Government and Opposition a One in Discountenancing Co-Ionial Contributions Toward Defence of Empire.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable,) London, Feb. 15 .- In the house ommons, Harold Cox (Liberal) moved an amendment affirming that the first question to be laid before the colonial conference should be the importance of fuller participation by the colonies in the cost of imperial defence.

Mr. Cox urged the government to enter into negotiations with the colonies for a partnership on strictly defined equitable terms, similar to those embodied in the treaty with Japan, Mr. Balfour said there ranged thru

mr. Balfour said there ranged thru Mr. Cox's speech a desire to treat the question of national defence rather in a strictly bargaining spirit of interchange of services between different parts of the empire, which ought to be the greatest link between the colonies and ourselves.

Mr. Balfour, continuing, said, if the colonies provided for their own defence we could not reduce the strength of the navy. He did not think it reasonable to ask a colonial parliament to vote money which somebody else was to spend. Better to trust to the patrictic enthusiasm of the colonies than a hard and fast organization.

Winston Churchill, speaking for the government, thought it would be very wrong to measure in money the value of the services rendered by the colonies. The view of the government was that the British empire was not a business proposition, and was not to be looked upon in that light. It was framed on the principle of a syndicate.

Continuing, he said the British armaments were not due in a great measure to association with the colonies, but he quite agreed that as the opportunity occurred the colonies should contribute to the common resources of what Lord Rosebery had called "our defensive league."

The strategic principle governing imperial, naval and military defence was the practicability of the colonies organizing forces for defence in time of war on the principles laid down in this country in regard to interchange of units and officers in the colonies, India, and the mother country.

He concluded that the government hoped to reduce the expenditure on armaments by peaceful negotiation and recourse to arbitration.

Their petition read: "We, employes of the Toronto Rail-way Co., believe it is unfair and absurd to ask us to work twelve hours per day. We can neither do justice to ourselves or our work by so doing. We would ask you as our manager to give this matter your consideration. We have been with the empany a number of years and have in the past been treated fairly, and hope the company will continue to do

so, and use us as men, not slaves." Mr. Fleming said last night: We have been letting our men dewn there go as we require their ser-vices no longer. You see there is no buying Niagara power and running a power house also.

But the arrangement of the work to be done by about 12 or 15 men has ot been gone into at all. It has been suggested that as the work is light there might be two shifts of twelve hours each, and it is also suggested

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GAS HOLD-UP IN CHATHAM

Corporation Declines to Purify Product According to Agreement and Appeals to Ottawa.

Chatham, Feb. 15 .- (Special.)-The Chatham Gas Company, Limited, inserted in the local papers an advertisement to the effect that natural gas will be turned into the mains of the company on Feb. 15 and that after that date no artificial gas will be

The citizens of Chatham have a substantial grievance against their reresentatives in the council for what they regard as a complete surrender to the corporation. The Gas Company agreed to deliver natural gas in Chatham for 20c a thousand to private consumers and 15c a thousand to manufacturers. After the city accepted the offer the company boldly said it would not deliver the gas and then demanded prices nearly double those agreed upon.

In December last a new agreement in writing was made that the com-pany would purify its product in order to comply with the statutory standard and deliver for 35c, 25c and 15c to the different consumers. In the meantime the Gas Company was given a perpetual franchise by the city. The company refused to purify its product according to the agreement and sent its solicitor, who is an alder-

man of Chatham, to Ottawa to ask the government to amend the statute in order to enable the company to deliver pure natural gas, altho the citizens have at great expense put in pipes and fixtures for poor gas to be delivered at low pressure. It is said by a gentleman close to

Archie Campbell, M.P., that the government will, as requested by the gas corporation, amend the act so as to reeve the company of the necessity of purifying the gas and to compel the consumers to strengthen and change the pipes and appliances in their

The history of the company is as follows: Last autumn a company represented by H. D. They went to the Chat-ham Gas Company and the latter applied to the city for a perpetual franchise to deliver natural gas. company has been supplying the city with artificial gas. The Natural Gas Company made an agreement with the Chatham Gas Company whereby the latter was to take over the gas from the former and pay 60 per cent. of

The Natural Gas Company agreed to purify the gas for the Chatham Low Pacific Coast Rates.

Gas Company, and the latter agreed to purify it for the citizens, and got reduced rates to British Columbia and from the city a perpetual contract to Pacific coast points for second-class, deliver the natural gas purified t ne-way tickets. Expense to Citizens, The gas was brought to the city and notice given to the citizens that it was ready to be turned on; and then the citizens were notified to change their gas heating and cooking ap-pliances, which have heretofore been used for purified gas, so as to be used in future for the impure gas, by carrying off the offensive and obnoxious matters up the chimney. The solicitor for the Natural Gas Company was elected as one of the aldermen for the year, and a majority of the council were supposed to be favorable to the gas corporation. Articles were written in the newspapers, minimizing the cangers of using the impure gas and favoring amending the purifying clauses. The solicitor-alderman, after going to Ottawa, procured the assurance that the standard quality required by the act would be so amended as to allow the natural gas to be delivered in its impure state.

The city council passed a resolution almost unanimously to oppose the amendment, but many fear that the opposition is only on the surface and that the act will be quietly amended. 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



FARMERS WHO WIN PRIZES

Interesting Addresses Given-Wychwood to Enlarge

Richmond Hill, Feb. 15 .- (Special.)-The third annual seed fair was held here to-day, A large number of the representative farmers were present, and Simpson Rennie of the Dominion seed department addressed the audience on clean seeds. He commented upon the uniformity of the potatoes upon exhibition and the very good samples of red clover seed shown. He emphasized the importance of selection, cultivation and manures, in obtaining maximum yields. He discussed the methods of dealing with the Camada thistle, the perennial sow thistle and switch grass. The principle to be noticed was that all these pests must breathe thru their leaves, and hence a constant cutting off of the leaves meant death to the plant.

A. J. Reynolds of Scarboro was present, and called attention to the seed fair at Markham next Friday. He felt much interested in the seed improvement, and referred to the good done by Sir Wm. Macdonald by his prizes for the boys. There were three ways to make more money on the farm and they were to make farms better by manures, by cultivation and by seed selection with a good short rotation of crops.

J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent of agricultural and horticultural excitions seed department addressed the aud-

J. Lockie Wilson, superintendent of agricultural and horticultural societies, commended the spirit of enterprise among the farmers in the study of commended the spirit of enterprise among the farmers in the study of science in their work. Germany, and other European countries had beaten us out in the race already, for they had gone in steadily for scientific enquiry and co-operative work. The fact that two million tons of potatoes alone were used in Germany for the manufacture of denatured alcohol for heat and power purposes on the farm was evidence of their progress. He called the attention of the directors to the changes in the new act whereby a grant of \$75 was given to associations holding bull and stallion shows along with the seed fairs. In closing he counseled young men to remain in Ontario, and be better off in the end than they would be in another place. The judging of the potatoes and grain was done by Simpson Rennie, J. L. NO MORE AMERICAN SHOES.

ncreased Duty Will Make Their Cost Prohibitive in Canada.

After weighing the question carefully, Hon. William Fielding decided to put a higher tariff on American shoes. The nan or woman who cannot now be satisfied in a Slater Shoe store, must pay thirty cents on each dollar's worth of value in the shoes, or an average of about \$1.25 more on each pair.

Thus an American shoe selling for 55 at retail in the United States will cost \$4.97 at wholesale in Canada, and a shoe dealer would then ask \$7,00 for a shoe, with the same leather as in a \$5 Slater Shoe. Yet, the president of the Slater Shoe

Company was the only manufacturer to protest against this increase, which cannot but do his company a world of good. He unselfishly advised the gov-ernment to reduce the tariff on raw materials, so that people could get

materials, so that people could get their shoes cheaper.

As one gentleman observed, "I suppose ours is a retaliatory measure. The Slater Shoe does not need protection. But at Washington they tax everything coming into that country from Canada, with the possible exception of the money loaned to risky Wall-street speculators by Canadian banks. One Canadian bank recently showed Wall-street loans more than double the amount of its total capital.
