Venator, who lives in the rear, and his son Charlie, a draughtsman employed in the city hall, W. Hanley and a number of neighbors. Drawing his revolver and handing his baton to Hanley, Constable Smith, after surrounding the house with the neighbors, walked into the backyard of the house and up a narrow passage at the south side of the house. He was closely followed by Hanley.

The officer and Hanley had not proceeded far into the alley whon they saw the burglar crouching down in the corner, near the front of the house. Smith and Hanley were in such a position that they were clearly visible in the moonlight to the burglar, who was hidden from them in the shadow of the house.



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

This coal, in addition to charges for freight for carriage by defendants, was liable for freight on other roads, and for duty before it was taken possession of by defendants. The defendants assumed to seize for the entire amount, including these back charges. I find that the defendants did not have the consent of the plaintiff or the ore company to take the coal. The defendants are liable, and the measure of the damages is the value of the coals Judgment for plaintiff for \$448.83, without interest, and with costs. The action is for tort. The defendants are not entitled to set off their claim against the liquidator. They will no doubt prove against the company in the winding-up proceedings.

CHICAGO, March 4.-The Deering Coal Co. of Delaware, a \$5,000,000 corporation operating mines in Indiana and Illinois, was placed in the hands of a receiver to-day by Judge C. Kohlsaat, in the United States Circuit Court, on application of the Witt Mercantile Co., with a calim of \$2924, and Jackson K. Deering, owner of \$350,000 worth of the coal concern's stock. R. R. Hammond, president of the company, admitted that the corporation was in such financial straits as make a receivership necessary. It is declared that the coal company solvent, but that it is pressed by creditors to whom it owes a million dollars, and that it will be unable to meet the interest on its bonded indebt-edness. In the bill of complaint, it is alleged that various steel concerns owe the Deering Company \$215,000, which they refuse to pay becaus of differences arising between them and the coal company over damage calims.

The request that the city contribute \$30,000 to enlarge the House of Industry so as to increase the accommo dation for "casual" inmates from 100 to 200 beds, was made by the trustees of the institution at a conference with the board of control yesterday. The mayor promised that the city architect would prepare a plan of the proposed new addition, and that the board would consider it.

The visitors, for whom Archibald MacMurchy was chief spokesman, said that 100 beds were not enough, and that during February 60 more "casuals" had to be allowed to sleep nightly on

the floor. Mayor Oliver replied that the city didn't contribute from \$30,000 to \$35, 000 a year to the institution to lodge and feed inmates who stayed for periods of two or three months. board had discovered several cases of this kind. He suggested that an institution for permanent inmates be established outside the city limits. The inmates would be able to contribute to their support by doing light farmng work.

trustees did not receive this proosal favorably. They said the permanent inmates were too aged to do any work, and that they would prefer to remain in the city, where they could be visited by friends.

Trustee H. R. Frankland said that of the \$35,000 voted this year, only \$2000 would be expended on the keep of the "indoor poor," the remaining expenses being borne by private subcription. There were 190 permanent

The trustees also suggested that the accommodation for casuals be increased to 300 instead of 200 beds, but the mayor said if this were done there rould be an influx of the indigent from utside the city.




