

S. C. Hildreth said after the race at Belmont on Thursday that King James would be shipped to Toronto on Sunday or Monday to start in the race for the Toronto Cup, which he won a year ago. This means that the Plaudit horse will not go to the post in the Brooklyn Handicap on Tuesday, as the Toronto Cup will be decided on the same day. Mr. Hildreth's plan to ship King James here for the \$5000 race was one reason for his purchase of Fitz Herbert on Wednesday at an advance of \$10,000 over the price at which he sold him to John E. Madden last winter.
