





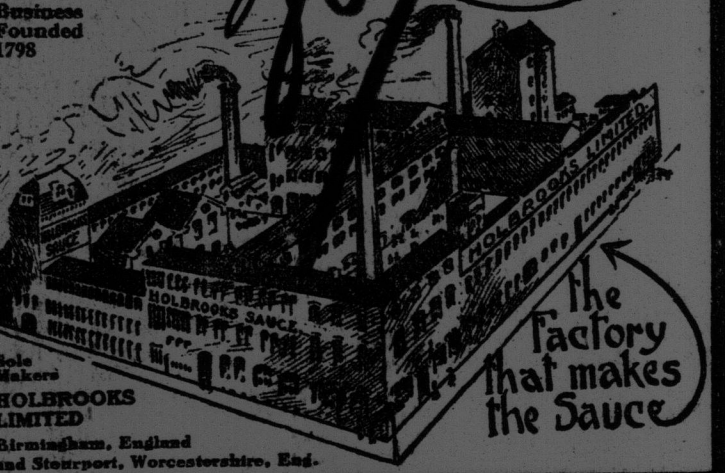

### IN PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—In the House of Commons today, Col. Sam Hughes criticized Dr. J. A. Macdonald of the Toronto Globe and Rev. Mr. Milne of Ottawa and was rebuffed by A. C. Macdonnell, Conservative, who fired his "blunders on religion and dogmatism." Others spoke and altogether from both sides of the House Col. Hughes received a cold shower.

Hon. Mr. Graham reported that an I. C. E. employe who failed to provide special rates arranged for a Conservative picnic last summer had been fined and reprimanded.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux, on the labor estimate, said more than \$10,000,000 had been saved to Canada in four years by the operation of the industrial disputes navigation act.

The delegation yesterday in reference to reciprocity were mostly from the Niagara peninsula.

Sir Wilfrid made the reply for the Canadian government. He said that they had come too late. There had been a delegation of farmers from all parts of Canada before Christmas urging free trade in agricultural products of all kinds and the government had given heed to their request. The truck growers and fruit men had not raised their voices in protest. The Canadian representatives had gone to Washington and had made an agreement which would be for the benefit of the country as a whole, though it might pinch its parts. However, some classes had to make sacrifices for the general good and he commended this sentiment to the delegation today.

Sir Wilfrid's answer is taken as another evidence of the determination of the Canadian government to live up to the terms of the Washington bargain to the letter.

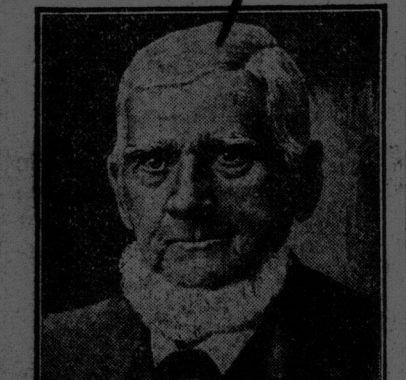

"Money wasted," "outrage," "shame and disgrace." These are some of the mildest terms applied to a certain piece of road work done by the present provincial government on the McLaughlin Road in the county of Kent.

A piece of work that could have been satisfactorily done for \$200, and cost in the vicinity of \$600, the result was that the last day of the road was worse than the first.

One man and his boy employed at the work made as much as \$17 a day. And the worst of the matter is that this is not an isolated case of incompetence and graft.

One of the promises made by Mr. Hazen was that bridge and other contracts should be put up to tender and the work done by the lowest tenderer.

In some instances repairs to bridges have exceeded the original cost of the structures. Exorbitant charges for materials have been rendered and paid and a few friends of the government have been dipping deep in the government chest.

A glance at the auditor general's report will show at a glance that the cost of superintendence, inspection, foreman's wages and charges of that nature is out of all proportion to the cost of labor and materials.

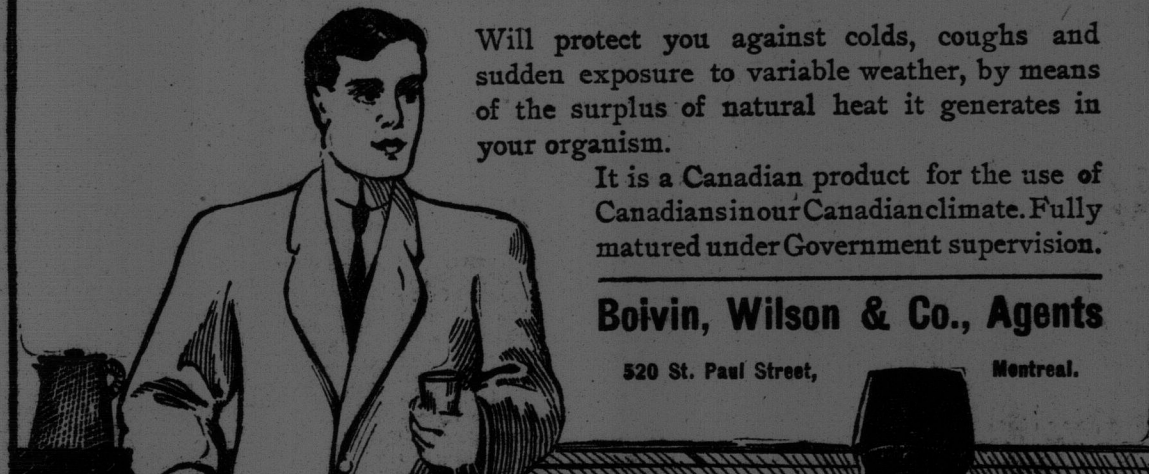

**KING STREET PROPERTY DEAL CLOSED**

Oak Hall Buys Land Adjoining Store, and Takes 99 Year Lease of Property Next

One of the most important real estate deals of recent years was announced today by Scovil Bros. & Co., Ltd., proprietors of Oak Hall shopping house, in the leasing and buying of the adjoining property on King street, for the purpose of extending their rapidly growing business. For some time the firm has felt the need of extra accommodation and about a year ago wholesale warehouses and a factory had to be established in the Sutherland building in Union street to relieve the expanding retail departments in the King street building. Now it is proposed to centralize the whole business under one roof.

The present stand occupied by Oak Hall, at the corner of King and Germain streets, is held under a lease from the Vernon estate, which has five years longer to run. Now the firm have purchased the strip of land adjoining occupied by W. H. Irving, as a jewelry store, and have leased for a period of ninety-nine years, the lot next adjoining owned by Major John S. Hall and occupied by L. H. Hall's book and stationery business and Louis Green, tobacconist.

The present Oak Hall building has a frontage of forty feet and the newly acquired property has the same frontage, so that the firm will have a combined length of 80 feet in King street and extend to Market street, a distance of 100 feet.

The building on the newly leased property is only two stories high and is under lease to Louis Green for two years from May 1. Mr. Green sub-letting a portion to F. H. Hall, Scovil Bros. & Co., intend tearing down the building at the expiration of the lease in 1913, and erecting there a five-story brick building with basement, as an addition to their present quarters. The two buildings will be connected and elevators installed to make the plant modern and up-to-date in every respect.

The main reason for buying the property is that the firm is at a disadvantage at the present time in having their factory and wholesale business divided from the retail, the latter having increased to such an extent that they were forced to secure quarters in the Sutherland building, where two floors are utilized for carrying on this branch of the business. The firm also have a large factory in Montreal and they expect to be able at some future date to centralize their entire business in St. John under one roof.

A three month lease was shown through the factory in Union street this morning and the extent of the business carried on there was a revelation. A large staff of employees are engaged in manufacturing clothing, there being twenty machines operated by electric power for turning out the goods and an immense warehouse for carrying in stock a complete line of men's furnishings for the wholesale trade.

**READY FOR USE EARLY NEXT WEEK**

New Chemical Laboratory in High School Will be Valuable Aid in Work

The new chemical laboratory in the basement of the High School building which is expected to be finished early next week, and will almost immediately be used by the pupils of Grade eleven, who at present are considerably hampered for lack of space in the old laboratory, which was condemned some time ago by the building inspector and the fire chief. The new room will be finished before the place will be ready for occupancy.

The accommodation will be much greater in the new laboratory than is the case in the one now in use, and classes can be taught in two divisions, which could not be done before. The new room has been fitted with modern improvements in plumbing, heating and carpentering, and is practically fireproof.

Four long working tables for the pupils have been placed, with basins, gas taps, trays, and other up-to-date equipment, and a lecturer's demonstrating table is also in the room. In it are performed experiments which the scholars do not attempt. There is also an cupboard for noxious gases, and there are glass acid-proof chambers and pipes laid in cement for drainage. There are always open for inspection, a feature which will be beneficial.

W. J. S. Myles, who has been teaching chemistry in the High School for some years, but whose place in this course of instruction has since Christmas been taken by Thomas E. Pavers, said this week that he expected excellent results from the new laboratory, as it presented opportunities for teaching, experimenting and demonstrating, which were not enjoyed in the other room, and because encouragement was held out to those engaged in the chemical work.

**ST. PATRICK'S DAY PARADE**  
Another meeting of delegates from the Catholic societies of the city was held in the A. O. H. rooms, Union street, last night to complete arrangements for the church parade to the cathedral on St. Patrick's Day. The matter of engaging bands was discussed and a committee was appointed to attend to this part of the arrangements. A collection will be taken up in the cathedral on March 17 for the orphans. The matter of dress for the parade was left to the societies rather than the representatives to decide.

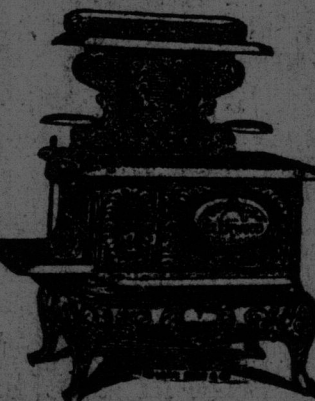
