Liante Reading Room Reciprocity Means a Dulia: on Every Sheep Raised in Ontario

Some Other Things.

On Thursday The World reported that on the day previous 289 sheep from the United States had been sold at a profit on the Toronto live stock market, notwithstanding that they had paid a duty of 88 cents each. We told the Ontario farmer that reciprocity would take off this duty (25 per cent.); that in consequence the Canadian live stock markets would be flooded with American sheep; and that as a further consequence American prices would rule the Canadian market; that reciprocity meant a dollar less on every sheep Mr. Canadian Farmer had to sell. [We reprint The World's item of Thursday in the adjoining column.]

To this, two answers have been made: The Toronto Star admits the thing is true, but says these sheep were of a special kind, small ones for the summer market, when consumers want little legs, and that conditions over in the United States just now are abnormal! [See Star's article in adjoining column.]

Now, neither of these statements is true. The cold fact is that it paid the Canadian butcher to bring them in, and he is, bringing a lot in these days—and he'll bring all he needs if reciprocity obtains, unless the Canadian farmer comes down to the American price. The average American price per sheep is a dollar lower than the Canadian price!

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The Globe's answer, stripped of all its twisting [and we reprint its article] is that the Canadian consumer will get cheaper mutton; and then asks The World which horn will it choose—cheap mutton for the consumer, or high prices to the farmer!

We are not called on to answer the question. What Sir Wilfrid Laurier and The Globe have been pumping into the farmer was that reciprocity would give him the American market, and that the wider market was a better one than the home one-that the Canadian farmer would get a better price for his products! The World joined issue, and was able to show from the facts that inasfar as sheep are concerned The Globe was guilty of misleading the farmer.

We still assert that reciprocity means a loss of at least a dollar average on every sheep he has to sell-that the wider market (United States) is a dollar lower than the Canadian! The Globe admits this, but says the consumer will get the benefit. Will he?

We have, therefore, proved our case by the admission of The

But let us give you, Mr. Farmer, some further information on this important point:

The Star pretends that the sheep brought in and referred to by The World were of an unusual kind, and just a few, anyway, for a special purpose, and that abnormal conditions prevailed in

From enquiries made by The World of the commission men on the Toronto stock market, it was learned that in the past three months over 18,000 sheep were brought into Toronto from the Buffalo market, where the price averages \$1.00 per head less than on the Toronto market!

Among those who brought in sheep was one leading firm doing business both in Buffalo and Toronto, and whose imports alone were over 8000 since the 1st of March! Dunn & Levack brought in over 3000; the Harris Abattoir Company brought in 3200 McDonald & Halligan 3000. And all these did this business because the sheep were cheaper in the United States, and they could pay the duty, which would average over one dollar apiece, and still undersell the Canadian farmer! Not only has this taken place, but they are doing it every day. One firm has a shipment of 570 on the way which will be offered on the Toronto market this coming week!

Now, these men are not living on theory. They are doing business and if you ask any one of them they will tell you, that the reason they are doing it is because the American price is. one dollar less than the Canadian price, and this means-and The World asserts it again-that, when reciprocity passes, the price for sheep in Toronto will be the same as the American price, the same as the wider market; and, therefore, reciprocity means a big injury to the Canadian farmer who has sheep to sell. The Globe has deceived them as to higher prices for sheep in the States. Reciprocity means that the American farmer can run the Canadian farmer out of the Canadian market!

And to go a step further, let us publish the following, which The World's live stock reporter presents to you, Mr. Farmer.

Mr. E. Maybee of the commission firm of Maybee & Wilson stated that should reciprocity come into effect. Buffalo prices would prevail on the Toronto market for sheep and lambs. And this means that the farmers of Ontario would be getting less by

That's what Brother Maybee has to say to you, Mr. Farmer. Mr. David McDonald of the firm of McDonald & Halligan stated that his firm had brought into Canada about 3000 American lambs and sheep during the past three months, and that if reciprocity came it would mean a difference of easily one dollar

per head from present prices to the Ontario farmer. McDonald is a pretty good witness, Mr. Farmer. He's in business; not in politics.

Yesterday 289 sheep from the States were sold on the Toronto market at 5 1-2 cents a pound. They weighed 64 hs and brought \$3.52 each. The duty was 88 cents. Canadian sheep brought 16 cents less, as the American sheep of better quality can be brought into Toronto, pay freight, 25 per cent, duty, and compete with the home animals. Sheep on the Buffalo market sell for from two to four and a half cents.

With the duty off, and reci With the duty off, and reciprocity will take the duty off, the Toronto Live Stock Market would be flooded with American sheep, and prices would drop about a dollar a head! What is true of sheep is true of hogs and cattle. It is up to the Ontario farmer to bear this in mind. With, say. ?? sheep and 40 hogs a year this means a straight loss of 360 a year, a sum sufficient to pay his annual taxes. What is all the talk for reciprocity compared with these facts against it? Ponder it over, Mr. Farmer.

THE INVASION OF U. S. SHEEP WAS DUE TO UNUSUAL CAUSE

Not an Ordinary Condition of the Market and Will Not Harm Farmers Here—A Weight of Lamb the Ontario Farmer Doesn't Supply Here.

From The Toronto Star July 27. Toronto has been invaded for many years by American tourists and American delegates to international conventions here, and has fived thru it without loss of either honor or sleep. But a new invasion has come, and there are those who are terribly alaumed and can hardly sleep o' nights. These new invaders also come from the United States, but international courtesy forbids any comparison between them and said tourists and delegates, for the latest peril takes the gates, for the latest peril takes the form of sheep. Their bleatings are sending cold shivers down people's backs and arousing them to shout

backs and arousing them to shout against reciprocity.

These invaders marched right across the border into the western cattle market and brought a higher price than Ontario sheep.

"Now, Mr. Farmer" says the opponent of reciprocity, "if American sheep can do that when they have to pay duty to get in here you can see what you will be up against if reciprocity goes into force."

The fact is that the American sheep did bring slightly higher prices yes-terday than the Ontario sheep, but for that there is a reason which, tariff or no tariff, will affect. The house-holder when he goes out to buy his leg of lamb in the summer time insists on a small one. The family is emailer, perhaps, than in the winter and anyway they cat less meat. Butchers therefore find it easier to handle smeller sheep, and are therefore willing to pay a little more for it. United States farmers raise smaller sheep than do their competitors in Ontario. and therefore their sheep have an advantage even on the Toronto market, especially at this time of the year. The prices they bring do not, so authorities on the live stock market say. represent the ordinary run of the

"As far as live stock prices in the United States and Canada go," said one prominent dealer. "It is only in sheep where the average price would be lower in the United States than in Canada. That is due to abnormal





Novel Collection for Dale.

FindsThat the Article Must Be Consumed on Premises When Purchased Sunday.

According to a decision handed down by Judge Morson yesterday, ice cream purchased on Sunday must be con-sumed on the premises. The case in point was that of R. H. Webb of West point was that of R. H. Webb of West Queen-street, who was recently convicted and fined \$5 and costs by Magistrate Kingsford for selling on the Lord's Day a brick of ice-cream for consumption off his premises.

The judge thus agrees with the judgment rendered by Justice Middleton, that it is illegal to sell and allow ice-cream to be taken away and consumed at some other place.

In his decision Judge Morson says:

In his decision Judge Morson says:
"The material facts are not in dispute, the only point for my decision being whether or not I am bound by the judgment of Mr. Justice Middleton in Rex v: Wells, 37 Weekly Ontario Reporter, volume 2, page 1232, who held that anything sold by a restaurant-keeper, as part of his business as such, must be consumed upon the premises; if I am bound the appeal must fail, but if not, it must succeed, because while agreeing with the judgment in every other respect, I differ from him as to the necessity of the consumption upon the premises.

"It seems to me, after a good deal of consideration, that the provision as to a stated case is where nice and difficult points of law arise before the magistrate and it becomes necessary to obtain the opinion of the high court in order to settle the law. While the statute does not expressly say this opinion is binding the devision court as an appellate court, it must have

in order to settle the law. While the statute does not expressly say this opinion is binding the devision court as an appellate court, it must have been so intended, and if so intended it is the court's duty as far as possible always to give effect to the intention.

"Apart from this, however, while it may or may not be true that both appellate courts are courts of equal jurisdiction. I think a high court judge, is higher in rank than the county court judge when he sits as an appellate court, that is a court of higher rank, and its opinion entitled to more weight.

Two Ontario medical council exam inations were cut out by the council at yesterday afternoon's session. They are the primary and the intermediate are the primary and the intermediate medical council examinations. The percentage to the secured at the final examination before the student is allowed to practice was raised from 50 to 60 per cent. The question of lowering the fees to be paid by the students to the council was discussed but, the the two examinations were eliminated, the fee still remains \$100-\$25 registration fee as a matriculant and \$76 for the final examination and registration as a practitioner. In the future the council will depend on the universities for the primary and intermediate examinations.





ALTERNATIVE ROUTE UNDER INVESTIGATION

Civic Engineers Find Few Difficulties in Way of Construction of Tubes Up Teraulay-St.

Yesterday afternoon the special civic committee who are investigating the subway railway situation went over the proposed alternative route up Teraulay-street. With the party went George Powell, assistant city engineer and E. L. Cousins, bridge and rail-

and E. L. Cousins, bridge and railway engineer.

The route presented very little in the
way of difficulties or obstructions as
far north as College-street. In fact
it presents a great many advantages,
not the least of which is the absence
of paving which favors the quicker
and cheaper "open" method of construction on the subway. The city engineering staff state that property
damages in this section will be comparatively light and that the amount
of expensive disturbances of various
interests, such as would arise were
Yonge-street chosen as the route, 15
practically a negligible factor. practically a negligible factor.
Some Difficulties.

At College-street some more serious difficulties are met with. Proceeding dus north from the north end of Teraulay-street, dwelling houses numbered 54 and 56 are in the way and would have to be removed. Continuing towards Grenville-street two more houses would have to be taken and then the tube would take a curve eastward to St. Vincent and Grenville-

streets.

For some considerable distance the route is fairly unobstructed, but the Presbyterian church, standing at the corner of Grosvenor and St Vinces streets is in the way and would proably have to be removed. North of the residence of J. K. Osborne on the west side of Chapel-lane, and the St.

west side of Chapel-lane, and the St. Michael's College property, coming out at the south end of North-street. North-street presents few difficulties. It is 62 feet wide and the only important buildings on it are the Baptist Church and the School of Expression, at the Bloor-street end.

Passing under Bloor-street at the houses numbered 62 and 64, the tube would proceed by 65 and 67 Cumberland-streets, then up to 56, 58, 55 and land-streets, then up to 56, 58, 55 and 53 Yorkville-avenue. At Scollard-street it would pass under 57 and 59. The house on the other side standing on the west of the street leading to Ketchum Park would likely have to be removed. Here the subway would curve under the park, passing to Davenport road between the Aged Women's Home and the Industrial Refuge, thence straight north to McAlpine and Hillsboro-avenue, overlooking Ramsden Park.


