# WALL AND RUMORS OF WALLS.

## Whole World Seems Charged With an Atmosphere of Belligerency—Chamberlain's Notable Alliance Speech.

### MANILA HAS NOT YET BEEN ATTACKED.

Despatch Boat McCulloch Arrived at Hong Kong Yesterday With Definite News From Admiral Dewey, Who Says He is Maintaining a Strict Blockade, and Captured a Spanish Gunboat From the Caroline Islands Which Entered the Harbor—Only Two Shots Were Fired.

### WAR NEWS VERY MUCH MIXED.

The war news this morning, as far as the situation in the West Indies is concerned, is very unsatisfactory. It seems impossible to get definite reports. The Spanish Cape Verde squadron appears to have eluded Admiral Sampson, and there is a great deal of speculation as to where it is. One report is that it is lying in wait for the St. Louis, renamed the Harvard, which is now at St. Pierre, Martinique, making repairs to her machinery. Then it is reported that the fleet is making for South American waters, and will endeavor to intercept the Oregon. Still another report is that it is going westward, and will endeavor to get to Cuban waters.

### ADMIRAL DEWEY IS ALL RIGHT.

From Asiatic waters definite news comes from Admiral Dewey. Manila has not yet been attacked. A Spanish gunboat from the Caroline Islands entered the port at Manila, not knowing that a state of war existed. An American war ship fired across her bows and demanded a surrender, but the Spaniard paid no attention. Then a shot was fired direct at the gunboat, and she came to. Philippine insurgents applied to Admiral Dewey for his approval of an attack upon the city, which was granted with the provision that no excesses were to be committed. There is no truth in reported massacre of a number of Americans. Admiral Dewey officially informed the Government at Washington that he is maintaining a strict blockade, and has plenty of coal.

### THE CABLE IS CUT.

Therefore There is No Way of Getting News From the Oregon or the Spanish Cape Verde Fleet.

New York, May 15.—(Special to Toronto World.)—A Kingston, Jamaica special says: The cable between St. Lucia and St. Vincent, British West Indies, has been cut and with it all communication between the United States and St. Vincent. The Oregon, accompanied by the other two vessels, is now off the extreme eastern coast of Brazil. She is making rapidly for the West Indies, and has now been four days out of reach of communication. Unless the Oregon puts in at Georgetown, British Guiana, on La Guayra, Venezuela, she will probably set a direct course for the West Indies. She will hope to receive there some word from Washington to decide her future movements. By the cutting of the St. Lucia cable she is placed beyond reach of her Government, and news of the movements of the Spanish squadron cannot be received. Washington navy officials declare the Oregon is safe from harm and will join Sampson's fleet all right.

### NEWS FROM DEWEY.

He Has Not Yet Attacked Manila, But Holds a Strict Blockade and Has Plenty of Coal.  
Hong Kong, May 15.—The United States despatch boat Hugh McCulloch arrived here to-day from Manila, with despatches from the Spanish Government. ### Yankees Driven Off.

Havana special to The Herald from a Spanish correspondent: Last Thursday American cruisers approached the entrance to Bahia Honda Bay, firing shots and attempting a landing. Spanish troops in ambush repelled the attack and captured two men, said to be reporters of a New York newspaper. It was at first believed that the prisoners were Charles H. Thrall and Hayden Jones, but investigation showed that both these men had in all probability escaped from Cuba. Two American gunboats chased a Spanish ship along the Jamaicatta coast yesterday afternoon, which they succeeded in capturing. In several towns more than 20,000 guerrilla troops are being organized.

### A Running Fight.

Key West special: Late advices from the south coast of Cuba report an engagement after the bombardment of Cienfuegos, between the Mosquito boat Eagle and a Spanish gunboat, further east, off the mouth of San Juan River. The gunboat came out from Cienfuegos and, finding the Eagle alone, gave chase. The Eagle was stonewalled, exchanging only occasional shots with the gunboat. The officers on the Marblehead, which was near at hand, heard the firing and turned back to reinforce the Eagle. The Spanish gunboat escaped them by entering San Juan River. The Eagle was struck several times, but her injuries were trifling. None of her men were killed or wounded.

### FLEET AGAIN LOCATED.

American Consul at Curacao Notices the White Horse That the Ships Are There.

New York, May 15.—(Special to Toronto World.)—Washington special: The State Department received a despatch from Leonard W. Smith, American Consul at Curacao, to-day, confirming the presence of the Spanish fleet there. It is now conceded that the White Horse and Navy Department that the Spanish fleet is seeking to make connection with General Blanco by way of Cienfuegos. It is believed that Admiral Sampson, having been fully advised of the location of the fleet and its probable intention, can apprehend it before it can reach Cienfuegos. In the meantime Commodore Schley, with the flying squadron, is making all haste south, and the naval authorities are confident that either Sampson or Schley will reach the objective point ahead of the Spaniards.

### CRESTFALLEN CAPTAIN.

The Steamer Gussie Returns to Key West With Her Cargo of Rifles, Bullets and Supplies.  
Key West, Fla., May 15.—The steamer Gussie, which left Tampa on May 10, with two companies of the First Infantry on board, in charge of 7000 rifles and 200,000 rounds of ammunition, intended for the insurgents in the Province of Pinar del Rio, remained off the coast of Cuba Thursday, Friday and yesterday, conveyed by the despatch boat Matanzas, where an arrangement to land her cargo. Captain J. H. Dorst of the staff of General Miles at Vienna headed the expedition, which returned here this morning. Her commander, a German, who accompanied the expedition, failed to accomplish the mission entrusted to him, refused to discuss the matter beyond admitting the failure and saying the Gussie will return to Tampa, Fla. Previous to leaving Cuban waters, the expeditionary force had a skirmish with Spanish cavalry near Cabanas, 10 miles west of Havana, where an attempt was made to land part of the cargo. On Friday morning Captain Dorst abandoned the attempt at that point and steamed toward Matanzas, where an arrangement had been made with the insurgents to send supplies ashore at Point Maya, a small cove where the battle of manzanillo was fought. ### SUICIDE OF A BANK TELLER.

Illness Brought on Despondency and Mr. O. Mowat of Owen Sound Shot Himself.  
Owen Sound, May 15.—The citizens of this town were startled Saturday night to learn that Mr. O. Mowat, for many years cashier at the Bank of Hamilton here, had committed suicide. The deceased had been in the hospital for two months, the last about 10 days ago, suffering him incapable of carrying on his duties as teller. He was last seen alive Saturday morning about 6.30, when he told the porter at the Seldon House, where he has lived over 10 years, that he was going to the bank and not to keep breakfast for him. When he did not turn up for dinner his room was searched, but he was not there, and everything seemed all right. After tea the junior clerk, who sleeps at the bank, found the pistol which had been used to shoot the deceased. The body was found in the basement to put on a fire. He was evidently the dead body of the cashier with a bullet hole in the temple. Deceased was about 33 years of age, and married. He was well connected, being a nephew of Sir Oliver Mowat, and was very much respected by the patrons of the bank and those who knew him.

### CUBA'S CASE.

Presented by Senator Tola, Who Replies to the Recent Lecture of Senator Duff.  
Senator Tola, on Saturday night in Association Hall, replied to Senator Duff's lecture in Masses Hall, by presenting the Cuban case of the question. He denied most of Duff's statements, sketched the oppression of the Cubans—cited the case of his own father chained to a Spanish ship till he became "a little wreck," and pictured Spain not as a dying but as a dead nation, whose general opinion he was helping to preach. The fight of 70,000,000, he said, against 15,000,000 seemed unjust to Duff, whose Spanish conception of justice was associated with gaps and tortures, especially appropriate for the races, powder and shot. Did he think of the deeper injustice to those who for four hundred years had been the victims of Spanish tyranny and misrule? Rev. C. O. Johnson, in moving a vote of thanks, nearly precipitated a war of words with a gentleman in the audience, but which quieted down. Mr. John Hewitt was in the chair.

### THE YALE IS ALL RIGHT.

Kingston, Jamaica, May 15.—The French cruiser Fulton, from Havana on May 8, arrived here yesterday and landed 38 refugees at the quarantine station. The Fulton will now proceed to Santiago de Cuba with provisions for the French Consul there, who has called to Kingston requesting that food be sent to him and announce that famine prices prevail at Santiago de Cuba. It appears from what the officers of the Fulton say that the Spaniards and soldiers at Havana are disinclined by the blockade and the improbability of any succor reaching the city. On the other hand, a great American invading army is expected to land in Cuba shortly. The price of imported food, salt, meat, fish and flour are steadily mounting at Havana; and vegetables are to be had there in plenty.

### TALK OF AN ANGLO-AMERICAN UNION.

Only the Sharp Veto of the British Government Prevented a Combination of European Continental Powers to Dictate to the United States—Downfall of Spain a Foregone Conclusion—The Question Would Have Been as to How the Spoils were to be Allotted.

### CHAMBERLAIN'S GREAT SPEECH.

The speech of Mr. Chamberlain at Birmingham, following that delivered by Lord Salisbury to the bankers, has set the whole world talking more than any utterance of recent years. The telegraphic reports this morning show that the idea of an Anglo-Saxon alliance will not be received with coldness in the United States. Even The New York Sun, formerly the most inveterate of tall-tailers, approves of the idea, and says any statesman who frowns on the proposal is unworthy of notice. English provincial papers of large influence also talk approvingly. The Spanish press comments on Mr. Chamberlain's speech as angry, and The Liberal (Government organ), predicts that on the day such a treaty shall be signed, "the general conflagration will burst out which has been so long suppressed by the powers. Anglo-American union will be faced by Russia and Germany, with their allies, and our western and eastern possessions, now on fire, will be an insignificant episode, compared with the conflagration in India, South Africa and China."

### BRITAIN'S SHARP VETO.

Was All That Prevented a Combination of the Powers Against the Interests of Uncle Sam.  
New York, May 15.—The London correspondent of The Sun cables his paper to-day as follows: "Had it not been for the sharp veto of the British Government, the United States would have been confronted, several days ago, with the difficult problem whether to withdraw Dewey ignominiously from the Philippines or fight combined Europe. I make this statement on the authority of two prominent members of the Salisbury Cabinet, and its accuracy is beyond question. Moreover, it falls far short of conveying an adequate idea of the manifold perils, plots and counterplots which the situation contained."

Bankers Hurry to Threadneedle-Street With Looks of Ominous Anxiety.

From the Sunday World. New York, May 14.—(Special.)—The London correspondent of The Evening Post cables the following to his paper: Mr. Chamberlain and Lord Salisbury together have managed to give Englandmen a severe attack of the nerves. It will pass away as the situation is frankly faced, but this morning there is no mistaking the familiar symptoms of John Bull in some of the London newspapers.

Mr. Chamberlain's remarks have been interpreted as a prediction that grave international complications are ahead, and his reference to the possibility of an Anglo-American alliance has generally endorsed.

The Yorkshire Post remarks: "The duty of the moment imposes upon us the obligation of a neutral posture, but nothing can prevent an interchange of sympathy at such a time between the people themselves. Mr. Chamberlain's words sound encouraging, but they are not cheering, and the present feeling on both sides of the Atlantic indicates the great part which the United States will play in the new world."

Mr. Chamberlain's speech in connection with the real trend of British policy, arising out of the Spanish war, of which I was able to send you an account on Thursday.

Such language, taken in conjunction with Lord Salisbury's recent speeches, and the context of Mr. Chamberlain's own speech, is interpreted in many quarters as a warning that diplomacy is nearly exhausted in some quarters of the globe. 
