





Now, there are many who will laugh at this letter of Mr. Tarte's, and say that it is merely the attempt of a tricky politician to cover his retreat from a diplomatic field in which he was beaten. They will say that, having raised the racial and religious cry for party purposes, he is now willing to sacrifice the interests of his race and religion for party interests. The Herald does not believe this to be the whole truth. We believe that Mr. Tarte is an exceedingly shrewd politician and an ardent Liberal; but we believe that he has also become a Liberal in the best sense of that much-abused term. The transformation of this man from a champion of extreme ultramontanism in religion and of narrow Gallic nationalism in politics into the exponent and defender of liberal views, both in religion and in national politics, is one of the most interesting studies in the development of opinion that the history of our time affords. Not more than two or three years ago Mr. Tarte would have been horrified at the theory that in the education of Catholic children clerical authority should yield to the authority of the state, and he would have bitterly resented the prediction that the growth of a French nationality on the banks of the St. Lawrence is a dream that will never be realized. Now he argues that a good secular education for Catholic children is more important than the retention of clerical control over the schools, and his patriotism has grown wide enough to in-

cific.

Scene at a Burial.

Weston, Nov. 16,—(Special.)—The Roman Catholic burying ground here was the scene of quite a little sentiment and commotion among the villagers this morning. Mrs. Curley, an octogenarian, who had lived in the village since the cemetery was founded. died on Saturday and was to be burjed beside her husband to-day. The grave was dug and the funeral cortege-arrived at the cemetery. About the same time the village constable put in an appearance. He forbade the interment on the ground that according to a village bylaw (190), which came into force on August 1st, 1895, no more burials should take place within the village limits. It was generally surmised at the passing of the bylaw that exceptions would be made in the case of some few aged citizens, all of whose relatives were buried in the village, and in this case the friends of the deceased consulted with the Reeve, who consulted with the Medical Health Officer and the village magistrate; all of whom were agreenble to having the deceased lady rest beside the remains of her husband. Although no guarantee was given that proceedings would not be taken to stop the interment, the friends left with a letter from the Reeve to the Rev. Father Bergin, which inferred that no action would be taken. To-day's proceedings at the grave, amidst the sorrows of weeping relatives, were considered by some disgraceful. Rev. Father Bergin, however, explained the circumstances to the throng which had gathered there, held mass in the church and gave an order for burial in St. Michael's Cemetery, where the interment afterwards took place.

I have been making inquiries regarding this swift descent from £2 to £1 1½ 16d and have gleaned the following information: Two large shareholders have recently been pressing some of their holdings on the market at a very awkward period. For some time things have been sadly out of joint here in the London mining markets, and this effort to realize large blocks of shares has worried the market considerably. I am assured, however, that all the shares are absorbed and that there is nothing to hinder a sharp recovery in the price. Some idea of the effect of this selling may be gauged from the fact that it is said the two shareholders referred to have between them placed 32.000 shares on a tired and jaded market."
