

Russian Officials in Conference Re garding the Adoption of the Gregorian.

DECISION TO BE GIVEN IN 1903.

Other Orthodox States, Greece Roumania, Servia , Bulgaria, to Follow the Lead,

St. Petersburg, July 17.-Russia's mos

It is probable that conferences on th advisability of adopting the Gregorian calendar will be held intermittently calendar will be held intermittently until 1903, when the subject, having been fully discussed, will be ripe for decision.

The Greek and Russian calendars retain the old Roman style, which is defective, as the solar year consists of 365 days 5 hours 49 minutes, and not of 365 days 6 hours, as the Roman calendar makes it. To correct this, an intercalary day was added every third year. In the B. C. 8, this so-called correction went on until Augustus Caesar lordained that there should be no leap year for twelve years to correct the error.

be no leap year for twelve years to correct the error.

In the sixteenth century, the difference amounted to ten days, and to obviate this error, Pope Gregory ordained that the year 1582 should consist of only 355 days. To prevent further irregularity, he also invented the system at present in use in all countries except Russia and the Greek States, the calendars of which countries are always ten days behind the Gregorian.




