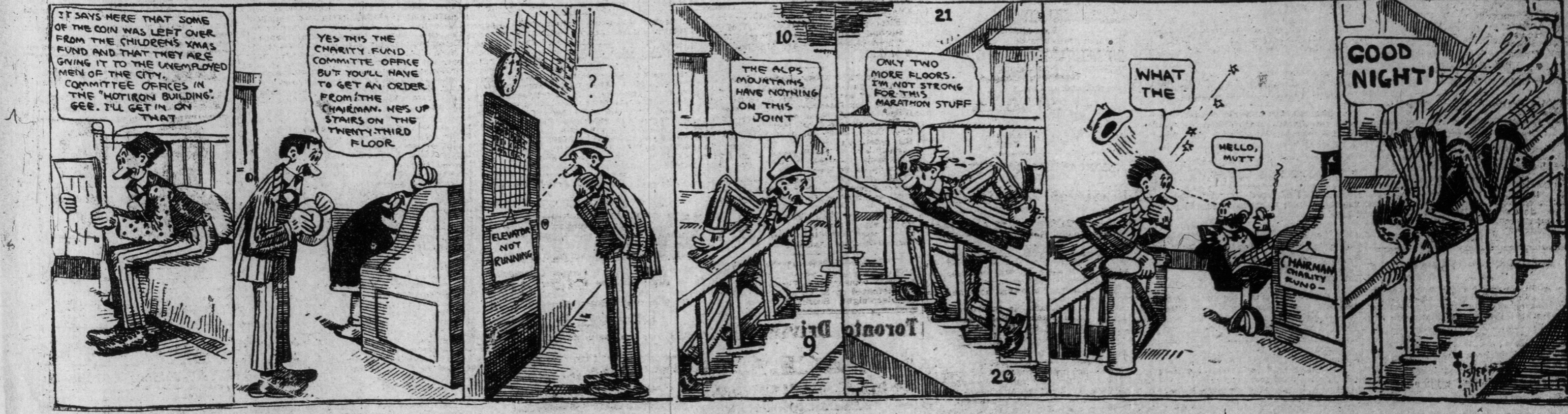

TAUGHT RELIGION IN PUBLIC SCHOOL

Trouble in School in Peterboro County Over Sectarian Instruction.

PETERBORO, Jan. 1.—Peterboro County also has its trouble over sectarian religious worship in a public school. It is alleged that in school section No. 8 of Otonabee, the teacher, a Miss Ward, Roman Catholic, has for some time been giving Roman Catholic instruction during school hours, and the Roman Catholic children have been detained for such instruction after school hours. The trustees, two of whom are Protestants, protested to the teacher against the practice, individually, and not as a board.

At the recent trustee elections, which hinged on an attempt to maintain Protestant ascendancy on the board, J. Connor, Roman Catholic, was declared elected by the chairman.

The election was protested on the grounds that Connor did not receive a majority of the votes.

Richard Lees, inspector, has received no formal complaint as to religious teaching, but it is said that the matter has been reported to Sir James Whitney.

ESTRADA, QW-PRESIDENT

Was Head of Revolutionary Movement Which Chased Out Zelaya.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 1.—Gen. Juan J. Estrada, by the unanimous vote of congress, yesterday became the constitutional president of Nicaragua for a period of two years. Adolfo Diaz, former minister of the interior, was elected vice-president for the same term.

The inauguration ceremonies took place this afternoon in the hall of congress. Estrada was the head of the revolutionary movement which caused the flight from the country of Jose Santos Zelaya, who was president of Nicaragua in 1909.

INCREASED CUSTOMS RECEIPTS.

OTTAWA, Jan. 1.—The Dominion customs receipts for December totaled \$5,727,576, an increase of \$470,982 over December, 1909. For the nine months of the fiscal year the total was \$53,124,433, as against \$44,367,181, an increase of \$8,757,252.

At Port of Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Jan. 1.—A net gain of 45 per cent is shown in the customs collections for the port of Ottawa during the 12 months of 1910 over 1909. The total revenue for 1910 was \$1,258,788.03, compared with \$1,067,355.84 in 1909. The increase is \$191,432.19. The December collections were \$92,196.08.

At Port of Montreal.

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—The customs receipts for the port of Montreal for the calendar year ended Saturday last were \$17,700,000, compared with \$17,600,000 for 1909, an increase of \$100,000. This created a new record for the port.

The receipts for December were \$1,408,000, a falling off of \$20,000 compared with the previous corresponding month.

USED CANCELED STAMPS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—The attorney-general's office announced yesterday that it has brought suit for \$139,000 against Raymond Pyn-bon & Co., brokers, of this city, for the alleged use of canceled stock transfer stamps. Deputy Attorney-general Turner has 36 stamps which he says were used a second time by someone in the firm's offices after they had once been canceled.

BURNED THE POOR HOUSE.

MONTCLAIR, N. J., Jan. 1.—This town celebrated the advent of the new year last night by burning the poor house and the best house in two great municipal bonfires. Both buildings were saturated with oil, touched off, and then carefully watched by firemen while a detail of police kept the crowd at a safe distance.

WILL BE WARM FIGHT UP IN NORTH TORONTO

Vote Polled Will Be Heaviest Ever -Annexation Likely to Carry -Suburban Doings.

NORTH TORONTO, Jan. 1.—(Special)—At the last moment and too late to counteract, even if considered worthy in the ordinary way, Mr. Murphy, one of the candidates for the mayoralty office, has issued a circular reflecting generally on the course adopted by the mayor, and dealing vaguely with charges of collusion on the part of the chief magistrate.

On Friday Mr. Murphy was the author of a circular appealing for support, and stating among other things that the relations existing between himself and the mayor were friendly. His latest production launched on Saturday night, and which is nothing more or less than the common, ordinary roorbach, charges his worthy opponent with collusion in the drawing of a company, and with, in short, being recreant to every promise and trust reposed in him. The mayor is especially scored for his attitude on the annexation question, and generally with setting himself with the large property owners of the town as against the small.

Charges Unfair.

The charges leveled against Mayor Brown by Mr. Murphy are so void of reason as really not to merit any consideration. No man who ever occupied the mayoralty chair in the Town of North Toronto has kept himself more scrupulously aloof from all alliances than A. J. Brown. He has been approached with a view to this end, but has steadily refused, and stands to-day absolutely untrammelled. One thing he has never done is to deliberately in the face of public opinion, and the openly expressed wish of the ratepayers, throw down a by-law when once endorsed by the electors.

The action of Mr. Murphy introduces a new phase of municipal code of honor in North Toronto, and one to which the right thinking men of the town will never subscribe. Statements and innuendoes handed out at the last moment, and these absolutely false and misleading, will not adversely affect A. J. Brown's candidature. The World from time to time criticized some of the mayor's actions on some points. This eleven-hour underhand attack is not such an honorable rival would inaugurate. Mayor Brown need have no fear of it.

Good Men All.

Of the council, the ratepayers have seldom, if ever, been more highly in accord with the character and stamp of men offering for municipal honors and responsibilities.

In Walter Muston the electors have a man of probity, of good business ability, and an indefatigable worker in committee and council alike. He is a sound adviser, and his judgment has never been called in question. His return is practically assured.

Fred Howe has from time to time aroused some opposition in council, but in an active and aggressive man, this is inevitable. He is a hard worker, all hard blows given and received. In the ways on the job, and in spite of the hard blows given and received, is one of the best-liked men in town. His presence on the council board is indispensable, and in dealing with the Metropolitan Railway question alone, Frank Howe has abundantly vindicated his strength. North Toronto needs and especially during the incoming year, aggressive men.

Some New Men.

John P. Patterson is a new aspirant for municipal honors, but it is safe to say that few men have ever come more rapidly to the front. His clear-cut statement of Saturday with respect to his business relations has immensely strengthened his position, and it seems to be morally certain that he will win a seat at the next council board.

R. B. McQueen is a man who ought to receive the hearty endorsement of the ratepayers of the town. Mr. McQueen has acquitted himself well in any position of trust he has ever occupied, and that he will, if elected, make a first-class councillor is generally conceded. Give Mr. McQueen a friendly boost.

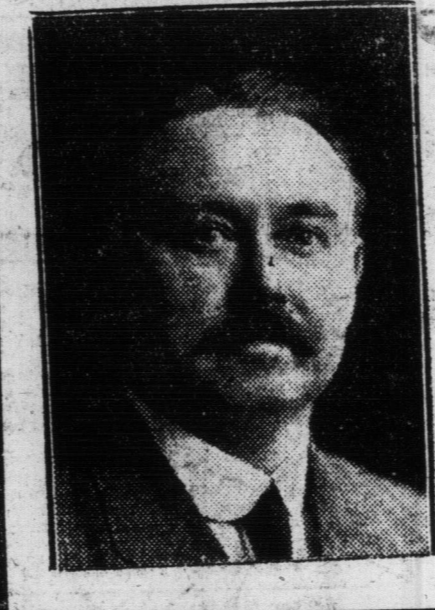

A BIG UNDERTAKING.

CHICAGO, Jan. 1.—The Chicago Subway, Arcade and Traction Co. it is said, will ask the council committee on local transportation at its next meeting for the most extensive ordinance ever granted by any city. The company, according to the board of education, stands prepared to resign its New York financial backers to the council and take on a franchise to construct a complete system of passenger and freight subways, a complete outer harbor, or waterfront system of docks and warehouses, and to carry out immediately the Chicago plan scheme.

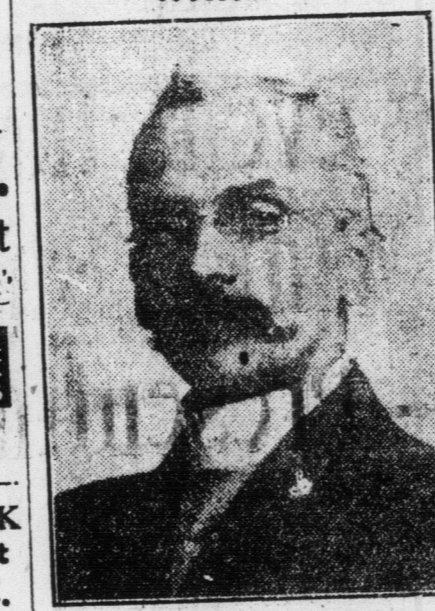
EXPLOSION IN A TUNNEL.

CLERICS IN POLITICS

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Bourassa Urge Rival Views at Rome.

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—(Special)—The presence in Rome of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux has caused no end of comment here in religious and political circles. While Mr. Bourassa will try to ascertain if the decline of French-Canadian influence at the Vatican has been caused by the fact that the Pope's advisors have been erroneously instructed regarding Canadian affairs, Mr. Lemieux will speak in the name of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and it remains to be seen if the Liberal claims of undue interference in politics on the part of the clergy will hold water.

Report has it that the Vatican authorities decided to keep Mgr. Stagni, the new delegate to Canada, close at hand till the Canadian minister arrived, and now that Mr. Lemieux has seen the Pope and his secretary of state, it is expected to be seen whether or no Archbishop Stagni will sail for Canada at all. It is quite sure that had the bishop's way, Mgr. Stagni or no other Roman prelate would ever take up residence at Ottawa.

Service in Theatre.

Sure evidence of the many friends whom the Rev. J. D. Morrow has in Toronto was the crowded parquette and gallery of the Royal Alexandra Theatre last night, where he held his usual Sunday service, instead of at St. Andrew's Hall, from where he was crowded by the pulpit show. On the stage with him were the Alexander Choir, under the direction of Mr. Palmer, and a quartet of male singers, whose singing added much to the force of the "Father's" preacher's words. Mr. Morrow, always a strong speaker, was especially convincing in his appeal, in which he bitterly condemned hypocritical tendencies of many church people of to-day.
