

SCHOOLS THIS YEAR

CasternNavigationSchools have Noticeable Increase in Attendance - Large Number Attend Lectures

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—Reports to the Marine and Fisheries Department show that there is a noticeable increase in attendance at the eastern navigation schools. 242 attended the lectures at North Sydney and 161 at Yarmouth. The illness of Capt. Lugor disorganized the Halifax school. Quebec had the largest of the six schools in the Dominton. There being 753 students. There was no school at St. John last year.

In the eastern division 83 candidates were examined for masters certificates, 20 for sea going, 31 for coasting, 16 for minor waters, 9 for inland waters and 7 for temporary certificates. Of the above 13 failed, 6 for sea going, 3 for coasting, 3 for minor waters, and 1 for inland waters. For mates certificates 66 candidates were examined, 12 for seagoing, 37 for coasting, 6 for minor waters and 11 for inland waters, besides 7 second mates certificates; 14 failed, 5 for sea going, 5 for coasting besides 1 for seacond mate's certificate.

Major-General Sir Isaac Brock, Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, delivered his famous address to the Legislature of the Province 102 years ago today. The outbreak of the war between Great Britain and the United States was still four months in the future, but Brock, with prophetic vision, realized that the struggle was imminent and certain. The man who was to be the hero of the conflict, and to give up his life to the British cause before the year had passed, said:
"England is not only interdicted the harbors of the United States while they afford a shelter to cruisers of her inveterate enemy, but she is likewise compelled to resign those maritime rights which she has long exercised and enjoyed. Insulting threats are offered and hostile preparations actually commenced; and though not without hope that cool reflection and the dictates of justice may yet avert the calamities of war, I cannot be too urgent in recommending to your early attention the adoption of such measures as will best secure the internal peace of the country and defeat every hostile aggression."






