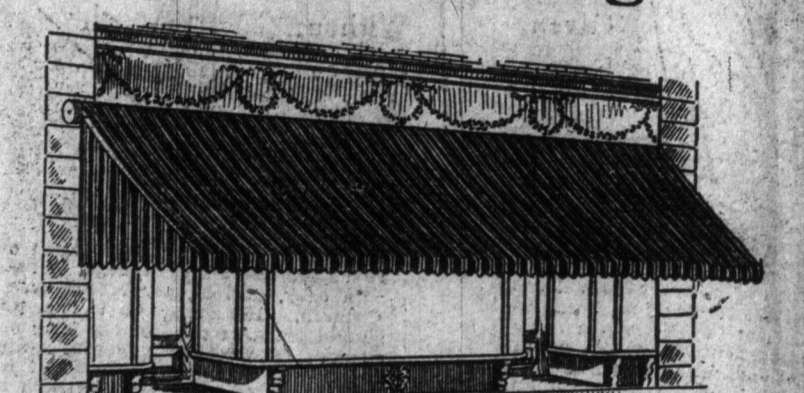

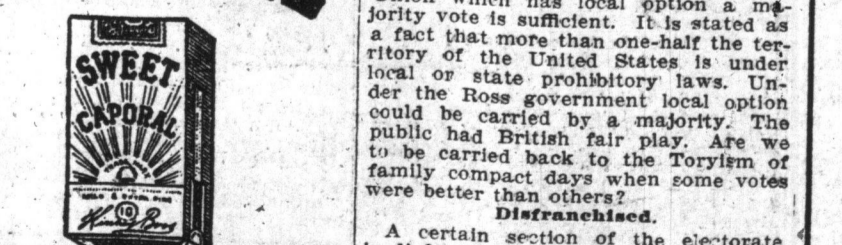

COLONIAL AID TWICE WELCOME

To Funds of the United Irish League Writes General Treasurer.

"No doubt you are already aware that we have forwarded three instalments of \$10,000 each to the trustees on the other side, and your generous cheque will very materially aid us towards an early remittance of the fourth instalment."

DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.

Workmen Thawing Out Explosive Cause Great Damage.

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—While city workmen were thawing out some dynamite in Norman-street to-day a terrific explosion occurred. The men were working on a drain and stored the dynamite in a shed, where the stove was. Luckily they saw the danger and took away a quantity of the explosive and warned the neighborhood before the crash came.

One of the workmen was hurt and a little child rather badly, while a woman also received injuries. The damage will cost the heavily insured property around it badly damaged and the frame houses much battered.

REVIVE TEMPERANCE SOCIETY

Movement is Under Way in the Anglican Church.

The quarterly meeting of the Temperance Reform committee of the Toronto Diocesan Synod was held in the synod office yesterday. There was an unusually large attendance. Reference was made to the fact that to-morrow, being the first Sunday in Lent, is Temperance Sunday in the Diocese of Toronto. With a view to more aggressive action in the temperance cause, it was decided to urge, where practicable, the revival in the different parishes and missions of branches of the Church of England Temperance Society, and a circular on the subject has been prepared. Where it is not desirable to form branches of the society, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the branches of the Anglican Young People's Association will be asked to undertake the work as a part of theirs.

The committee placed themselves on record as strongly in favor of a shortening of the hours for the sale of liquor, and by a narrow majority affirmed the principle of the temperance vote being essential for the adoption of local option.

A committee, consisting of Rev. Canon Inglis, Rev. Canon Dixon, Rev. R. A. Sims, Dr. N. W. Hoyle, K.C., E. Macrae and G. F. Herman, was appointed to represent the committee at the convention of the Ontario-Dominion Alliance next week.

Theford Mines, Que., Feb. 15.—Geo. Lessard, 22 years of age, unmarried, was killed and his body horribly mangled by the C.N.R. train from Quebec about 7 o'clock last night. Lessard got on the steps of a second-class car, in company with a friend, who were going to the next station, and after riding a short distance jumped off into the snow and rolled under the cars. The body was found nearly a mile from where he had jumped.

First Mail Since War.

Berlin, Feb. 15.—The first overland mail from here to the far east since the outbreak of the war between Japan and Russia left Berlin to-day for Vladivostok, which city is to be reached in 17 days. Thence the mail will be shipped to Nagasaki, Japan, arriving there two days later and reaching Shanghai, China, 48 hours afterwards, making 21 days' transit from Berlin to Shanghai.

Wolf Hunt a Failure.

Montreal, Feb. 15.—The wolf hunt in Northern Ontario appears to have been a severe frost, judging from the story told by the advance guard of the returning party. Those who have returned spent a week in the woods looking for wolves, and all the satisfaction they got for their trouble was the sight of some wolf tracks.

Estate Goes to Crown.

The estate of the late James Confor Cousins, for many years news vendor, corner Spadina and Queen, has found no representatives of next of kin to claim the value, amounting to \$274.61. The National Trust Co. are applying to administer the property under the law of intestate estates. The estate will go to the crown.

Mouldy Butter to Japan.

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—Alexander MacLean, Canadian commercial agent in Japan, reports that Canadian butter has reached that market in a mouldy condition, which is calculated to seriously injure the reputation of its commodity in the Japanese market.

Rev. Father Roach, president of St. Michael's College, will preach a charity sermon in St. Joseph's Church, Leslie street, to-morrow evening, in aid of the local conference of St. Vincent de Paul.

GIGANTIC FRAUD UNEARTHED

System of Underground Pipes to Convey Whiskey to Warehouse.

London, Feb. 15.—A gigantic scheme on the part of a firm of whiskey distillers to defraud the revenue is reported to have been unearthed by inland revenue officers. The latter, it is asserted, discovered a system of underground pipes through which whiskey was conveyed from the distillery to the duty paid warehouses, whence it was distributed to the trade, thus escaping the tax of \$2.75 per gallon. The revenue authorities are said to have demanded the payment of a fine of \$300,000 on the smuggled liquor. The matter probably will be brought up in parliament.

ELOPES WITH LITTLE GIRL.

Her Parents in Oven Sound Get Toronto Police to Interfere.

Sarcasa Zafino and Josephine Pashan, Syrians, eloped from Owen Sound for the purpose of making Toronto a Green. Akko the marriage license had been procured, the ceremony did not take place. They were "dagged" by the police, at the request of the mother of the waif-to-be. For some reason Zafino would not make an ideal son-in-law, the girl's parents think, and they insisted that there be no wedding bells for her—at least not at present. They claim their daughter is only 13 years of age. She was sent to the Salvation Army shelter pending further developments.

THIEF GOES TO "PEN."

John Dorsey Will Serve Three Years in Kingston.

John Dorsey and Bill Windsor, thieves, who for the sake of making a few dollars, destroyed several hundred dollars' worth of property, were put away yesterday by Magistrate Denison. Dorsey went to the "pen" for three years, and Windsor to the Central for 18 months. Those men broke into factories and stripped machinery of valuable brass fittings, valves, etc., which find ready sale with the "junk" dealers. As yet no charge has been laid against the man who bought the stuff. John J. Wardrobe and Wm. Marshall, thieves of the same nature, only of a cheaper grade, were also sentenced. Wardrobe got 14 months in jail.

BOY SHOT BY PLAINMATE.

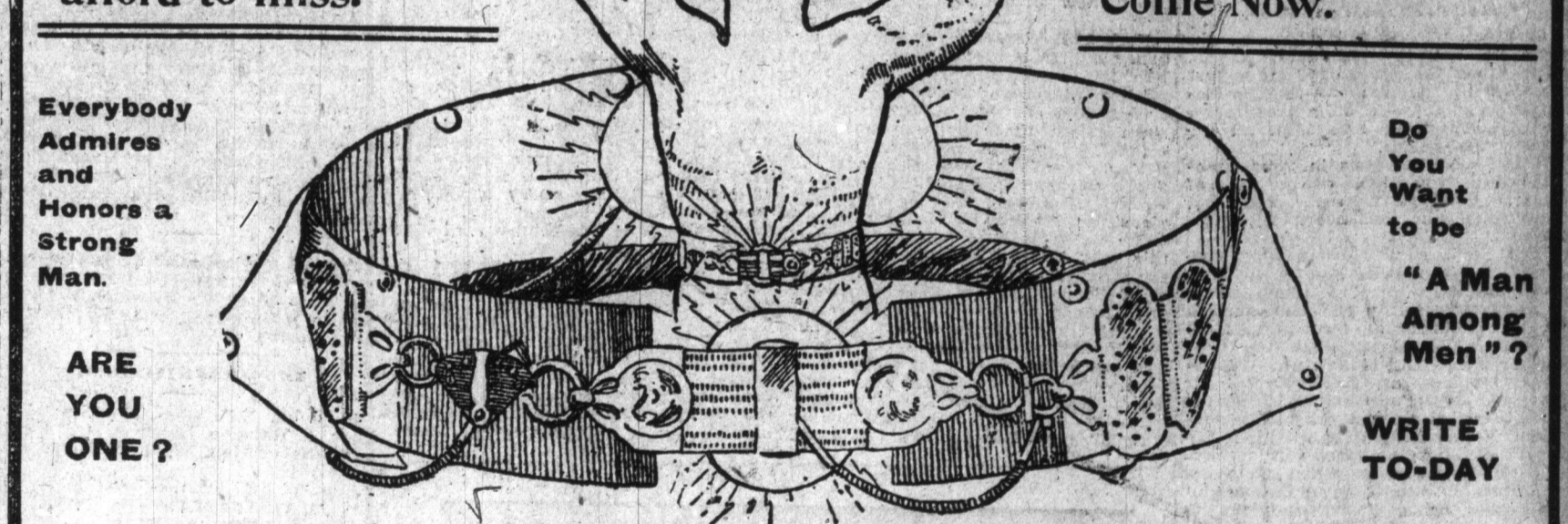
Oil Springs, Feb. 15.—A boy named Crobbie accidentally shot and killed another boy named Dean.

**SIR F. BORDEN NAMED.**  
 Will Go to London as High Commissioner, Says Journal.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Feb. 15.—A correspondent of The Yorkshire Post says: "At last there is definite news from Canada that Sir Frederick Borden is to succeed Lord Strathcona. He will bring to London a great reputation as an administrator."

A London correspondent of The Birmingham Post says information has reached London from Canada confirming the report of the approaching retirement of Lord Strathcona. A correspondent states Borden will succeed Strathcona.

The Canadian Associated Press understands arrangements are being made for enabling delegates to the colonial conference to visit provincial industrial centres. In some centres a conference will be held with local commercial bodies.

In the house of commons, Sir F. Channing, speaking in regard to encouragement of scientific agricultural research, gave an account of scientific research carried on in Canada. He thought this country has a good deal to learn from Canada. Science applied to the production of wheat had given Canada command of the market.

**WOODSTOCK'S REGIMENT.**  
 List of Officers is Published—John White in Command.

Woodstock, Feb. 15.—(Special.)—The list of officers for the new regiment was published to-night with the exception of the lieutenant of whom Col. White has made application for two additional ones. The provisional school of instruction will commence on March 1, and one of the best instructors in the service has been procured. The opening of the new armory will take place shortly.

The officers are: Lieutenant-colonel, John White; major, W. T. McMullen; captain, Fred Burgess. Lieutenants: A. Reg. Stone, G. S. Pepper, W. L. Kerr, C. R. Shedden, R. Parkinson, W. C. Elmelle, J. G. Dunlop. Quarter-master, paymaster, Malcolm Douglas; quartermaster, Fielden Crossley; chaplain, Rev. R. B. Cochrane; adjutant, Capt. J. M. Ross.

**CANNOT STOP PROGRESS.**  
 Leader of Peasant Party in Douma Predicts Great Upheaval Soon.

New York, Feb. 15.—Alexis Aladyin, leader of the peasant party in the Russian douma, arrived here today by the steamer Majestic. Mr. Aladyin proposes to make a tour of the country delivering lectures in the cause of freedom in his native land.

Mr. Aladyin said that he would not be astonished if the new douma is never organized.

"It is now too late to stop the progress of liberty in Russia," said he. "The liberal sentiment is so broadcast and general throughout Russia that it will come to the front in spite of all government opposition. Its progress is assured."

Mr. Aladyin said that the condition of the poorer classes in Russia is desperate. He believes, he said, that more than a million persons will die in that country during the next three months from starvation.

Mr. Aladyin said that unless the constitutional rights demanded by the Russian people are immediately granted there will be one of the greatest strikes the world has ever seen.

The Russian navy will join in the revolt from the first, he declares, and they will be quickly followed by the army.

**DISAGREE ON ASSESSMENT.**  
 G.T.R. Won't Accept Terms Offered by Ottawa on Hotel and Depot.

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—(Special.)—The question of the new G. T. R. station and hotel for Ottawa is at a standstill. C. M. Hays refuses to accept the city's terms. Mayor Scott met him this afternoon and laid the city's proposition before him. It was fixed assessment of \$50,000 for ten years for the hotel and complete exemption for the station for 20 years, provided that \$1,000,000 was spent on the hotel and \$250,000 on the depot. The proposition of the G. T. R. is a fixed assessment of \$150,000 on the station for 20 years, and \$300,000 on the hotel for a like period. The latter figure is the same as the assessment on the Russell House.

Mr. Hays refused to consider a proposition which did not include both station and hotel on an equal time basis.

There are minor matters such as widening streets upon which there is little disagreement.

**Oil Lands Bring Large Figures.**  
 The California Oil Fields, Limited, one of the largest oil producing companies in California, recently purchased 1680 acres of land in the Colingia district for \$2,084,000. This land is made up of several tracts located at different points, some of it outside of what is considered the proven field. One tract adjoins a portion of all oil lands, some of it is not paid for oil land unless it can be demonstrated that the production of oil will insure a heavy profit on the investment.

Another tract of land near the California Diamond property and on which several wells are located, recently sold for \$19,000 per acre. These prices also furnish an idea of the value of the proved California oil lands. When these prices are considered in connection with the vast holdings of the California Diamond Oil Co., which amount to over 2300 acres, some idea of the value back of California Diamond stock may be obtained. The prices of all oil lands brought the Colingia district are advancing, largely on account of the advancing prices of the oil and heavy demand for oil. The natural increase in the value of the holdings of the California Diamond Oil Co. consequently give the stock a steadily increasing value. This makes heavy profits for present investors.

**Anniversary Services.**  
 The anniversary services of South-West Presbyterian Church will be held to-morrow. The preachers for the day will be Rev. Prof. Kennedy, Knox College, in the morning, and Rev. T. C. Brown of St. Andrew's Church, in the evening.

**Want Him to Stay.**  
 Windsor, Feb. 15.—The officers of the 21st Regiment at a meeting last night adopted a resolution asking Col. A. Bartlett to remain in command of the regiment for another year.

**Refusal of Command of Channel Fleet Not for Open Discussion.**  
 Mexico City, Feb. 15.—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, who arrived here this afternoon, when asked as to the truth of the statements that he had refused the command of the Channel fleet, because of the action of the admiralty in reducing the fleet, said: "You may say to the world that I can neither affirm nor deny the story at this time. This is a matter between the admiralty and me, and the end of it will be known when I return to England. It would be highly improper for me to comment on such a question at this time."

**Manitoba Elections.**  
 Winnipeg, Feb. 15.—Three more candidates have been nominated for the legislature. The Liberals of West Winnipeg named Thomas Johnson, barrister, and Horace Chevrier, M.L.A., is the choice of the Liberals of St. Boniface. The Conservatives of Morden have nominated the present member, George Ashdown.

The elections are expected in March, dates named being 10th and 26th, respectively.

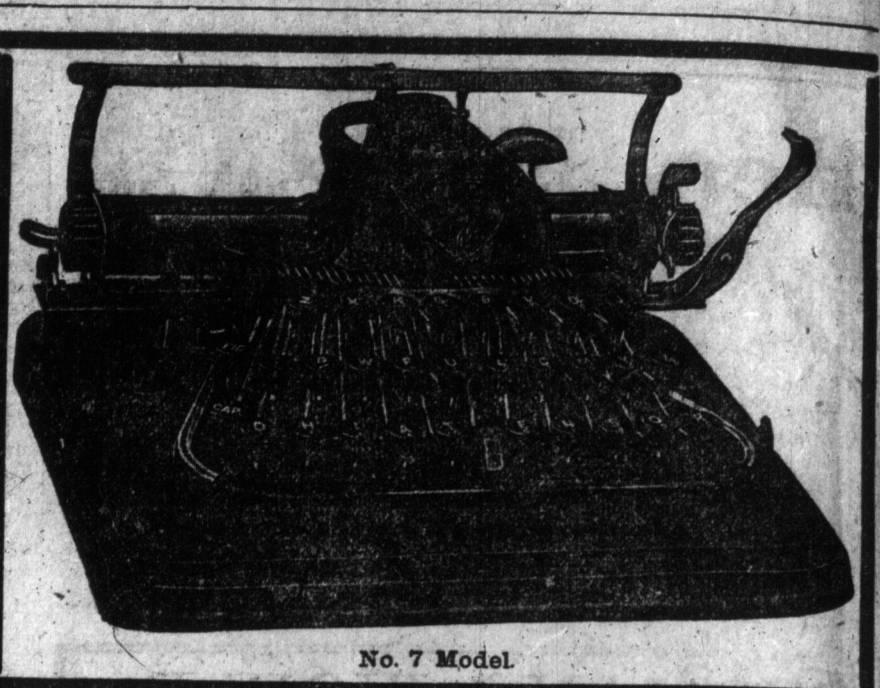

**POWER HOUSE EMPLOYEES  
PETITION AGAINST CHANGE**

According to Manager Fleming,  
However, Their Protest is a  
Little Premature.

"The matter has never yet been under consideration," said Manager Fleming to the World when asked about reports of a threatened strike of power house employees.

The rumor arose from an alleged statement that a new schedule would be enforced increasing working hours from 8 to 12 a day with an increase in salaries from \$88 to \$10 a month to switchmen and operators. At noon yesterday a deputation waited on the manager. It consisted of R. McLaren, representing engineers and firemen; C. E. Robinson, electrical operators; and C. W. Cornell, dynamo attendants.

"We, employees of the Toronto Railway Co., believe it is unfair and absurd to ask us to work twelve hours per day. We can neither do justice to ourselves or our work by so doing. We would ask you as our manager to give this matter your consideration. We have been with the company a number of years and have in the past been treated fairly, and we hope the company will continue to do so, and use us as men, not slaves."

Mr. Fleming said last night: "We have been letting our men down there go as we require their services no longer. You see there is no use buying Niagara power and running a power house also. But the arrangement of the work is to be done by about 12 or 15 men has not been gone into at all. It has been suggested that as the work is light there might be two shifts of twelve hours each, and it is also suggested

that there be three shifts of eight hours each with less pay. "I am not in a position to say which one will be adopted as the best, until I have gone into the matter. The men waited on me to-day and I will give it my consideration."

"You can see this," added the manager, "that it will be the policy of the company to do no man an injustice, and I am not alarmed at all. Boyd only talked with the men there about the suggestion and no order was issued as no decision has been arrived at."

**GAS HOLD-UP IN CHATHAM  
CITIZENS HAVE NO RIGHTS**

Corporation Declines to Purify Product According to Agreement and Appeals to Ottawa.

Chatham, Feb. 15.—(Special.)—The Chatham Gas Company, Limited, inserted in the local papers an advertisement to the effect that natural gas will be turned into the mains of the company on Feb. 15 and that after that date no artificial gas will be supplied.

The citizens of Chatham have a substantial grievance against their representatives in the council for what they regard as a complete surrender to the corporation. The Gas Company agreed to deliver natural gas in Chatham for 20¢ a thousand to private consumers, and 15¢ a thousand to manufacturers. After the city accepted the offer the company boldly said it would not deliver the gas and demanded prices nearly double those agreed upon.

In December last a new agreement in Toronto, which made the company would purify its product in order to comply with the statutory standard and deliver it at 15¢ and 20¢ to the different consumers. In the meantime the Gas Company was given a perpetual franchise by the city. The company refused to purify its product according to the agreement, and sent its solicitor, who is an alderman of Chatham, to ask the government to amend the act so as to enable the company to deliver impure natural gas, although the citizens have at great expense put in signs and fixtures for poor gas to be delivered at low pressure.

It is said by a gentleman close to the city council, and who is the agent of the city, that the gas corporation, as requested by the city council, amend the act so as to relieve the company of the necessity of purifying the gas and to compel the consumers to strengthen and change the pipes and appliances in their homes.

**Public Ownership the Remedy.**  
The citizens expect no relief from the city council and regard municipal ownership of the gas plant as the only means of escaping from the injustice of the corporation. It is also remarkable that neither of the local papers is taking the side of the citizens in this matter. The history of the company is as follows: Last autumn a party of citizens secured a charter from the city council for a gas plant, and got an excellent gas well near here, but the product is of a very inferior quality, unless cleaned and treated with sulphuric acid, which is a nominal sum; Symmes and the company refused to carry out the plan, and the city council has since made an agreement with the Chatham Gas Company and the latter was to take over the plant and pay 60 per cent. of the proceeds.

The Natural Gas Company agreed to purify the gas for the Chatham Gas Company, and the latter agreed to purify the gas for the city and deliver the natural gas purified to the city at 15¢ per thousand, and 20¢ for illuminating gas. According to both contracts the gas is to be purified and delivered to start at or before the first day of January, 1907.

**Expense to Citizens.**  
The gas was brought to the city and notice given to the citizens that it was ready to be turned on, and the citizens were notified to change their gas heating and cooking appliances which have heretofore been used for purified gas, so as to be used in future for the impure gas, by carrying off the offensive and obnoxious matters up the chimney. The solicitor for the Natural Gas Company was elected as one of the aldermen for the year, and the council, which were supposed to be favorable to the citizens, immediately passed a resolution that the act will be quietly amended. There is no suggestion that the Gas Company should supply a correspondingly lower price for the impure gas.

It is expected that the gas company will deliver in Chatham one million cubic feet of gas per day. This means at 12¢ per thousand a gross receipt from one well of \$15 a day. If the company is to get from the citizens 25¢, 20¢ and 15¢ the profits will be enormous. It costs about \$1500 to bore a gas well.

**COCHRANE'S MINING BILL HAS IMPORTANT FEATURE**

Assessors to Be Appointed, Who Will Report Upon Properties Annually.

The new mining bill of Hon. Mr. Cochrane was ready yesterday for distribution in its printed form. Besides the tax on profits and acreage, the bill provides for the appointment of a mining assessor with wide powers. Extensive reports are to be furnished and half the tax is to go to the school sections in unorganized districts. A tax is also to be imposed on natural gas, half to be refunded on what is not exported.  
Owners will be requested to notify the bureau of mines of the fact that a mine is in operation within ten days after said operation commences, together with the following information: Name of mine, name of owner, occupant and operator, name and address of manager. Notification of any change in these or any cessation or recommencement of operations must also be made. From this the bureau of mines is to keep a list showing all operating mines in the province with names and addresses so given.  
It is made illegal to ship ores without first notifying the bureau of mines that such mine is in active production, and mine owners, in addition to other statements, must before Aug. 1, 1907, and March 1 in every year, furnish a statement containing the following information: Name and description of mine; name and address of persons owning or occupying quantity of ores shipped or treated on the premises during the year ending Dec. 31; name of smelter to which sent; cost per ton for transportation; cost per ton for smelting; value of ore shipped, after deducting charges; value of ore treated on premises. Books must be kept at or near the mines, containing account of ore and value.  
One or more officers, to be known as mine assessors or mine assessors, shall, annually, or oftener, "prepare lists and descriptions of, and ascertain and report the facts concerning all mines,

and to make such investigations as may be required by the minister." This officer is to be given power to enter mining premises at all times for the purpose of making enquiries and obtaining information, and "he shall be allowed to take samples for assaying values of ore, and he shall have access to all books and letters, but any information of a private or confidential character shall not be disclosed."  
One-half the amount collected by the acreage tax shall be refunded to the trustees of the unorganized school sections in which the lands are situated. Trustees have to furnish a list of the mining locations in their districts. In unorganized territories, it is provided that lands shown to have been used during the preceding year shall be exempted.  
Methods for the preparation of the tax roll are defined, appeals from which must be filed within fifteen days. These appeals are to be referred to the mining commissioner on the railway and municipal board. Any person causing an investigation by reason of false or untrue statements may be compelled to pay costs as taxed by officer of the high court. Where a very large sum is involved an appeal may be made from the commissioner or board to the court of appeal. In lieu of an appeal the minister may conduct an enquiry into the facts.  
All mines in the province operated under the same general management shall be dealt with as one, and not as separate mines. The annual profits shall be ascertained from the gross receipts on the year's output, or, in case any part of the output is not sold, but is treated for the owner, then the actual value at the pit's mouth, the market value to be ascertained by the mine assessor after deducting certain defined expenses. The taxation shall be upon the basis of the business of the preceding year. For non-payment of taxes the location or claim becomes forfeited after two years have been in default, and after due publication. But such claims so forfeited shall not be open to staking or recording as mining claim unless so declared by order-in-council. In case of dispute the minister retains the right to compromise. The crown retains the right to exempt any property from the tax by agreement.  
A clause provides for a tax at a rate per thousand to be fixed on all gas produced, and another clause provides for remission of one-half the tax on the quantity used in the province. Similar machinery is provided in reference to mines in this provision.  
Any person knowingly making or signing any false statement or furnishing

any false or incorrect information to the bureau of mines or any mining assessor, or keeping or causing to be kept any false or incorrect book or accounts regarding anything done under this act, with intent to deceive, shall, in addition to any other liability, incur a penalty of \$200 for every such offence. Neglect of any person to furnish statement asked for, shall be punishable by a fine of \$20 per mine and double taxation on the mine.

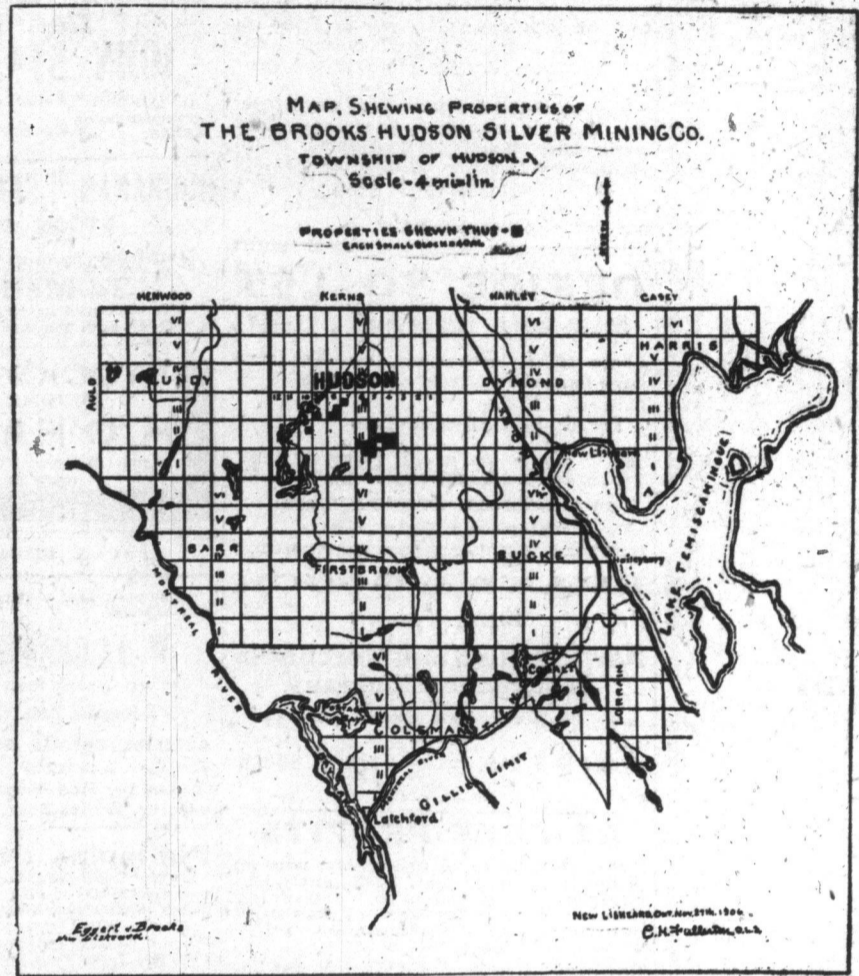

## JAMES STREET EXTENSION QUESTION FINALLY SETTLED

Board of Works Vote Against Re-opening the Matter—Tax Sale Judgment Hits Hard.

The decision of the civic works committee yesterday against reopening the bylaw providing for James-street extension at a width of 66 feet means that the question will not be re-opened by the city, and that the ruling of Judge Winchester as to the assessable area and the basis of assessment in individual cases will set the final seal upon the matter.

Now that the committee has set aside the petition the judge says he is prepared to accept the decision as a final one. The matter has been granted, that an expression of the will of the city might be obtained. The evidence had all been adduced, and his honor hopes next week to be able to give his ruling.

The works committee yesterday heard the representation of the solicitors of property owners affected. The vote was taken on a motion by Ald. James Hales "that in view of the strong opposition recommendation be made to the council that the bylaw be repealed," and the result was as follows:

For repeal: Ald. J. Hales, Lytle, Vaughan, McBride, Whytock—5.  
Against: Controller Hubbard, Ald. Geary, Ald. J. McLaughlin, McGhie, Keeler, Foster and Wilson—7.

Of last year's committee who had thereby threatened the petition, only Ald. Vaughan supported the petition. In the absence of the city engineer, who is ill, Controller Hubbard's motion for a car line of King-street, Market to the north city limits by way of Jarvis-street, Adelaide-street, Macdonald-square, Claremont, Clinton and Christie-streets was allowed to stand over for a report from Mr. Rust, Road St. Pavement.

The proposed paving of Bond-street, from Queen-street to Goulbourn-street, with asphalt, developed a lively debate. Controller Hubbard did not see the need for changing the paving from macadam to asphalt, as Bond-street was not a business thoroughfare. The residents were willing to pay for resurfacing. Ald. McGhie drew attention to Dr. Sheard's complaint that asphalt could not be kept clean because of the clouds of dust which were carried from intersecting macadam roadways.

Ald. Graham was strongly against tearing up the sound foundation of the pavement. The matter was allowed to stand over, as was also the paving with asphalt of Bloor-street from Yonge-street to Sherbourne-street, and Front-street from King-street to Front-street.

The petition of Hamburg-avenue residents to have the name changed to Gladstone-avenue, led to a street-naming sub-committee of Ald. Keeler, J. Hales and Whytock being formed.

**City Appeal.**  
Should Justice McMahon's decision allowing John Russell to reacquire Carlaw-avenue property from the city, be accepted as a final judgment, the city is liable to be sued for the recovery of no less than 1677 parcels of land purchased from the city at tax sales. The accumulated taxes amount to about \$525,000. The city solicitor has taken under a provision of the assessment act, whereby a municipality might purchase lands for the amount of taxes due, provided the price offered at an adjourned sale was less than the amount of taxes, charges and costs, and provided that the sale was duly advertised. The judge's decision was based on the fact that the amount of taxes and charges and costs did not exceed the price offered at the sale. The city solicitor says the case will be appealed to Mr. Porman's opinion is that the city will ultimately win.

**Time to Project.**  
President J. A. Ellis of the Ontario Municipal Association has invited Controller Hubbard that he is seeking to arrange a meeting of the executive with Mr. Hanna, to discuss the big electric merger.

Mr. Ellis' opinion is that strong representations should be made against the merger, and that the association should do everything possible to "assist the evident desire of the Ontario government to prevent these electrical companies, and the companies escaping from the jurisdiction of Ontario." The executive meeting will be held on Wednesday next at the Queen's Hotel.

**Brevities.**  
Assistant Engineer George Simpson has been promoted to the position of engineer at Berkeley-street Firehall, succeeding the late John Hackett.

The request that arrangements should be made at Toronto jail where by first offenders and juveniles may be separated from hardened criminals, is made by Steward McMillan, an property commissioner.

It is reported that the Canadian Northern railway erect a station at the northwest corner of Queen-street and the Kingston-road.

The city is meeting with difficulty in procuring steel for the steel structural work on the new central fire station. They are too busy.

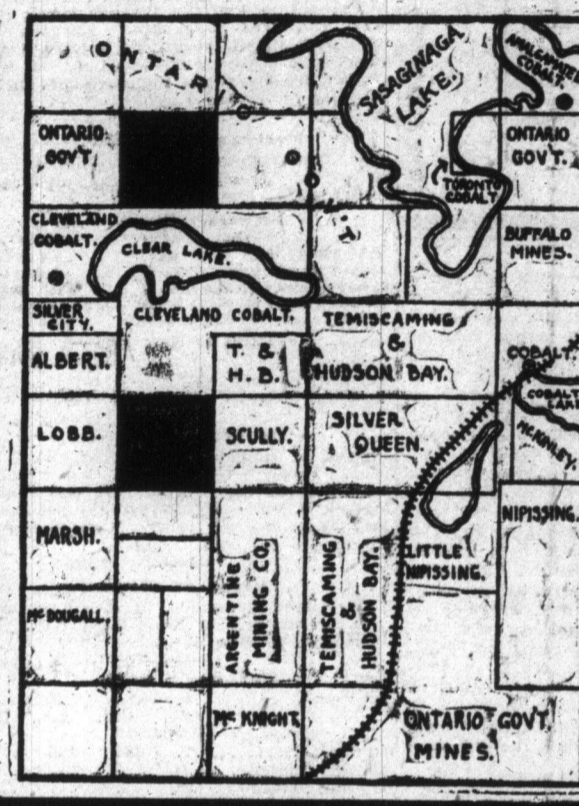

**RICHMOND HILL SEED FAIR**  
FARMERS WHO WIN PRIZES

Interesting Addresses Given—  
Wychwood to Enlarge  
School.

Richmond Hill, Feb. 15.—(Special.)—The third annual seed fair was held here to-day. A large number of the representative farmers were present, and Simpson Remie of the Dominion seed department addressed the audience on clean seeds. He commented upon the uniformity of the potatoes upon exhibition and the very good samples of red clover seed shown. He emphasized the importance of selecting cultivation and manures, in obtaining maximum yields. He discussed the methods of dealing with the Canada thistle, the perennial sow thistle and switch grass. The principle to be noticed was that all these pests must breathe thru their leaves, and hence a constant cutting off of the leaves meant death to the plant.

A. J. Reynolds of Scarborough was present, and called attention to the seed fair at Markham next Friday. He felt much interested in the seed improvement, and referred to the good done by Sir Wm. Macdonald by his inquiry for the boys. There were three ways to make more money on the farm and they were to make farms better by manures, by cultivation and by seed selection with a good short rotation of crops.

J. Locke Wilson, superintendent of agricultural and horticultural societies, commended the spirit of enterprise among the farmers in the study of science in their work. Germany, and other European countries, had beaten us out in the race already, for they had gone in steadily for scientific enquiry and co-operative work. The fact that two million tons of potatoes alone were used in Germany for the manufacture of denatured alcohol for fuel and power purposes on the farm was evidence of their progress. He called the attention of the directors to the changes in the new act whereby a grant of \$75 was given to associations holding bull and stallion shows along with the seed fairs. In closing he counseled young men to remain in Ontario, and be better off in the end than they would be in another place.

The judging of the potatoes and grain was done by Simpson Remie, J. L. Wilson and F. M. Chalmers. The following prizes were awarded: Early potatoes—1, T. W. Stephens; 2, Chas. Jones. Late potatoes—1, Chas. Jones; 2, Peter Jones; 3, T. W. Stephens. Turnip seed—1, T. W. Stephens; 2, Wm. Palmer. Ailch—1, W. Stephens. Red clover—1, Henry Casely; 2, Wm. Palmer; 3, T. W. Stephens. A public meeting was held last night in Hillcrest school house, school section No. 25, when it was decided to authorize the trustees of the school to apply to the township council for the issue of debentures to provide further school accommodation. The trustees explained that the proposition is to add four new rooms to the present building by a wing on the east side of the building with an assembly room 65x24 ft. in the second floor, the whole cost to be \$15,000. The proposition was adopted unanimously, the debentures to run for 30 years. The school board was also authorized to buy more land north and south of the school for additional playground. The petition will be presented to the township council next Monday.

**NO MORE AMERICAN SHOES.**  
Increased Duty Will Make Their Cost Prohibitive in Canada.

After weighing the question carefully, Hon. William Fielding decided to put a higher tariff on American shoes. The man or woman who cannot now be satisfied in a Slater Shoe store, must pay thirty cents on each dollar's worth of value in the shoes, or an average of about \$1.25 more on each pair.

Thus an American shoe selling for \$5 at retail in the United States will cost \$4.25 at wholesale in Canada, and a shoe dealer would then ask \$7.00 for a shoe, with the same leather as in a Slater Shoe.

Yet, the president of the Slater Shoe Company was the only manufacturer to protest against this increase, which cannot but do his company a world of good. He unselfishly advised the government to reduce the tariff on raw materials, so that people could get their shoes cheaper.

As one gentleman observed, "I suppose ours is a retaliatory measure. The Slater Shoe does not need protection. But at Washington they tax everything coming into this country from Canada, with the possible exception of the money loaned to risky Wall-street speculators by Canadian banks. One Canadian bank recently showed Wall-street loans more than double the amount of its total capital.
