FIRST SEDERUNT.

In the City of St. John, and within St. Andrew's Church there, Tuesday, the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, at half-past seven in the evening:

At which time and place the Synod of the Maritime Provinces of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met pursuant to adjournment. The Rev. James Maclean, the retiring Moderator, conducted Divine Service, and preached from the text Mark xi. 22: "Have faith in God." He thereafter constituted the Synod with prayer.

On request of Mr. Hogg, he and his seconder were allowed to withdraw their motion.

By the request of Dr. Murray and Rev. John McMillan, their names were withdrawn from nomination.

Rev. W. P. Archibald moved, in amendment of Rev. A. McKay's motion, and Rev. K. McKay seconded, that Rev. N. Kay be Moderator.

On the vote being taken the motion was carried, and Mr. Sedgwick was declared elected, and was introduced by the Moderator. On taking the Chair he thanked the Synod for their confidence in him, and emphasized the importance of the work which the Synod is summoned to perform.

The Synod has listened with intense interest to the thrilling story which has just been recited, of the trials and triumplis of the Cross on a field consecrated by the labours of our sainted pioneer Missionary, and by the tears and blood of our faithful martyrs.

The Synod fervently hopes that all our people may strive to copy the abounding liberality of the Island converts, whose zeal should provoke very many, and whose givings may well put us to shame.

The Synod feels grateful for the visits already paid by our Missionary to so many of our congregations, and the interest awakened by them. We affectionately commend him and his devoted wife to the hearts and homes of those they may yet visit, and earnestly pray that, after a pleasant and profitable furlough, they may be permitted, with recruited energies, to resume work on the new and yet more extended field which, with singular magnanimity, our beloved Brother has expressed his anxiety to enter.

Mr. J. Scott Hutton moved the reception of the report and the adoption of its recommendations, which was seconded by Rev. Edward Grant and unanimously agreed to. The thanks of the Synod were tendered to the Committee and especially to the Convener, for their services.

2. That Presbyteries appoint an Augmentation Committee to apportion to congregations their share of the amount levied upon them; to visit such congregations as may require such visitation in the interests of the Fund 2 and to visit all aid-receiving congregations with the view of introducing among them an improved financial system, and of inducing them to increase their contributions for the support of ordinances, and generally to manage within their bounds.

3. That all permanent additions made to their pastors salaries by aid-receiving congregations from the beginning of 1886, be deducted for the current year from the sums apportioned to these congregations by Presbyteries, and from the amounts levied on Presbyteries.

4. That Presbyteries, when they deem it desirable for the better working out of the Scheme within their bounds, be arged to call for assistance in the form of a deputation from the Board.

5. That all Presbyteries be required to complete their work and to hand in their returns to the Secretary on or before the 1st March, 1886. And that all applications for Supplement for the year beginning 1st April, 1886, be made on or before this date, as it will be impossible for the Committee to consider applications made after their meeting in April.

The Chairman of the Committee reported that the late Mr. McLeod, of Halifax, made provision in his will for the reversion to this Synod, for the benefit of ministers having a salary less than \$600 per annum, of certain sums invested for the benefit of several legates during their life-time, and that the sum of \$230 is now available for that purpose.

It was agreed that the Agent of the Church, the Rev. P. G. MaeGregor, be authorized to receive the funds from the executors of the estate of Mr. McLeod, and that the Moderator of Synod and the Conveners of the Augmentation and Home Mission Committees, be a Committee to consider the destination of the McLeod bequest on behalf of weak congregations, and to report at next meeting of Synod.

The Synod tendered to the Committee, and especially to the Convener, its most cordial thanks for their arduous and successful work.

Moved in amendment by Dr. McKnight, and seconded by Rev. J. McGregor McKay:—

The Synod, having heard Dr. Ross in support of his memorial, and considered the whole circumstances of the case, reverse the decision of last Synod respecting the amount of Mr. Ross' retiring allowance, and authorize the College Board to pay him an allowance at the rate of \$1000 per annum, beginning on the 1st December next.

On the vote being taken the amendment was lost by 37 for and 43 against.

The Rev. Neil McKay then moved, seconded by Rev. R. Laing the amendment just lost with the substitution of nine hundred dollars for one thousand. When the vote was taken there appeared 48 for the amendment and 37 against. The amendment was then put as the main notion yea or nay, when there appeared 48 yeas and 35 nays. The decision of the Synod was thereupon intimated to Dr. Ross by the Moderator. Dr. Ross, on receiving the intimation, protested for leave to appeal to the General Assembly for reasons to be given in. The attention of the Moderator having been called to the question of the competency of the appeal, the Moderator ruled that inasmuch as the General Assembly remitted the petition of Dr. Ross to the Synod with power finally to issue the matters contained therein, the appeal of Dr. Ross is not competent.

Moved by Dr. McKnight, seconded by Rev. J. Carruthers, that the Synod approves of the action of the College Board in paying Dr. Ross' salary in full to the end of November next.

SYNOD FUND.

Rev. A. McLean Sinclair presented the report of the Committee on the Synod Fund, and stated that after having charge of this Fund for the last nine years, he now desired to resign his connection with it, and gave it as his opinion that a standing committee on Synod Fund should be appointed. The report was received and adopted, and on motion the hearty thanks of the Synod were tendered to the Committee, and and especially to the Convener.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Dr. Patterson made a statement in connection with the Widows and Orphans' Fund, and reminded the Synod that they are to nominate a committee of twelve, to be appointed by the Assembly. The Synod

expressed satisfaction with the condition of the Fund, and remitted the nomination of the committee to the Committee on Standing Committees.

On taking up, the petition of the Rev. E. Ross to the General Assembly, complaining of the treatment of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, which petition was remitted to this Synod, Mr. Ross asked leave to withdraw his petition. On motion, this leave was granted.

STATUS OF REV. E. ROSS.

On the next business—The Status of Rev. E. Ross remitted to the Synod by the Assembly, it was found that there was no extract minute of Assembly, and that the documents necessary to the consideration of the case are not on the table. It was therefore agreed that the matter be allowed to lie over for the present.

PRESBYTERY RECORDS.

The Committee to revise the Records of the Presbyteries of P. E. Island, Miramichi, Truro, Lunenburg and Shelburne, Victoria and Richmond, Pictou, Wallace, St. John and Halifax, reported that these Records are carefully kept and the business regularly conducted. The reports were received and the Records ordered to be attested accordingly. The Records of the Presbyteries of Sydney and Newfoundland have not been forwarded.

It was agreed that the evening Sederunt be prolonged to eleven o'clock.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place at half-past seven o'clock, of which the Moderator gave notice, and this Sederunt was closed with the Bengdiction.

SEVENTH SEDERUNT.

In the same place, and on the same day:

The Synod of the Maritime Provinces met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with prayer.

The Minutes of the Sixth Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Dr. Macrae reported that the nominating committee proposed the following names to be recommended to the Assembly as the Committee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund:—R. Laing, Dr. Patterson, G. McLean, John Forrest, T. Sedgwick, D. Blackwood, Geo. Mitchell, J. Scott Hutton, R. Baxter. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON TEMAERANCE.

The Rev. Neil McKay, Convener, read the report of the Committee on Temperance, and moved that the report be received and the recommendations be considered seriatim. This motion was duly seconded and unanimously carried.

The following recommendations were adopted :-

- 1. That in the line of previous deliverances on the subject, the Synod believes the traffic in intoxicating drinks to be an evil which every Christian community ought to disapprove and suppress.
- That this evil is so firmly entrenched among our social customs and so closely allied with perverted appetite and filthy lucre, that it can be suppressed only by the co-operation of suitable moral influences and effective legal restrictions.
- 3. That the Synod strongly disapproves of the action of the Senate of Canada in persistently barring improvement in Temperance Legislation, and in seeking to destroy the efficiency of the Canada Temperance Act, by authorizing the sale of beer and wine, contrary to the strongly expressed wishes of the people.
- 4. That we approve of the action of our people in standing by the Canada Temperance Act, as the best means of legislation at present available for graphing with the evil of intemperance, but at the same time that we encourage them to avail themselves of every constitutional means to obtain advanced legislation in the direction of complete prohibition.
- In the judgment of this Synod, all professing Christians should be total abstainers from intoxicating drinks as a beverage.
- That the arrangement by which the quantity of liquor that may be imported into Scott Act Counties has been reduced from forty gallons to ten, is strongly disapproved and condemned by this Synod.

The thanks of the Synod were tendered to the Committee, and especially to the Convener, for their report.

LETTER FROM W. C. T. U.

The Rev. J. Hogg read a communication from the Womens' Christian Temperance Union, and moved as follows:—

That the Synod receive the communication, assure the W. C. T. U. of New Brunswick of its hearty sympathy with them in the great object for which they are working—the suppression of intemperance—and cordially commend their earnestness in seeking to attain such an end.

This motion was duly seconded and unanimously carried.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Rev. Joseph Hogg, Convener, read the report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools. The report was received and the recommendations were considered seriatim and adopted as follows:—

- That Presbyteries exercise greater diligence in order to secure a report from each school within their bounds.
- 2. That a Presbyterial conference on Sabbath School work be held annually.

SUMMER SESSION OF COLLEGE.

Resumed the consideration of the remit of Assembly anent a Summer Session of the Theological Hall.

The Rev. A. McL. Sinclair moved, seconded by Mr. W. H. Blanchard:

That the Synod, taking into consideration all the circumstances of the case, deems it inadvisable to change the time of holding the Session of the College at Halifax, from the winter to_0 the summer months.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. A. Simpson, seconded by Dr.

In the interests of Home Mission work it is desirable to examine fully the matter of a Summer Session at Halifax, and with a view to that recommend the Board to communicate with the College authorities and Home Mission Boards in the West as to the likelihood of securing a good number of students.

When the vote was taken the amendment was carried and became the judgment of the house.

LEAVE TO LICENSE,

Leave was granted the Presbytery of St. John to license Mr. Paul Langille, to the Presbytery of Halifax to license Mr. William M. Fraser, to the Presbytery of Truro to license Mr. Henry Dickie, when these young men shall have completed their Theological studies.

STATEMENT FROM THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

The Rev. Neil McKay, President of the Alumni Association of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, read a paper representing the views of the Association on the possible ways of assisting and improving the College.

OBITUARY NOTICES.

The Committee on Obituary Notices reported as follows:—

I.—REV. MATTHEW WILSON,

late of Sydney Mines, C. B., died on the 13th December, 1884, in the 79th year of his age and 42nd year of his ministry. He was a native of Glasgow, Scotland, and came to Cape Breton in 1842 to take charge of the large and scattered congregation of Sydney Mines, of which he continued Pastor till 1883, when he retired from the active duties of the ministry. His long and successful pastorate, his genial and amiable disposition, his ability and earnestness as a preacher of the Gospel, won for him the confidence and high esteem, not only of his own people, but of all classes and creeds.

II.—REV. ALEXANDER MUNRO

died at Middle Musquodoboit, July 12th, 1885. He was born in Rosshire in 1806, and completed his studies at King's College, Aberdeen. During several years he was assistant to his uncle, Rev. John Munro, of Halkirk. After the disruption he engaged in Home Mission work in the Highlands in connection with the Free Church, until 1849, when he came to New Brunswick. He had the prospect of a permanent settlement in this Province, but his attention having

been called to the destitution prevailing in Prince Edward Island, he removed thither, and was settled at Valleyfield in 1850. He was distinguished for his mature scholarship, knowledge of church order, and for his courteous and kindly manner. He was also eminent for his piety and zeal in every good work. He discharged his ministerial duties faithfully, and continued his arduous labours among a strongly attached people until a few months before his death.

III.-REV. ROBERT SEDGWICK, D. D.,

was born at Paisley, 10th May, 1804, and died at Middle Musquodoboit on the 2nd April, 1885. For several years previous to leaving his native land he was Minister of the Belmont St. Secession Church, Aberdeen. In 1848 he came to Nova Scotia and settled in Musquodoboit, where he labored with singular acceptability and zeal until the period of his retirement, three years prior to his death. He was Moderator of the Synod of the Lower Provinces at the time of the Union, having previously filled that honorable office and being retained therein at the first Synod after the Union in 1875. In 1876 he received from Queen's University, Kingston, the Degree of D. D. He was author of several treatises, indicating no inconsiderable literary power. No one was better known or more highly esteemed throughout our entire church than Dr. Sedgwick. His name was familiar as "household words" in these Maritime Provinces. presence at any gathering was a benediction, and the fragrance of his worth and work will abide. He was identified closely with the missions and institutions of the church, and did much for their advancement. In the days of his vigor no one was more popular in the pulpit or on the platform, and even in the evening of life, when his powers, physical and mental, were beginning to show signs of enfeeblement, "the old-man-cloquent" retained not a little of the charm that attached to his earlier efforts. His flow of spirits and fund of incident and ancedote; his genial disposition and power of fresh and forceful utterance made his company courted, and his friendship warm and fast, while his unction in prayer made his leading of our devotions in our congregations and church courts as the gate of Heaven and a time of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. No death of late years in our ecclesiastical or home circles has created a greater blank than that of Dr. Sedgwick.

1V.—REV. CHARLES FRASER,

of Richmond Bay, East, died on Monday, 25th May, 1885, after a few days illness, in the 42nd year of his age. He was a native of Cavendish, P. E. Island, and having passed through a full examination, both literary and theological, in our own institution and in Princeton, N. J., he was licensed, ordained and inductèd into the pastoral charge of West Cape. Brae and Campbellton, in which congregation he labored faithfully and with great acceptance for ten years. He then resigned his charge and settled in Richmond Bay, East, where, by appointment of Presbytery, he continued to labor until the Sabbath before his death. His labors were greatly blessed and he was much beloved by the people to whom he ministered, and not only so, but by his genial disposition and his broad Christian charity, he was esteemed and beloved by all denominations. The Synod record their sympathy with the bereaved widow and children in the great loss which they have sustained, and their earnest prayer is that the God of the widow and fatherless may be their God and Father here and their portion evermore.

V.-REV. THOMAS M. CHRISTIE

was born at Shubenacadie, on the 14th day of March, 1848, being the son of the Rev. George Christie, (then minister there) afterwards of Yarmouth. Through both his parents he enjoyed the precious heritage of ancestral piety, and the pious manse training of his early years produced its fruits in his consecration of himself in the days of his youth to the service of the Redeemer. He also showed an inclination for study, and passed through a full course of study at Dalhousie College, where he graduated with credit. Having devoted himself to the work of the ministry he studied Theology first at the Presbyterian College,

Halifax, and afterwards at New York. His mind was early directed to missionary work, and while completing his studies he accepted an appointment as Home Missionary at Sing Sing. But about the same time the church requiring a Missionary for the new station at Couva, in Trinidad, he offered his services and was accepted. He accordingly commenced his labors there in the autumn of 1874, and prosecuted them with earnestness and success till the autumn of 1882, when the state of his health rendered it necessary for him to relinquish the work entirely. He accordingly left Trinidad to the great regret of his brethren in the ministry, the members of the Board and all interested in the mission. Subsequently, his health being partially restored, he accepted an appointment as home Missionary in Southern California, under the mild climate of which it was hoped that he might yet be sparred for years of useful service in the church. But the good Lord willed otherwise and called him to "enter the Master's joy," "his sun going down while it is yet day." This Synod sympathizes deeply with his widow and children, strangers in a far off land, and commits them to the care of their Heavenly Father who "preserveth the strangers and relieveth the fatherless and widow."

The report was received and adopted, and a copy of the notices ordered to be sent to the families of the departed brethren,

STANDING COMMITTEE ON SYNOD FUND.

Rev. A. McLean Sinclair moved, seconded by Rev. E. A. McCurdy, that a Standing Committee be appointed on the Synod Fund. The motion was unanimously carried and the following Committee appointed:
—Rev. G. S. Carson, Convener; Revs. A. McLean Sinclair, J. Hogg, W. Grant, R. D. Ross and D. McMillan.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS ON REV. E. ROSS' APPEAL.

The Commissioners on the Appeal of Rev. E. Ross to the General Assembly, reported that the Appeal was fallen from, and that they were thus relieved of their work. The report was received and adopted

Rev. E. Ross was heard in giving his reasons for falling from the appeal.

MEMORIAL FROM S. F. MORRISON.

Read a memorial from S. F. Morrison, Secretary of the congregation of Upper Londonderry, praying for a final settlement of the difficulty between the Londonderry congregation and Rev. E. Ross.

Mr. Isaac Flemming, as representing the congregation, was heard. The Rev. E. Ross spoke for himself. He said, while confident that I can disprove with written statements, the statement of the memorial that I consented either directly or indirectly to the Conference of Presbytery fixing the amount of the award, and believing that \$125 is inadequate compensation, yet in conformity with the urgent request of brethren who believe that the interests of religion would be subserved thereby, I consent to accept the amount of Presbytery's award, and let this matter take end. He requested that this statement be recorded.

REPORT ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Rev. A. McLean Sinclair, Convener of the Assembly's Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, made a statement of the condition of the fund. It showed that not more than one-half of the congregations and only forty-seven ministers contribute, and that the funds are consequently low.

Moved by Rev. E. A. McCurdy, seconded by Mr. W. H. Blanchard, and agreed:—

Having heard the statement of the Committee of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, receive the same, thank the Committee for their work and strongly urge ministers to join the Fund, and congregations to make annual contributions thereto.

REPORT ON SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

The Rev. E. A. McCurdy, Convener, explained that there is no report this year on Systematic Beneficence. This statement was received and the matter passed over.

PUBLIC EDUCATION.

Dr. McKnight, Convener of the Committee on Public Education, stated that there were some small matters to which, as Convener, he had directed attention, but that there was nothing requiring a meeting of the Committee, and that, therefore, there is no formal report.

REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES ON COLLECTIONS.

The reports of Presbyteries as to their efforts to secure collections for all the Schemes of the Church, was called for but there were no reports on the table. On motion, Clerks of Presbyteries were requested to have their reports ready for next Synod, and the matter was then passed from.

EDICT OF NANTES AND CHURCH OF BOHEMIA.

On motion of Dr. Burns, seconded by Dr. Pollok, the following resolutions were unanimously passed:—

The present year being the Bi-centenary of the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes, an outrage upon civil and religious liberty which inflicted untold suffering and loss upon our honored branch of the Presbyterian Church,—it is hereby recommended to our Ministers to call attention to the event in its historical relation by lecture or otherwise, as opportunity may offer.

Inasmuch as the General Presbyterian Council at its last meeting at Belfast, earnestly recommended the Churches represented in the Council to make an effort in behalf of the struggling Churches of Bohemia, and the General Assembly at its last meeting endorsed this recommendation; this Synod cordially commends this worthy object to all within our bounds interested in the Land of Huss and Jerome.

MINUTE ON RETIREMENT OF DR. ROSS.

Dr. McKnight, on behalf of the College Board, to whom the matter was committed last Synod, reported the following Minute on Dr. Ross' work, which was unanimously adopted :--

In connexion with the retirement of Dr. Ross from active service as a Professor, the Synod record their high appreciation of the work he has been anabled and honored by God to do, especially in the education of young men for the work of the Ministry. He was ordained to the charge of West River congregation fifty years ago. During the early years of his ministry the Presbyterian Church of Nova Scotia was suffering from the insufficiency of the number of its ministers to carry on and extend its work. Such means of education for the ministry as had previously existed within the Province had become less efficient or less available. It became evident to M1. Ross, and others associated with him, that the church required an institution of her own. After some agitation of the question, the Synod came to the same conclusion, and appointed Mr. Ross as their Professor. For two years he carried on his College work in Mr. Ross as their Professor. For two years ne carried on his charge, and conjunction with that of the pastorate. He was then relieved of his charge, and for some years performed, alone, the work of a whole Faculty of Arts work was afterwards shared with the late Professor McCulloch; and the Institution, then organized, was transferred from West River to Truro. On the organization of Dalhousie College he came to Halifax, and from that time has occupied the position of Principal of the College and Professor of Ethics and political Economy. During part of the time he has also rendered valuable service in other departments of instruction: as Experimental Physics; and, His wisdom in counsel, and his energy and perseverance in latterly, Hebrew. action,—the versatility of his powers, the wide range of his attainments, and the unswerving fidelity with which he carried through the work entrusted to him, have contributed largely to the prosperity of the church, and call for devout gratitude to its glorious Head, who bestowed such gifts upon His servant. The Synod express their sympathy with him in the infirm condition of his health, and pray that he may enjoy much peace and comfort in his declining years, and may yet largely serve the Master by letting the light of a screen and godly old age, radiant as an autumn sunset, shine before men, and thus attract them to the love and service of his Heavenly Father,

RESOLUTION OF SYMPATHY WITH DR. MACGREGOR.

On motion of Rev. Joseph Hogg, the following minute of sympathy with the Agent of the Church was unanimously adopted :--

Having learned of the impaired state of the health of Dr. MacGregor, the Agent of the Church, which has caused his absence from this Synod, from which he has not before been absent for several years, and where the benefit of his counsel has been felt; this Synod hereby assures him of its deep sympathy with him in his illness, and of its warmest prayer to the God of all grace and comfort that He may restore him to health and enable him to serve the Lord in the active duties in which he has been so long engaged,

VOTE OF THANKS.

On motion of Rev. T. Cumming, seconded by Rev. E. Scott, it was unanimously resolved :-

Report of the Committee

OF THE

HUNTER CHURCH BUILDING FUND,

From Oct. 1st, 1884. to Oct. 1st, 1885.

THE Executors of the Hunter Estate have informed the Committee that there has been no sale of property for the year past, but they have paid over \$600, -being balance of rents received by them over and above expenditure for repair of houses, insurance and taxes.

The Committee have also received Bank Interest, \$304, and Interest from Congregations, \$120.25, making in all, \$1024.25,—so that when the Agent's salary, Miss Wier's annuity and other expenses were paid, there remained little to be given in free grants.

The sum of \$775 capital was returned by congregations, which, with a balance of \$259.49 in fund at the beginning of the year, makes \$1034.49.

The applications for Loans during the year were not urgent, and therefore none were granted. The Committee therefore berrowed about half of that sum, \$542.23, temporarily, to meet urgent requests for free grants.

While no money has been loaned within the year, \$895 have been paid out in aid of the following congregations:-

(1) LAKE AINSLIE, \$75.

Second payment, making \$150, which it is believed has been well applied, and helped materially in the finishing of that church.

(2) MOOSEBROOK, \$100.

This grant was made to a section of the Noel congregation too remote to attend the Noel church. The people had no proper place for public worship, and the Committee cheerfully granted the sum named to build a church, 38x28, 18 ft. post, at a cost of not less than \$600. The Committee had evidence that the case was a worthy one and urgent,-for the people, though willing, were poor, and the congregation itself in a struggling condition.

(3) PARRSBORO', \$250.

This completes a grant of \$500, without the promise of which at a critical juncture in the history of the congregation, it is questionable if the new church would have been undertaken. That congregation has now a well finished building in a suitable locality, with good prospects of progress.

(4) RIVERSDALE, LUNENBURG Co., \$100.

This makes the third \$100 to this congregation, but without this grant the church would not have been finished. The people themselves contributed \$135, though they had just completed the payment of an expensive school house, and the Presbytery have the gratification of knowing that the church is finished to their satisfaction.

(5) RESERVE MINE, C. B., \$200.

This grant was made to a congregation of very considerable ability, but it required four places of worship, in the construction of three of which the congregation had largely exerted themselves in the past. They were also employed in bullding a manse, to cost between \$1500 and \$2000. In these circumstances, the Committee concluded that they would be serving the interests of that congregation and of the Body by making the grant named.

(6) "THE ROCKS," \$150.

This completes the sum of \$300 to aid in the erection of a church at the "Blue and Black Rocks," which is a small settlement near the entrance to Lunenburg harbor. Particulars given last year need not be repeated. Mr. Miller, in sending receipt for the \$150, writes: "I need only say that the grant promised by your Committee practically built the church, for I do not think the people could have been started with this most necessary work, had it not been for such help." President Forrest, having officiated there lately, testifies to the increased comfort in conducting public worship, and to the marked improvement in the personal appearance and conduct of the people.

Another sum of \$20 has been paid to insure the Bedford Church for three years. The case is exceptional, the vote arising from the weakness of the appropriation.

Several congregations, usually punctual in their payment of instalments, have requested one year's delay, stating the causes; and the Committee, knowing that the request was not the result of indifference, granted it.

They have, however, to express regret that several congregations are far behind, indeed, we may say very far behind,—so much so, that the Committee will have to take immediate steps to see that their notes are not shut out by the Statute of Limitation.

The Committee deeply regret that they have not funds on hand to meet the subjoined earnest requests for free grants. They regard the applications as worthy, and will be happy to respond to them as soon as they receive funds. They have to state that all sums paid were applied for, prior to the applications that remain undetermined

Since the closing of the account, the Committee, not being able to give to Lockeport a free grant as requested some time ago, have decided to give a free loan of \$500, being nearly the whole amount in fund.

Rules for the Administration of the Hunter Church Building Fund.

"That the Fund be employed in the following manner:—That one half be used in loans without interest, on church buildings, to be repaid in instalments, extending over such a period of years as may be determined on; and that the other half be kept invested, and the annual income therefrom, employed in grants to aid congregations erecting places of worship or in liquidating debt on churches."

"That the Fund be administered by the Board under the following

regulations:—
(1.) "All applications for aid shall come through the Presbytery of the bounds, who shall forward to the Board recommendations as they may deem proper, and such information as they may consider necessary, to enable the Board to judge in the case."

(2.) "Before receiving any aid, congregations shall afford to the Board satisfactory evidence that the church is held, and by a secure title, in connection with this body, and also that it is duly insured."

(3.) "The amount guaranteed, either as a donation or a loan, shall be given on the condition of such efforts on the part of the congregation as may be agreed upon."

(4.) "The amounts loaned shall be secured to the Board by mortgage on the church, or bond of the Trustees, or otherwise to the satisfaction of the Board."

(5.) "In case a congregation which once received aid from this Fund, and which has not its property insured, shall lose its church by fire, it shall not receive any aid from this Fund."

(6.) "Congregations which received loans from the Hunter Fund, shall in all cases keep their churches insured, at least to the amount borrowed, over and above all indebtedness, so long as they are indebted to the Fund."
