





# **IF SUCCESSFUL WOULD PRE** AN AUSTRIAN INVASION

Chief of Staff's Plan to Carry Important Points Along Guidicarie Chain if Lessini Mountains Would Remove All Danger of Invasion and Permit Italians to Choose Time and Place to Force Mountain Passes Into Austria.

Rome, May 28.—The official reports from the front show that Lieutenant-General Cadorna, Italian chief of staff, is attempting to carry out a well defined movement for the occupation of the important points in the Alps, along the Guidicarie chain of the Lessini mountains the Sugana Valley and the Carnic Alps. This manoeuvre, if accomplished, would place the Italians in an advantageous position to meet the Austrians if they should undertake any serious attack for the purpose of invading Italy. It would also permit the Italians to choose their own time and place for making an attempt to force the mountains and penetrate further into Austria. The occupation of Attisino mountain, which is 6,790 feet high, is regarded as the most important achievement in carrying out this plan.

MILITIA IN CHARGE AT MILAN. MILITIA IN CHARGE AT MILAN.

Milan, Italy, May 28—The military authorities assumed control of Milan today on account of disorders during the last few days. The chief purpose of the military is to protect Germans and Austrians, against whom there have been demonstrations on Increasing severity. Attacks have been directed against their property as well.

Instructions have been issued in Milan to guide the people in case of aeroplane attacks. Householders are to keep in their courtyards large receptacles filled with water, as well as boxes of dry sand, to put out-fires. Upon being warned of the presence of a hostile aeroplane all lights are to be extinguished, and people are requested to go quietly home.



Lord Selborne writes: "I think that the clersy would be acting very wrongly if they will be the solders and meglected those spiritual functions which they alone can perform, and which were never more needed than at the present moment, both by ourselves at home and by our fleets and armies. I believe that this is also opinion of the vast majority of the laity of the Church of England, and I should be very much surprised if Noncontormists or Roman Catholics took a different view about the duty of their clergy." An eminent London rector writes: "There are two perfectly conclusive reasons why the clergy should not enlist. One is that they can do far more work either in

their parishes or as chapians, whether at home or abroad, than they can do as combatants. The other is that at ordination we became official presentatives of an international so ciety—the Catholic Church—and that involves foregoing the right to act in a purely national capacity unless the church is to be robbed of its Catholic witness precisely when that witness is most needed."

The British Attorney-General has introduced a bill in Farliament to enable the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge to overcome the difficulties with which the war has confronted them. He gave a picture of Oxford in war-time with the examination schools turned into a military hospital, colleges housing soldiers, instead of students, the university parks a training-ground. No fewer than 500 of the 2,000 Oxford University recruits are scholars or exhibitioners, and the bill makes provision for financial help for them when they return after the war. Again, fellowships are not to lapse, because of the absence of many of the younger tutors on active service. The bill, too, makes emergency provision for university and college finance. Sir John Simon made it clear that the universities are not asking for assistance from the Treasury or the taxpayer.

"The reduction in the standard of height for recruits, which has not been made necessary by any falling off in recruiting, but may be regarded as a concession to the many men who have been refused on the score of height alone, has been followed by a most encouraging response. This was only to be expected, having regard to the great success attending the recruiting for the eight Bantam battalions, which accepted men as low as five feet in height and were raised in a fed days. It has already been preved that these small men stand the necessarily rigorous training as well as, if not better, than the taller men, while their marching powers are


