RAPID RISE IN FLOUR IS SHOWN IN RETURN

Statement Deals With Soaring Prices in Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal.

At Winnipeg, commercial grades per barrel rose from \$3.40 in August to \$6.30 in December, and last night's from \$6.80 in May to \$9.50 in December. At Toronto, winter straight rose from \$5 in June to \$10 in November, and first spring patent's from \$6.50 in April to \$10.40 in November.

At Montreal the increase in straight rollers per barrel was from \$4.75 in June to \$8.75 in December, and first spring patent's from \$6.80 in April to \$10.45 in November.

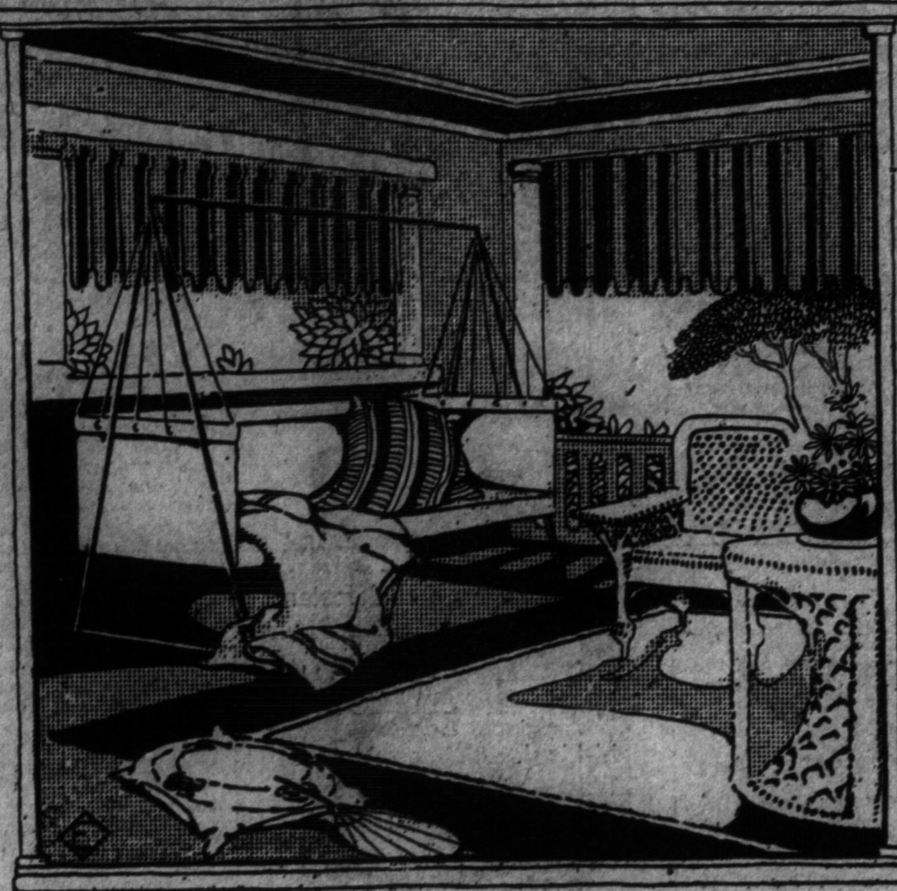

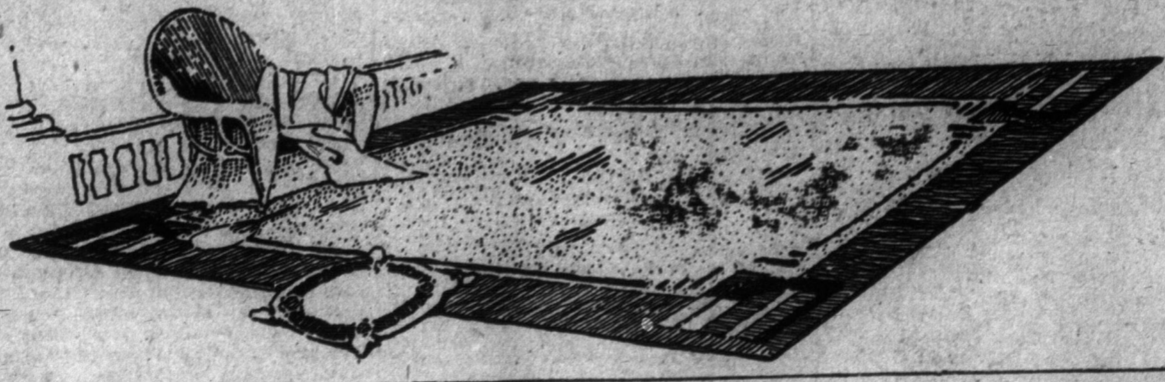

LOCAL AVIATOR KILLED ON THE SOMME FRONT

Flight-Lieut. Arthur C. Dissette Was Well-known Toronto Sportsman.

News of the death of Flight Lieut. Arthur C. Dissette was received in the cablegrams of yesterday from the admiralty by his brother, Frank Dissette, of the St. Charles Hotel. The young aviator, who was a well-known Toronto sportsman, was killed while on secret duty on the Somme front. He joined the Royal Naval Air Service in November, 1915, receiving preliminary training aboard H.M.S. Nobe at Halifax.

After a brief furlough in Toronto he left for England in February of the following year, and has since seen service on many fronts. He participated in the recent raid on Freiburg, which was carried out as a reprisal for the sinking of the Lusitania.

"In stating grounds you claim an exemption you use one of the following terms: If you claim to be an active, legislative, or judicial officer of the state or nation, name your office and say whether it is an office of the state or nation. If you claim to be a member of a religious sect whose creed forbids its members to participate in war of any form, simply name the sect.

"If you are employed in the transmission of the United States mails or as an artificer or workman in an armory, arsenal, or navy-yard of the United States, or if you are a mariner employed in the sea service of any citizen or merchant within the United States, so state.

"If you are a felon or otherwise morally deficient and desire to claim exemption on that ground, state your ground briefly. If you claim physical disability, state that briefly. If you claim exemption on any other ground, state your ground briefly.

"This further instruction is given by General Crowder in connection with his claim for exemption on account of dependent relatives.

"Consider your answer thoughtfully. If it is true that there is another man than your own which you alone have a duty to feed, do not let your military ardor interfere with the wish of the nation to reduce war's misery to a minimum.

"On the other hand, unless the person you have in mind is solely dependent on you, do not hide behind petitions or children.

"What constitutes a natural-born citizen, a naturalized citizen, and an alien is defined thus: "A natural-born citizen is one born in the United States, Hawaii, or Alaska. If born in Porto Rico, the person is a natural born unless of alien parents.

"A naturalized citizen is one who has taken out his final citizenship papers. Those who have merely declared their intention of becoming citizens or taken out "first papers" are "declarants." All who do not fall within these three classifications are aliens.

"Alien enemies will be required to register, but undoubtedly will not be drafted, states the guide.

"Declarants, it is inferred, may be drafted, unless they are of enemy birth.

"Question 10, 'Married or single (which)?' and 'race (specify which)?' does not ask whether you were once married, but whether you are married now." In answering as to race, those registering are to state briefly whether Caucasian, Mongolian, Negro, Malay or Indian.

"Citizens living in foreign countries may register through the nearest American consul."

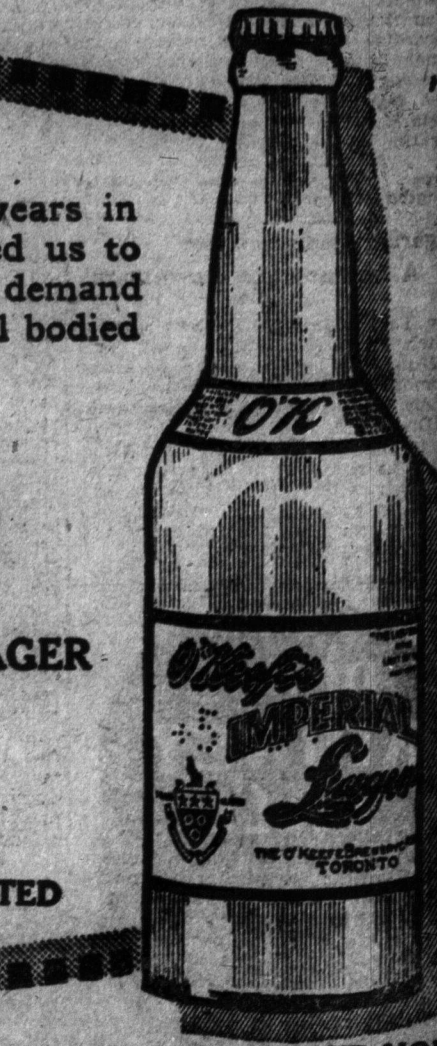

A factory in Aubervilliers, a suburb near Paris, exploded with such force that nothing was left of the structure of the factory itself, while the roofs of nearby buildings were carried away.

The Liberals have candidates already in the field for all seats excepting where the elections are deferred, while the Conservatives have their men named in all but two or three constituencies. In addition there are some five non-partisan league candidates, a labor candidate in Saskatoon and also two or three independents in the field. D. J. Sykes, Swift Current, is the non-partisan Liberal and Conservative candidate.

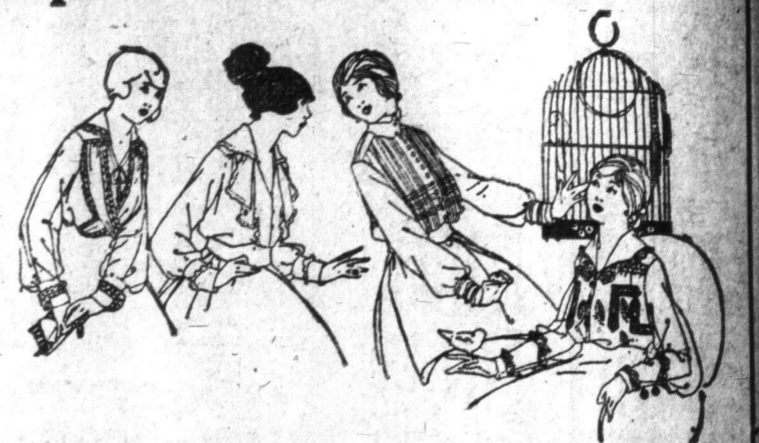
