THE UNIVERSITY LAND GRANT. The public will not be disposed to adversely criticize the proposal of the Ontario Government to grant the University of Toronto a block of agricultural lands in the Rainy River district. It is intended to keep abreast of the world and institutions throughout the world are extending their facilities in various departments, and to do this a considerable increase in its endowment is necessary.

OUR TRADE WITH GREAT BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES. In estimating the probable effect that an increase in the United States tariff will have on this country, we should bear in mind that the United States took only 33 per cent of our exports last year, as against 55 per cent, consumed by the United Kingdom. On the other hand, while we purchased only 28 per cent of our imports from the United Kingdom we bought 50 per cent of them in the United States.

AS TO TARIFF LEGISLATION

What Senators and Representatives are Saying.

A DIVERSITY OF OPINIONS.

Senator Brice Thinks Free Silver Men Will Vote With Republicans.

Mr. Sherman Will Express No Opinion—Mr. Allison Hopes Enough Revenue Will Be Raised—Hawley Expresses Doubts—Walthall Does Not Expect Immediate Legislation at the Coming Session—Dingley is Non-Committal—Other Notes From Washington.

Washington, Nov. 16.—With a view of ascertaining the views of the leading men in Congress as to the probability of tariff legislation in the next session of Congress, and as to the likelihood of an extra session, the Washington Bureau of the United Associated Presses has sought the written opinions of a number of prominent Senators and representatives. The replies received show quite a diversity of views and are exceedingly interesting. A few of them are as follows:

SENATOR BRICE. Senator Calvin C. Brice of Ohio says: "While some of the free silver senators, who have heretofore prevented the passage of the Dingley bill with such amendments as may make certain a sufficient revenue, will, in view of the result of the election, probably vote with their Republican brethren, it is material whether they do or not as in my opinion a sufficient number of sound money Democratic Senators will assist the President to pass the necessary tariff legislation in the 54th Congress to supply the existing deficit in the revenue. At least shall vote and I understand that Senator Gorman and a number of others occupy the same position."

SHERMAN IS MUM. Senator Brice's colleague, Senator Sherman says: "In the present conjuncture of affairs, it is not for me to express my opinion as to the proper tariff and financial legislation of this or the next Congress."

ALLISON'S HOPE. Senator W. B. Allison of Iowa says: "I hope the Dingley bill will pass with such modifications as may be necessary to secure sufficient revenue to carry on the government. If this can not be done during the 54th Congress, I am sure an extra session of the 55th Congress is inevitable."

HAWLEY IS DOUBTFUL. Senator Hawley of Connecticut says: "The possibility of adopting a satisfactory revision of the tariff such as might be expected to remain unaltered at the last session of the 54th Congress seems to me very doubtful."

WALTHALL IS SKEPTICAL. Senator Walthall of Mississippi says: "I see no reason to justify the expectation that there will be any important tariff or financial legislation at the approaching session of Congress."

DINGLEY IS NON-COMMITTAL. Mr. Dingley of Maine, chairman of the House Committee on Ways and Means and leader of the House, refers to his recently published interview, in which he expresses the opinion that there was not the slightest hope of the passage of the so-called Dingley bill by the Senate at the next session of Congress, and that the House would not propose anything further in this direction at the approaching session of the Governor Dingley adds: "This covers all I have to say at present."

GROSVENOR IS PESSIMISTIC. General Grosvenor of Ohio says: "I do not believe it possible that any material legislation for the benefit of the country can be passed in the 54th Congress. I do believe that the Republican party will be in a position in the 55th Congress to give the country from bankruptcy and the industries of the country from destruction."

THE PATRIOTIC DUTY. Representative Charles H. Russell of Connecticut, a member of the Committee of Ways and Means, says: "The patriotic and businesslike members of the coming session of the 54th Congress is to provide revenue for the needs of the government. That should be done by a proper and reasonable increase of customs duties. It could be effected by the adoption of a revision of the tariff which the House passed at the last session, or some measure on the same line."

A FREE SHIP BILL. Despite the fact that there is no probability of either this Congress or the next passing a free ship bill, the Commissioner of Navigation in his annual report refers prominently to the subject and urges the necessity for the passage of such a measure.

ON THE SILVER QUESTION. Although the official figures of the revenue have not yet been published, the Republican Congressional headquarters, the result of the contest in the various congressional districts is known with sufficient exactness to warrant the announcement of a summary of the political divisions in the House of Representatives in the 54th Congress. This shows 207 Republicans, 17 Democrats and 12 Populists.

Ministerial Association. The fortnightly meeting of the Ministerial Association was held yesterday. Most of the time at the morning session was taken up by the reading of a paper by Rev. W. Johnston on "The Larger Vision of Society" which was through the reading of the paper.

Ontario Division Com. John Macintosh, clerk of the Fourth Division Court of Ontario, died last week at his residence on Sunday. Mr. Keble, the District Crown Attorney, becomes ex-officio clerk, until a successor shall have been appointed.

TO PROTECT NEW ORLEANS

Mayor Quinn Convinces the Authorities That the Place Must Have Costly Forts Built.

New Orleans, Nov. 16.—Several weeks ago Major Quinn, U.S.A., recognizing the comparatively defenceless position of this city against a foreign foe, evolved an elaborate plan for the building of a series of forts along the coast. The plan of Major Quinn will require the expenditure of nearly \$3,000,000. The importance of the suggestion was recognized by the United States authorities having in charge the work of erecting the fortifications along the Gulf coast, and this morning the Board of Fortifications proceeded down the river by motor launch to examine the connection with the project. Fort Phillip and Fort Jackson lay at present the only forts on this city. The Government has recently made many improvements at these forts, and is engaged in building two other forts.

EAST SEAMSHIP SERVICE

The Allans Discuss the Steamship Canada—Faster Route Proposed.

The following letter is from The Montreal Herald: Sir.—In an article in yesterday's Herald headed, "The Canada," it is stated that "a vessel of the same type, but of greater speed, is under consideration, and it is claimed, so as to develop a speed of 12 knots." If this were done, the result would be that these features which you claim as so desirable, viz., the capacity for carrying large cargoes, passengers, would be, to a large extent, wiped out. Such a vessel would only carry a moderate cargo, and would not be sufficiently speeded to compete successfully with the fastest lines to New York for passenger traffic.

The deduction you draw from the very creditable time made by the Canada, namely, that vessels of this class are preferable for the Canadian route to New York, is entirely unjustified. It is evident, therefore, that agriculturists and shippers would be better served by a vessel of the same type, but of less speed, no matter what their type. In addition to this, however, we put forward as part of our scheme an undertaking to provide a fleet of modern freight steamships, each with every requisite for the carriage of cattle, sheep, horses and cargo of all descriptions, including perishable cargo requiring refrigerated space. A weekly sailing of 20-knot steamers supplemented by more frequent sailings of large modern freight steamers, would not only greatly benefit the export and import trade of the Dominion, but would enable the Canadian merchant to beat the fastest of the New York route than any other class of vessels.

You say that Mr. Fleming "has very clearly shown that the Canada route cannot with safety be demanded of vessels using the St. Lawrence route," etc. Mr. Fleming's apparent purpose is to favor an Atlantic terminal port and to discredit the St. Lawrence route. It is, however, as you are supported by facts, and until these are advanced it may be passed unanswered. But now let us take your own words: "The truth of the matter is, that all vessels, fast and slow alike, have to be guided by the same rules of safety, and that when fog or ice or other causes of detention are encountered they have to be handled in the same manner.
