The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is observed on the last Sabbath in January, April, July and October.

The Session meets in the Vestry the last Tuesday of every month, or at the call of the Moderator.

The Committee of Management meets in the Managers' Room on the third Wednesday of each month, after prayer meeting.

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Address of the Bession.

It is with feelings of much thankfulness for the past year, and of hope for that which is before us, that the Session of St. James Square Congregation send forth this their annual address to those over whom they have been placed in charge. It is probably not too much to say that, so far as man can judge, the past has been a year second in prosperity to none since the formation of the congregation. The attendance upon the Sabbath services has steadily increased, as also, perhaps somewhat more slowly, that upon the weekly prayer meetings; while the activity of the members of the church in every good work has increased in a degree which must fill every Christian heart with much joy and gratitude to the Lord who works in us "both to will and to do," to whose grace alone must be ascribed all the glory.

The comparative tables on pp. 51-53 give the facts which illustrate these remarks. The deaths and removals of the past year must be regarded as few when we consider the size of the congregation. Of the five who have departed hence "to be with Christ," one, Mrs. Buik, was one of the eight whose names appear on the Communicants' Roll Book as first received as members of the Gould St. Church, in 1853. Mr. Robert Wilson's name appears but little later on the same first page of the roll. The Rev. George Lawrence had also been a member of the congregation for many years, since he became unable longer to engage in stated preaching, and had greatly endeared himself to all who knew him. Mr. Wm. S. King had been with us only a few months, but was known to a few as a beloved brother of the Rev. Dr. King, the former pastor. These were all in middle life or advanced age; but, as if to remind us that no age is exempt from the call of death, Emma Rollo was called away while in all the attractiveness of early girlhood. But both she and her friend Ida Carson, who was, by her last sickness, prevented from professing her faith in Christ, departed this life, no less than those in ripest years, in peace and hope, trusting in the love and merits of the crucified Saviour. The loss is theirs who miss them here; for each of these departed ones, we rejoice to know that death was eternal gain.

rejoice to know that death was etchnar gunn Of the members who were with us at the beginning of the year, thirty-three at their own request have received certificates of disjunction. Of these, seven left us to join the new Bloor St. congregation, and six were dismissed to the Parkdale Presbyterian Church; seven certificates were given to ladies who had married, and so removed from the bounds of the congregation. Of the remainder all but three live no longer in the city. The names of three Knox College students were dropped from the roll, as having completed their studies and entered the ministry.

Deducting these losses, the net increase of the congregation during the past year, as appears from the preceding tables, has been, in the number of families, 25 per cent.; in the number of single persons not connected with such families, 50 per cent.; and in the number of communicants, to which there have been 162 additions, 24 per cent. As the Managers have remarked in their report, this large accession has now very nearly filled the church building; only fifty-four sittings remain to be allocated, a number, it will be observed, only greater by five than the number of families who joined us in the past year. Whether this calls for any action looking toward enlargement of the building, is a matter that we have in the near future to consider.

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Normal School. The large number of such in regular attendance on the Sabbath services is a matter of much gratification, we are assured, not only to the Session, but to all the congregation. In the latter part of the year, at the request of the students of the University Y.M.C.A., the pastor began a course of week-day Bible readings on various evangelistic topics, which have been exceedingly well attended, not only by students of the University, but also of Knox and other Colleges. The interest in the evangelization of the world which has developed so much in the past few months among the students in our colleges, should make itself felt for good upon our whole congregation. In this connection attention may well be called to the marked blessing upon Christian nurture at home and in the Sabbath School, as evidenced by the large number of the young people from the Sabbath School in the church who have during the past year made profession of their faith in Christ, and taken their places at His table: a number nearly half of all admitted by profession of faith. And yet there remain many who worship with us with unfailing regularity who have never yet taken this step and confessed themselves for Christ. What may be hindering each one, is known to themselves and to the Lord. We may say, however, with confidence to all such, that the unreadiness is all on their part, and not on the part of the Heavenly Father or the blessed Saviour. May many from the congregation, in these coming months, make that decision for Christ upon which turns the question for each one of us, of eternal blessing or of eternal pain.

Even more gratifying than the increase in numbers is the increase, even greater in proportion, in the activity of Christian work during the past year. The work begun near the beginning of the last year in connection with the Sabbath Schools in Wilton Avenue and across the Don has prospered in a degree which equals the best hopes of those who entered upon it, and abundantly justifies the wisdom of the congregation in undertaking it. These two vigorous schools have brought under

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instruction 255 children, very few of whom before these were started were seen in such a place. The twentynine teachers and other officers of these schools have laboured most faithfully, in teaching and in visitation, aided, moreover, by the faithful and systematic service of many ladies who have regularly visited, distributed tracts, and in various ways sought to aid those who were in need of help, in matters temporal or spiritual. So also the work in the Sabbath School has been effectively supported by a Mothers' Meeting, by prayer meetings, and gospel services, both on Sabbath and weekday evenings, in which there has been often a marked degree of interest. It is not strange to observe that already we have been privileged to receive into the fellowship of the Church several who are seals of the Master's blessing on this faithful work. In this connection, the Session would express their sense of the excellent service that has been rendered by Mr. J. M. Scott, of Knox College, who, since last spring, has been engaged under appointment of the Session in active supervision of the work in those sections of the city where our Sabbath Schools are placed. Until the beginning of the college session in October, Mr. Scott had charge of the work on both sides of the Don; but from that time his labours have been restricted to the east side of the river. The congregation are greatly indebted to the very efficient help that Mr. Scott has afforded.

No little help, in an unostentatious way, has been given by a few of the young men of the church, who have formed themselves into an association to aid the pastor in work among the young men. By a careful visitation and in other ways an effort has been made to reach some of the many young men coming into the city as strangers, and help them to feel at home among us. The boys too of the church have tried to do their part by forming a Boys' Missionary Society, in which a large number of our boys are members and take a hearty interest. This new association is specially commended to the sympathy and practical support of the parents among us; and this, most of all, because in this way our ther also rais suc Τ thro to r one effo mee wha uni affo mig gift ing ma on this me] rea suc Thgro Sa sib ne siz the ne to th in of flc ch

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our boys may be made to feel that the church is for them also, and that the Master has a work which they also may do. Quite apart from what money they may raise for missionary purposes, the educational value of such an organization is very great.

The Young Men's Prayer Meeting has been kept up through the past year as usual. We are glad to be able to report that while the attendance has not been what one could desire, yet of late, as the result of some special effort to promote the interest and profitableness of the meeting, the attendance and interest has been somewhat improved. Not to speak of the spiritual benefit of united prayer, this meeting has the special value of affording a place in which Christian young men who might feel an insuperable diffidence in exercising their gifts in address or in public prayer in the general meeting of the congregation, may, with less embarrassment, make a beginning in duties so important in their bearing on their Christian usefulness. We earnestly desire that this view of the case may commend itself to the young men in the membership of our church.

If work for Christ is one evidence of Christian life, readiness to contribute of our means to the support of such work is another and no less important evidence. The Session are glad to see that there is evidence of growth in this respect also. The rapid growth of the Sabbath School on the east of the Don, and the impossibility of securing adequate accommodation, made it necessary to purchase and build a chapel of moderate size, which was ready for occupation on the last day of the year. The hearty readiness with which the money necessary for the purchase of the lot was subscribed, not to speak of the several hundred dollars required for the current expenses of the schools, has been exceedingly gratifying. In addition to this, the largest part of the money required to meet the cancelling of the floating debt of the church has been already no less cheerfully pledged.

The fact deserves to be noted that of the contributions for benevolent purposes, over \$544 were contributed by

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the scholars who attend our Sabbath Schools. The total increase in contributions reported for the past year for both congregational and outside purposes is 38 per cent. over last year, an increase, it will be observed, slightly greater than the percentage of increase in the congregation. This increase, however, is very unequally distributed among different objects. Thus, exclusive of the \$1,939 given for the purchase of a lot for the chapel for our Sabbath School and other work across the Don, the increase in contributions for miscellaneous purposes of a missionary character has been 725 per cent.; or, if that sum be included, then 1881 per cent. The increase in the ordinary revenue of the congregation for current expenses has been 26 per cent.; while at the other extreme we find the contributions for the Schemes of the Church, for which contributions have increased only 3 per cent. The Session would express the earnest desire and hope that, now that the city mission work which has drawn so largely upon the liberality of our people the past year is well established, we shall see a much more considerable increase in the contributions of the congregation to the Schemes of the Church, especially to the Home and Foreign Mission work. The former may be said to have reached something like a crisis as regards its financial support; while, as regards the Foreign work, no intelligent and thoughtful Christian can fail to see in the unprecedented movement among the students on both sides the Atlantic-nowhere more conspicuous than among ourselves-a most clear and unmistakable call from our ascended Lord to corresponding self-sacrifice and liberality in the support of those who are willing to go where most of us cannot go. One and another of our leading churches has signified to the Foreign Mission Committee their willingness to become responsible, in addition to their present contributions, for the support of a missionary to the heathen world. It is to be hoped that we shall be effectively provoked by the zeal of such to go and do likewise. That the congregation, in its present condition, is abundantly able to do this, can hardly admit of a doubt. All that is needed is a new baptism of the Holy Ghost, a new and powerfully constrai Lore unce T of th men Asso mar tain thin sens so 1 the us, com T vea of a that whi fror per acq no the ma Ι the kin mu WO nev wh ma sec dui tio end " (ye the straining view of the power and grace of our blessed Lord and Saviour. For that we shall do well to pray unceasingly.

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The Session feels that it is but expressing the feeling of the whole congregation when they make appreciative mention of the excellent service of the Young People's Association of the church in sustaining, and with such marked efficiency and success, a series of social entertainments during the present season. Apart from something of this kind, it is hard to see how any general sense of mutual acquaintance could be maintained in so large a city congregation; and especially in view of the large numbers who have but lately come among us, this promotion of friendly Christian fellowship becomes of no small importance.

The Session, in revising the roll at the close of the year, have been unable to discover the present residence of a very few of the members. It will be remembered, that, according to the present rule of the Session, names which remain unaccounted for two years, are removed from the regular roll of the church. It is hoped that all persons who leave us will therefore be particular to acquaint the Session with the fact, and if they have no intention of returning to our bounds, will take with them letters of disjunction to such other church as they may find convenient.

In closing, the Session would urge upon all, as upon their own hearts, their remembrance of that law of the kingdom which our Lord has declared: that "to whom much is given, of him will be much required." The words apply to us as individuals and as a church, and never more than at the beginning of this present year, when we have received, as a congregation, such a marked strengthening and enlargement. May our consecration and self-devotion to the adorable Redeemer during the coming year be in some good degree proportioned to the blessing that we have received. For our encouragement, we have the sure and faithful promise, "God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that ye always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound therein, to the praise and glory of God."

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ABSTRACT OF

Minutes of Congregational Meeting.

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TORONTO, January 18, 1888.

The thirty-fourth annual meeting of the congregation was held this evening, according to intimation from the pulpit on the two preceding Sabbaths.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. Dr. Kellogg, who also reviewed at some length the steady growth of the church, both in additions to its membership and the increase in the amounts contributed for the various Schemes of the Church.

Mr. Henry W. Darling was then called to the Chair, and Mr. W. E. Long appointed Secretary of the meeting.

The minutes of last congregational meeting were read and confirmed. The Secretary then read the Managers' Report and also the Treasurer's Statement.

It was moved by Mr. R. Kilgour, seconded by Mr. Hugh Millar, "That the Report and Treasurer's Statement be received and adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer, for the manner in which they have discharged their duties." Carried.

Nominations for Managers were then received, and the vote having been taken, the following were declared elected :-- Messrs. John Paton, W. D. McIntosh, Robt. Darling, Alex. Nairn, R. C. Steele, and A. R. Christie. It was moved by Mr. Wm. Kerr, seconded by Mr. R.

Carrie, "That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Douglas, the leader of the Choir, and as a token of appreciation of his valuable services the Managers are hereby authorized to pay him

the sum of three hundred dollars." Carried. Moved by Mr. John Paton, seconded by Mr. R. C. Steele, "That thanks are due and are hereby tendered to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance

rendered throughout the year." Carried. Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Carrie,

"That Messrs. Wm. Gray and R. M. Gray be appointed

Auditors for the ensuing year." Carried. Dr. Kellogg reminded the meeting that the new school-

house across the Don was as yet without a name. It was therefore moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Kilgour, "That the naming of the new chapel be left to Rev. Dr. Kellogg and Messrs. Wm. Kerr and

Thos. Kirkland." Carried. The above-named gentlemen were also appointed a committee for preparing and printing the annual report.

After a vote of thanks to the Chairman the meeting

was closed with the benediction pronounced by Rev. Dr. Kellogg.



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Revenue.

"Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."—I Cor. xvi. 2.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES are made in three ways: (1) Weekly Offerings, in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to any one.

ENVELOPES are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. Those occupying sittings are expected to contribute according to their means.



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Managers' Report.

In their Annual Report for 1886, the Managers took occasion to say they felt that "this year would mark the commencement of a new era of prosperity for the congregation, spiritual and temporal." It is extremely gratifying to record that their hopes in this respect have been very fully met.

The first complete year of the pastorate of the Rev. Dr. Kellogg has witnessed a steady growth in the number of members, in the attendance at all the services, and in the interest evinced in every department of congregational effort. It would be strange indeed if it were not so, for the pulpit ministrations have been of the most instructive kind; and the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ has been preached to us with freshness and power such as to edify and attract, and to lay upon each member and adherent deep responsibility for the extent to which they have profited by it. Truly the pastor has been a shepherd to the flock; and all his duties have been performed with zeal and acceptability to the entire membership. With added numbers and greater consecration of heart and substance to the work of the Master, we may look for yet larger blessing and success as a congregation, being careful to cultivate that harmony and cordiality which have characterized our association in times past, and never more so than in the year just closed.

At a meeting of the congregation held in the early autumn, it was determined, in view of the promising nature of the mission work on the east side of the Don, to

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acquire a lot and erect a Mission Hall thereon; and that for this purpose, as well as to pay off the floating debt on the Building Fund of the Church, the sum of \$5,000 should be solicited from the congregation. A partial canvass elicited a hearty response; some \$4,500 has already been subscribed, of which \$1,939 has been paid, and the balance will be forthcoming, without doubt, as soon as an opportunity is afforded the other members who have not yet contributed. For the lot \$2,600 was paid, and the estimated cost of the completed building, a neat roughcast structure, is \$2,000 or \$2,200. A loan of \$2,000 at 6 per cent. has been obtained, secured by mortgage on the property, and it is proposed to make a collection each month at the prayer meeting to provide for this interest, and other expenses in connection with the mission work.

The floating debt upon the Church Building Fund has been paid off; and the interest upon the mortgage debt of \$15,000, at 5 per cent. per annum, will not be onerous to meet out of the ordinary revenue.

From the Treasurer's abstract and the comparative statement of Revenue and Expenditure accompanying, the substantial increase in the ordinary Revenue of about \$1,829, as compared with last year, will be noticed. It is now about 60 per cent. more than it was two years ago. The ordinary Expenditure has increased about \$400, when compared with 1886.

The statement shews that we closed the year with a balance due the Treasurer of \$1,563.58, but it is confidently expected that the close of the current year will find all the outlay in connection with our new and promising mission enterprises fully met, and the balance once more on the right side.

The seating capacity of the church, as the members are aware, is about 1,000, when all the pews and the choir gallery are filled. The pew book shows the allocation of 946 sittings, including those reserved for students, which have been fully occupied during the college sessions. We have come to the point, therefore, when it may be said the church is full; and although the

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changes constantly taking place in a shifting population like ours, make more or less room for new-comers, an addition of twenty or thirty pews in the body of the,

church would be most acceptable. A new infant class-room, a better subdivision of the

space underneath the Sabbath School room, and an improved system of heating and ventilating the entire church edifice, are matters the Managers would gladly see accomplished; and they have only been restrained from attempting some of them by considerations of prudence, feeling that the delay of a year or so would better indicate what the full requirements are likely to

be, so that useless expenditure may be avoided. In conclusion, the Managers desire to express the

obligation they and the congregation are under to the Treasurer, for the faithful and unwearied discharge of the onerous duties of his office, continued without interruption for over twenty years. The services rendered in this way and in other departments of the church work, by Mr. John Y. Reid, constitute a claim upon the appreciation of the congregation meriting a generous

In submitting the usual annual report of the Sabbath School, we have at the outset to acknowledge with thankfulness to Almighty God'all the goodness and mercy shown towards us these past twelve months. The attendance and interest, we are pleased to say, has not lessened, and the gracious influences of the Holy Spirit through the Word have so quickened the heart of one and another amongst us, that the year now closing has again witnessed a very considerable number of the scholars coming forward to the Lord's table, and in this public way avowing themselves to be His disciples. No less than twenty-seven young persons have thus declared for themselves, "I am the Lord's." Surely, if anything should gladden and encourage the heart of pastor or teacher it is the fact that the "good seed of the Word" is finding the good soil, and that by and by the good fruit may be looked for "in some thirty, in

some sixty, and in some a hundred-fold." The number of names on the different class rolls at

present is as follows :----

The number of male teachers on the roll is fifteen, and of female, sixteen; the total, thirty-one. The number of both teachers and scholars is the same as last year. Whilst sickness has not prevailed to any very alarming extent during the year, two of our number have been called home by the Good Shepherd. These were: Ida Carson, who died on the 27th June, and Emma Rollo, who died on the 25th September last. Both of those dear girls had attended the school faithfully for a number of years. Their teachers, as they met them in the class and in their homes, found that their trust and triumph in life and in death was in the Lord Jesus Christ alone; and y the e them end c land real,

And so it was that as the end drew near, and as they beheld the light of the better land dawn upon them, and the love of the Saviour so real, they were constrained to say:

Jesus, lover of my soul, Let me to Thy bosom fly, While the nearer waters roll, While the tempest still is high. Hide me, O, my Saviour, hide, Till the storm of life is past; Safe into the haven guide, O receive my soul at last.

Mr. Houston, having moved to the western part of the city, was obliged to resign his charge of the Young Men's Bible Class. Dr. McPhedran, we are pleased to say, kindly agreed to take his place.

Principal Kirkland has still the care of the Young Women's Class which he has conducted so faithfully and for so many years. The subject for study in both classes this winter is the Acts of the Apostles. The scheme of lessons for the intermediate classes during the past year was the International, and which has proved for so many years entirely satisfactory.

The school was addressed by the Rev. Dr. Kellogg on the 13th February, the subject being "Missions in China." On the last Sabbath in March our pastor reviewed the lessons for the previous three months; and on the last Sabbath in June, instead of the usual review of the lessons, gave a most instructive address from the three last verses in the last chapter of Matthew. As a substitute for the review of lessons on the last Sabbath in September, he addressed the school on the questions previously given out for answer by the scholars:

I. What does God think of Idolatry?

2. Have the heathen any excuse for their idolatry?

3. Can the heathen be saved by their own religions ?

4. What, then, does Christ command us to do for them?

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Letters have been received and read to the school from time to time from Willie Drainville, the pupil attending the school at Pointe-aux-Trembles, for whose support and education our school annually gives fifty dollars. The reports concerning this young lad are very encouraging and give good reason to hope that, if spared, he will be a faithful witness for Christ amongst his

fellow-countrymen in Lower Canada. On the last Sabbath of the year-Christmas Day-

our pastor preached to the Sabbath School and Bible Class and the young people of the congregation a most excellent and appropriate sermon. The text, "Thanks be to God for his unspeakable gift," led many to think, specially at that season of the year, of the great love of God for sinners, in the gift of His only and well-beloved Son-a gift offered, simply to be taken, unspeakable in its value, and bringing those who receive it at once into

the enjoyment of God's saving grace. The meeting held for devotional exercises immediately after the dismissal of the school is still continued, and has proved, as in past years, a season of blessed fellow-

ship. Meetings for business connected with the school have been held from time to time as found necessary, and have been on the whole well attended.

In the month of May last certain districts bounded by Yonge, Shuter, Jarvis and Carlton Streets were marked out and thoroughly visited by the teachers, with the object of finding any children who were not attending any Sabbath School, and inviting such to come to our school. It was found, however, that there were but very few such children. A few names, however, were added to our rolls. When it is remembered that St. James Square is surrounded with Sabbath Schoolseast, west, north, south-it need not be a matter of wonder that much increase is not possible. It is plainly our duty, however, to see that no child is uncared for in our immediate neighbourhood that may be brought under the influence of Sabbath School instruction. this, doubtless, the teachers will give heed from time to time. With regard to the children whose parents are mer at a exp

The anniversary of the Sabbath School was held on the 30th December, 1886. There was a very large attendance. The invitation extended to the scholars and their parents, and to the friends of the Don Mission, and the Wilton Avenue schools, was very generally accepted. Everything passed off pleasantly, one of the happy features of the evening's enjoyment being a very fine display of views from the magic lantern. The Don and Wilton Avenue Mission Schools also joined with our school in the excursion made last summer to Long Branch. The 25th of June was a delightful day; and besides the large number of scholars and teachers a goodly number of the scholars' parents, with friends of the congregation and Mission Schools, were present. All returned home greatly pleased and thankful for the day's recreation together.

The Infant Class, with the Intermediate Classes, have been, as usual, supplied with the *Children's Friend* and other papers every month. The library now contains about 600 volumes, some fifty new books were added to it during the past year. The school is still very much indebted to Miss Douglas, who continues to fill the place of organist which she has so faithfully occupied for many years past. The singing in the school has improved considerably during the past year under the leadership of Mr. Lowden, assisted by some of the female teachers and Mr. A. Rogers.

In concluding this brief report, not one of us, we are sure, is ready to say we have done all that we could, or that what has been done has been always well done. It is in conformity with this law that an inspired apostle declares, "None of us liveth unto himself." To live for self is opposed to the very genius of Christ's religion. "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing." If the inward life is lost in outward appearance, of what avail are those sudden and occasional impulses which are put forth under the force of excitement or the pressure of circumstances? Good deeds, when uninspired by the life of love, are rather the convulsions of approaching death. And for a Christian to live to himself where everything without him is ministering to his life and health and joy, is to deny the very genius of the gospel. Christianity

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is love—universal, unbounded love—embracing within itself the present and the everlasting interests of man. And the more we partake of its spirit, the more entire will be our consecration—the more unreserved will be our activity and our service. Our happiness will consist in doing good, and our minds will rest with complacency in the end which we contemplate. For if God is glorified, and man is blessed by us, this will satisfy our idea of life on earth; we shall go down to the grave with joy and triumph, and wait for our next appearing at the resurrection of the just.

The history of the work in connection with the Wilton Avenue Mission Sabbath School during the past year has been most encouraging. The number of scholars on the roll has increased from eighty-five at the beginning of the year to 145 at its close. The average at numb attend they h house

than c labour from] age attendance for the year was eighty-two; the largest number present at any time was 120. The faithful attendance of the teachers has been most marked, and they have been most efficiently aided by the house to house work of the lady visitors in that part of the city.

The collections for the year from the various classes amounted to the encouraging sum of \$68.00, which was designated for the General Assembly's Mission Work in China.

Auxiliary to this Sabbath School work, meetings have been sustained in the Sabbath School Hall on the Sabbath and Thursday evenings, as also Mothers' meetings on Thursday afternoons. The average attendance on the Sabbath evenings has been about fifty; on the Thursday evening meeting, about twenty. These have been seasons of spiritual refreshing to friends in the vicinity, as well as to the workers in the Mission; and the earnest and sympathetic attention of those attending has been matter of frequent remark by those in charge.

The Mothers' meeting has been under the charge of Mrs. McLaughlin, assisted by several other ladies. The average attendance has been about sixteen. This has met a real need, and without doubt has been of great service in connection with our labour in that part of the city.

Most valuable, too, has been the service rendered by the ladies visiting the families in the district; through those who have been engaged in this work, tracts have been regularly distributed and cases of need discovered and helped. In organizing and supervising much of the Mission work and the conduct of the meetings, all feel greatly indebted to Mr. J. M. Scott, of Knox College, who by appointment of the Session engaged in this Mission work in the Wilton Avenue District until the first of October. All regret that it was found necessary for him from that time to confine his labours to the Mission work of our church on the other side of the Don.

In all these ways doubtless far more has been done than can be represented by any statistics. The faithful labour of all these workers is "with the Lord," and will from Him receive a reward at His coming.

The labours of Mr. J. McP. Scott, of Knox College, have been much appreciated, and, united with the labours of the district visitors, have been productive of much good. Our earnest prayer is, that by the blessing of God, a flourishing congregation may soon be found worshipping in the commodious and comfortable chapel now erected on the corner of Gerrard Street and Bolton Avenue. "Truly the Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are glad."

The contributions of the school for missions up to the end of the year was \$40.45, which sum, by vote of the school, was equally divided between the Assembly's Home Mission Work and the Knox College Missionary Society.

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The Schemes of the Church.

The Lord has taught us plainly in His Gospel that we may not in our work for Him stop with the care of our own church or of those more immediately about us; but, if we will be loyal to Him, must aim at carrying and sending the Gospel to the destitute in our own land and in all nations. For practical purposes our General Assembly has divided this work, committed to our trust by Christ, into several departments under the charge of special Committees, which are commonly spoken of as "the Schemes of the Church." The obligation to contribute to the support of these, as the Lord may prosper us, rests upon the Lord's last command, and from the responsibility no member of Christ's Church can be

These "Schemes" are divided by the General Assemabsolved.

bly as follows:

I. FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

1. Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, Trinidad, S.A., the New Hebrides, our own Indian Tribes in the North-West, Formosa, and, from the present year, a new Mission in Honan, N.

2. The General Assembly of 1886 directed that a place China. among the "Schemes of the Church" be assigned to Jewish Missions. It may be said with regard to this work, as yet new to most, that although comparatively little has been done for the scattered nation, that little has been remarkably blessed, and the outlook among them has not been so bright for centuries. Let us remember that it is written that "the Jews are beloved for their fathers' sakes," and that at last "all Israel shall be saved," and that "the receiving of them " shall be "life from the dead." to the world.

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II. HOME MISSION WORK

has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the three following departments:

1. The Home Mission Committee seeks to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellowcountrymen, who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain them.

2. It is the special object of the Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends to raise the salaries of the Ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$700 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the Congregations who need such help.

3. The work of *French Evangelization* seeks to bring the Word of God to the large French-Catholic population in our Eastern Provinces, and so, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from that bondage of superstition and subjection to the priesthood, in which Rome everywhere and always seeks to keep her votaries.

4. The Church and Manse Building Fund, as the phrase indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

III. EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Divinity Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important and fundamental than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, at home and abroad, especially in these days of so rapidlyadvancing knowledge and widely opening doors. It should need no argument to commend this work to the sympathies of all our members.

IV. THE FUNDS FOR AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS, AND FOR MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church, by contributing to their support when by sickness or old age they are disabled from longer service, or

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in the congre-

gation the following organizations: 1. The ladies' Murray Mitchell Auxiliary, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the

Western Branch of the Canada Presbyterian Church. The Helpful Gleaners' Mission Band, an organization

of the young ladies of the Church, working and contributing for the same end as the last named.

3. The Wayside Gatherers is an association of the

girls in the congregation for the same purpose. 4. The Boys' Missionary Society, as the words indi-

cate, is an association of the boys of the congregation for the purpose of giving and receiving information as to the work of missions, and helping, as they may be

able, with their contributions.

5. The Missionary Association of the congregation is an association whose work it is to secure and collect contributions to all the Schemes of the Church from all families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions to their support are asked of all members and adherents of the Church. Collectors are appointed for each Elder's District to visit each month all families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one will decide as in the presence of our Lord how much they ought to give each month to these purposes, and act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's wish is given the funds received by the collectors are annually allocated to the several Schemes in the proportion suggested by the General Assembly. But whenever a contributor may express a desire that his special gift should be assigned to a particular object, the wish will be regarded in the distribution of the funds. If any should be passed by in the collector's calls, they will kindly intimate the fact, with their wish to contribute, to the pastor or to Mr. R. Darling, Rosedale.
