Trustees Would Double Accommodation for "Casuals" - Mayor Against Residents,

TO HOUSE OF INDUSTRY

\$30,000 FOR ADDITION

The request that the city contribute \$30,000 to enlarge the House of Industry so as to increase the accommo dation for "casual" inmates from 100 to 200 beds, was made by the trustees of the institution at a conference with the board of control yesterday. The mayor promised that the city architect The would prepare a plan of the proposed new addition, and that the board would consider it.

The visitors, for whom Archibald MacMurchy was chief spokesman, said that 100 beds were not enough, and that during February 60 more "casuals" had to be allowed to sleep nightly on the floor.

Mayor Oliver replied that the city didn't contribute from \$30,000 to \$35, 000 a year to the institution to lodge and feed inmates who stayed for periods of two or three months. The board had discovered several cases of this kind. He suggested that an institution for permanent inmates be established outside the city limits. The inmates would be able to contribute to their support by doing light farmng work.

trustees did not receive this prorosal favorably. They said the per-manent inmates were too aged to do any work, and that they would prefer to remain in the city, where they could be visited by friends.

Trustee H. R. Frankland said that of the \$35,000 voted this year, only \$2000 would be expended on the keep of the "indoor poor," the remaining expenses being borne by private subcription. There were 190 permanent

The trustees also suggested that the accommodation for casuals be increas-ed to 300 instead of 200 beds, but the mayor said if this were done there ould be an influx of the indigent from utside the city. Again the Septic Tanks.
