Savage Teutons BombTwo Hospitals On Verdun Front

Ten Wounded Men, a Woman Nurse and Nineteen Male Nurses Killed; Wounded Germans Were Among Patients

On the French front, Aug. 28—(By the Associated Press) — Incendiary bombs dropped by two German aviators on two hospitals behind Verdun on Sunday evening killed ten wounded men, one woman nurse nad nineteen trained male nurses. They wounded fortynine male nurses and inflicted further injuries on patients suffering from wounds received in battle, many of whom rushed naked into nearby fields in an attempt to find shelter from the bombs which were being rained down. Meanwhile the German aviators circled about in the air for half an hour, firing their machine guns at hospital orderlies who were endeavoring to extinguish the flames. The High Commissioner for New Zealand recently made a statement regarding the frozen meat trade of the Dominion, his object being to clear New Zealand, and incidentally Australian farmers, ship-owners, and agents, from unfair charges of profiteering. Whatever justification the British public may have for its acceptable on this score the cause for cusations on this score, the cause for complaint must be looked for nearer home, not overseas. In the early stages of the war, the British government acquired control of the supplies of both New Zealand lamb and mutton, and Australian beef and mutton. The meat from both sources was commandeered primarily so as to ensure an adequate and regular supply for the British armies, and to this end it was necessary to keep up a considerable reserve, in case of accidents of loss or delay due to submarine warfare, only a certain quantity being released from time to time for civilian consumption. The prices paid to the New Zealand farmers are: lamb 61-2d. per lb., and mutton 47-8d. per lb. After paying the necessary charges for transit, cold necessary charges for transit, cold storage, insurance, etc., the meat is sold to the wholesaler by government agents, who receive a maximum commission of two per cent., and the prices at which the meat is sold by the wholesaler to the retailer are:—lamb 101-2d. per lb., mutton 9d. per lb, whereby the wholesaler's profits are not allowed to exceed 1-2d. per lb. Once the meat passes into the retailer's hands, it is at present beyond government control; but up to that stage profiteering is impossible."

Britich Gained More Ground In Their Attack Yesterday

London, Aug. 22—The British troops attacking fiercely again today, have captured important strategic positions for a mile along the Ypres-Menin road, to a depth of nearly a third of a mile, and further to the north carried forward their front about a half a mile over an extent of two and are helf miles. over an extent of two and one-half miles.

The fighting, according to the offiial report from British head-quarters tonight, was of the most desperate nature, the prisoners taken bearing a small ratio to the losses inflicted on the Germans.

The text of the statement reads: "Successful operations were undertaken by our troops this morning to the east and northeast of Ypres for the capture of a series of strong points and fortified farms lying a few hundred yards in front of our positions astride the Ypres-Menin road, and between the

Ypres-Roulers railway and Langemarck.

"Bitter fighting has taken place at all points. The enemy again launched repeated counter-attacks, which suffered heavy losses from

our artillery and machine gun fire. HIGH GROUND CARRIED IN BITTER FIGHT.

"The struggle was particularly fierce in the neighborhood of the Ypres-Menin road, where the enemy fought desperately to retain command of the high ground. Here our line has been advanced to a depth

of about 500 yards on a front of about a mile. "A position giving important observation to the eastward was captured by us, and our troops established themselves in the western portion of Inverness Copse. Further north our line has been carried forward on a front of two and a half miles to a greater depth of over

"The garrisons of the captured farms and strong points resisted with the greatest stubbornness. In many cases isolated positions were only reduced after fighting lasting throughout the greater part of the

"In these operations we captured over 250 prisoners, but by reason of the obstinate nature of the fighting the prisoners taken bear

more than a usually small proportion to the total losses inflicted.

"The number of prisoners taken by us in the course of yesterday's fighting in the neighborhood of Lens is 194, bringing the total in this neighborhood since the morning of Aug. 15 to 1,378. In the same period we also captured in this area 34 machine guns and 13 trench mortars, so far counted.

"Yesterday there was again great activity in the air on both sides. Severe fighting took place. Twelve German airplanes were brought down by our machines. Five others were brought down out of control. Twelve of our airplanes are missing."




