Chamber, Newcastle, on Tuesday, the 11th day of April, A. D., 1876. Comity of Northunberland.

1. That the Police district for the town of Newcastle shall extend from the lane on the upper or westerly side of the lands owned and occupied by James Falconer, to the lower or easterly line of the lands formerly owned by James Ledden, and presently occupied by John Lawlor, Esq., and from the middle of the River Miramichi to the roar line of the front lots, including the ships, vessels, bones canoes and rafts in front of said district.

That the Police districts for the same of Chel. cames and raits in front of said district.

That the Police districts for the town of Chatham shall extend from the upper or westerly line of lands owned and overpiled by Alexander Mortion, Eaq., to the upper or westerly line of the shippard and farm property formerly owned by the late Robert Johnston, Jumbor, deceased, and from the middle of the River Mirandich to the rear line of the front lost, including the ships, vessely, boats, cances and rafts in front of the said district.

3. That part of the building known as the Fire Engine House in the Town of Newcastle, heretofore occupied and used for Palice purposes, is hereby hired, set apart and established as a Lock-up-House for the Police district of Newcastle
