THE
FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
FRESH-AIR FUND
COMMITTEE,
MONTREAL, 1891.

To the Subscribers and Friends :—

The work of the Committee during the past season, having been carried on practically upon the same lines as former years, calls for only a brief report.

The impression deepens as to the importance of the work and the growing need of the comparatively rich and intelligent coming to the assistance of their poorer fellow citizens. During the heated term of July and August, it will be for the benefit of those living in the less favoured parts of the city that the mothers and children have, at least, a fortnight of pure fresh air and healthy surroundings.

The Inaugural Meeting was held in "The Star" Offices on the 9th June, 1891, when the Executive Committee was formed, as follows :—
Reverend John Nichols, Chairman (re-elected); Mr. Charles Alexander, Hon. Treasurer (re-elected); the Reverends James Patterson, Vice-Chairman, Samuel Massey, H. J. Evans, E. McManus, James Watson, (Chambly), G. H. Butler, (Chambly), and Messrs. George Kemp, Peter McLeod, H. F. Lunan, Peter Sinclair, Donald Campbell, J. M. M. Duff and S. H. Parsons.

The Executive Committee was sub-divided into smaller Committees upon the selection of Inmates, Day Excursions, the Purchasing of all Supplies, and upon Finance.

Dr. W. G. Stewart was re-appointed Chief Medical Officer, and Mr. Berwick (a fourth year Medical Student of McGill College) Resident Medical Officer at the Home. The Committee here desires to record its satisfaction with the labors of these gentlemen in the important duties entrusted to them.

Various localities for a suitable country house were considered, and finally the "Officers' Quarters," at Chambly, which had been rented for the three previous seasons, was secure upon favorable terms, and Miss Watt (who had given excellent satisfaction in the same position the previous season), was re-engaged as Matron, with a competent staff of assistants.

No time was lost in preparing to receive Inmates at the Home, and satisfactory transport arrangements having been made with the Railways,

sent out 118 mothers and children on the 26th June, 1891.

This Committee met in "The Star" offices on three afternoons of each week during the season, to receive and consider applications. Applicants, as in former seasons, were required to furnish the certificate of a Clergyman, Priest, or prominent citizen, showing that the applicant was known to the signer as fitted to become an inmate of the Home, and could not procure such a benefit without the aid of the Fresh-Air Fund. The applicants were referred by the Committee to the Medical Officer, who, if satisfied that their homes, or neighborhoods, were free from infectious diseases which might endanger the health of the Home, granted the necessary pass entitling the holder to admission thereto, which permit stated thereon the train whereby the applicant was to journey to Chambly.

All inmates enjoyed the advantages of the Home for a fortnight, and in cases where it appeared an extension of this period would be highly desirable, such extension was granted.

The Home was found to afford accommodation for 275 adults and children, exclusive of the staff, and its capacity was taxed to the utmost during the season.

Each party was forwarded to Chambly in special cars furnished by the Railways, and was in charge of members of the Committee, who attended to its needs until the members were comfortably quartered at Chambly.

Altogether 1,205 adults and children partook of the benefits provided during the season, as compared with 378 mothers or adults, and 817 children in 1890—an excess of 10, although the Home was closed earlier than usual—on the 21st August. There is reason for congratulation that no cases of serious diseases broke out, and but one death occurred. In this instance the infant was very ill when taken to the country, and the benefits to be found there came too late.

DAY EXCURSIONS.

Two enjoyable and highly successful excursions were held during the season, by steamer "Prince of Wales," to Ile Perrot, Lake St. Louis, by which some 1,200 mothers and children were afforded a day's outing. The total cost was \$333.20, and only lack of sufficient funds prevented a larger number of day trips being arranged for. The Committee is of opinion that, in cases where mothers or children are unable, for a variety of reasons, to be absent from their homes for a period of two weeks, this means of health-giving recreation in the country is most beneficial. It may prove of interest to note here that the Toronto Fresh-Air Fund confines itself altogether to this branch of the work.

PURCHASES.

The Committee determined to limit itself to the purchase only of such furniture, linen, etc., as was urgently needed, and therefore the amount debited to furniture account (\$212.81) is very moderate.

In the purchase of provisions, etc., a new departure was inaugurated, and proved highly successful. Tenders were invited for the supply of meat, groceries, butter, bread, milk and ice, and the contracts in each case awarded to the lowest responsible tenderer. This latter supplied a satisfactory service at a less cost than was secured in former years.

FINANCES.

The subscriptions received during the year amounted to \$4,095.18. A statement of receipts and expenses, duly audited by Messrs. P. S. Ross & Sons, Chartered Accountants, is submitted herewith, and the expenses show a gratifying decrease in several particulars.

In conclusion, the Committee desires to record its special thanks to all the subscribers and donators of clothing and supplies; to the Great North-Western Telegraph Co. (through Mr. Angus Grant), which, as in former years, transmitted all messages free of charge; to Mr. C. F. Sise and Mr. C. P. Sclater, of the Bell Telephone Co., who placed an instrument in the Home for use free of charge; to James Stephenson, Esq., Supt. G. T. R'y; to W. D. O'Brien, Esq., Ticket Agent G. T. R'y; to D. McNicol, Esq., General Passenger Agent C. P. R.; to A. C. Stonegrave, Esq., District Agent, and other officials of the Central Vermont R'y; to the officials of the Richelieu & Ontario, and of the Ottawa River Navigation companies; and to Willis & Co., who, as in former years, kindly supplied a piano at the Home free of charge.
