ON CYCLOPS.

The Fugitive Slave.

Was discussed in the United States Senate on Tuesday. Davis, Cass, and Hamlin spoke warmly on the subject, declaring that the conduct of Great Britain could not be extenuated without disgrace and dishonor.

The Henry Clay.

The Coroner's Jury, in the Case of the Henry Clay Disaster, decided that the death of all the persons, and each of them, was the result of an act perpetrated by John F. Tullman, Thomas Colver, James L. Jones, James Edmundson, Edward Hubbard, John German, Charles Mervin, and the said keepers, which set was evidently dangerous to others, and evinced a depraved mind, regardless of human life, although it was perpetrated without any premeditated design to effect the death of any particular individuals.

Death of Sands, the Cleric Performed.

An extract from the *Newark Standard* (Wayne Co.) states that on Saturday evening it was advertised that Mr. R. Sands, circus performer, would be buried at Newark, and his head downcast, by means of a scientific apparatus suspended to his feet. The experiment was successfully made by Mr. Sands, and the audience went away perfectly satisfied, with what they were told, all except one individual, who said Mr. J. was not able to perform the last part of the circus.

Mr. Sands offered to exhibit the same performance in any place where there was a calling having a strong religious character, and said his weight could be obtained. The large room in the town hall was selected. Mr. Sands repaired to the hall and commenced his anti-position on performance on the ceiling, and an elevation of 15 feet from the floor. He had suspended himself by the waist, and was in the act of reclining when a large portion of the platform gave way, and he was precipitated to the floor beneath.—Mr. Sands was taken up senseless; his neck was broken by the fall, and death ensued instantly.—[Boston Times.]

Important Trial.

Dr. Gaudet et al v. Edward Allaire and William Calms.—This trial in Albert County occupied 14 days. The plaintiffs belong to Nova Scotia, and the case was tried in Nova Scotia last winter, and was gained by the plaintiffs, but the Jury in Albert County, in this Province, have given a verdict for the defendants. The trial was relative to the Albert County Mining Leases, the plaintiffs contending that the substance dug from the mines was Asphaltum, and the defendants contending that it was coal.—During the trial a number of the scientific men of the Province, and of the United States were called as witnesses—Drs. Percival, Wellcome, Webb, Antisch, and Lady, and Professor Taylor, being examined for the plaintiffs, and Drs. Hayes, Percival, Jackson, Terry, Deck, and Elliot, and Professor Shillibeer, for the defendants. Judge Wilmet presided. The Jury declared the substance to be Coal, and not Asphaltum.

Esq.—The London Morning Herald says "that the belief is more prevalent that the present Chancellor of the Exchequer under the Administration of Earl Derby, will be able to realize what was the dream only of the late Sir Robert Peel, by reducing the 600 millions of 3 per cent into 2½ per cent stock, at an immense saving to the nation. An operation of such a immense magnitude in its consummation must of course demand a skill and ability commensurate with carrying it into effect, and this and their qualifications may be reasonably anticipated from the financial tact which he has provided for the Councils of the Administration."
